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Resolution to Revolution

What a better place this world would be to live in if every Christian (or those who claim the name Christian) would make just "one" New Year's resolution:

"In the year of 1968 I,, resolve to stop gossiping, slandering, and backbiting against my neighbors, my friends, and my enemies. I resolve to keep my lips sealed unless what I have to say will

benefit or uplift the person whom I'm talking about. Even if what I know or have heard is the *truth*, I resolve to keep my lips sealed, even to my best girlfriend (or boy friend, family, etc.) concerning what one has told me in confidence. Furthermore, I resolve to seek and bring out the best in people and show others the true character of Christ through me."

"Wait just a minute! That's some resolution! No person could begin to keep such a resolution!"

Yes, this is true, no man could keep a resolution like this one. Only a Christian with the divine help of God could keep this resolution. But we can find many scriptures in the Word of God which will back up such a resolution. I have not found that gossip is not to be found anywhere in the church. On the contrary, if something happens

it is soon heard in every church all over—sometimes faster than it takes a letter. We can justify ourselves here on earth by telling ourselves that it's only human nature to gossip, to let our tongues slip a bit once in a while; that everybody talks about someone. If we are going to justify this one "little" sin of gossip, then we might as well try justifying all other sins, for one sin is as bad as any other sin, according to James.

We have all read Proverbs 26:20-22:

"Where no wood is, there the fire goeth out; so where there is no talebearer the strife ceaseth. As coals are to burning coals, and wood to fire, so is a contentious man (or woman) to kindle strife. The words of a talebearer are as wounds, and they go down into the innermost parts of the belly."

We Christians read these verses, shake our heads and say, "How true this is! If only people wouldn't gossip so much!" Then we go about our everyday affairs and:

"Say, Mary, have you heard what happened to poor, sweet Jane...? It really wasn't her fault, but...."

"I never take part in gossip—I wouldn't think of it—but the other day Mr. Smith came right up to me and started telling me what actually did happen to the Jones family. All I could

do was stand there and listen. Since you are my closest friend, I'll just tell you. Of course you'll never say a word...."

"...and it was this way... Oh, my! I forgot I was supposed to keep that a secret, but I know you will never tell."

In Proverbs 11:13 it reads:

"A talebearer revealeth secrets: but he that is of a faithful spirit concealeth the matter."

Also in Proverbs 11:9 it tells us that:

"An hypocrite with his mouth destroyeth his neighbor...."

And in Proverbs 16:27 it reads:

"An ungodly man diggeth up evil: and in his lips there is as a burning fire."

This verse doesn't just say talebearer, or hypocrite, but an ungodly man. Woe! to any of us if we have been guilty of telling secrets, destroying our neighbor by our mouth, or digging up evil to hurt someone.

Proverbs 20:19 warns us to meddle not with the talebearer:

"He that goeth about as a talebearer revealeth secrets: therefore meddle not with him that flattereth with his lips."

Proverbs 22:10 tells us to cast out the scorner:

"Cast out the scorner, and contention shall go out; yea, strife and reproach shall cease."

In James 3:5, 6 we find:

"Even so the tongue is a little

member, and boasteth great things. Behold, how great a matter a little fire kindleth! And the tongue is a fire, a world of iniquity: so is the tongue among our members, that it defileth the whole body."

Verse 8: "But the tongue can no man tame; it is an unruly evil, full of deadly poison."

Verse 14: "But if ye have bitter envying and strife in your hearts, glory not, and lie not against the truth."

Verse 16: "For where envying and strife is, there is confusion and every evil work."

Verse 18: "And the fruit of righteousness is sown in peace of them that make peace."

How can we make peace by telling things about our neighbors?

Once again in Proverbs 17:9 we read:

"He that covereth a transgression seeketh love; but he that repeateth a matter separateth very friends."

We never know the harm we may cause by repeating a certain matter, even though it is the truth.

But when someone wrongs you or me, our attitude should be as found in Proverbs 24:29:

"Say not, I will do so to him as he hath done to me: I will render to the man according to his works."

At all times, according to Philippians 1:27:

"Only let your conversation be as it becometh the gospel of Christ."

How can gossiping and backbiting about one another become the gospel of Christ??? It can't!

In Ephesians 4:29-31 we find this instruction:

"Let no corrupt communication proceed out of your mouth, but that which is good to the use of edifying, that it may minister grace unto the hearers. And grieve not the holy Spirit of God... Let all bitterness, and wrath, and anger, and clamour, and evil speaking, be put away from you, with all malice: and be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you."

We can no longer go on and on justifying ourselves about this matter of gossip. For the question is asked in Psalm 15:3:

"Lord, who shall abide in thy tabernacle? Who shall dwell in thy holy hill?"

The answer is found in verse two.

"He that walketh uprightly and worketh righteousness, and speaketh the truth in his heart."

But verse three goes on to say: "He that backbiteth not with his tongue, nor doeth evil to his neighbour, nor taketh up a reproach against his neighbour."

Proverbs 21:23 adds: "Whoso keepeth his mouth and his tongue keepeth his soul from troubles."


And Psalm 141:3 reads: "Set a watch, O Lord, before my mouth; keep the door of my lips."

Let God's Word Speak

The first message sent over the telegraph wire in 1844 was "What hath God wrought?" I wonder what Morse would say today if he saw the rate at which Daniel 12:4 is being fulfilled ("... and knowledge shall be increased"). Libraries cannot keep up with the explosion of knowledge, so fantastic new methods are coming into use where many volumes of library books can be placed on microfilm that occupies less space than a match box. Today the "God is Dead" movement tries to say, What hath man wrought?

Today the idea of science and the Bible harmonizing is rapidly becoming unpopular. Our modern science loves to assume many theories of evolution as facts based on a frightfully small

amount of evidence. To teach evolution by inference and wishful theories is a shame and disgrace to a Christian nation. True science and the Bible do not disagree but a study of science will establish firmly a faith in a God that formed this earth with a plan and a purpose. I have personally heard a great, modern evolutionist from England tell of his modern study of evolution and heard nothing that contradicts the sacred scriptures. I have studied geology under a great geology teacher in New York and after hearing of the "evidence" of the early history of the North American Continent, my faith in what the Bible teaches was strengthened for a lack of faith to believe in the geologist's theories.

Being a Christian geologist does not mean one seeks to find oil on church property. There are no Christian laws of science. "The heavens declare the glory of God; and the firmament sheweth His handiwork" (Psalm 19: 1). Even before science discovered its "laws of nature" the sun. moon, and planets were already following their precise pattern as planned by God. In my future discussions of astronomy, geology, botany, and evolution, we will try to put into words a few ideas that speak for a Creator rather than chance; and that survival of the fittest could not explain life as we know it today. The more man learns



about the DNA molecule and biochemistry, the less one can believe that *chance* could bring about a wonderful machine like the human body.

That science and religion are not friends can be understood through history. When Galileo first advocated that the earth moved around the sun he was thrown in a dungeon and royally mistreated by the Catholic Church. At 70 years of age he had to swear on the Bible that he was advocating a false theory about the earth moving

around the sun to get out of the dungeon. When William Harvey of England first taught that the blood circulated in our body he was excommunicated from his church. Even grade school students today can observe blood circulation in a frog leg.

Atheists claim that primitive man invented the idea of God to explain what they could not understand. When man could not understand thunder and lightning he said it was a god and thought that eclipses were of a divine cause. As knowledge increases, that kind of a god would get smaller and smaller but our God gets greater and greater. When man found the cell, he thought he had found the basic unit of living matter; but since then man has found atoms, then protons, and now many smaller units within the proton. As we look at an insect, a protozoan, a seed, a flower, or a leaf under the microscope, one must stand in awe and respect to a greater Creator who made the blueprint and put them together—then gave them life. Try to count the stars on a clear night; or better yet, use a telescope and you will be astounded at the complexity of our universe.

Both science and the Bible solve problems—but not the same problems. Science gave us nitroglycerin and gunpowder, but only faith in God can give us real peace. Science can make a missile but only God can heal a broken heart. Science makes giant streetsweepers but only God can clean a guilty conscience.

First century gospel agrees with 20th Century science. Lord Kelvin after whom the Kelvin scale thermometer was named said, "If you think strongly enough you will be

Tell Me, Please

Youth Questions answered by Ray L. Straub



QUESTION:

I've seen several comments giving ideas on how to get a date, but I haven't read much about how to get out of one. One hardly has to be popular before this problem comes up. It seems that the least desirable dates cause the most hard feelings when refused. How can a person get out of a date gracefully?

ANSWER:

By "getting out of a date" I presume vou mean refusing one rather than backing out on one already made.

It is unlikely that a date can be refused without causing a certain amount of difficulty somewhere. It actually takes a lot of nerve to ask for a date, and when it is refused disappointment is keen. It injures the ego, and when that happens, often other members of the family reflect a little disappointment—in cases, some hard feelings.

Nonetheless. I see little reason why anyone should accept a date that has little appeal. While some may not intend it that way, the fact that you are asked implies that you have a choice to accept or refuse. There is nothing immoral about using that

Be mindful that a refusal is a bit hard to accept, so be as kind as you can without any display of pity. Give the impression that the person asking could get a date elsewhere if he chose. This would protect his ego-a need that is ever present when a request for a date is denied.

OUESTION:

Why are some members and ministers of the Church so easily upset when a Youth questions some of the doctrines of the Church. Does it mean that a person is an atheist or an infidel if he doubts or questions some of the doctrines and policies of the Church?

ANSWER:

I wish your question reflected the attitude of members and ministers of the past, not the present, but

apparently this is not the case. No, vou are not atheistic nor unfaithful for questioning church doctrine or policy. To the contrary, a sincere inquiry will strengthen the Church.

A youth who has an intelligent, probing mind will approach the Church's teachings with the same analytical curiosity that he does other interests. This is a compliment to the Church.

If our doctrines are truthful, they can adequately produce satisfactory answers. If our policies represent good thinking, they will be understood and accepted. If they are met with reservations, a re-examination may likely produce more effective procedures. The Church must always remain obligated to answer honest inquiry from her youth. If she cannot, she may be floundering in less than a generation.

At the same time the questioning youth has a sizeable obligation. He must be sure that his questions represent honest inquiry, rather than reflect rebellion. Often questions are a timid way of showing resentment. When the questioner is incorrectly motivated, he does little more than show a lack of personal depth.

An examination that is less than honorable can only bring injury. Inquiries that are sincere will strengthen both the Church and the curious. Whenever you need clarifications, get them. If you have difficulty doing so, write to me. I will do my best to see that you receive some answers.

OUESTION:

Why does the Church prohibit the use of tobacco by its membership? Instead of becoming more open-minded about it, we seem to be getting more strict. I know some people that use tobacco who are more "Christian" than some good church members who do not.

ANSWER:

The Church prohibits the use of tobacco by its members because it is harmful to the body. The Church took this position long before the fact was as openly declared and publicized as it is today.

Further, the Church does not consider it healthy for a person to be enslaved by a habit that is detrimental to good health and threatens cleanliness. Our bodies should be kept clean and under control for holy use. The tobacco habit strays from this intention.

The Church is becoming strict in this respect, but no more than she ought to. Take care not to confuse open-mindedness with permissiveness. A person who is overly permissive is weak, not open-minded.

There are many good people who use tobacco, as there are good people who have never repented and accepted Christ as their Saviour. The goodness of men by man's standards and Christianity are not the same.

You do not know who is a good Christian and who is not. God has reserved this kind of judgment for Himself, and He has not delegated it to you or me or anyone else. Your evaluation of another man's Christianity supports no logical argument for permission to use tobacco.

If you cannot have everything, make the best of everything you have.

It was a terrible shock. I burst out crying and Mom nearly had a nervous break-down. My heart felt like it was being squeezed to pieces.

I went into the living room, lay down on the sofa and cried for quite a while. The day was really dull and Mom and I wandered around trying to keep ourselves busy and trying not to cry. But time after time I couldn't hold my emotions in and I'd break out crying.

That night I fell on my knees, poured out my heart to God and wept at His feet. I found that my heart was filled with peace and it was such a glorious feeling that in the following days I began to pray more often.

Now I know what faith is. There was nothing we could do for Ruth except pray. She was in God's hands. Through prayer we just had to trust God to save Ruth. That is faith.

Through faith my heart was drawn closer to God's. I sincerely hope and pray I'll never wander from Him.

I don't remember the accident Saturday evening, July 22. I don't even remember leaving the plane.

The last thing I remember is flying over Devil's Lake. My brother, Robert, was piloting the plane and we were headed for the National Church of God General Conference, in Colorado. It was dusk. I looked out the window and saw many different-colored lights below. Everything looked so small and reliant upon a higher power that my emotions were stirred and I couldn't take my eyes away.

That's the last thing I remember about the flight.

The next thing I remember is awakening in the operating room. I realized I was lying down. I looked at the many doctors standing around me and wondered what I was doing there. I felt no pain. My eyes focused on the last doctor—realizing that not one of them had smiled. He looked at me with sad eyes. I remember he had blonde hair. Then after about 15 seconds I became unconscious again.

I regained consciousness Tuesday afternoon when I was being taken in an ambulance plane to St. Mary's Hospital, Rochester, Minn. I looked up at the nurse and the I.V. bottle she was holding high in her hand. I started to turn over on my left side. The nurse quickly pressed on my right shoulder and said, "Don't roll over!" So I laid back.

During the days that followed I was very tired. I slept. When I talked to a nurse, I called her "Teacher." Quite a few days passed before I realized what I was saying.

My brother Benjamin and his wife Joanne brought Mom to see me the next Saturday, July 29. I asked Mom what happened. She said I had been hit by the plane's propeller. Robert had stayed at the hospital with me in Devil's Lake until I was flown back to Rochester. Then he had gone on to Colorado and that's all she knew.

Mom and Joanne couldn't even look at me without crying. I felt no pain. I felt terrible when they started to leave. I didn't want to be alone again.

When the Colorado conference was over Robert came back and stayed in Rochester several days to be with me. While he was there he told me what had happened.

We had just landed at Devil's Lake. Robert was checking the engine and asked me if I would go ask a man where he should park the plane for the night. He didn't mean for me to get out until he had cut the engine. But I got out right away.

Even in the daytime you can't see a propeller going around. All you can see is a circle of moving air. At night the only way you'll know it is near, is by an increasing air current hitting you. I didn't walk far enough to get around the propeller. They assume I was holding onto my scarf with my left hand. The end of the propeller, about half an inch wide hit me. The engine was killed. Robert heard a thud and rushed out to see if what he dreaded had really happened.

His heart sickened. I was lying on the ground, blood flowing from where the propeller had hit my head, neck and chest. It had struck onequarter-inch from my jugular vein. What was left of my left hand was lying on the ground a short distance from me.

Other people heard the thud and rushed to help. The ambulance was called. Robert knelt beside me and tried to staunch the flow of blood. He began praying. Someone else was holding my arm.

The doctors were surprised I wasn't already dead and even though they expected me to die at any time they started stitching the wounds. They gave me nine pints of blood.

When the doctors found that I was still alive after about two hours, they said if I lived 36 hours more, I'd probably recover. Under God's hands, I did.

When they saw that I was recovering they had me flown to Rochester for additional surgery. I was in St. Mary's Hospital for over nine weeks. I got pretty homesick and missed everybody.

Because the propeller had gone into my brain tissue I have a hard time thinking of words to explain what I mean.

The doctors are going to cover my scar, connect the facial nerve so I can move the left side of my face (Continued on page 20)



When I was sent to Alaska while in the Air Force, I had to stay in Anchorage almost two months waiting for my position to be opened on St. Lawrence Island. During that time I heard H. W. Armstrong's program, "The World Tomorrow," on the radio. It stirred up my interest because of the different approach he had. I listened to it every time I could, and after being sent to the Island I started taking his correspondence course. When I got sent back stateside I started taking his magazine, and became a sincere follower of his.

One of the biggest doctrinal studies I made was on the Sabbath question (which eventually led me to this church) and also all the other doctrines different from the Baptist and other Protestant churches. This led to many hours of deep meditation and thought and paved the way for my own "reformation."

When I said that I was somewhat of an Armstrong fan, he told me of Mr. Armstrong's breakaway from this church. Then I had opportunity to read some of our tracts. As a first step toward my stand for the truth, I stopped working at the farm on the Sabbath. Of course, this didn't set well at all with my Sunday background, but once the truth got root, it was in me to stay.

Circumstances then took my wife and me to a different part of Colorado to live, and I forgot about my encounter with the Sabbath and the other truths I'd learned. But then we moved to Moab, Utah, where I had a much better job, with Friday and Saturday as my days off. After a while this was impressed on my mind, and I did some serious thinking. After much prayer I was shown that Saturday. the Sabbath of the Lord, is indeed the day to keep holy. So I vowed to the Lord that I'd keep the Sabbath instead of the Sunday, if it be His will, no matter what the cost. Later on I had to pay that vow, but by His grace I was able to do so

Well, it was His will that I start keeping the Sabbath again, and my family and I had to move back to Grand Junction, Colorado, to live with my folks. The Lord had worked things out this way so that I might be able to attend our church in that city. So having found a new, glorious church home, I had to break away from the Baptist church. This was no small task. But after the breakaway I was re-awakened to the fact that while I was in the Baptist church I had dedicated my life to full-time Christian service.

After losing three jobs in three months I figured that the Lord was trying to tell me something; and after much prayer and fasting, difficulties were overcome and the way to Mid-

west Bible College was provided. We came back to Missouri in April of '66, and I immediately found a job and apartment thanks to God. In September '66 I entered school in preparation for a ministry which I am very eagerly awaiting.

The truths that I've learned are ever so precious and powerful dispelling ignorance and pagan traditions dressed up in modern "Christian" clothes. I'm so very thankful that God has seen fit to call me into the best and highest of His wondrous grace and truth. I'll be eternally grateful to Mr. Phil Wishart for introducing me to this church, its truths, and the dear brothers and sisters in Christ who compose it. I'm also grateful to the Baptist Church in which I grew up and came to know God. I have many fond memories of it, but I wouldn't go back to it for the whole world.-Gold is much more precious than silver. And I know somewhat of how Moses felt when he chose Israel over Egypt; also the blessings of the wise choice made.

The book of Revelation is the only prophetic book in the New Testament. Its main theme is, "I come quickly." As we read of the beast with seven heads, the vision of God's throne, and the book with seven seals, we come to realize the meaning of Paul's writings to the church at Corinth.

"For now we see through a glass, darkly; but then face to face: now I know in part; but then shall I know even as also I am known" (1 Corinthians 13:12).

Our understanding of these passages is indeed limited. Even in trying to imagine the second coming of Christ and the holy city descending from God out of heaven, our minds are full of questions concerning the exact sequences and just how it will all come about.

While it is good to study these visions and perhaps establish some theory on the order of events, be careful lest you neglect the most important aspect—are you ready for the day when the glass will be made clear and all mysteries will be revealed?

It has been said, "Do not worry about whether or not the sun will rise; be prepared to enjoy it." So it is with the great judgment day. God will take care of the details. Our chief concern, as expressed in an old favorite hymn, should be.

"Is my name written there, on the page white and fair? In the book of Thy kingdom, is my name written there?"

When Jesus visited Mary and Martha, Martha was cumbered about much serving and troubled about many things. But Jesus said one thing was needful; and Mary had chosen that good part. Seek God's guidance in your reading that you, like Mary, will gain that which is needful. And as you imagine the wonderful rewards of which you read, consider the promise,

"Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love him" (1 Corinthians 2:9).

forced by science to believe in God. Pure science is one of Christianity's strongest allies.

Science changes but the Christian religion does not. It happens that a student honors a teacher of science by proving his teacher in error. The chemist, Arrhenius, received the Nobel prize for his electrolytic theory of dissociation; the same prize was given later to Debye for sowing the inadequacy of Arrhenius' scheme.

God has made us a marvelous machine. Our heart generates enough energy in one day to lift six fully loaded Greyhound scenicruiser buses one inch off the ground. Our heart beats 40,000,000 times a year. We often forget to think of the heart or its designer until our miraculous little pump fails to work perfectly. IN THE CARE OF JULIUS 27:1

When it was decided that we (Paul and his friends) should sail to Italy, the authorities delivered Paul and some other prisoners into the care of a man named Julius, a captain of Augustus' troops.

We boarded a ship from Adramyttium. We started to sail, intending to sail by the shores of Asia. We had with us Aristarchus, a Macedonian from Thessalonica.

AT SIDON 27:3

The next day we landed at Sidon. Julius was very kind to Paul and gave him freedom to go to his friends and to give himself a rest.

To Myra 27:4

We left there and sailed by Cyprus with a wind blowing against us. After

we had sailed over the seas of Cilicia and Pamphylia, we landed at Myra, a city in Lycia.

At Myra the captain located an Alexandrian ship sailing for Italy, so he put us on that ship. Then we sailed slowly for many days. The wind was such that we were hradly able to reach Cnidus. We sailed by Salmone and then south of Crete. We were just able to pass the extreme end of Crete. We were able to come to a place called, "The fair havens." That was near the city of Lasea.

Much time had been lost and sailing at this time was dangerous. The time of the fast had already passed.

So Paul advised, "Sirs, I am made to conclude that if we sail now it will result in hardship and damage, not only to the cargo and the ship; but even our lives will be endangered."

To PHENICE? 27:11

However the captain relied more on what the operator and the ship owner said than on what Paul said. Besides that, the haven was not suitable for wintering. More persons advised sailing on, hoping that by some means they would reach Phenice; where they could spend the winter. Phenice is a haven on Crete. It has a southwest, northwest pattern.

When the south wind blew softly, the sailors thought they had gotten what they wanted, so they began to sail and sailed near the shores of Crete.

Before long a tremendous east wind began to blow very threateningly. The ship was caught. It could not withstand the wind, so we let it be driven. We sailed south of an island called Clauda. We had a great deal of difficulty dealing with the ship's attendant boat. After hoisting the boat we used the equipment and undergirded the ship. Then we were afraid of getting into the quicksands, so we lowered the sails and were driven by the winds.

We were being tossed mercilessly by the storm. The next day we lightened the ship. On the third day, with our own hands, we threw the ship's equipment overboard. We were in a mighty storm. When neither the sun nor the stars could be seen for many days, the men were robbed of all hope that we would be saved.

After a long period of eating nothing, Paul stood among the people and said, "Sirs, you should have listened to me and not sailed from Crete to now have to suffer this loss.

"I advise you, have a cheerful attitude. Not one man among you will lose his life; but the ship will be lost. This night an angel of God, to whom I belong and whom I serve, stood beside me and said, 'Do not be afraid, Paul. You must be presented to Caesar. God has given to you everyone who is with you.'

"So I say, sirs, cheer up. I believe God; and events will happen as they were told to me. However, we must be washed up on a certain island."

When the fourteenth night came we were being blown up and down the Adriatic sea. About midnight the crew calculated that we were coming close to some sort of land. The crew sounded and found the depth to be one hundred

twenty feet. When we had drifted further, the crew sounded again and found the depth at ninety feet.

Fearing that we would strike rocks, the crew dropped anchors from the stern and hoped for daylight.

Some sailors tried to leave the ship. When they had lowered the attendant boat, they indicated that they were going to lower the anchors at the front of the ship.

Paul said to the captain and the soldiers, "Unless these men stay with the ship, you cannot be saved."

So the soldiers cut the ropes holding the boat and allowed it to drop to the water.

When it was beginning to become light, Paul urged everyone to eat some food. He said, "This is the fourteenth day that you have watched, worked, and have not taken time to eat. So I ask you please, eat to maintain your strength. Not a hair will be lost from the head of any of you."

After Paul had said that, he took bread, and gave thanks to God in the presence of everyone on the ship. When he broke the bread, he began to eat. Everyone became more cheerful and the others also ate some food.

In all there were two hundred seventy six on board the ship. After everyone had eaten enough, the crew lightened the ship by dumping the wheat into the ocean.

When day came land was seen, but was not recognized. The crew sighted a beach with a stream flowing through it and decided to drive the ship into the creek, if possible.

The crew freed the anchors and dropped them into the sea. They freed the rudder, opened the mainsail for the wind and progressed toward shore. The ship sailed into a place where the two currents collided and the crew grounded the ship. The front of the ship was stuck; it was unmoveable, but the rear was broken by the violence of the waves.

The soldiers' advice was to kill all the prisoners to prevent any of them from swimming away and escaping. But the captain wanted to save Paul, so he detered the soldiers from doing what they intended. The captain ordered that the ones who could swim should jump into the sea first, and swim to land. The others were to get to shore on boards or on pieces of the ship. Everyone got safely to land and escaped death.

Dr. Edward King, Anglican dean of Capetown, thinks employers who forbid women workers to wear miniskirts are right. "In a business office," he said, "girls who wear minis are finis. Most females look like complete fools in minis.... And it serves them right."

A new survey by the official magazine of Russian atheism, "Naukai Religiya," found that better than one out of every five Soviet citizens is "religious." Findings were: 21 percent say they are religious; religious parents are credited as the main reason for this faith; 81 per cent of believers are women; 34 per cent belong to the working class, the supposed bulwark of Communism. Only 3 per cent of those calling themselves religious are under 30.

Georgia governor Lester Maddox proposes: Set aside prayer rooms in public schools for use by students on a voluntary basis. He points out there's a prayer room in the state capitol. Also, prayer services are conducted daily in his office for any state employees who care to attend.
