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Are You a

JUDAS?

We find recorded in the Holy Scriptures the story of a man who walked close to Jesus in life as His own disciple, yet yielded his heart to the Wicked One to betray his Lord and Master. In Matthew 26:14-16, we find Judas making his deal with the chief priests. When negotiations were completed, Judas had consented to betray the Lord for thirty pieces of silver.

If asked the question, "What do you think of Judas and what he did?" I wonder what our reply would be. It would be easy to sit in stern judgment against him for his actions; but let's turn the spotlight on ourselves for a while and see just how bad a man Judas really was when compared with many of us. How much is the Saviour worth to you? How do you present Him before the world? Would you sell Him for thirty pieces of silver? Are you a Judas?

When asked the first question,

I am sure that many would answer, "The Lord is worth everything to me. I love Him!" But our words mean very little if our lives speak differently. Jesus said, "If ye love me, KEEP MY COMMANDMENTS" (John 14: 15). The world is full of people who would pat themselves on the back like the Pharisee did and say, "Lord, I'm glad I'm not like Judas Iscariot. Money does not mean that much to me. I pay my tithes. I go to church regularly. I fast and pray, and I'm a good neighbor. What more could you ask for than this?" Judas no doubt did all these things, but they alone could not save him. The only one was the ONE he sold and rejected-Jesus Christ.

Are you a Judas? Are you content in life to feel that because you pay your tithes and offerings, attend church regularly, pray, and are a good neighbor, that you are no Judas? Friends, many who make such claims are selling the Lord for less than Judas did. At what price have you prized Him?

Have you accepted or rejected Him? What does the Saviour mean to you? It is time that we examine ourselves, our very lives through God's Word to see how we stand.

My Brother, is the Saviour worth only thirty cents to you? Then why do you sell your Lord for that package of cigarettes, pipe, cigar, or a chew of tobacco? You say you can't get along without it: it has become such a habit, so you sold the Saviour! It means more to vou! In Job 20:12-17 and Deut. 29:18-20, we are warned not to use the poisonous weed and the punishment that will come upon those who disobey this command of the Lord. In 1 Corinthians 3: 17 we are told: "He that defileth the temple of God, him will God destroy; for the temple of God is Holy which temple YE ARE." Are you a Judas?

My sister, how much does the Lord mean to you? So-you sold the Saviour for the fashions and trends of the world! You just couldn't live different from the world to please the Lord. The influence of your worldly friends and relatives meant more to you. You just couldn't stand to be criticized by the world for your plainness and distinction from them; so you decided to blend in with them. The powder and paint look too good to leave alone. The half nude dresses, you thought, looked so appealing to the eye. And your wardrode just wouldn't be complete without your sparkling jewelry! The shorts seemed so much cooler than a modest house dress. It meant so much to you to be accepted by the world that you sold the Saviour.

In Titus 2:14 Paul tells us that God is looking for a peculiar people, zealous of good works. In 1 Tim. 2:9, 10 we find these words: "In like manner also, that women adorn themselves in modest apparel, with shamefacedness and sobriety; not with broided hair, or gold, or pearls, or costly array; but (that which becometh women professing godliness) with good works." 1 Pet. 3:1-5 also gives us instruction on this point. Christ calls for young men and young women today who will have the courage to come out from the world and be separate even in their choice of wearing apparel. The Apostle Peter tells us that the world will think it strange that we are not like them, if we live to please God (1 Pet. 4:4). Are you a Judas? Have you sold the Saviour for the fashions and trends of the world?

Young lady, does the Lord mean so little to you that you would give Him away for one night out with a worldly dating friend? With continual dating out in the world, you soon grow very fond of a worldly boy, his flashy car, his easy going way, and the pleasures he delights in. You vow to be his one and only and give your Saviour away for

a companion of the world. The Word of God tells us that those who love the Lord, be it male or female, should not be unequally yoked to unbelievers (2 Cor. 6:14-17). We should not even be partakers with the unfruitful works of darkness (sin) (Eph. 5:7-12). Are you a Judas?

How much IS the Lord worth to you? He means a lot, does He? Then why sell Him so cheap to the world? That obscene literature that you just couldn't resist reading only cost you from thirty to fifty cents. Your jokebooks, comics, romance stories, etc., were the things that so occupied your mind and spirit that God's sweet Word was left out, so you sold the Saviour. The Bible tells us, "All that is in the world, the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eves, and the pride of life is not of the Father, but is of the world" (1 John 2:16). The Apostle John stated before this that if any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him. The Word also tells us, "Therefore, if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature; old things are passed away; and behold, all things are become new" (2 Cor. 5:17). Has this change been made in your life, or are you a Judas?

Young man, you say you'd

never be a Judas-But what's that in your hand? A can of beer, huh? How much did it cost? And where were you last night? Oh, to a show. How about the night before? To a dance, ave? You say that the twist and the pony are such good exercise as you throw and wiggle yourself around to the Beatles and Rolling Stones, etc. So you sold the Saviour for the fun and vain pleasures of the world; but be ve transformed by the renewing of your mind that ye may know what is that good and acceptable, and perfect, will of God." We are also told to redeem our time because the days are evil. If we are living a full, rich life in Christ and doing all we can to upbuild His kingdom here on earth, we will find much joy in living for God that these vain pleasures can never give. No man can serve two masters. We cannot love God and the world. Are you a Judas?

Hey, what was that you said when your plans didn't work out just right and someone got on your nerves? Now, now was that nice? And what was that whopper that you told that the crowd laughed so hard over? And what was that you said while quarreling with your neighbor? And then you talk about what a bad man Judas was? Judas sold the Lord, but you have given Him

away! Your words and actions disown Him! The Bible tells us that if we are in Christ even our conversation is different than what it once was. "Let all bitterness, and wrath and anger and clamour, and evil speaking be put away from you with all malice" (Eph. 4:31). We are also told to put off all filthiness, foolish talking, and jesting that is not convenient, but we should continually be in an attitude of prayer and thanksgiving. We are also told not to practice profanity nor take God's name in vain. Are you a Judas?

As we look about us today we see so much sin and betrayal of our Saviour that we have no

right to point a finger at Judas. Many today are selling their Saviour for much less than He did, while some give Him away. When strong drinks, and such things as the use of tobacco, eating unclean foods, worldly pleasures, indecent literature, jokes, evil speaking, lying, fashions, dishonesty, and other things of the world are in our lives, we cannot please God. Today Christ calls for young men and young women who will cast down the things of the world and pick up His cross and follow Him. Have you accepted this challenge? How is the Lord presented in your life? DO YOU REFLECT HIM; or-reject-HIM? Are you a Judas?

The graduate's response revealed the ambition to get himself a good paying job which he could enjoy. Once again the observer nodded approval, and asked, "What then?" Chuckling a little, the graduate answered, "Well, I suppose I'll find myself married. And that, of course, involves starting a home and raising children."

"Fine," the elder commented. "And what then?" The graduate sighed and attempted a conclusion by saying that he would retire, enjoy his grandchildren, and someday, of course, die. The inquirer, a minister, repeated the same question—"And what then?"

This graduate, as well as these here tonight, either has or has not planned for the most important part of his future.

Most of us have plans immediately following high school graduation. Approximately one-third of the class will go on to college or vocational school. Youth Questions answered by Ray L. Straub



Problem

PROBLEM:

I guess I'm kind of a night owl. At home I am told that nice boys and girls don't stay out until "all hours" of the night. Frankly, I can't see what the time of night has to do with being nice as long as we behave. The time of night that I'm expected to be in seems early to me, and I would like to know what is so awful about being out late. When do you think a respectable teen-ager ought to be in at night?

ANSWER:

It is difficult to know what you or your parents consider to be late. For some young people there is no such hour. For some parents, it becomes late soon after sundown. Both of these viewpoints are extremes, and I do not know where the viewpoints of your family lie between these extremes.

Your question which requests my

opinion about what time of night a teen-age person should be required to be back home is also hard to answer. There are numerous situations which could affect this, such as the type of activity in which one is engaged, the distance from home that must be traveled, the individuals in the company, the ages of the people involved, with their willingness to accept responsibilities, etc.

There are several important considerations involved in this rather difficult question about how late you should be permitted to be out at night. Let's consider some.

I note in your question that you may have reservations about the value of the statement that "nice boys and girls don't stay out until all hours of the night." This actually bears a certain truth which deserves your attention.

One might ask, "Just what does a nice young lady and gentleman do

for some hours after most activities for the evening have ceased? What nice deeds are performed then?"

You see, at night there are a great many questionable activities that go on which would not be done during the daytime. Temptations to go astray quite normally become stronger as the hour grows later.

Parents are aware of the fact that during very late hours, businesses have shut down, most medias of recreation and entertainment have closed; that it is unlikely that you do chores between midnight and sunrise, or that you walk around innocently enjoying the muted sounds of the night. It is easy for parents to become uneasy—and you should be thankful for that!

At night one cannot see very far, due to the darkness. You would do well to remember that this is also true symbolically. There is a tendency to commit deeds that rob untold pleasant hours and comfort from our futures. Foolish acts are done because folks are unable to see ahead to the danger that lures. The wise person learns that darkness can be an enemy of good. In the natural and spiritual sense, nighttime is of advantage to the enemy who creeps up on us during the darkness. Do not dismiss these statements as "old folk" talk, or a mere poor attempt at poetry.

It is to be recognized that there are occasions when you will be attend-

ing worth-while functions that are some distance away with those whom your parents know. It is presumed that you will be in late. On the other hand, it is reasonable for your parents to estimate a time when your activities for the evening should be ended and expect you in reasonably soon afterwards—quite soon when with someone your parents do not know well, and perhaps not quite as early when you are with someone in whose good discipline your parents have ample confidence.

There is another important con-

sideration on this subject; that of your own health. While it may not seem important to you now, it is quite necessary for any youth to get sufficient rest. Normally, young people need more sleep than do their parents. Without it, it is impossible to be alert during studies or at work. This robs a person of his efficiency. When he does poorly, it is difficult for him to be encouraged about the future. Many attitudes most important to your future happiness and wellbeing are formed during high school years and those shortly following. Drowsiness and fatigue scratch ugly scars into otherwise bright futures, Many people rest so little at night that they are not awake enough during the day to enjoy it! What a sad predicament to fall into.

Perhaps it cannot be expected that you will always agree with your parents concerning a reasonable time of night to be home. But, I hope that all parents and their sons and daughters recognize that as long as they live together under the same roof, the parents may reasonably expect wheelence on this matter. You may dis-

however, baptism is merely a symbol or outward sign which God requires of us to show the change that has taken place within our lives when we are converted. First of all, you must believe that Jesus is the Christ. the Son of the Living God. Have faith in God. Read Hebrews 11: 1: 'Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen.' However, faith alone is not sufficient for the scriptures tell us in James 2:19: 'Thou believest that there is one God; thou doest well; the devils also believe, and tremble.'

"The second step toward God is repentance. Luke 13:5 (last part) tells us, '... except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish.' Repentance means being sorry for past sins and to change the mind in respect to sin, to God. and to self.

"Conversion follows next. In Matthew 18:3 we are told: 'Verily I say unto you, except ye be converted, and become as little children, ye shall not enter into the kingdom of heaven.' Again in Acts 3:19: 'Repent ye therefore, and be converted, that your sins may be blotted out, when the times of refreshing shall come from the presence of the Lord.' Conversion is turning from sin, a complete turning toward God. 'Therefore

if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new.'"

"I'm beginning to see that there is a lot more to this matter mused Marilyn. "Then, after conversion the next step must be baptism."

"That's right, see what we find here in Mark 16:15, 16: 'And he said unto them, Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned.' You know, Marilyn, I believe I can diagnose your trouble. It seems to me that you have been buried alive."

"Buried alive?! Please explain, Elder Crane," exclaimed Marilyn. "I don't know what you mean."


Lorraine, daughter of our former editor, Donna Faubion, has accepted a position as head of the drama department of Sam Houston High School in Houston, Texas.

Danger Signals

Whether your datebook is full or not, you will still agree with me that dating is here to stay. Dating is more than a social pastime for teen-agers: it's an important part of your life. Your dates today are helping to prepare you for adult responsibilities tomorrow, like courtship, marriage, and parenthood. You may not realize it, but every fellow or girl you date is helping you decide what kind of mate you want for the rest of your life!

Or, maybe you've quit "playing the field" and, like manyteenagers, you're going steady. "Going steady" means different things to different young people, I've discovered, so I can't give a blunt "yes" or "no" answer to that oft-repeated question, "Is it wrong to go steady?" But whether your dates are with that same terrific guy or gal every week, or whether you "take 'em or leave 'em," you've got to watch out for the danger signals on your dates.

Dating is delightful (and sometimes delirious!), because God made it that way. But it's

also dangerous! If you're a normal, red-blooded teen-ager, you have certain physical drives down inside that can make you or break you, depending on how you handle the controls. I'm talking, of course, about sex, which, whether we admit it or not, is pretty well the cause of such wonderful things as love and marriage. Love has its spiritual side, too, ("Love is of God," says the Bible) but your interest in the opposite sex right now is primarily due to certain changes going on in your body, changes that are getting you ready for adulthood. That's why I say that dating can be dangerous, because this period of transition is also a time of temptation, and too many fellows and girls have run through the red lights instead of putting on the brakes. The results are sin, shame, and a future pretty well wrecked. Nearly half of the unwed mothers in the United States are teen-agers, and the number of girls graduating from our high schools "in absentia" is on the increase.

Before I list these danger sig-

nals, let's be clear on this: the fellow is just as much to blame as the girl, and maybe more. I know it "takes two to tango." but one of the two has to start the music, and nine times out of ten it's the fellow. These danger signals apply to guys as well as gals, and any self-respecting fellow ought to know when to put on the brakes to avoid a life-smashing collision with sin. A girl is so made that she responds quickly to sexual stimuli (like heavy petting) and the boy who deliberately leads her in that direction is asking for trouble. Pay attention to these danger signals and you'll not get detoured into sin.

1. "I'll permit it." This is the first red light to watch out for, because love is never permitted, it's always given. Even if you do permit a good-night kiss, and it's okay with Mom and Dad and your conscience, you still can't afford to give things away cheap that God meant to be precious and satisfying. Any date who requires you to lower your personal standards and "per-

mit" selfish gratification ought to be erased from your little black book. Kisses are not permitted, they're given; and the kind of physical affection that belongs to marriage is never "permitted" beforehand. Real love is a two-way street with both of you happily going in the same direction. Any other arrangement leads to a moral smash-up.

2. "We can always stop when we please." The teen-ager who says this just doesn't understand his own physical make-up! The sex drives in your body are different from the other drives like hunger and thirst, because sex affects every part of your personality, and once the wheels start turning, it gets harder and harder to put on the brakes. Your mind may scream "Stop!" but once your body gets aroused. it's not easy to quit. The only safe policy is this: never get started at all. Playing with sex is always a down-hill proposition, and the longer you do it. the faster things move until only a collision can stop you—and then it's too late.

3. "I'm glad nobody's around!" It's a pretty safe rule that teenagers should do nothing on their dates that they wouldn't do if Mom and Dad were with them. Perhaps your parents wouldn't hit the ceiling if you indulged in a good-night kiss and some hand-holding, but beyond that-well, you know the answer. If during a date it suddenly hits you, "Boy, I'm glad nobody's around!" then you've had a danger signal and it's time to stop. You can fill your parent's heart with pride by what you do, or you can break their hearts, too. If you and your date start thinking up excuses to get alone, then beware. It's a danger signal! And don't forget that you'll never find a spot where God can't sit in on your date and watch what you're doing!

4. "What about tomorrow?" If you find yourself worrying about the consequences tomorrow, then there's something wrong. Real love can be shared over and over again, and it gets more wonderful all the time. Real love doesn't worry about tomorrow. But the teen-ager who plays with sin is always asking the question, "What's going to happen?" The girl who permits a few moments of pleasure today is only auctioning off tomorrow's happiness at the lowest possible price. Many a teen-ager is wearing the devil's

price tag: "Slightly soiled, greatly reduced in price." It's the old mistake of sacrificing the permanent on the altar of the immediate. So, if you catch yourself asking, "Will I be sorry for this tomorrow?" you've seen a danger signal and you'd better do something about it. Chances are you're degrading and debasing this wonderful thing called sex, and you can't play with fire without getting burned.

How can teen-agers today escape this kind of sin, when sex is exploited on TV, in books and magazines, and almost everywhere they go? How can you keep clean when the very atmosphere around is polluted? The Bible gives a three-fold secret of victory:

Observation: "Watch ye and pray, lest ye enter into temptation. The spirit truly is ready, but the flesh is weak" (Mark 14:38) is what Jesus commands. Keep your eyes open, and when you see temptation around the corner, make tracks! "Flee youthful lusts!" Paul warned young Timothy in 2 Timothy 2:22.

Amputation: "And if thy hand offend thee (cause you to stumble), cut it off!" says Jesus in Mark 9:43. What He means is, be drastic when you deal with sin. If some friend, some favorite magazine or occupation, causes you to fall into sin, then cut it out of your life immediately. If you don't kill sin, it will kill you. This may mean saying

"no" to certain dates, or refusing to go to certain places; but it's the only way to keep clean.

Dedication: "For to me to live is Christ." I firmly believe that no teen-ager can get through his teen years unscathed without the power of Jesus Christ in his life. Christ will give you victory over temptation and your life will have a new thrill when He's in control. It isn't enough to make resolutions or have good intentions: you need a power within you to keep you clean. Give your heart and life to Christ today and that power is yours. Spend time daily in the Word of God and you'll find new strength and victory. "Thy Word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against thee."

So, teen-ager, when you're on that next date, don't just look at the stars in the sky or even the stars in your date's eyes. Keep your eyes open for these danger signals. You'll have a lot more fun today—and you'll be glad you did tomorrow.

In these particular writings of Paul, we find he makes mention of several women. He salutes them and sends greetings in his letters. Evidently they are dedicated women of God and zealous in the Lord's work. I notice one woman in particular: Priscilla, the wife of Aquila.

Priscilla and her husband were Jews who lived in Rome. When Claudius ruled Rome he commanded all the Jews to get out. Aquila and Priscilla moved to Corinth. It was there that Paul first met them. He stayed with them for a time and the men labored together at tentmaking.

It was probably two years later that Paul sailed to Syria. Priscilla and her husband went with him as far as Ephesus. After Paul departed, a highly educated Jew came to Ephesus and spoke boldly in the synagogue. He was preaching the baptism of John but Priscilla and Aquila took him into their home and taught him "the way of God more perfectly." From that time on he preached that Jesus was Christ.

Later, Paul made it known that Priscilla and Aquila had risked their lives for his sake. This probably took place in Rome, although he doesn't tell where or how it happened. When he knew his life would soon be over he wrote to Timothy to come to him in Rome. Even in so urgent a message he again makes mention of his loyal friends.

What a godly woman Priscilla must have been. Her home was open to strangers. She helped teach the Word of God. They even held church in their home. Her loyalty to the Lord's work went as far as risking her life for its cause. Isn't she a fine example of a Christian wife?

How astonishing is this gospel? The maker of worlds put wee, two-legged creatures on a tiny planet of a second-rate sun, put in those wee creatures souls, set these souls free, and then began gently to knock at the doors of their hearts begging them to open and let Him come in and do them greater good! Every second He sustains their lives, sees to the very center—yet cannot enter the inner soul until we open the door.

You look into each other's eyes And clasp your hands and kneel in prayer


With balding head and graying hair. Then rising from your knees you say.

Do our hands slack? Are we too often taking comfort and assurance from the accomplishments for the Kingdom that we see made by others, yet failing to seek as we should for what more we, individually, might do for Him?

A striking line in a gospel song we sometimes hear asks, "What if every friend He had were just like me?" Doesn't this call for some real self-examination each time we hear it? Then what do we do about it?

May we not make the mistake of thinking what our hands do must be an outstanding talent. The important thing is that "whatsoever we do is as unto the Lord," and is the best we can offer.

The "ditches we dig" can be great or mediocre, depending on our own attitude and dedication. You—as a student, a clerk, a secretary, an accountant, a carpenter, can be just another worker or you can be outstanding because your character as a child of God is outstanding, and because you develop your opportunities for witness.

Are you just digging holes? Or are you building cathedrals?
