Mr. Ted Armstrong Visits Australian Office

It is now 'telegram-official' — Mr. Garner Ted Armstrong will visit the Australian office this month. The telegram said that he would be arriving Thursday, 6 December, on the Pan American's morning flight 811.

This will be Mr. Ted Armstrong's first time in Australia since his arrival here in November, 1959, with Mr. Gerald Waterhouse and Frank Longuskie to establish our office in North Sydney. This visit will enable Mr. Armstrong to see the development that has taken place in God's Work here during these past three years.

The primary purpose of Mr. Armstrong's trip here is that of church and office administration. However, it is hoped, and tentatively planned, that some contact will be made with

MR. COLE & MR. HUGHES VISIT WILKE & CO.

On Monday, 5 November, Mr. C. Wayne Cole and Mr. Gene Hughes caught the early morning flight to Melbourne. The purpose of their trip was to meet with members of the production staff of Wilke & Co. Ltd., printers of the Australian edition of The PLAIN TRUTH, and to visit their lithographic printing plant. The trip was prompted by a request from Dr. Herman L. Hoeh, managing editor, for specific information regarding certain of the production processes employed by our Australian printers plus plans for enlarging The PLAIN TRUTH to 52 pages — with the addition of a heavier cover.

Arriving in Melbourne at approximately 10.30 a.m., they were met at Essendon airport by Mr. and Mrs. William Winner. A

New Churches In U.S.A.

The Philadelphia era of God's Church once again witnesses Christ's commission being fulfilled.

A new church began at Harrisburg, Illinois, 10 November, 1962, with an attendance of 153. The scattered flock from the tri-state area of southern Illinois, southern Indiana, and northern Kentucky will now be ministered to with weekly services.

Meetings at this carefully chosen location will change the place of meeting for a number who were travelling long distances to the St. Louis, Missouri and Indianapolis, Indiana Churches. A weekly attendance of 200 is expected. Mr. Hal Baird will pastor this new church, in addition to the St. Louis Church. Mr. Robert Steep, a recent Ambassador College graduate, will continue assisting Mr. Baird in this newly organized area.

The Bloomington, Illinois, pastorship, formerly held by Mr. Baird, now becomes the responsibility of Mr. John Bald.

A second new church will also serve a three-state area. This is the Toledo, Ohio Church. The first service was held on Friday evening, 9 November, 1962. Attendance in Toledo will be drawn from western Ohio, northern Indiana, and eastern Michigan. Some thirty members who formerly travelled the longer distance each week to South Bend, Indiana, will now attend meetings in Toledo. Some have had to drive about 300 miles, return trip, to attend services.

Mr. Bill McDowell will be the pastor over

the Toledo congregation in addition to those at Pittsburgh and Akron. He will be assisted, for the present, by Mr. Robert Hoops who is local elder in the Akron Church.

For a *long* time the Detroit, Michigan brethren have waited for the opportunity to attend weekly Sabbath Services; now they will be able to make the comparatively short journey to Toledo via expressway.

Approximately one month prior to the Feast of Tabernacles, services commenced in the new Indianapolis Church. Now there are a total of . . . three new churches in a two-month period for midwestern United States. God is feeding the flock in addition to proclaiming the Gospel of His Kingdom to the world. PRAY for these churches that they will bear much fruit.

Continued from page 1 quick trip to downtown Melbourne brought them to the Wilke & Co. main offices and letterpress plant located in Jeffcott Street. After consulting with the Assistant Production Manager regarding forthcoming changes, an afternoon visit was scheduled to the lithographic printing plant located at Clayton, 15 miles south of Melbourne.

This turned out to be a very timely visit, in that the November issue of The PLAIN TRUTH was in the process of being printed and the visitors were able to actually view the two-colour printed sheets coming off the press. Also under production at the same time were *Readers Digest* and *Vogue. Time*



and the Australian pictorial *Walkabout* are also produced in this plant. Housed here, is one of the most complete and modern book binderies in Australia as well as the huge reel-fed letterpress machine which prints the Melbourne telephone directory.

Under installation at the time of the visit, was a huge five colour web-fed offset press imported from America. This press is quite similar to the one which prints the 300,000 monthly copies of The PLAIN TRUTH in the U.S. — as pictured in the May, 1962 issue. Both *Time* and *Readers Digest* are slated to be printed on this new press, freeing a smaller web-offset press for use in printing The PLAIN TRUTH. This machine would eliminate the current necessity of transporting the printed pages to the Melbourne plant for folding in that on this press the folding is an integral part of the printing process. This would greatly speed up production time.

Next came a visit to the plate-making plant housed in an adjacent building. Here it was possible to view the complete plate-making process from the initial preparation of the film positives shipped from Pasadena to the actual finished plate. Here also was gathered information for Dr. Hoeh that may result in bringing the quality of the Australian edition much nearer to that of the parent

Upon completion of the tour of the plate-making-plant, just enough time was allowed to catch the 6 p.m. flight to Sydney.

What can you as readers of The PLAIN TRUTH expect to see as improvements within the next few months?

First of all, beginning with the December issue, a much higher quality paper is to be used. This paper, specially imported from Holland, will be a vast improvement over local Australian paper now being used both in whiteness and printability. Gone will be the 'snowy' pictures and flecked solid areas. It has taken six months to finally institute the change, but the outcome will certainly be worth the time and effort expended. Then planned to come with the January issue will be the addition of a heavy cover of top quality gloss coated stock - to be affixed to the existing 48 pages. Following this it is hoped that production time can be stepped up, putting The PLAIN TRUTH in its more than 20,000 Australian readers' mailboxes as much as a full week earlier than it is now possible. All this will combine to make The PLAIN TRUTH an even more effective means of performing the commission of Mark13:10 in Australasia as well as the rest of the world.

And now, back from space, those radio waves are looking for a landing place. The modern thinking seems to be that outside aerials are not needed, are 'dangerous', and 'unattractive'. Well, don't you believe it!

Nine chances out of ten your set contains an inbuilt 'loop' or 'ferrite' aerial. Such aerials are limited. If you live in a steel frame building, signal strength is cut considerably because the metal acts as a shield. Distance also affects effectiveness. If you live near the station, you may have no reception problems with such an aerial — but it's a different situation in the outback. There, perhaps you should have a 100 ft. length of wire strung about 40 ft. high between the house and barn — a good landing strip for those waves.

The strength of the signal absorbed by your aerial is minute, especially if you are many miles from the station. Just as the transmitter that made the radio signal had to boost it to great strength, your receiver has to build it up again, because it has weakened through distance.

Unlike the station transmitter, your set receiver must be capable of receiving different frequencies. The main components of this circuit (behind the scenes of your radio dial) are a coil of wire and tuning condenser. The latter is composed of metal plates moving in and out between another set of fixed plates as you turn your dial. It holds the wanted frequency and rejects others.

Since there is much to be gained in amplifying lower frequencies, the modern 'superheterodyne' receiver introduces a second frequency into the set to 'beat against' the original. The resulting combination gives a constant low frequency of about 455 Kcs. This process is called *conversion*.

Next this low frequency is amplified in one or more intermediate frequency stages. Then, by a process we call detection (or demodulation), the sound signal is separated from the original radio frequencies.

From then on the process is one of simple audio amplification and mechanical reproduction of the original sound at the speaker.
