# Your Best --No Less

It is one thing to give your heart to the Lord, but it is another to give your *life* to Him. It is one thing to surrender your vile personality, and another to do all you can to refine that personality.

For the most part the average Christian is content to give his heart and his vile person to the Lord, not stopping to think that his gift would be so much more fitting if he went the "second mile" and really surrendered his LIFE and went ahead to refine his vile person.

Upon first coming to the Lord there is no one but that is vile and corrupted by sin. "For all have sinned, and come short of the glory of God," and "I know that in me (that is, in my flesh,) dwelleth no good thing"; so says the Bible in Romans 3:23 and 7:18. The best that any of us can offer the Lord is "no good" in itself.

But the young person who is really interested in giving his Lord an "appropriate gift," like we sometimes are concerned about choosing an appropriate gift for a good friend, will look beyond the day of his first commitment to the Lord. He knows that he was vile and "no good" then; but he also knows that his very best is none too good for the Lord. So, he goes ahead to refine himself in every way possible so that the gift he has given will be even more "appropriate."



There is many a young person who progresses through the years of his high school studies, not really knowing what the Lord wants to make of him—the him that is the gift he gave to the Lord—not really knowing just where he is to fit

into the mighty army of Christian soldiers. He could sit down and say, "Well, Lord, here I am, worthless and no good. If you can do anything with me this way, good luck." Or he could say, "Well, Lord, I'm no good in myself, and I'm worthless to you as I am; but I'm going to do the best I can to fit myself for some appropriate place in your army."

The Lord does not always make it readily known just what He wants in the way of service from a young man. Perhaps it will be one of the professions, maybe a minister of the Gospel, maybe a zealous promoter on a layman's level; or maybe even a humble soul with only a tender smile and a prayer of faith that reaches heaven. (Did I say ONLY?)



Sometimes the young lady wonders what the Lord wants her to be, besides being a Christian through and through—maybe a nurse, maybe a teacher, maybe a stenographer, maybe a missionary to far-off Africa; or maybe just a loving little mother to rear her son to be an Elijah, her daughter to be a Tabitha. (Did I say JUST?)

In either case, the young man, the young lady, dare not waste the precious years of youth in do-nothing-ness. Those

years ought to be used in careful preparation for effective service wherever the Lord leads.

A young man once said, "I don't know what the Lord wants me to do, but I am going to get the best education I can so that when the Lord does show me, I will be able to do a better job of it." This philosophy is what will drive a young person on to make the best use of his youth to prepare for his adulthood—that period of life that is so fruitful for the Lord if careful preparation is made in youth.

It may be that as you read these lines you are wondering what the Lord wants to make of your life. You may have thought about various fields of employment where you could give your LIFE in service: the ministry, the mission field, nursing, farming, church administration, school teaching, business, engineering—any number of professions.

Where should you begin if you don't know what the Lord wants?

Well, there have been a number of young folks enter college without knowing and spend a year, or two, or more in one line of study only to find that they were "misfits" there and had to change fields. As a consequence, that precious time was poorly invested and did not serve as a good groundwork on which to build for the future.

To safeguard against this, young people are urged to enroll at Midwest Bible College, where they can spend precious years of youth in studies that will be excellent background for whatever work the Lord may later reveal, whether it be the ministry, the mission field, nursing, dentistry, farming, church administration, school teaching, business, engineering—the very profession you may have been considering.

While young people are studying the Bible and related subjects and spending time together in prayer and Christian fellowship, they are opening their hearts for the Lord's revelation of His plan for them. And beyond just waiting on the Lord for a directive, they are refining their "no good" personality into something better so they can give Him their very best.



If you have been content to think you can give the Lord less than your best, do reconsider. Nothing short of your best is worthy to be given as a gift to the Lord.



# Man On The Moon

On Sunday evening, July 20, 1969, the world was thrilled by a great event. On our television screens we saw two men descend out of a space ship and walk on the moon! They set up a staff bearing the flag of the United States. The president of the United States talked with them by telephone. They picked up moon rocks and dug up moon soil. They returned to their space ship, started its rocket engine, flew up into the moon sky, and joined the mother ship which all that time had been orbiting the moon. Then they returned to the earth—and splashed down in the Pacific Ocean just a few miles from the aircraft carrier which was waiting there for them.

A very short time ago all of this would have been declared absolutely impossible. But now nothing is considered impossible. What does it all mean—and especially—what does it mean to Bible-believing Christians? What does it mean to us of the Church of God? Should it weaken our faith in God, or strengthen that faith? Does it prove or disprove the accuracy of the Bible? What should young people think?

# The Increase of Knowledge

In Daniel 12:4, we read that in the time of the end "many shall run to and fro, and knowledge shall be increased." When the "Pony Express" made regular trips between St. Joseph, Mo., and California, men were "running to and fro." The first steamships took people across the ocean in a matter of weeks instead of months as had been the case with sailing ships. Steam railroads carried people and materials back and forth

across the continent. High-speed autos on super highways traveled to and fro in every direction. We thought the prophecy had been wonderfully fulfilled. And then came the airplanes, and the modern jet planes in which people go back and forth through the sky from New York to San Francisco in a few hours. Surely that was the greatest fulfillment of the prophecy! Who could dream that it might also include man's going to and fro to the moon—and even beyond?

All of this has been made possible by the tremendous increase of knowledge. And much of this has been in the realm of advanced mathematics. With the aid of marvelous computers, calculations are made to plot the course of rockets and space ships. The exact speed which will be produced with a certain amount of thrust is determined; and the precise amount of thrust produced by the fuel is also calculated. This is all so exact

that a schedule of times could be made in advance showing just where the moon astronauts would be at precise times—and they were able to carry this out and meet the schedule almost to the minute. For centuries. schools have taught boys and girls the law of forces—that for every action there is an equal and opposite reaction. This has now been fully proven as rocket thrust sends space ships from earth to moon and back There is absolutely nothing for the rocket blast to push against when ships are beyond the atmosphere of the earth. The ship rose from the surface of the moon entirely by the force of reaction, a force which is a mystery—and yet works!

## How Can Man Leave the Earth?

Some teen-ager may say, "This takes away my faith in the Bible because the Bible says man can never leave this earth. The Church of God has taught that man does not go to heaven but always remains on the earth."

But let us see just what the Bible says and what the church has really taught. On the subject of the eternal reward of man, the Bible says: "The righteous shall never be removed: but the wicked shall not inhabit the earth" (Prov. 10:30). And in Matthew 5:5 we are told that the "meek shall inherit the earth." Now neither of these references says anything about man's not being able to go and visit the moon or other planets.

But rather they tell us that the eternal reward of the righteous after death, will be on this earth.

In the 16th verse of the 115th Psalm we read, "The heaven, even the heavens are the Lord's: but the earth hath he given to the children of men." This again does not say that man shall never be able to leave the earth to visit another place. But it does say that man's place is the earth and that the heavens are God's. Man has penetrated the heavens to the moon only because God has permitted him to do so.

# Bible Science Proved True

The observations and pictures which have been made on the moon trips should increase our faith in the Bible. For centuries men believed that the moon was a light which shined of itself. Genesis 1:16 refers to two great lights in the heavens. One is called the "lesser light" and it was to rule the night. Evidently this refers to the moon which appears as a light in the night sky. But in Job 25:5 we are told that the moon does not shine. Modern science has for many years taught us that the moon's surface is a rock formation which only reflects the light of the sun. But this could not be absolutely proved until man actually landed on the moon. The men who walked on the moon found that it did not shine of itself but that the sunlight was very bright upon it.

Many of the ancients believed that the earth was a great flat

# "Jesus, Use Me"

This is a true story—but unlike the familiar saying, we'll not change names to protect the innocent, for our purpose here is to acknowledge guilt—our own guilt.

It is strange how one fleeting moment can have an impact on your life for weeks to come, but I find this so true as I write this.

I suppose the guilt I feel reflects back a long way—perhaps to something I was taught or maybe to the time of my own conversion, but nevertheless I seem to remember its rebirth, strangely enough, in an insignificant instance I can recall as clearly as if it were yesterday.

If you're a teacher, you realize that the last day of school is no time to be distracted by noise; and if you're a student, you also realize that the last day is no time to sit quietly and learn. So it was that I found myself frantically finishing my reports and grades during my precious "off period," at the same time breathing silent threats at the noise next door in the choir room where the final exam was being given in the form of a free-for-all song fest. Not being a connoisseur of modern rock and "soul" music, I was on the verge of a nervous fit when the guitars suddenly

ceased banging and the chatter of last day business stopped. I became aware of a different note. A lone voice—a small male voice of no spectacular quality was singing to a listening, silent audience which moments before seemed impossible.

I listened a moment. Nice tune—strange I didn't know it. Stranger still, I found myself leaving my desk and going to the door to hear more. Again he sang....

To be used of God,
To sing, to speak, to pray.
To be used of God,

To show someone the way.

I long so much to feel the touch
of His consuming fire,
To be used of God,
Is my desire.\*

Such a beautiful thought—one I had had years ago before college—before facing reality—but nevertheless I had had that thought; that idea. I tried to think how long it had been since I'd examined this idea—this pledge; "To be used of God..." Was that still my desire?

I looked at the boy. He stood straight and tall in spite of his short frame. He looked at his audience in much the manner Jesus must have used to still the multitudes. And like those throngs before, these kids listened. I looked around the room. All eyes were on him.

I recognized many of the students (even though this school's student body numbered nearly three thousand). There was Donnie (He so needed love and security he missed at home—Had I told him of God's love?); Mary (I'd had her in English class—Did she know I loved the Lord?); Bill (He was a troublemaker—long hair and all—When I caught him cheating, did I show God's love?).

Then my eyes fell on a lovely, red-haired girl who was obviously humming the song. I nudged an ex-student in the door next to me and asked the girl's name.

"That's my sis," he beamed,

"To be used of God, to sing, to speak, to pray...." All the rest of the day these words came over and over to my mind. When the day was over at last, I went home seeking a moment's relaxation and drifted to the piano. Methodically I picked up a new book I'd gotten weeks before and surprisingly there was that same song—"To Be Used of God."

Since that day I've sung this song many times, but more than that, I've thought about its meaning: dedication, sincere dedication to God and His cause.

"... to sing, to speak, to pray ..." I can do all those things.

"...to show someone the way...." Now there's the prob-

I guess I've probably gone to more camp meetings and revivals than most people, but my shame remains that this idea, the whole purpose of being a Christian, hasn't been on my schedule. I guess I've used about every excuse in the book to cover my own selfish refusal to get down to business with God—and all the while this burning, this desire to feel God's "consuming fire" has led me further from my only means of ever attaining it.

So as I sit here tonight, I guess I've pretty well summed up my life so far, but through

it all, I think I've found out a few things.

First, I've found again the purpose for my life—for any life—to be the instrument of God.

Second, I realize that whatever talent I may possess came from God and is useless without Him.

Third, I discovered what it was that kept my Christian experience a facade instead of a deep experience, and that was that I was not sharing it with others.

Fourth, I know that to be content with myself I must be at peace with God. That means that . . .

Fifth, I've got to stop using excuses and put God's work first in my life.

Now this much I know; I've used my complaints and dissatisfaction for a hole in which I stuck my head without fooling anybody—least of all God. I also know I've got to get busy, but I also know I'm stumped. Where and when will I be used of God? What can I do? How can I find true service and claim my share in this power God gives when one proves his life is sincerely dedicated to Him?

Before we go further, let's get one thing straight—just living like a Christian won't do the job. I've done that, as well as I could, for years, and God has blessed me and answered prayer. But I want more—I want to claim all He has promised and that means I've got to learn to tell others—not just live a good life and hope they

notice, or perform certain duties and hope they understand.

In his book Effective Evangelism (Harper & Brothers), p. 21, George Sweaze has observed:

Christianity cannot be radiated. It is not only an attitude and a spirit—it is also a body of truth. . . . Knowledge of this truth can no more be radiated than can a knowledge of arithmetic.

From my own experience, I am forced to conclude he's right.

The way I figure it, earnest belief that you have something the people around you need has got to be the first step (Isn't that what salesmen learn?) I don't know if I've quite got that, but I'm working on it. I do know that if I sincerely believe that everyone who doesn't serve God (not just know about Him) will be lost, then I'd better get convinced before God gets tired of me, and start to love those around me enough to care whether they are saved or not.

I'm trying very hard to care. I want to set about putting more love in my heart. I'm concerned. I'm convicted!

All right now, do you see yourself in this idea—it's pretty big, but it's possible. I want to know what real blessings are and those blessings are available only through an active campaign of caring enough to give myself to God that He, through me, can lead others to a fuller life.

I want to find a way. I want

to be used. I want to spend more nights like this one when sleep won't come for my thinking of God's work and what I can do. I want to show God I mean business.

It occurs to me—should anyone read these idle words—that God may stir them with the same dedication or may have spoken to them in the past. (Thank God, it's not yet unique to be dedicated.) I covet suggestions, experiences you have had in witnessing for God and filling the job He has given.

If you, like I, feel amazed at the threshold of never-beforeexperienced blessings and a bit perplexed at the next step, please join me in prayer that the way will be clear. If you have an experience—share it if you can through *Aim*. Perhaps this too is another way to serve God if He so leads. Your experience may help others more than you will ever know.

If you forget what I have attempted here—fine! But please remember this idea—"To be used of God..." Will you join me in saying that this is your desire too? Will you join me in a search for real ways this desire can become reality? Will you help me and those around you to see the many opportunities God is already providing for us to do His work?

Has your prayer-life been ineffective and unrewarding? Perhaps the fault lies in your attitude. It is a fact, that a proper attitude toward prayer is essential before it can be successfully engaged in. One must realize

the blessed privilege he has of actually communing directly with such a One as our heavenly Father. When a child of God bows before Him, his first thoughts should be praise and gratitude to the Creator for His intimate interest in us and for His desire to fellowship with us. Such an attitude is pitifully scarce among Christians, as is witnessed by our sparing use of this divine communion.

This brings us to another point—how often should we pray? Several of the Bible characters throw light on this question. Daniel, for one, was in the habit of praying three times a day. He kept faithful to these sessions even at the risk of his life, proving their importance to him. David testified. "Evening and morning, and at noon will I pray...." I see no reason why Christians today shouldn't set aside a period three times a day to pray. We can find time to feed our physical bodies three times daily, so why not our spiritual life? Which is more important?

One of these three sessions should, if at all possible, be in the morning, preferably early. It honors our heavenly Father when we crucify our lust of the flesh which desires to consume that extra sleep, and rise early to wait before Him. Often God's richest blessings accompany. throughout the day, those who

have made contact with Him in the morning. This idea for early morning prayer is strengthened by the example of our Saviour Who, "...rising up a great while before day, went out and departed into a solitary place and there prayed."

Another practice which uplifts and enlightens the soul is to pray over the Bible. Pick a devotional-type chapter and spend a half hour praying over it Read a verse and then meditate and pray over its meaning, even if it seems apparent. Do this over the whole chapter. God will reveal hidden meaning to those who pray over His Word. The Word was written by the Spirit of God and it takes the Spirit of God in prayer to interpret it.

In our praying, sometimes our minds go blank as to what to pray for. This really should never be a problem. There are hundreds of things to pray for —let me suggest a few.

Firstly, we need always to pray for ourselves that God will keep us in His grace and make us better laborers. But let's not get over-possessed with this selfpraying. Do it, yes, but not to the neglecting of the rest of the world's problems. Don't be selfish.

Pray for the leaders of our country—the Bible tells us to do this.

Pray especially for the lost, both in your own environment, and abroad in the heathen countries.

Pray for your minister. Some

people like to criticize their minister, feeling that he isn't half what he ought to be. Maybe he isn't, but who are you and I to cast stones? Let's pray for him.

Spend time fervently praying over the requests which appear in our church papers. These people are depending upon us.

If you can't think of anything else to pray for, think of the thousands of children who are starving to death in Nigeria. Those of you who have children, just imagine your own in that predicament—slowly and painfully withering away, confused, frightened, perhaps separated from parents and not understanding why they should be exposed to such heartache. If suffering such as this doesn't move us to prayer, may God have mercy upon our calloused souls.

This divine communion, as we have seen, serves a dual purpose. Through prayer Christians maintain a close relationship to the heavenly Father; and through prayer Christians move God to work in behalf of solving this world's many problems-both small and great. In the words of John Wesley, "God does nothing but in answer to prayer." Realizing this, it behooves us to pray. As we put these suggestions into practice and are persistent in following them, our prayer times will become more meaningful to each of us. There is no reason for prayer to be an offensive chore. Rather it will become a delightful blessing.



# Oklahoma



# Oregon

The Oregon Youth Camp opened on June 23 amidst a downpour of rain at the campsite in the mountains. A warm fire in the big wood heater in the dining hall was a welcome center of attraction to arriving campers. counselors, and directors, for everyone got wet while unloading personal belongings and getting settled into various dormitories. By the end of the afternoon, a total of 118 campers were registered. Later in the week more campers came to make a total of 137 campers, 94 senior youth (ages 12 through 25) and 43 juniors (ages 9 through 11). Youth came from many states-North Dakota. Texas, Idaho, Washington, California, and Oregon, as well as from Canada.

"In the Strength of the Lord" was the theme of the camp, these words being displayed on a large banner hung at the front of the chapel. Throughout the week various sermons, talks, and lessons brought out the idea that the Christian muset rely heavily upon the strength of the Lord to remain faithful to Him. 

Many spectacular news items make the headlines. In scanning a typical newspaper, one finds such headlines as: "Much Vandalism by Teenagers Yesterday"; "Riots Still Continue on Campus"; "Speeding Seventeen-Year-Old Arrested for Negligent Manslaughter ''

In view of this type of publicity, which is too often given our young people, I commented to someone (after being privileged, as AIM editor, to attend the camp meeting FYC Banquet): "Tomorrow morning there will be no headlines which say—MORE THAN 200 CHRISTIAN YOUNG PEOPLE GATHER FOR A CHRISTIAN FEL-LOWSHIP BANQUET! It is inspiring to further speculate that were such headlines to be found, the subsequent write-up of this event would read: ... the guest speaker ended his inspiring talk with these words: "Young folks, it's never out of place to step out and come forward for the cause of Christ. If you'd like to do so as we sing our closing chorus, feel free to meet God here." As the chorus was sung, a number of young people stepped out from their banquet tables and came forward, kneeling near the head table, in sincere, consecrated prayer of submission to God and His will for their lives.

Because my own attendance at the young people's activities was very limited, this particular one made "headlines" in my evaluation. Others, who attended many more FYC activities, could supply us with many more headline-worthy items. One of our National FYC officers, in discussing the blessings of working with the young people, remarked to me one day at General Conference: "Have you ever seen 100-125 young people fairly run to the altar. seeking God in prayer . . . ?"

# Are You the Fourth Ox?

On a short trip by ox-cart one day in Brazil I quickly learned the names of three of the four oxen that pulled the cart. Later it occurred to me that I didn't learn the name of the fourth ox. There was a good reason for this. The other three animals were unruly, sometimes rushing forward, at other times holding back. A bit of shade under a tree would attract one and he would pull over in that direction. The driver with his long whip and goad was kept busy. Occasionally he had to take a flying leap from the cart to run ahead and turn the lead oxen back into the trail. All his efforts were accompanied by much shouting of the names of the oxen. It did not take long for one to have them off by heart. But that fourth ox! I never heard his name shouted. I never saw him goaded, nor did the lash descend on his back. In the language of the people, he was manso. He was tamed. He was submissive. And for him the yoke was easy and the burden was light.

If we take Christ's yoke upon us and learn of Him, we will find that yoke easy, that burden light. But if we insist on our own way, if we stand up for our rights, we will find that the yoke galls and that chastisement follows. How much better, how much easier, to submit and inherit the blessing. "Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth."

A teacher told me recently that in his class of teen-aged boys several thought obedience to speed limits and traffic signs was foolishness. Whence this strange anomaly (irregularity)? Why do Christians find it so hard to submit to rules and laws? They admit they are good and exist for our good, yet they are flaunted every day. This applies in many ways in the daily life of the Christian. A visitor to a high school met the sponsor of the students' Christian group. She pointed out several students as the fine leaders of the Christians in the school. The visitors wanted to know why they were all doing detention! Obviously they had not learned yet to submit.

Riding with a friend down a street in a Minnesota town, he glanced at the speedometer as we passed a traffic sign. "Slow

down, Porter," he admonished himself. Then, turning to me, "You know there is one verse of Scripture that should make us Christians obey these signs." I thought I knew what was coming and. sure enough, he began to quote 1 Peter 2:13—"Submit yourselves to every ordinance of man for the Lord's sake." "If you don't do it for your own sake," commented Dr. Porter, "Do it for the Lord's sake."

Business firms reporting on the cause for the last three dismissals of employees said that it was a lack of willingness to accept discipline and authority. This attitude seems to be in the very air we breath these days. "For the Lord's sake," for the testimony we seek to give others, let us learn to submit.

Where may this lesson be learned? Only at the feet of Him Who said, "Take My yoke upon you, and learn of Me: for I am meek (submissive) and lowly of heart: and ye shall find rest unto your souls" (Matt. 11:29). —J. Manley in Field News

# "Is Smoking a Sin?" She asked


When visiting a young Christian lady in the Provincial Hospital at Port Elizabeth, I found her on the balcony of her ward in the company of three other ladies. As she had persistently refrained from taking cigarettes and faithfully borne her witness against smoking, one of the three who were smoking asked me: "Is it a sin to smoke?"

In order to gain her confidence, and to get my point in more decisively I put some questions to her in a way that she had to answer them. Here are my questions and her answers:

- 1. If you as a young mother smoke against medical advice and better knowledge so that the little one to be born will be detrimentally affected, is that right? She said, "Definitely not."
- 2. If your example causes your daughter to take up the habit of smoking early and she does it secretly during school hours, would that be right? She said, "Definitely not."
- 3. If you cannot afford financially to smoke and consequently your children and husband suffer in terms of food and clothing, etc., is it right to go on smoking? Her answer was, "Definitely not."
- 4. If you know by medical statement and your own observations that smoking is furthering a certain bodily affliction of yours, like cancer, tuberculosis, etc., and you smoke wilfully, is that right? "Definitely not."
- 5. If your habit of smoking is forcing you into bondage to such an extent that you must smoke up to 50 cigarettes a day, is that right? "Definitely not."
- 6. If for some particular reason the Holy Spirit speaks to your conscience to abstain from smoking, and you continue to do so, is that right? "Definitely not."
- 7. If a person suffering from the bondage of smoking requests you to help in ridding himself of such slavery and you tell him, "Do not worry about it: smoking is no sin. My minister smokes too," is that right? "Definitely not."

All four ladies then kindly permitted me to share a Word of God with them and offer up a prayer for them. My questions made them think and the consistent reply of "Definitely not" by one of

In Matthew 4:19 we read, "And he saith unto them, 'Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men.'" In Luke 5:10 (last part) Jesus says, "... Fear not; from henceforth thou shalt catch men." As we read verse 19 again, let us ponder upon its meaning. How can we best apply these fishermen?

One type of fisherman is those who fish because they want to —because they love the Lord. These fishermen witness in action and deed and probably have a great influence upon their fellowworkers, classmates, etc.

Some fishermen are fishermen because God has called them to save the lost and dying. We can assume these men are usually ministers and their goal is to win more souls for the kingdom of God.

Unlike the other two fishermen, the last group fish in a little different manner. They fish that their souls may grow in the knowledge of the scriptures. They fish that the Spirit of God within them will not die but will remain alive—eager to do the Lord's will.

May we be in the category of one of these fishermen—the

ones who fish because they enjoy the work of the Lord, the ones who fish because they are called, or the ones who fish to learn more of the Bible and may thus be ready whenever the Lord calls.

"And he saith unto them, Follow me, and I will make you fishers of men" (Matthew 4:19).

"And Jesus said unto them, Come ye after me, and I will make you to become fishers of men" (Mark 1:17).

This month we will also discover that David and the other poets entwined prophetical secrets into their songs. We gain small insights into such times as the crucifixion of Jesus, the return of the Jews, and the profaning of the crown of David.

It is truly wonderful to be able to read about events prophesied in the scriptures—and then either see them come to pass, or read of it in history.

Psalm 89 foretells that David's throne would be established forever. This was a great promise—but with a restriction, as we read in the books of Samuel. David and his sons had to do the works of their Heavenly Father to retain this promise.

This same psalm prophesies the fall of the crown of David, since Solomon and his sons disobeyed God. However, God loved David so much that He still did not destroy his throne. Christ, in the lineage of David, still reigns on the thrones of our hearts, and will someday be our literal King! Isn't this glorious?

Even though there has never been a world-ruling king on an earthly throne since the days of captivity, God provided an even more lasting and enduring King-the Messiah! This Messiah is going to come and judge the world (Psalm 96:13).

To a degree, we even know when His return shall be! Psalm 102 says the time is set! Christ will return when Zion is rebuilt and His praise is found in

Jerusalem! Surely, this means His return is very near, for even now Israel is re-inhabited by the Israelis!


