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Salvation - HOW?

HAT MUST I DO TO BE SAVED? Am I saved by my works or by God's grace? These questions are central and basic when we consider our relationship with the Creator. We will attempt to analyze and summarize the Apostle Paul's viewpoint on this subject as recorded in the New Testament writings attributed to him.

We will begin by discussing briefly the terms "salvation." "Christian," "works," and "grace." This is merely to clarify them for their use later in the article; the questions heretofore posed are dependent upon their definitions. We will attempt to define these

terms, not exclusively from Paul's theology, but from generally accepted ideas and our own concepts of Paul's usage of them.

Salvation is the condition of being saved; it is the state of being right with God.

All true Christians have salvation. The proof of this statement lies in the definition of Christian, which is, one who is Christ-like. All who are



Christ-like are right with God. True, no Christian ever attains that perfection which was so manifest in Christ, but one reason God sent His Son was to be an example for us, that we might strive for this quality - Christ likeness. Thus, if we are a Christian (Christ-like),

we are right with God (pleasing Him); we have salvation.

Grace is the unmerited favor of God. This grace, which loves the unloveable, endures the unendurable, and forgives the unforgiveable, is possessed only of the Almighty.

Works may be divided into good works and bad works. Bad works may well be called sin, which according to I John 3:4 is the transgression of the law. Good works, then, would be the keeping of the law (Matthew 22: 37-40); developing the fruits of the spirit (Galatians 5:22, 23); and keeping the law of good works as defined in Matthew 25:34-40.

How, then, does one obtain this salvation, which is the realization of every Christian and the hope of every hearer? When the rich young man came to Christ and asked what good thing he must do to inherit eternal life, Jesus answered, in essence, "Keep the commandments; take up thy cross and follow me" (Mark 10:19-21). Paul, in answer to the Philippian jailor's question of what he must do to be saved, replied only, "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31). Initially, these two answers to the same inquiry of the way to life would seem to be quite irreconcilable. As we attempt to discover truth concerning this question, let us consider two examples, Mr. A and Mr. Z.

MR. A's METHOD

Mr. A decided to become a Christian. He resolved within himself to become Christ-like, and thereby earn his salvation by good works and keeping of the whole law. This attitude, known in theological circles as legalism, is the attempt to find salvation under the law. It is believing you can do and be good in your own strength. Of this legalism Paul says, "Knowing that a man is not justified by the works of the law . . . for by the works of the law shall no flesh be justified" (Galatians 2:16). Also, "for by grace are ye saved.... Not of works lest any man should boast" (Ephesians 2:8, 9).

Paul makes it clear that no amount of good works can, of themselves, bring salvation, "For all have sinned and come short of the glory of God" (Romans 3:23) and "the wages of sin is death..." (Romans 6:23).

Mr. A, the legal man, is attempting what many theologians of Paul's day attempted and failed. But as Paul found, and countless others have found since, that is not the way of salvation. We must realize that all our goodness is as filthy rags in God's sight. We cannot work our way toward happiness and the kingdom; we cannot moralize our way; we cannot reform our way; we cannot buy our way. No man can earn God's favor by works of law. Let mortal man present himself before the Most High clad in his works of law, and the verdict must ever be: "Unrighteous!"

We may conclude that Mr. A can not earn his salvation.

MR. Z's METHOD

Mr. Z decides to become a Christian. He accepts God's grace, believes on Jesus Christ, and has faith in God: however, he continues his unChristlike conduct and bad works as before his conversion. Can this behavior be justified by Paul's teachings? After expounding at length on God's grace, Paul says, "What shall we say then? Shall we continue in sin that grace may abound? God forbid" (Romans 6:1, 2). He preached that the law was not made void through faith; "God forbid: yea, we establish the law" (Romans 3:31). Reminding the people of Corinth to labor diligently. he says, "For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that every one may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad" (II Corinthians 5:10).

Mr. Z is quite representative of the

Christian world today. Millions of people today willingly proclaim the existence of a supreme God. They admit that He alone has power to change men's lives. But in their form of godliness, they, by their actions, deny the very power thereof. We must realize that faith without works is dead; we must remember that God has not called us to uncleanness, but to holiness.

We may conclude that Mr. Z is not justified in his behavior.

GOD'S WAY

Let us now attempt to determine the divine plan for our salvation. With Mr. A and Mr. Z on each extreme, surely there remains a more excellent way: God's Way!

The old path of salvation, as given to God's chosen people, the Israelites, was one of strict legal codes, with a definite system of sacrifices and punishments. This mandatory system of legalism was not conducive to a clear conscience before God, but led only to "dead works." This law "... could never with those sacrifices which they offered year by year continually make the comers thereunto perfect. For it is not possible that the blood of bulls and of goats should take away sins" (Hebrews 10:1, 4). Therefore, God, in His infinite love for us, instituted a better plan. He determined to put his law in our inward parts and write it on our hearts. This is the replacement of the law

of works with the law of love and grace.

To cement this new covenant, God fulfilled the sacrificial law by making the supreme sacrifice. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten son that whosoever believeth in him should not perish but have everlasting life" (John 3: 16). With this sacrifice, God terminated the law of works by "blotting out the handwriting of ordinances that was against us, which was contrary to us, and took it out of the way, nailing it to his cross" (Colossians 2:14).

It was not our goodness, it was only His grace and love for us that prompted Him to this action. "But God, who is rich in mercy, for his great love wherewith he loved us; even when we were dead in sins, hath quickened us together with Christ..." (Ephesians 2:4, 5).

NOT "I"-BUT CHRIST

Now we come to the new basic thought in our study of Salvation. "For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God" (Ephesians 2:8). Our salvation is no longer of works, but it is now the result of a working faith in God's grace, manifested in Jesus Christ. We must all realize that we are in need of this grace. We must admit we are poor before we can become rich. "But the scripture hath concluded all under sin, that

s I was going through some of my old things at my home last summer I came across this poem which I wrote when I was 15 or 16 years of age. I remember the night and the scene clearly, but as I read the poem over I got a new lesson from it. It surprises me that it didn't come to me at the time. It occurred to me that this glorious burst of sunset so well represents that time in each person's life when he has reached the very peak of his success-that time when his goals, whether they be great or small, are more nearly recognized than any time before or any time to come in his life.

For some it is a time of fame, for others merely a time of personal satisfaction, but for all it is the most active, most useful era of their life span. Sometimes it may come late in life; occasionally it comes very early, say in the twenties or even (though seldom) in the teens; but most often it is in those middle years when maturity and experience have done their blessing, but age has not yet sapped one's energy and slowed his responses and ambitions.

But whether it comes early or late, whether it lasts a few years or many, whether the success is great or moderate, there is that time in every life when he makes his greatest contri-

bution to his society. He has passed the "dawn" of childhood and the "high moon" of training and experience and now his success and accomplishments flame brightly as a radiant sunset across the skyline of his life. People are aware of him now more than ever before; they admire his accomplishments, as one turns to enjoy the gold and crimson flames of a beautiful sunset.

But the thing that strikes me about this time in life is its poignant brevity. So soon the dusk of old age and the black night of death overcome it and all the brightness, all the radiance, is snuffed out. It reminds me of the words in Psalm 39:5; "...verily every man at his best state is altogether vanity." No matter how wide his fame, no matter how monumental his success, he takes with him in death no more than he brought in birth—UNLESS—

Unless? Oh, yes, that catches the ear, doesn't it? Unless what? UNLESS his goals were God-given, UNLESS his endeavors were God-guided and UNLESS his successes were God-credited! Then, and only then, does he take with him in death more than he brought in birth. Teenagers, these are the years when you are making important decisions, forming important philosophies and developing important habits and ways of life. Make sure they are Godoriented, God-guided, and God-centered and the glorious sunset time in

OMETIMES there is but one step between despair and joy, between failure and success. But that one step must be taken before we can realize any benefit which it can bring. There are times when just a step seems impossible, when only determination and faith can help one take it.

During pre-war years, a young man named Tony was a butcher. He had a prospering business and was happy. Then he was drafted into the military service. Later a blast of shrapnel rendered him a helpless invalid, confined to a hospital bed.

Although helpless for the moment and with a drab outlook for the fu-

ture, Tony refused to be beaten. He had fought bravely for his country, and now he meant to make a brave fight for life also. As he lay there, physically helpless, he began to think about future possibilities.

Opportunities into which he might fit seemed very limited. But there was one thing he could do besides lie quietly in bed. He could read. Tony had long cherished the desire to have a good education, but the necessity to work for a living had kept him from going to college. Here, he decided, was a practical possibility. Perhaps right there in bed he could begin that education.

He began to read. People who noticed his love for reading supplied him with books, magazines, papers. Tony discovered many new and interesting things, some of which he wanted to remember and use later. He obtained a scrapbook and pasted the items into it. Soon there were several scrapbooks, bulging with information.

Hospital people and visitors became interested. They found Tony's scrapbooks interesting, and Tony himself even more so. He had a bright mind,

which now was developing rapidly.

One day a visitor suggested that Tony ought to read some of his collected items before a microphone. "They ought to appeal to other persons who, like yourself, are shutins," was the visitor's thought.

Tony didn't relish the idea of publicity. But he was eager to help fellow sufferers if he could. So he read into a microphone, wondering just who might hear his voice. His program appealed to all types of listeners, not just shut-ins. Fan mail began to reach Tony. And then the radio people decided they would like Tony to read regularly over the air. Thus his scrapbook idea became a well-known program, eagerly heard by thousands of listeners. Tony's fame was now assured. Although he left the hospital still an invalid, he had won at least part of his battle.

Tony had won because when he was "down" he had not despaired. He had been willing to take one step. He had determined to do something, no matter how impossible it seemed. For him that first step has proved to be all that lay between despair and encouragements, between failure and ultimate success.

Tony's experience may have been unusually spectacular, but is by no means uncommon. Many other brave souls have taken the first hard step, the one step needed.

To everyone, regardless of age, sex or physical health, there do come times when despair, discouragement and fear harass and come with such force as to depress our spirits almost beyond hope. This condition, perhaps, is more prevalent in this present time of cold wars, atomic fears, uncertainty and anxiety than ever before. We may need to take that first step at this very moment.

Doctors are agreed that some sort of work or activity is an excellent therapy when depression and worry are great. But work alone cannot effect a cure. The cure lies much deeper—in the soul and spirit.

"Keep Thou my feet: I do not ask to see the distant scene: one step enough for me," declared Poet John H. Newman in his famous hymn, "Lead, Kindly Light."

Undoubtedly one reason for today's anxiety on the part of multitudes is the desire to "see the distant scene," and lack of faith holds us back from taking the one step. We want to know what lies ahead. Will man-made bombs destroy millions of persons in a matter of minutes? If so, when? What can we do to get ready? What will provide physical shelter? When will it occur? What is this distant scene?

Man does not know what lies ahead! He can, at best, only imagine, predict, speculate—with no real knowledge that is dependable. The future, the distant scene, is wholly in the hands of God. And God, in His great mercy and love, does not permit man to know much beyond the one step which he perhaps can take in the immediate present, the step which Tony took.

Has some severe temptation or disaster come upon us? Do we seem utterly unable to cope with the situation? Does resistance to this present temptation appear futile? If we have Christ as our Saviour and Friend, we need not despair. We have the sure promise of the Bible: "There hath no temptation taken you but such as is common to man: but God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able; but will with the temptation also make a way of escape, that ye may be able to bear it."

Let us remember that there is a next step for us. There is a way to escape the severest temptation, the most depressing situation. There is a way to take that next step. That is what we need to seek when the road seems darkest. But if we take the next step, then what? Supposing we take it in the wrong direction? What if we have not chosen wisely or well?

Again, the Word of God brings comfort and assurance: "A man's heart deviseth his way: but the Lord directeth his steps." We need not walk aimlessly. We may have a Guide, if we submit our lives completely to Jesus Christ.

One chilly night an old barefoot man found his way into a mission along the Boston waterfront. He had been walking the streets for some time and was sick and cold. After he had been given emergency treatment, food, shoes and stockings, he explained that he was sixty-eight years old. He had been a cook on a merchant vessel and had always followed the sea. He knew no other trade. While on his way to rejoin his ship that afternoon, he had met a stranger with a bottle. The next thing he remembered, he was on the ferryboat coming back to Boston-his suitcase, shoes and stockings gone.

"Do you think that God above cares for a fellow like me?" he asked. When assured that He did, the man said, "I'd like to know more about Him, then. I sure need help from someone."

He did need help. His ship had

sailed without him. He stayed at the mission for several weeks. Each night he attended the meetings, and he learned to know God in the person of Jesus Christ. When his ship docked again, he went back to his job. This time he had Someone to help and care for him. He had taken the important step—toward God. Now God would guide all of his future steps.

Someone may say that Tony and the old sailor were just lucky. Difficult as their situations seem, our own troubles always seem to be magnified until it is hard to see around them and recognize the other persons' problems. But these next-step heroes had the will, the spirit, the pluck to move forward, to take the important first step. Luck is based wholly on chance. Pluck is the result of inner courage.

Your important step may be very different from mine. Our future steps may lead in opposite directions. But for each person, the first step may be the key to future happiness and success. Look carefully now and see where that step may be taken. Sincerely ask God to direct your life, and you surely will be shown where your opportunity and duty lie. One step in the direction God wants you to go will start you on the pathway to blessing and the doing of God's will.—The War Cry

Religion in Review

Here are some excerpts from a "Religion in Review for 1963" release from Evangelical Press Association.

IN CAMPUS EVANGELISM

Two major events stand out in relation to the campus evangelistic ministry that appear to have real significance for the days ahead. The first is the belated public recognition of the plight and pressure that college and university students are in. The number of articles on campus suicides, drop-outs, psychiatric treatment that have appeared in leading journals have made this situation common knowledge. No longer are evangelical student workers considered prophets of doom or sensationalists in seeking to bring Jesus Christ into these situations.

In a similar vein the unprecedented response of almost 3,000 students to the Billy Graham Los Angeles Crusades appears to be a major breakthrough in reaching these students for Christ.

IN YOUTH MINISTRY...

This year there has been a definite move among youth to take their place as a force for God.

Of major importance during 1963 was the response of young people to be witnesses for Christ. No doubt of greatest significance during the year was the special outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon young people in many different denominations and groups. Perhaps this is a fulfillment of "latter day" prophecy. It is certainly preparing youth to more adequately serve in the year ahead.

OUESTION:

I am a high school senior, engaged to a boy who is in my class. We plan to be married right after graduation. We go to the same church, and both our parents seem to approve our going together. Everyone tells us we are too young to get married. Are we too young? We are very much in love.

ANSWER:

It's very good to be in love! And, it is perfectly normal for two young people in love with each other to want to live together, honorably bound by the laws and principles of marriage.

Besides your being physically old enough, you have several other qualities which contribute to a happy marriage. You have apparently won the respect and affection of your parents, and you are of the same religion.

You are to be complimented on being concerned with the suggestions of others who caution you that you may not be old enough to form a home of your own. This assures that you will seriously consider the answer to your question.

You are no doubt aware that physical maturity does not qualify one for marriage. There are other necessities.

For instance, how do you plan to assume responsibility for the financial support of your home? While money does not guarantee a happy marriage, you surely cannot get along without it. Not having yet graduated from high school, it is probable that neither of you know what it is to hold down a full-time job. Neither would you know how much income you would need from that employment in order to pay for the standard of living you hope to enjoy. You ought to know about living costs such as food, clothing, purchase of furniture, car expenses, rent, utilities. church support, medical and dental bills and so forth. Fear, disappointments, and repeated humiliation can seriously scar a marriage union.

What about your life's vocation? It is good to note that you love each other. Surely this love will not force you into a meager existence because it was too impatient to allow planning for a more meaningful and secure livelihood.

Perhaps you ought to consider the advantages received in your both having jobs, giving you opportunity to see what is involved in earning money and being responsible for spending it. If you can succeed on your own, you have something of real value to offer a marriage. Have either of you

been interested in traveling, trying various kinds of work, getting more education, acquiring new hobbies, living away from home? These are worth-while interests and will add happily to a marriage.

Discuss your plans with God in prayer. Sometimes young people feel a call from God to a certain service for Him, only to have the fulfillment of this call detoured by the lustre of marriage. Make Jesus your partner and try to do just what you think He would want you to.

Remember that at your fine age, delay before matrimony will almost always be to your advantage for several years. Often a person's good reasoning opposes what his emotions long for. The sign of a mature person is his ability to bring his good reasoning and his good emotions together into one good, godly decision.

Why not talk this matter over with your pastor? He is anxious to be of real help to you.

Do You Say It? Think It?

"But Mom and Dad are so Snoopy!"

Do YOU BRISTLE (inwardly or outwardly) when Mother and Dad ask, "How much do you really know about this new date of yours?" or "Is your new date a Christian?" or "Just where are you going tonight?" or "Are you sure the crowd realizes we want you to be home by midnight?" or "Won't two dinners at Pine Inn be pretty expensive?"

If you positively suffer from the "snoopy" questions Mother and Dad ask, especially about your dates, don't conclude that your parents are the snoopiest in ten states or that you're a lone victim.

Instead, why not give some thought to the subject of why Mother and Dad ask these questions; see if you can discover the deep, underlying reasons for their queries. If you go into a huddle with yourself and do this, you'll approach your problem like a mature adult, rather than

lashing out the way some girls and fellows do with reasons like these: Mother and Dad think I'm a baby. They don't trust me. They've forgotten how it feels to be young. They are determined to keep me tied to their apron strings. They think it's a sin to have any fun. They don't really love me.

A little quiet pondering will show you how childish these reactions are. And if, after your careful thought about the *real* reasons, you still are

A MEASURE TO BE FILLED

"Life is a measure to be filled—not a cup to be drained." It is with this thought in mind that I accept this new responsibility as editor of your paper—AIM. It is my hope that God can use me in this capacity to cause someone's life to be of fuller measure.

Recently I read the bleak feelings expressed by Clarence Darrow near the closing of his life. While he was a man of wealth and success, yet he realized he had nothing. Though his views in life would characterize him an agnostic or perhaps even atheist, he offered in conversation with a clergy friend his favorite Bible verse. It was found in Luke 5:5—"We have toiled all the night and have taken nothing." This expressed the feelings of this man who would be considered a tremendous success in worldly wisdom and material wealth. He had nothing—because his life did not exemplify Christ, did not witness for Christ, did not include Christ.

If your life includes Christ, then your efforts must include Him. "God gives every bird his food, but He doesn't throw it into the nest."

a bit at sea, there's one sure way to find out why Mother and Dad ask all these questions: ask them! Not with hands on hips and an expression that says, "now let's have this out," but in one of those heart-to-heart sessions that are a shining light of Christian faith.

Do you have family talk-it-over times at your house? If you don't, why not begin tomorrow? Talk things over calmly, quietly, with no accusations and no verbal bombs. Begin with prayer, show love and understanding. Families that have this sort of discussion find that at the end of the talk everyone feels a hundred per cent better.

As you listen to your Mother and Dad explain the "whys" of their questions, you'll sense their deep love for you and their desire for you to have happiness, success, and a wonderful Christian experience. Mother and Dad know that every date is a potential life partner, that a girl or fellow's life partner is one of the most important factors in the whole-life picture, that your marrying a Christian is vital. That's why they ask questions so often about your dating.

Before that heart-to-heart talk with Mother and Dad, here's something you can do that will pave the way for full understanding: make a list of ten questions you've asked your parents recently. Do any of your questions sound snoopy? Here are some you may find you've listed: Why do you have to use the car Saturday night? Am I going to get that brown jacket for my birthday?

Why can't we have a new car this year the way the Smiths do? What happened to the budget that we didn't get the new rug? Why can't I have my next week's allowance early? (Have Mother and Dad ever told you that you ask snoopy questions?)

Incidently, if you've been cogitating on how simply ducky it would be if you were in Gayle or Gregg's shoes (their parents never demand to know where they're going or with whom!), do some private sleuthing and get the whole picture of Gayle or Gregg's life before you do a lot of pining and yearning.

Could be you'll discover that those parents who can't be bothered checking up or asking "snoopy" questions are too busy hustling off to the Pink Lion Bar or a cocktail party. Chances are that Gayle or Gregg would give almost anything for the love, care, concern your parents feel and show; for the shining Christian faith you know.

Could be that, after your sleuthing, you'll humbly pray, "Thank you, Lord, for parents who care so much."

the promise by faith of Jesus Christ might be given to them that believe" (Galatians 3:22).

When we become aware of the destructive power of our stubborn

wills, and we realize our absolute dependence upon the grace of God through faith, then we have started on the road to happiness. Man does not come to know God through works; he comes to know God by faith through grace. We must accept Christ as God's Son; we must admit that He died to save us from sin; we must "put on Christ." Thus we come under His grace.

If we have made this step, we have succeeded where Mr. A. failed. We are not dependent upon our own efforts; we now have a source of righteousness within us. We are not under the curse of the law; Christ has been made a curse for us. This putting on of Christ entails moral privileges and responsibilities, which was the field of Mr. Z's failure. "I beseech vou therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world, but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God" (Romans 12:1, 2). We see that the result of putting on Christ is a whole change in our lives. "Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature; old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new" (2 Corinthians 5:17).

GOD'S GIFT—OBEDIENCE FOLLOWS

Does it seem logical that a criminal who has received pardon from the President would want to continue in crime just for the hope of the experience of receiving further pardons? Paul was more than plain in

declaring that those who put on Christ do not continue in sin and carnality. "For if I build again the things which I destroyed, I make myself a transgressor" (Galatians 2:18).

We must realize that sin is still defined and the wages of sin is still death. "Sin pays its servants: the wage is death. God gives to those who serve him: his gift is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord" (Romans 6:23, Phillips trans.)

"HEARTFELT" OBEDIENCE

The situation now should be that of obedience from the heart. After his conversion. Paul did not do some things he felt he would have been justified in doing, because of heartfelt obedience. "All things are lawful for me, but all things are not expedient; all things are lawful for me, but all things edify not" (1 Corinthians 10:23). His obedience was now in the spirit of the law. His testimony to the Corinthians was, "...our sufficiency is of God; who also hath made us able ministers of the new testament; not of the letter, but of the spirit: for the letter killeth, but the spirit giveth life" (2 Corinthians 3:5, 6).

Paul envisioned one who had put on Christ, thusly: "There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit. For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus hath made me free from the law of sin and death" (Romans 8:1, 2).

How does Paul view the end result of this process? "...that the man of God may be perfect, throughly furnished unto all good works" (2 Timothy 3:17). We will hasten to add

that these good works are not a product of our own righteousness, nor are we yet able to do any good thing of ourselves. All our goodness is a result of Christ reigning in our lives "that the righteousness of the law might be fulfilled in us" (Romans 8:4).

These conclusions may be drawn about our salvation:

- (1) It is the gift of God.
- (2) It comes through faith in Jesus Christ.
- (3) It works within our lives to bring forth good fruits.

In conclusion, we find one verse which seems to summarize and condense beautifully all our thoughts concerning salvation. Let us say with Paul, "I am crucified with Christ: nevertheless, I live; yet not I, but Christ liveth in me; and the life that I now live in the flesh, I live by the faith of the Son of God who loved me and gave himself for me" (Galatians 2:20).

During the past year you saw, heard and took part in many activities. Some you will remember with joy, others you may wish you could forget. Perhaps some of the temptations and problems that confronted you seemed insurmountable to say the least, but somehow it passed.

Yes, whatever problems and joys you may have had are all in the past. And the past can never be relived or undone or unsaid. So the important thing for you to think about and set your sights on is the future and the question, What do I want to be? Not what I was yesterday, but what I want to be tomorrow. This little poem will help you see the importance of this thought. "Yesterday is but a dream, tomorrow is but a vision, today well lived makes every yesterday a dream of joy and every tomorrow a vision of hope."

Then you will see what you must be!

Take inventory of yourself in the

light of God's word. Resolve with His help to overcome your weaknesses and to be what He wants you to be. Take time for God and you will soon see that it pays to serve Jesus.

PROGRAM IDEA

With Missionary Emphasis



The following program was presented at the Kansas City Church in November.

The script which was used for the Harvest Time Program is too long to print here, but those who are interested in a copy may get it by writing to

Elden Fischer, 10601 E. 26th St., Independence, Mo.

THE SCRIPT

In short, the script is the story of two brothers, one who became a farmer and the other who became a preacher. The script gives opportunity for comparing the harvests of the two brothers, the temporal harvest and the spiritual harvest.

It follows the course of events surrounding the preacher's call to service and his decision to answer the call. It follows him through his ministerial training and the pastorate of his first church and then to Africa where he spends some time as a missionary.

The biography is written in such a way as to lead up to the special numbers and readings which are to be used on the program. Of course, the numbers could be varied to suit the group presenting the program. Eventually, in a revival meeting the farmer brother himself comes to realize that he owes more than tithes and offerings to God.

RADIO TECHNIQUE

This program was presented in the form of a radio broadcast with the congregation as the studio audience. The emcee acting as program announcer and another person acting as technical engineer are seated at a table with the script and numbered cue cards which are shown in time for program participants to get in place before their respective numbers are due. Participants have been informed previously of their cue numbers. This way they can be already situated behind the microphone at the proper time with no waiting or unnecessary pauses.

VISUAL AIDS

A stenciled sign (cut-out) can be made with the words "On The Air" and placed in view of the audience with a light behind it. After a few hours of introduction to the "studio audience" the light behind the "On The Air" sign can be switched on and the start of the broadcast announced. Before this time, however, groups will probably want to have a traditional opening with hymn singing and prayer. In the K.C. program this consisted of two verses of the hymn "Send the Light," followed by a series of slides of harvest scenes taken in a farm area.

GROUP PARTICIPATION

As the program went "on the air"

the congregation was singing "Bringing in the Sheaves." This can be followed by a commercial or announcement (samples will follow) and then one of the announcers says "And now, join us as we present our annual Harvest Time Program." The script begins here, after a few strains of "Harvest Time" on the organ if available.

CALL LETTERS

Appropriate call letters may be chosen for the radio station. Some choices considered at K.C. were KFYC or KCCG (Kansas City Church of God). The script provides one station break at which time an offering was taken up. However as groups vary the program to suit them—

Grow More In '64

Are you interested in self-improvement? Here is a program we would like all young people through age 25 to join. Bible verses are easier to memorize and will stick with you longer when memorized during these early years in your life.

We suggest you learn two memory verses a week. We will select eight good verses to memorize each month and these will be printed in Aim. If everyone learns the suggested verses we can have local contests toward the end of the year and then hold national competition. We will publish the names of national winners and maybe offer a nice prize, too. Every month at young people's meeting or some other occasion you can have a drill on these verses.

You should know both the verse and where it is found. If someone gives you a portion of the verse you should be able to finish the verse. If someone gives you the text you should be able to give the verse or if someone gives you the verse you should be able to tell where it is found.

To keep track of these verses we suggest that you type or write the verse on a file card. On the other side of your file card you can print where the verse is found. This makes it easy for you to learn the verse and to drill yourself. If you participate you will benefit eternally from these efforts. A small investment of time will pay great dividends.

The Psalmist said, "Thy word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against thee" (Psalm 119:11). Let's hide God's word in hearts from coast to coast.

Why Have Church Schools?

A recent survey of 12 representative colleges and universities is reason enough. These appalling facts were revealed—and the picture is no brighter with secondary schools:

- 1. A decided majority agreed that "Christ should be regarded only as a very great prophet or teacher."
- 2. 82% of the students at one school, 70% at another, and 68% at still another indicated no disapproval of illicit sexual behavior because of religious beliefs.
- 3. Only 58% of those who believe in God believe that He "will sometime altar the course of events in answer to prayer."
- 4. A large majority of students consider atheists or agnostics "just as likely as believers to do the morally right or kind things."
- 5. 13% of all student "believers" never pray, and many more pray "only at specific crisis in...life."
