Spokesmen Tour Ambascosol Press

Have you ever been inspired? Well, the members of "C" Club, along with their wives and friends most certainly were when they had an opportunity to have a "64-dollar tour" of AMBASCOSOL PRESS, conducted by Mr. C. Wayne Cole and assisted by Mr. Gene R. Hughes. Yes, this tour was certainly a refreshing and inspiring blessing as are ALL things associated with God's Work!

On Sunday, July 11, there was a happy gathering outside the Print Shop at 12:15 p.m. in anticipation of the scheduled 12:30 p.m. start of the tour.

The first section visited was the Lay-out Room. Here a special process transfers the image on the film positives (received from Headquarters in Pasadena) to a pre-sensitized plate. The plate is then "fixed" in a chemical solution in preparation for running on the press.

Next there followed an examination of the dark-room. This, to most of us, looked somewhat like an X-ray laboratory but, after Mr. Cole explained all its fundamental workings, we could see that the room contained all the necessary equipment to enlarge or cut down to size any photographic material that may be required.

Passing through the main office, one

realises that here is true thought and planning for the future growth of God's Work. PLAIN TRUTH covers placed around the wall illustrate the various issues of the PT printed at Ambascosol Press on the new 2-colour press. At this juncture Mr. Hughes showed a special display of coloured covers, and explained how the four basic colours -- red, yellow, blue and black -- are used to achieve the beautifully coloured cover we are privileged to see on The PLAIN TRUTH.

Next, we visited the press room to see where the actual printing is done. It was deeply inspiring to watch this machine in action -- to see it rolling off the wonderful, LIVING TRUTH of God at a rate of one hundred sixteen 8-page-sheets per minute. After watching the press for a short time we were shown how the signatures are folded, which is quite a feat in itself. Finally, an "assembly-line" demonstration by Messrs. Cole, Hughes, Lulham, Lyons and Hopf demonstrated how the 3-knife stitcher-trimmer machine operates.

This completed OUR tour. Make sure YOU don't pass up an opportunity to see how GOD has blessed His Work with a spotlessly clean, beautiful Print Shop. And, THANK YOU, Mr. Cole, for a most inspiring afternoon!

This was not a "bucks" party but an opportunity for members, with their wives and dates, to visit the fascinating Snoobs Creek Trout Hatcheries and, at the same time, to enjoy a scrumptious barbecue lunch.

Eildon Weir is a truly delightful area, with the lake's beauty framed by heavily

timbered slopes and multi-coloured boats dotting the water -- adding unexpected splashes of contrasting colour to a scene of peace and tranquility.

The guide at the hatcheries was a very pleasant and humorous character with an easy flow of words (Spokesmen please note). From him we learned that the ponds contain several million trout ranging in size from a fraction of an inch to several pounds in weight. The large fish are kept for breeding purposes.

After 50 days in baskets the fish eggs hatch to produce youngsters called alcuins. These are fed six times a day until they grow to three to six inches long, at which stage they are about six months old. At this age they are dropped -- by air -- into Victorian rivers and streams.

The day was interesting and instructive and was capped off by a very pleasant trip back to Melbourne through countryside brilliant in the late afternoon sunlight.
