Baptizing Tours In Planning Stage!

About 375 persons in Australia and New Zealand are waiting to be met by baptismal tours -- many of whom will be met this summer. This number excludes the three church areas, Sydney, Melbourne and Brisbane. The addition of these church areas would presently raise the estimated total to nearly 500! About 75% of this number are requesting baptism and the remainder wish to be visited.

The area to be covered includes a substantial portion of both north and south islands of New Zealand and every state in Australia plus the Northern Territory. Australian applicants represent about 25% of the land surface of this continent, or 750,000 square miles. This includes most of the well-settled areas. All states show a comparatively good, steady response taking into account population figures and broadcast coverage. New ZEALand response is exceptional. With no radio time open to The WORLDTOMORROW in New Zealand -- 65 await baptism and 16 want visits at the time this goes to print!

These heartening facts should cause rejoicing and bring to our minds the matter of stewardship and responsibility. The Bible commands us many times to rejoice and also -- to PRAY. We are told to labour fervently in prayer. God has commanded us to put our hearts into His Work.

You can pray that God will lay it on the hearts of some who are weak or doubtful, to really seek Him with their whole heart and come to know they are truly repentant. Some need that extra portion of help to yet take the step of asking to be met by a tour this year. All are going to need a great deal of help to crucify the self and to come willingly to God, wanting to be totally ruled by Him. It requires God's supernatural power to enable all to see their true needs and act accordingly.

We are commanded to pray that <u>God</u> will send labourers into <u>His</u> harvest... that He will direct and inspire the planning, contacting, and visiting of those whom He has called...that He will provide the wisdom, strength, efficiency and safety needed to do His will on these tours. Will you remember your responsibility to <u>think</u> and <u>pray</u> about forthcoming tours which are NOW in the planning stages? You will again be informed about these tours from time to time.

All the recordings feature the voice of God's Evangelist, Mr. Norman Smith, and are loaned out like library books for two-week periods to interested blind persons. Nearly 500 blind people --primarily co-workers -- have received the "Talking Books" so far, and over 20 enquiries are arriving weekly.

The records are mailed all throughout the United States to any blind person -regardless of religion or finances -requesting them.

In Isaiah 55:11 God Almighty says: "So shall my word be that goeth forth out of my mouth: it shall NOT return to me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it." Yes, we can REJOICE in knowing that this new facet of God's Work WILL PRODUCE FRUIT of righteousness!! Remember to PRAY to the Almighty that He will bless these "Talking Books" and use them to further the fulfillment of Matthew 24:14, "And this gospel of the Kingdom shall be preached in all the world for a witness unto all nations, and then shall the end come."

This first letter is from a member who recently lost a high-ranking teaching position in keeping the Feast of Tabernacles: "I simply must take this opportunity to share with you the wonderful way Almighty God has intervened on my behalf in finding employment fol-

lowing my dismissal.

"Investigating every job which could have possibly been open for me in teaching around Sydney, I found no success. 
