"We left for San Francisco on Wednesday afternoon arriving at 7:45 that evening. We were to meet my wife's

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
Feast at PASADENA ...Report by Miss Bayley

RECENT FESTIVAL Very REWARDING

God's own people in Australia have recently kept a most REWARDING, encouraging Passover Festival with new attendance records being established.

This was unquestionably a most meaningful, truly enjoyable Passover season. God is giving steady growth numerically and spiritually, and our lives are being enriched accordingly year by year. The instruction and the fellowship, commanded by God, becomes more evidently vital and priceless each Festival Season.

In Sydney special preaching services were conducted each day or evening, except one evening for which our meeting hall was not available. Twelve new converts were buried in baptism just before the Passover and during the Feast of Unleavened Bread. Just prior to the Passover, Sydney had its largest weekly Sabbath Day gathering ever with 200 in attendance. The following night 139 brethren partook of the Passover service and the next night 219 attended the Feast. Attendance held near 220 throughout the Festival.

This year Mr. Winner reports that, "Old attendance records for Melbourne fell and new ones were established." Melbourne had a total of 62 observing the Passover this year. The next night 114 were present at the Feast compared to 51 last year. Mr. Winner stated that everything moved along very smoothly and every indication showed that the Festival was enjoyed very much by all.

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A Shepherd's Adventure

This letter from Mr. Percy Neale was so interesting we asked permission to print it for all of you readers. It is inspiring to notice what a shepherd will do for his sheep...and remember, Jesus said, "I am the Shepherd"!

"On 28th March I had a yardful of sheep and the rain came suddenly. I just had to let them go on a bit of high ground and go home. It rained until Saturday (nearly 7 inches) and the whole country was well soaked.

"On Sunday morning I drove as far as I could on sandy ground, and then walked to my downstream neighbors to help him get some of his sheep out of the river channels. We just had to throw them into the water and make them swim out the other side. We accomplished that after much heaving and splashing, and then walked a few more miles to his brother's place to get a car and truck out onto high ground on the other side of the river. By the time we had bogged them a few times it was dark, and we were well stuck, so we walked to a neighbor's place and borrowed a tractor to pull

"After walking back to the river and rowing across, we started for home. Went about a mile in a Land Rover and then climbed aboard another tractor which was parked on the road, but could only go about 2 miles, and it became necessary to walk again. They

just don't make a vehicle to negotiate this mud. ("Go anywhere," say the ads.) Oh yea! Anyway I got home at 1:30 A.M. and my feet were sore next day, because I'd left my boots somewhere in the mud and there are plenty of sharp thorns.

"The river came down next day and rose to 1 ft. of the '56 mark which was the highest since 1910. It came under one side of the house, and cut me off properly, and I didn't have much tucker except some wheat and honey, and that has been my main diet for the past 3 weeks.

"A few days later, I decided to go out and see how the sheep were, and I was swimming across a channel, holding my clothes clear of the water with one hand. It was hard work, and I began to lose altitude and take in water. I grabbed a tree, and coughed and spluttered, and out shot my teeth into the water. I made a swipe at them, and missed the first time, but was successful next try, for which I was thankful. I never would have been able to chew some of that unleavened "bread" I made, without them. Boarding house steak has a gentle nature by comparison. Of course my clothes and matches got wet, so I might just as well have left them on. The sheep were all right, but a bit hungry, and I was able to move them on to some


