

# **PENTECOST**

With much rejoicing and thanksgiving, members of the Church of God gathered together in Sydney and Melbourne on Monday, June 11, to keep the Feast of Firstfruits — Pentecost — the 1932nd such feast to be kept by the New Testament Church since its foundation on that memorable day of Pentecost, Monday, June 18, 31 A.D.

This year, the Festival was observed in Sydney by 135 people (101 adults and 34 children), including visitors from the outback of New South Wales, an increase of 35% over last year. Another 72 people observed the Feast in Melbourne (56 adults and 16 children), making an overall increase this year of 109% observing the Feast in Australian congregations.

The services in Sydney were conducted by Mr. C. Wayne Cole, assisted by Mr. Clarence Huse and Mr. Gene Hughes, while the Melbourne services were conducted by Mr. Tony Hammer, assisted by Mr. Dexter Faulkner, who had flown to Melbourne a few days previously with his wife and son.

As well as those gathered in Sydney and Melbourne, many brethren scattered through-

# CHURCH GROWS! TOUR TO WESTERN AUSTRALIA

At 11:50 a.m. Sunday, May 20 Mr. C. Wayne Cole, accompanied by Frank Simpkins set out again for territory never before visited by representatives of God's Church. This was the beginning of the second such venture in six weeks — the New Zealand tour being the first.

Two Ansett A.N.A. DC-6B's combined their efforts to complete the Sydney to Adelaide to Perth trip in a grand total of ten hours twenty minutes, bucking headwinds of up to 70 miles per hour. The weather in the territory to be visited had just changed from searing 90 to 100-degree temperatures to definite early winter conditions. Despite the weather, unexpected warm greetings were received at Perth Airport from members, Mr. Frank Clarke and Mr. John Rozentals, as they welcomed Western Australia's first baptising-visiting tour.

Using a rented Holden sedan as means of transport, the tour officially began Monday morning as fourteen people were met at the G.P.O. in Perth. Of the twelve scheduled to be counselled, seven were baptised. Following this highly encouraging beginning,

two more were baptised during the afternoon of the first day.

Arrangements were made on Tuesday to baptise an elderly couple in a Perth suburb. Despite formidable illnesses and circumstances, this couple demonstrated a willingness to forfeit their lives if necessary in order to be baptized.

Wednesday, May 23 found the team headed south toward Busselton. Here a self-employed dairyman and farmer was met. This single Welshman displayed a fine attitude and was the first person to be baptised in the cool blue-green waters of the Indian Ocean.

Proceeding southeastward on Thursday through rugged country, another young single man, carrying the full responsibility of

Five thousand U.S. troops rushed to Thailand ... 600 Indonesian paratroops invade Dutch New Guinea ... Pro-Communist advances in Laos ... Indonesia reported to be considering granting Russia permission to establish a military base on one of her many islands ... These are only a few of the events of the past month that have caused many Australians to cast worried glances toward the vast expanses of our empty far north, and the teeming millions of our neighbours living just beyond our northern shores.

Many previously complacent, self-satisfied Australians are only just now beginning to realise how isolated this country is from her "great and powerful friends", and how geographically close we are to the hordes of Asians living virtually right on our borders.

The placing of U.S. troops in Thailand together with token forces from the U.K.. Australia and New Zealand, followed dramatic Communist successes in neighbouring Laos, where troops of the Royal Laotian Army fled before opposing Communist forces from the villages of Nam Thia and Honei Sai, across the Mekong River into Thailand.

Meanwhile, recent events in Indonesia give little cause for rejoicing in the Western camp. President Soekarno's assertion that Communism has "a great role to play in the anti-colonial struggle" will do little to reassure Western leaders of Indonesia's intentions.

At the same time, the Dutch government's

acceptance of the Bunker Plan as a basis for negotiation with Indonesia makes it increasingly evident that Holland is planning to leave the territory in the near future.

The plan has already been accepted "in principle" by Indonesia, and calls for the handing over of the administration of West New Guinea from Holland to Indonesia in phases through a neutral party, and guarantees the right of self-determination of the Papuan population.

(What Indonesia will do with this latter provision once she occupies the country needs little conjecture.)

Also causing concern in Australia is the failure of the U.N. to take prompt action to prevent further aggression by Indonesia, when called upon to do so by Holland.

In rejecting Holland's appeal, the U.N. acting Secretary-General, U Thant (of Burma), claimed that to call upon Indonesia to refrain from further acts of aggression would be taking sides — and yet by his refusal to act this is precisely what he did! He took sides with Indonesia against Holland!

U Thant stated that before he could take any action to prevent further aggression, Indonesia — the aggressor — would also have to request U.N. intervention!

Imagine a householder ringing the police to say a thief was trying to break into his house, only to be told that unless the thief also requested police intervention, they would be unable to do anything as this would be "taking sides". Yet this is the reasoning of the U.N. acting Secretary-General.

Another source of trouble for the Western allies in South-East Asia appears to be brewing in Burma.

It is reported that last April — soon after General Ne Win overthrew Burma's civilian government — the new regime OUSTED WESTERN TEACHERS AND USIS ADVISORS (Red Chinese are reported in control of 70% of the 350 Chinese-speaking schools.) Now, military intelligence warns, Burmese army leaders are LEANING TOWARDS THE RED CHINESE. WHY? Their growing belief the Reds WILL TAKE OVER SOUTH-EAST ASIA BEFORE

Last month we covered the intricacies of the studios of The WORLD TOMORROW in Pasadena. In case you didn't know — similar, fully equipped facilities are installed at Ambassador College in England — for the use of Mr. Armstrong when in U.K. and Dr. Rea in making Spanish broadcasts.

We can all understand the work of The RADIO Church of God, if we better understand how wireless works. Last month we came to the part where the sound entered the radio station. The majority of the stations carrying The WORLD TOMORROW broadcast receive a tape recording for each day's programme. This tape is threaded on a recorder minutes before the broadcast goes "on the air". It is "cued in" — ready to go at the appointed hour.

At the scheduled time, after a commercial station identification and the time, an engineer in the main control room actuates the tape recorder to "PLAY" and The WORLD

Dear Brethren,

Greetings to all you readers of <u>The Church of God News</u> Australasian Edition! Although we are only approaching the first of July with seemingly plenty of time before the Feast of Tabernacles, it is time to begin making arrangements for observing the Festival to be held this year from 13 October through 20 October. Again this year we will be meeting in the Blackheath Community Center located in the heart of the beautiful Blue Mountains in Blackheath, N.S.W.

All of you who were able to attend this wonderful Festival last year will remember the many ways in which God blessed this group of people who had gathered to observe this annual Festival of the Almighty God. This year, if each does his part and makes every effort to be present, I'm sure we can be very safe in saying we shall have an even greater feast.

Remember, the annual holy-days are commanded by God and in no place throughout the Bible is there the slightest shred of evidence these days are not to be observed by Christians. No, to the contrary, Jesus Christ kept these days and set the example for us to do the same; the Apostle Paul observed these annual sabbaths and taught Gentiles to do the same. Yes, the Bible teaches that Christians today will observe these days and that they will be observed during the 1,000-year reign of Christ which is soon to begin on this earth.

Some have felt they could not take time off from their employment for these annual observances. . .but, I ask you, which is more important. . .to have a few material things on this earth but be denied a place in the eternal family of God or to serve God first, trusting Him to provide your physical needs. Brethren, one of the most essential points for you to understand is that God is unchangeable and is no respector of persons! Jesus said in Matt. 6:33 to seek first the Kingdom of God and your needs would be added. . .God means what He says (Num. 23:19) and will not change or show respect in blessing one but not another! No, you can rest assured, God has not commanded you to do something which He will not make possible for you to do!

God has instructed His people to maintain a savings account throughout the year to provide for the observance of His commanded Festivals. This <u>special</u> savings account is the "second tithe." Every wage or salary earner, business man or anyone with an income is commanded to set aside the second tenth of his income, saving this fund to use in observing the annual Festivals. I realise that some of you did not know about this second tithe until recently and therefore have not saved it heretofore. God understands this and if you now find yourself with insufficient funds this year to attend the Feast of Tabernacles, you should <u>continue to save the second tithe</u> and <u>definitely plan on being with</u>

God's people in 1963. (All of you should have received articles explaining the second-tithe ... if you have not, please write requesting it.)

Brethren, this Festival, the Feast of Ingathering, observed in the end of the year is surely the high-light of the year for every truly begotten Christian. This season pictures the time of the coming great harvest during the 1000-year reign of Jesus Christ. Yes, this festive - season pictures the time to soon begin when this earth will really learn the way of peace and prosperity. To make this Festival accurately picture this coming time of "rest", we must all work to make this a genuine time of love, peace and abundant life. To add to the festivities, we are going to plan on several types of diversion, recreation and social enjoyment to provide a balance. We want you to enjoy the whole Festival . Of course, the most important part is the spiritual instruction but in its proper place God surely approves of our putting our hearts into good clean fun and recreation.

This year, we are asking that each person or family represented provide for his own lodging. We are not going to make bookings through the office of the Radio Church of God and assign them to those attending. To facilitate your making arrangements for your lodging, I have prepared the following list of motels, hotels, inns, lodges, etc. You may have to write to more than one of these establishments before finding the place suitable for your needs. Your bookings should begin on 12 October which, of course, is the beginning of the first annual Sabbath of the Festival.

You will need to arrange for your lodging and your breakfast. Breakfast will not be served in the Festival auditorium. However, the noon and evening meals will be provided by a local caterer for all attending at a nominal charge to each person. We are asking that all plan on eating these two meals at the auditorium. I'm sure you will find this most enjoyable and a time to engage in friendly fellowship with your brethren.

More will be written later in regard to final details on meals, plans for services, etc. This letter is to primarily provide information that you may arrange bookings for your lodging. I might add that you should begin making these arrangements immediately. We have been informed that these guest houses and lodges, motels, etc. begin to be completely booked up for September and October by the last of July and the first of August. By the way, any of you who made your bookings while at the Festival last year (1961) for this coming Festival, should write to the place where such bookings were made and confirm the booking, also sending the deposit as is required.

If more information is needed than that which is provided in this letter and attached list, please write to me at the address of the Radio Church of God in North Sydney and I will see that such information is sent to you.

May God continue to guide, bless and encourage each one of you as you serve and obey your Creator.

Printing Department was established locally, this was the main artery by which the printed Word arrived in Australia for redistribution throughout this nation and South-East Asia.

Having received the "Bill of Lading" and packing Invoice from Headquarters, we proceed to the first port of call — the Shipping Company, where for a small fee the Bill of Lading receives its first stamp. From here we wind our way to Circular Quay to the Maritime Service Board. Having previously filled out forms in triplicate, the first clerk checks weight and cubic footage, okaying the wharfage charge; then it's on to another clerk who fills in the receipt and along to the next clerk who checks it and — thump! The Bill of Lading receives its second stamp.

We now cross to the other side of Circular Quay and enter the Customs Building. Located here is the dispatch section where the Invoice (packing list), along with customs forms properly filled out in quadruplicate, are submitted. After a two-day wait (during which the Invoice proceeds to the Publications Office where any printed matter entering the country is scrutinised by the Censor) we come back again to pick up the Invoice which has duly received Her Majesty's Official Customs Stamp.

We have now cleared the first hurdle but are far from the goal of receiving the Consignment of Books. We must now make a bee-line for the docks at Woolloomooloo.


Upon arriving at the wharf we present our papers to the customs officer in charge who again stamps them with the fourth and last stamp. But we still haven't seen the shipment! With an O.K. from the delivery clerk we're directed onto the dock where yet another clerk shows us our boxes. There is something mysterious about this man as it is possible to walk up and down the shed several times before you find him, nobody seems to know who or where he is. A look at our watches reveals 20 minutes to lunch break and worst of all it's pay day and as everyone knocks off early we have less than 15 minutes to get cleared or it will mean 1½ hour's delay.

The driver goes for the Holden while I look for another clerk who fills in a slip authorizing release of the cargo. Then it's a frantic dash back to the delivery clerk who now fills out a gate pass in triplicate. Rushing back to the cargo, I find, to my utter astonishment, everything loaded in the station wagon, with one of the wharf labour-






Back page: Panorama of beautiful Squaw Valley

reached. He would then have to go on to Perth in order to have sufficient fuel to make it. Five minutes ahead of his time limit, a parting of the clouds made his landing possible.

During the remaining two days of the tour, several additional visits and baptisms in the Perth area were the final portion of the itinerary. The last baptisms were performed late Friday evening prior to a speedy midnight flight from Perth to Sydney via

Melbourne.

On this highly successful tour, 56 persons were scheduled to be counseled for baptism or to be visited. Of this number, 41 met the team and 12 additional unscheduled persons were counseled. These unscheduled were either friends or relatives of those on the list or those who had written the Sydney office requesting a visit during the tour's actual progress. The number of definite scheduled baptism requests was 36. During the tour the final number of requests made for baptism reached 49. The total number baptised was 23. Of this number, 14 are in or very near Perth. Of the 53 persons met, 33 are in Perth and suburbs.

God's concern for the welfare and progress of His work was evident beyond question during this tour. Not once in this normally dry state was finding sufficient water for baptising of major concern. A *soak* (pond), swimming pools, rivers, oceans and bath tubs were utilised. Time schedules worked out very well and no real hindrances of any kind were encountered during the entire 7600 miles.

Reproduced sounds from the tape, now in electrical form, flow directly through the station's console, limiter, amplifier, and over a cable to the transmitter. All this is nearly a duplication of what we described at Ambassador Studio. So, if it seems like we are going in circles, bear with us.

So far, the sound as originated at the microphone or recorder has been in the form of electrical impulses of varying intensity, in tune with the original voice. Through the various stages, these electrical currents have merely been amplified, or boosted.

Without cable to travel on, the electrical impulses could not be distributed. You can see that radio broadcasting would not be very effective, if we had to have cable from the radio studios to our homes, as with telephones. And what about "out back"?

Sound wire systems do exist however, especially in small countries. Perhaps the Netherlands and U.K. have the most extensive ones. God has revealed a better way — the wireless! You probably know the history of it and the "inventors".

The answer was the Radio Frequency Signal that would radiate into space — eliminating the need for transmission wires — hence the name wireless!

An important part of the radio transmitter circuitry is the *Radio Frequency Oscillator*. The basis of this circuit is a quartz crystal, which is ground down to a size and shape that will vibrate at the station's assigned frequency when an electrical current is applied to it. By this means R.F. Signal is generated.

Next there is R.F. Signal amplification in several stages. In the larger stations, large water or blown-air cooled valves boost the signal to a tremendous strength.

At this point, the original voice electrical currents from the studio are arriving over a cable to the transmitter building out of town. Here in a section of the transmitter circuit called the *Modulator*, the voice currents are super-imposed on the R.F. Signal. Thereby, the R.F. Signal becomes a "Carrier Wave".

That is the mechanism, in condensed form, of the average radio station. But let us not forget the staff. It includes everything from a receptionist at the station's city studios to the General Manager. There are advertising writers, publicity men, program directors, announcers, studio engineers, transmitter engineers, to list a few.

Until next month, we leave Mr. Armstrong's voice on the Transmission Line at the base of that 200 ft. tower, out in that large paddock, five miles out of your city. Then, we will attempt to explain what is a very interesting part of this discourse — the Radio Spectrum and Radiation of waves into space.
