Sabbath, June 6, was a memorable day in the history of the Sydney Church of God, and in the lives of six of its members. The brethren rejoiced as six persons were ordained into three different offices in God's Church!

This was the largest number of persons ever ordained at any one time in Australia or in the Southern Hemisphere in this era of the Church. The total number of ordained servants in the three Churches of God in Australia now stands at 10. And with the scheduled arrival of Mr. Royston Page to pastor the Brisbane

Church, it will soon be 11! To date seven persons have been ordained within Australia. Six of all those ordained are native Australians! One of the number just ordained was raised in rank from Continued on Page 2

BREATHTAKINGLY BEAUTIFUL VIEWS of the Kanimbla Valley are obtainable from the tabernacle site, as it folds back in a gigantic panorama of sweeping green fields, rolling up to the foot of rugged hills some miles across the floor of the valley.

Deacon to Local Elder; that's another
first for Australia!

The ordination service was both sobering and very inspiring. Following his introductory remarks, Mr. C. Wayne Cole, Evangelist in charge of the Work in Australia, ordained three very surprised mento the office fo Local Elder. They are Messrs. Frank Simpkins, Clarence Huse and Don Abraham.

The first to be ordained was Mr. Frank Simpkins. Mr. Simpkins, with his wife Bernice, arrived in Australia from Pasadena on June 21, 1961. They have two children, a daughter, and a young son born Sabbath, June 27.

Mr. Simpkins, a graduate of Ambassador College, has worked mainly as a

ministerial assistant, first under Mr. Gerald Waterhouse and currently under Mr. Wayne Cole. Four baptismal tours have taken him through much of Australia and the length of both the North and South Islands of New Zealand. With his ordination, it is certain that Mr. Simpkins will become a more powerful instrument in the hands of God.

Second in order of ordination was Mr. Clarence Huse. Mr. Huse has also graduated from Ambassador College, Pasadena. He arrived in Sydney on October 18, 1961 with his wife Billie Kay. Mr. and Mrs. Huse have one child, a son born in this country about two years ago.

The biographical record of Mr. Huse since his arrival in Australia is similar to that of Mr. Simpkins. He too has been a ministerial assistant to Mr. Cole and a leader in the Visiting and



Letter Answering Departments. His sermonettes and occasional sermons have encouraged and inspired many in the three Churches in Sydney, Melbourne and Brisbane, Australia. Mr. Huse is in the process of planning his fifth baptismal tour since arriving in Australia to assist in the Sydney Office. The tours have taken him through New South Wales, Queensland, Victoria and New Zealand. The forthcoming tour will be on the other side of the continent in Western Australia. The growth Mr. Huse has shown while faithfully performing these duties proves that it is Christ's will for him to be ordained to the office of Local Elder, thus equipping him to be a more useful servant in God's hands.

Third to be ordained was Mr. Don Abraham. Mr. Abraham, unlike the other two, is a native Australian. He came into contact with the Work in 1956 while working as an announcer for radio station 4TO, Townsville, Queensland, a station that was airing the World Tomorrow programme once weekly.

Mr. Abraham with his wife and three



children moved to Sydney over four years ago to be employed in the Sydney Office. Mr. Abraham was the first Australian hired to work in the Sydney Office soon after its establishment. Dedication to duties in the Office and the Church preceded his ordination into the office of Deacon about eighteen months ago. Mr. Abraham has delivered many encouraging and helpful sermonettes and a few sermons in Sydney and Brisbane. He has been active on the Visiting Programme and in the Letter Answering Department. He has also served as second man on a baptismal tour which covered parts of New South Wales and extended along the coast into the northern part of Queensland. He is now preparing for the imminent tour with Mr. Huse into Western Australia. Though Mr. Abraham is not a graduate of Ambassador College, he has proved himself dedicated and zealous in his wholehearted willingness to be corrected and led by the Spirit of God. His ordination as Local Elder equips him for greater service in God's Church.

Next, Mr. Cole announced that two <u>Deacons</u> were to be ordained. Mr. Edward Tupper and Mr. Aubrey Pye were then called to the stage.

Mr. Tupper and his family came to Sydney from near Perth in Western Australia in 1960 for fellowship and instruction in God's Church. Mr. Tupper has been a member of the Sydney Spokesman Club since its beginning in 1961. He has been President of the Saturday night Club since November, 1963. Recently Mr. Tupper was employed in the Sydney Office and is on the sermonette list. As a willing servant, Mr. Tupper has qualified himself for the office of deacon in God's Church.

Mr. Pye is also a long-standing member of the Church and has been a member of the Sydney Spokesman Club since its inception. He has previously served as Sergeant of Arms and is presently Vice President of the Saturday night

MELBOURNE ORDINATION

The afternoon of Pentecost, Monday May 18, was a truly memorable and joyful occasion for the entire congregation of the Melbourne Church. After reading the qualifications of a Deacon from I Timothy 3, Mr. William D. Winner called a surprised and thrilled Mr. David Neil to the front. After showing that God's ministers had observed Mr. Neil's fruits over a period of time, Mr. Winner said that he was able, by the authority and inspiration of Jesus Christ, to ordain him to the office of Deacon.

Prior to coming in contact with God's truth, Mr. Neil spent a number of years in the R.A.A.F. and the C.M.F., emerging as a Troop Commander in 1958. Soon afterwards, a workmate, Mr. Gunnar Froiland (now in his second year at Ambassador College U.K.), introduced Mr. Neil to The PLAIN TRUTH magazine. Since then, his his-



tory reads a fascinating array of firsts! Along with his wife, only four months later he was the first from Melbourne to be baptized and to partake of the first Passover in Australia (in April, 1960), and subsequently, the first Pentecost and Feast of Tabernacles. Later (in July, 1961), Mr. and Mrs. Neil were among the first twenty-one to assemble at the beginning of the Melbourne Church. Less than a year later, Mr. Neil had the honour of being the first President of the Melbourne Spokesman Club, and now the FIRST DEACON! Mr. Neil has also been privileged to give a number of sermonettes to the Melbourne Church.

During that time, Mr. Neil has won the love and respect of God's people in Melbourne for his obvious dedication and enthusiasm, and his warm personality.

Certainly our best wishes and heartfelt

prayers go with you, Mr. Neil, in your new office. May you continue to grow toward further fruits in God's Church.

PENTECOST — 1964!

THREE HUNDRED THREE, an increase of over thirty-seven percent above last year, came together to observe the Feast of Pentecost in Sydney. This year the Sydney brethren and those coming in from "outback" were afforded the added blessing of all-day services on the weekly Sabbath and Sunday, making the Festival a full three days.

The well appointed Anzac House in the city was used for the first two days and the pleasantly located Municipal Council Chambers in the north shore suberb of Lane Cove, on Pentecost. Both halls provided complete facilities for an inspiring Festival.

Sermons by Mr. C. Wayne Cole included a descriptive panorama of today's society, directly paralleling the conditions God said would exist; man's last-ditch hope in the panacea of science which admittedly offers no salvation; how we are either being digested and assimilated into the body of Christ as useful body-building food, or vomited out as refuse; why God has called each one of us, and how little we had to do with it; and the meaning and purpose of Pentecost.

Mr. Cole expressed the confidence that all of the sermons and sermonettes were inspiring, moving and beneficial.

Further north, Pentecost saw the completion of one full year of festival observances in the Brisbane Church -the first annual holyday being the Feast of Trumpets 1963. Pentecost was eagerly and joyfully kept by 135 who were able to carry out the command to assemble together on this day. An allday meeting was complemented by a very fine feast and fellowship. Sermons elucidated the plan of God with special emphasis on Pentecost, the Holy Spirit, trying the spirits, qualifying to rule and appreciating conversion and salvation. All went smoothly with many willing hands making the Feast a total success.

entrance, until the property descends in a series of natural terraces towards the floor of the valley.

The property is in an ideal location, in that it is easily ascessible to both road and rail transport (Blackheath railway station is less than five minutes drive away). Yet, it is private and well secluded, with little or no chance of it ever being hemmed in by surrounding properties.

Much of the beauty which once graced the site is still easily discernible in the well laid out paths and walks, though these have long since been overgrown with weeds and undergrowth. To aid in the task of restoration, and to ensure that full advantage is taken of the properties natural beauty, one of Australia's leading nurserymen and landscape artists has been engaged to map out and plan a proposed garden layout. This will



provide a basis upon which the area may be developed as one of the finest properties in the Blue Mountains.

The grounds offer plenty of scope for the development of ample sporting facilities. The remains of a tennis court can still be seen on the property. It is planned to eventually build a softball diamond, with sufficient area for volley ball and other games, and also to construct a playing area for small children.

The property offers ample space for



very adequate parking facilities, and a well laid-out parking lot is now in the planning stage. It will be so designed as to allow passengers to alight at the Tabernacle entrance, before the vehicle is parked by the driver, thus eliminating any possibility of their having to walk in rain or cold weather from the parking lot to the building.

At the time this paper goes to press, the foundations of the Tabernacle have been completed, with a section of the cement flooring also laid. Much of the preparatory work for the complex system of plumbing pipes and drains has also been finished. Work is surging ahead on foundations for a caretaker's cottage, and the out-building, containing garages and a workroom, is almost completed. It is hoped to have the amenities block finished in the near future. Present plans call for erection of the steelwork to commence almost immediately. Following this the walls will be constructed.

An added blessing which this particular property affords is a wealth of bricks and other building materials which can be obtained from the remains of the old college building still left standing. It has been estimated that well over 200,000 bricks -- still in useable condition -- remain on the site,

and these are in the process of being cleaned ready for use on God's Tabernacle and out-buildings, etc. Despite the magnitude of the task, many dozens of willing helpers have been travelling up to Blackheath each Sunday from Sydney, to assist in this, as well as on the many other jobs which this tremendous project provides. It has been -- and is -- a pleasure to observe the willingness with which those privileged to help on the site have gone about their responsibilities. Despite the very cold weather that is experienced in the mountains at this time of year, and the discomfort that this causes, many of those engaged on cleaning bricks can be heard singing their way through their task.




