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

"What Do You Have in Your Hand?"

From the midst of a burning bush God called out to Moses, saying, "Moses, Moses," and Moses answered, "Here am I." God, having seen the affliction and heard the cry of His people who were in Egypt, came down to deliver them out of the hands of the Egyptians and to lead them to a large, bountiful land flowing with milk and honey.

When God told Moses He had chosen him to go to Pharaoh and bring forth the children of Israel out of Egypt. Moses asked, "Who am I, that I should go unto Pharaoh, and that I should bring forth the children of Israel out of Egypt?" God assured Moses, "Certainly I will be with thee." But Moses questioned God further, "Behold, when I come unto the children of Israel, and shall say unto them, the God of your fathers hath sent me unto you; and they shall say to me, What is his name? What shall I say unto them? God told Moses exactly what he should say to the children of Israel, and He assured Moses they would believe and follow him. God also told Moses that He would cause Pharaoh to let His people go by doing many wondrous things. Moses was still doubtful and hesitant so he told God, "Behold, they will not believe me, nor hearken unto my voice: for they will say, The Lord hath not appeared unto thee."

At this point God asked Moses, "What is that in thine hand?" And Moses answered, "A rod." God told Moses to cast the rod on the ground, and when he did, the rod became a snake. God then told Moses to pick up the snake by the tail and when he did, the snake became a rod again. God told

Moses to use this as a sign to show the children of Israel he had been sent to them by Him. After God showed Moses two other miraculous signs to perform. Moses began doubting his own abilities and said, "O my Lord, I am not eloquent, neither heretofore, nor since thou hast spoken unto thy servant; but I am slow of speech, and of a slow tongue." God asked Moses, "Who hath made man's mouth? or who maketh the dumb, or deaf, or the seeing, or the blind? have not I the Lord?" God finally commanded Moses, "Now therefore go, and I will be with thy mouth, and teach thee what thou shalt say."

The remainder of this story is familiar to all of us. Moses followed God's instructions and led the children of Israel in their exodus from Egypt and on to an eventful 40-year journey through the wilderness.

Throughout the pages of the Bible are recorded many other inspiring accounts of how God used men and women in great ways to achieve His goals. Today God still calls His children to do special work for Him, but it seems that many of His children do not hear or answer their Father's call.

How do you answer when God calls you? God may not call out to you from the midst of a burning bush like He did to Moses, but God will speak to your heart, and His voice will be just as audible to you as it was to Moses. When God calls you, what is your answer? Do

you say as the humble man Moses did, "Here am I"—or do you ignore God's call and pretend He has not spoken to you? Do you try to hide from God?

Just as God needed Moses to deliver His people from their bondage in the land of Egypt, God has something He needs you to do. Whether the task God has chosen for you to do is great or small, it is nonetheless very important, for only you can do it. After you have surrendered your life to God and have dedicated yourself to His work, He will speak to your heart and tell you what He wants you to do. Do you ever question the Lord like Moses did by saying, "Lord, who am I that I should do this job? You know I am not very qualified to do this so could You get someone else to do it?" Or do you undertake whatever the Lord gives you to do knowing that He will certainly be with you?

WHAT DO YOU HAVE IN YOUR HAND? God used something as common as the shepherd's stick in Moses' hand to perform a miracle. God will also use whatever you have in your hands in a great way. Just as Moses doubted his own abilities, you may think that you are untalented and unable to contribute anything worthwhile to the work of the Lord. God will use whatever He has given you—your time, your money, a profession, any special talent or ability, or even just your hands-for His work, if you are willing to give

back to Him what He has given to you.

Jesus will return to this earth one day very soon, and all of us should work for the Lord with all our might until that day. Not only must we keep our own lives prepared for Christ's second coming, but we must also be constantly warning others to ready their lives for Christ's return, and we must win souls for the Lord while there is yet time.

ALL AROUND YOU there are people living and dying without Christ. What are you—a child of God and part of God's church—doing to help these people? You know that Christ will come very, very soon. Can you afford even one idle minute? Is there something you are just "holding in your hand" and not using in the Lord's work? Have you given your life to God?—He can do so much more with it than you can.

The Marks of True Christians

True Christians carry four marks which set them apart from the rest of the people of the world. The first mark of true Christians is that they have accepted Jesus Christ as their own Lord and Saviour. They have been born again or have been converted. The following classic reportedly was written by Abraham Lincoln when his young son Tad began school. It reflects the feelings of parents when their sons and daughters venture out of the family world for the first time. It is here reprinted through the courtesy of Mr. Ray Page, Illinois State Superintendent of Schools:

World, take my son by the hand—he starts to school today.

It's going to be strange and new to him for awhile and I wish you would sort of treat him gently. You see, up to now, he's been king of the roost. He's been the boss of the backyard.

I have always been around to repair his wounds and I've always been handy to soothe his feelings.

But now...things are going to be different. This morning he's going to walk down the front steps, wave his hand, and start on a great adventure that probably will include wars and tragedy and sorrow.

To live in this world will require faith and love and courage. So, world, I wish you would sort of take him by his young hand and teach him the things he will have to know.

Teach him-but gently, if you can.

He will have to learn, I know, that all men are not just-that all men are not true. Teach him that for every scoundrel there is a hero; that for every crooked politician, there is a dedicated leader. Teach him that for every enemy, there is a friend.

Let him learn early that the bullies are the easiest people to lick.

Teach him the wonders of books. Give him quiet time to ponder the eternal mystery of birds in the sky, bees in the sun, and flowers on a green hill.

Teach him that it is far more honorable to fail than to cheat. Teach him to have faith in his own ideas, even if everyone tells him they are wrong.

Try to give my son the strength not to follow the crowd when everyone else is getting on the bandwagon. Teach him to listen to all men, but to filter all he hears on a screen of truth and to take only the good that comes through.

Teach him to sell his brawn and brains to the highest bidders, but never to put a price tag on his heart and soul. Teach him to close his ears on a howling mob-and to stand and fight if he thinks he's right.

Teach him gently, World, but don't coddle him, because only the test of fire makes fine steel.

This is a big order, World, but see what you can do.

Youth Questions answered by Ray L. Straub



OUESTION:

I was recently asked why our church doesn't believe in going to movies and dancing. After explaining that movies were bad because of the violence and sex they show, I was told that it is good to know about these things, and that we could learn about them by seeing movies. How can I answer this? Also, is there anything wrong with dancing nowadays, since there are many dances where there is practically no contact?

ANSWER:

The argument you were given for going to movies is a weak one. What good is there in learning about the kind of violence and sex portrayed on the movie screens? Is anyone better off after seeing someone assaulted, robbed or murdered?

Our physical health depends upon the food we eat. In order to remain strong and healthy we eat good food, so that our digestive system can easily turn it into energy. Our minds absorb information in the same way that our stomachs receive food. If we pour a lot of garbage into our minds, our mental health, as well as our attitudes, will soon become weaker instead of better.

Contrary to the belief of some, we do not become spiritually strong by exposure to sin. To the contrary, we fight the devil best when we resist him, instead of allowing him to tease

Concerning the no-contact dances, I recognize that some of our previous arguments against the contact type of dances will not be effective when we try to expose the new types. My personal objection to the non-contact dancing is that it is ridiculous. All of these swivel-hipped, flop-jointed dances tend to represent a release of inhibition. One may possibly get used to watching them and be unaware of the barbaric nature of the base gyrations. That doesn't make them less repulsive.

Aside from whether or not participation in dancing is Christian, I consider that they are in extremely poor taste. They make an otherwise fine-looking young person act like he needs to learn something from a

The contact dances are potentially dangerous because of the explosive possibility involved in persons approaching or of adult age, putting arms around one of the opposite sex—pressing themselves against each other while stepping to the beat of music. I concede that it may not adversely affect all, but the activity is geared to produce more difficulty than good. No one needs it, and it is best left alone.

QUESTION:

Is it wrong for a Christian to pluck her eyebrows?

ANSWER:

I know of no moral implications in plucking eyebrows. This is probably a matter of taste. Once a young lady has grown to the age where she is concerned about her appearance, she has the right to be neat and appear well-manicured. If the plucking of a few stray hairs, or some slight shaping will improve the neat look, I would tend to approve it.

Personally, I consider that eyebrows look best when they look neat but unaltered. This may not mean the shape has not been altered, but that the change effected is not an obvious one.

At this point I should mention a Bible verse that may come to the attention of some in this regard. It is Deuteronomy 14:1, "Ye are the children of the Lord your God: ye shall not cut yourselves, nor make any baldness between your eyes for the dead." In response to this verse I can only advise that we all do what it says—not to make a baldness between our eyes FOR THE DEAD. What this might have to do with cleaning up or slightly shaping the eyebrows in order to make one look neater, I wouldn't know.

Family Financing

Making a Budget

INCOME. OUTGO. DEBIT AND CREDIT. Every home knows this language. Young couples will soon learn to speak it. They will learn by experience or will seek counsel if they are wise. In the total picture, one's budget is a very simple operation. It rests on one simple fact, "One cannot spend what he does not have." The home operates on what it receives through its income—the product of its labors. These are the figures on the Debit side of the Cash Book.

The husband is the one source of the income account. The family expense account, with all future projection, is stacked against the income account of the husband. When the outgo is more than the income, one will soon be ready for bankruptcy. No home can spend more than it makes. You cannot use what you don't have.

I PROMOTE THE FACT that a home must build its future on the husband's income. If the wife works, her money can be saved, can be used to buy some "need" for cash, or to purchase



some "want." A credit system built on two incomes for more than an extended period of six months can run aground. Sooner or later children will bless the home and remove the wife from the labor market. A credit structure resting on both incomes will collapse. No woman can be a homemaker, a wife, a mother and a breadwinner all in one. To set up such a credit system and then have her removed means trouble.

To operate a good budget system requires the close cooperation of both husband and wife. The budget is established on his income, but both must operate it. All plans, present and future, must be based on the husband's ability to make the payments from his "take-home pay," that is, his net salary or what is left after all government taxes and other deductions are removed. The day the check comes, the two will set about to balance the budget. What is left after the budget is satisfied can be deposited to some projected need or set into a saving's plan. Whatever else happens, the budget must be met or somebody will be short on a due date.

THE SALARIED WORKER AND THE HOURLY MAN will know his income. Seasonal employees, some farmers and owners of small businesses, have other problems. But all can approximate to some extent what his income will be this month or this season.

With an income, known or estimated, the budget-conscious family will know where to put its money when it does come, and will not go beyond the amount they expect to receive. A few months of budget effort will give the family a workable knowledge for a useful budget program. It will take courage and much planning to beginand more so if there are financial troubles to solve when they begin the plan. One faces the variable factors in any budget or family money system. There are the normal miscellaneous expenses which should be considered in the making of the budget. However, these can be solved by slight adjustment. Then there are the deep, unforeseen emergencies which can wreck the structure of a home for years without proper preparations or reserve funds. There are men who can operate a multi-million-dollar business, but are bankrupt at the home level. It takes work to operate a home at a profit. It is believed by many that a sound budget system is the answer to the home profit system. This has been proven many times in the redemption of insolvent families.

WHAT IS A BUDGET? It is a plan which tells you where 100% of your income goes. The budget plan my office works with carries some twelve major divisions. When one can go 100% on a budget, no matter what his income may be, he will not lose. Knowing what one gets, he then will fit himself and his plan of living to that budget.

The Christian home budget will begin with God. 10% is taken first and set apart. Perhaps the family will take another per cent to cover their gifts to the church: another small per cent for gifts for others as for weddings, birthdays, etc. Then he considers carefully regular costs, such as rent, food, etc. The total income is thus broken down into basic amounts. This money is set aside and when the bills are due, the money will be there. This is when one discovers whether expenses and income agree. If not, then something must "give!" Often a family will get into financial difficulty before they know what is

Youth "Robbed" of Life

Why do drugs and tobacco appeal so much to man today? What benefits are found in using them? Satan makes them so appealing to youth today by causing young people to think that it is a mark of maturity to be able to inhale smoke and blow it around. One is a real "swinger" if he is man enough to take a trip on LSD or some other narcotic which takes him temporarily from reality into a state of "bliss." The world's appeal is for man to be recognized as a man by the standards which society deems as being popular and "the thing to do." One should remember that no matter what the appeal may be SIN IS NO MARK OF A MATURE PER-SON) The easy thing to do is to follow the crowd but (IT TAKES A MAN TO STAND FOR THE BIBLE AND ITS TEACHINGS.

What does the Bible say about these things? Does it say anything about drugs and tobacco?

If one looks for a verse which states, "Thou shalt not touch tobacco and drugs," he will not find it. In fact, there is not one single reference in which the Bible specifically mentions them. But there are verses which support total abstinence from these harmful things, 1 Corinthians 3:16, 17 says, "Know ye not that ye are the temple of God, and that the Spirit of God dwelleth in

you? If any man defile the temple of God, him shall God destroy: for the temple of God is holy, which temple ye are." Also, 1 Corinthians 6:19 and 20 says, "What? know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you. which ye have of God, and ye are not your own? For ye are bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit, which are God's." There are many things included here which pertain to living a clean life and glorifying God. These verses warn against unclean practices which defile the body. Therefore, thoughts presented therein may be applied directly to our subject! What better example of unclean practices is there than tobacco and

drugs?) I medical reports



The latest medical reports released by the United States Public Health Service reveal that cigar-ette smoking is the Young people, how can we possibly number one cause of lung cancer in men and is the primary cause of other respiratory diseases. Also it has been recently proven that smoking leads to coronary heart disease. Heart disease is the

greatest killer in the United States and the smoking of cigarettes contributes to this fact. Millions of people let lung cancer and heart disease ruin their lives because tobacco defiled their bodies!

The results of abusive drugs on the lives of those who use them are evident. Those who suffer from drug abuse are people who have been affected by the habitual use of drugs. The amazing thing is that drugs can become abusive after only one use because drugs can be "mind warpers.") They cause people to think differently than they would if they never had taken them. Once the mind has been warped, it is very hard, and sometimes impossible, to restore it to normal.

This "mind warping" is illustrated in the cases of many who have been "hooked" by drugs. A young mother who took a trip on LSD killed her infant baby by taking a broken bottle and cutting out his heart. While "gone" on her trip, she took her baby's life because she saw everything out of focus.) There are many such cases which show the harmful effects; but the worst perhaps is in children born to parents under the influence of certain drugs. With drugs like LSD, it is probable that offspring born to such parents will be born deformed and

allow these effects to enter our lives and destroy us? WE CANNOT! WE MUST NOT! Yet it is reported by a California doctor that 40 to 50 per cent of the students at some Los Angeles high schools have taken LSD. Think of it! Almost 50 per cent of an entire student body trading a moment's "thrill" for a possible lifetime of inescapable suffering!

Let's look at it logically for just a minute. If God is the Creator of this world, and if He made us. doesn't it seem that He knows what is best for us? It is my contention that He does. So when He speaks through the Bible, we can take it as His Word to guide us. God knew what effects tobacco and drugs would have on our

To you who want to draw closer to God, and I believe everyone should, I urge you to follow this program of Evangelette.





God near as Mike was baptized! Mike will be going to Midwest Bible College the second semester to begin ministerial training.







Or will you stand firm with those of pure mind and body who are seeking a thrill beyond that which could be imagined by natural man-that eternal thrill and delight of a life without any pain or unhappiness—a life which can only be found in our perpetual reign with Christ Jesus, our Lord!

"Youth in Orbit"—the phrase seems conducive to some interesting parallels.

Quite frequently, it seemed, in the recent Apollo 8 flight, we heard the expression, A.O.S.—acquisition of signal. Apparently A.O.S. was important before each subsequent phase of Apollo 8 could be continued.

It was necessary that the Apollo 8 crew be able to gain contact with the ground crew at Houston. Without this contact, the whole space event would have been a failure.

Another expression heard was "carrier waves." It appears that the carrier waves are the means by which a message could be carried from the ground to the spacecraft or vice versa.

We, as God's "ground crew" must be well aware of the importance of the A.O.S. from our Father. If the A.O.S. seems to be foggy, perhaps we need to check our own "equipment" and conduct to see what is interfering with the carrier waves from God to us. We can be sure the flaw is in our own operation—not in God's.

Could our failure to gain A.O.S, be in our failure to read His Word each day? Could it be in our failure to have a quiet time with Him when He can speak to our hearts? Could it be in our lack of daily prayer—or even in our poor choice of the time when we do these things?

Further, we might check our tolerance meter to determine how much we try to be understanding about the feelings and failures of others. We might check our patience meter, to determine whether our patience holds out in private—and at home—as well as in public. We might also check our ego meters. Are we humble enough to work for God?

Surely if we are to be in spiritual orbit around Jesus Christ, our lives must be drawn to Him, and must show forth those traits which are Christlike.



Quite often we think of the books of Chronicles as being very dull and uninteresting. But if we read them looking for little bits of inspiration, we can see how the deeds of these people were written for our learning and example.

From our chapters for this month I would like to look at one of these thoughts of inspiration. In 2 Chronicles 27:6, we read of Jotham, one of the kings of Judah. "So Jotham became mighty, because he prepared his ways before the Lord his God." The beginning of this same chapter shows how he prepared, or established, his ways. He did many wonderful works for the Lord, but the phrase that caught my attention was the last part of verse 2. "And the people did yet corruptly." It must have been a struggle for Jotham to serve the Lord when his subjects rejected Him. Verse 6 certainly is a wonderful testimony of any person's life, especially with these odds against him.

I wonder how many of us would have the courage to serve Christ in our heart—to say nothing of doing things for Him—if all those around us did not love God. I'm afraid we would be like Ahaz, Jotham's son! "For the Lord brought Judah low because of Ahaz king of Israel; for he made Judah naked, and transgressed sore against the Lord" (2 Chron. 28:19).

It would be much easier to go along with the wicked people, than to stand out as being "odd"

or "different." But look what happened to Judah because of this one man's sin—God brought the whole nation low—while God did not do this under Jotham, even though the people were wicked!

May the Lord give us strength to be witnesses of His power and majesty as Jotham was, and not a detriment to others' salvation as Ahaz was!

If you are in the draft age, you should be very careful and know what you want to do. If you are truly a conscientious objector because of your faith in God and the teaching of the church, you should have no trouble getting your proper classification. However, it is your obligation to be informed and to keep your local board properly informed of your stand.

Since 1942, I have helped many boys get their classification, and it was always easy where the boys were not careless in getting and giving the proper information, and at the proper time. A THE SECOND SEC

TEN COMMANDMENTS

Official Church of God doctrine—Article No. 11

. . "The Ten Commandments constitute the eternal basic law of God for the conduct of His people. These commandments were given by God to be observed by His people from the time they were proclaimed; and inasmuch as none of them has been revoked or changed, they are still to be observed in their entirety.

Reasons the Ten Commandments are binding today:

. . The Ten Commandments were in existence and binding before the Law of Moses was given:

All may be identified (Gen. 4:6-10; Gen. 39:7-9; Exodus 16:20-30). Observance was required by God (Gen. 26:5; Exod. 16:28).

. . The Ten Commandments are different than the Law of Moses:

Commandments—not grievous (1 John 5:3); Law of Moses—burdensome (Acts 15:5 and 10).

Commandments—holy (Rom. 7:12); Law of Moses—carnal (Heb. 9:9 and 10).

Commandments—all binding (Romans 13:8-10; James 2:10-12); Law of Moses—abolished (Col. 2:14-17).

. . The Commandments were existing after the death of Christ when the Law of Moses ended:

All 10 commandments may be identified (Rom. 13:9; Heb. 4:4 and 9, 10; Eph. 6:1, 2, etc.).

Observance is required by God (James 2:8-12; 1 John 5:3; Deut. 7:9).

. Ten Commandments identify sin:

Sin is transgression of the law (1 John 3:4; Rom. 4:15).

. Ten Commandments must be obeyed for man to inherit eternal life:

If thou wilt enter, keep the commandments (Matt. 19:16-21; 1 John 2:2-4; Rev. 14:12; Rev. 22:14).


Texas State FYC Meets
