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

Shakespeare's k n o w l e d g e about man was wide and profound. One never ceases to marvel at the unchangeableness of man, and Shakespeare seemed to have a secret of this knowledge that is beyond our scope of imagination. One of the rewards of being able to read the English language is being able to explore the nature of Shakespeare's writings.

When McBeth, knowing that Lady McBeth did not survive the agony of her own condemning conscience, realized that life is to be lived today, and to be lived in a manner befitting a good conscience, he said: "Tomorrow, and tomorrow, and tomorrow, Creeps in this petty pace from day to day. To the last syllable of recorded time; And all our yesterdays have lighted fools The way to dusty death."

How like Lady McBeth we are—always looking to the future for happiness. In her case it was the desire for a kingdom that caused her downfall. She thought that only a kingdom could bring the happiness she

wanted. It may not take a kingdom to make you happy, but how many people do you know who live their days in discontent and unrest, looking for the literal kingdom to come in which they will know joy forevermore, and letting this life slip by without ever tasting the happiness they anticipate for tomorrow?

To look forward to the kingdom is part of the faith we hold in God's promise of a reward to the righteous. But some people spend so much time in trying to get ready to live in the afterwhile, that they miss the happiness God intended for them right here on this earth.

Our "View"—Our Outlook

"It is curious to what extent our happiness or unhappiness depends upon the manner in which we view things" (Burke). Some people feel that a gloomy and pessimistic outlook is a Christian outlook. They never see things in a positive way. If they read the newspaper they see only the bad reports, the accidents, the mur-

ders, the lust. If they were given a handful of hundred dollar bills, all genuine except one, they would throw the genuine away and keep the counterfeit, claiming that God intended them to live in misery; that being unhappy is the lot of the Christian.

"Men continually forget that happiness is a condition of the mind and not a disposition of circumstances" (Lecky). Cease looking to tomorrow for happiness. You will be happy tomorrow only through building up a consciousness of happiness today.

"Happiness, like mercy, is twice blessed; it blesses those who are most intimately associated with it, and it blesses all those who see it, hear it, feel it, touch it, or breathe the same atmosphere" (Kate D. Wiggans). It is important to live every day to its full and draw from it all the happiness God has to offer you.

"Link" Joy with God

Stopford Brooke has said: "These things I have spoken

unto you, that my joy might remain in you, and that your joy might be full." Although there were many heartaches in the life of Jesus, He was essentially a happy person. He brought comfort, encouragement, healing and joy to those round about Him. He never walked into a house and told them the world was full of woes and that they should suffer and be sad. Instead He brought such joy to their minds that suffering was not a burden. He showed them that the yoke was really a means of sharing joy as well as burdens, making it so plainly a joyous duty, that men gladly laid down their lives for Him.

The first thing to realize is that neither person nor thing can keep you from enjoying the blessings of God unless you choose to let them deprive you of your rightful heritage—happiness. Christ in you is greater than all external influences. His presence in your heart is the presence of all the good you can ever desire.

To live happily means to turn your attention to the pow-

er of Christ within, which is peace, joy, love, health and supply. Release all thoughts of the past that trouble you, all failures, all frustrations, all tensions and begin each new day by acknowledging the presence of Christ within.

David in speaking of the power and majesty of God in Psalm 95:6, 7 says: "O come, let us worship and bow down: let us kneel before the Lord our maker. For he is our God; and we are the people of his pasture, and the sheep of his hand, Today if ye will hear his voice."

What a wonderful happy thought—"Today if ye will hear his voice!" Not tomorrow. because tomorrow all too soon becomes today, and today becomes yesterday beyond recall. It is today, this very day, this very hour and minute, that happiness begins if we will heed the call of God.

'Tis Being and Doing

There is no secret to today's happiness. Jesus gave the perfect plan in Luke 17:21, "... Behold the kingdom of God is within you." Paul added this thought to today's happiness-"Christ in you, the hope of glory." The embodiments of this kingdom are found in Gal. 5:22, 23: "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance . . . " Life must be happy if we are in such

a glorious state, because there is no law against the goodness of God. Why? Because these are attributes of God. To be happy, one must embody the good contained in these godly attributes, and practice them to perfection. It does no earthly good to know something that will make us happy, and then never use it. "'Tis being and doing and having that make All the pleasures and pains of which mankind partake; To be what God pleases, to do a man's best, And to have a good heart, is the way to be blest" (Byron).

Remember the little grace you learned as a child?—"God is great, God is good."? Meditate upon this thought. Grasp the significance of the words: thrill to the power in that simple statement—"God is great." Can't you begin to sense the joy of knowing such a great God? This is a happy statement, designed to teach us the greatness and goodness of God and His providence for His children. We can be happy because God cares what happens to our lives.

Make Happiness a Habit

Make happiness a habit. Begin each new day in the realization that God has something good in store for you and that vou are determined not to let it pass by and wait for another opportunity tomorrow.

Begin the day by freeing your mind of any limited belief con-

cerning your capabilities, and your right to happiness. Negation neutralizes your good, so think powerful, positive thoughts. Remember that you are serving a powerful God. Let your mind and heart be quickened with the realization that you are a child of God, fearless and free.

Instead of thinking of hap-

piness in terms of the future, begin the happiness habit today. A life in Christ is meant to be a joyous and rewarding life today, and it will be, if it is lived in the knowledge that the kingdom of God is within your very being, and that kingdom is a happy kingdom because Christ sits on the throne of your heart.



Editorial

A noted commentator remarked recently that never in his quarter-century as a commentator had he known there to be so many diversified opinions on vital issues of the day from top-level figures.

You, as a young person, are affected by these universal problems—at least in your thinking, if not directly. Some of the issues controverted by top officials are such issues as the War in Vietnam. Some contend we have no alternative—that we must remain there to protect the rights of freedom. Others contend that we should pull out, leaving affairs to work out without our intervention. Many debatable domestic issues exist right here at home, such as the Poverty Program—Is it a good thing? Is it helping the ones that really need it, or is it simply a good publicity stunt for political strength?

Just what sort of a stand does the Christian young person (or Christian individual, in general) take on such things? As I see it, we are not called upon as disciples of Christ to take a dogmatic view one way or the other on controversial issues—so controversial that from within the same ranks you hear opposite views.

However, it is yours, Christian youth, to take opportunity wherever you see it to relate the many chaotic happenings of today to Bible prophecy. With an informed view concerning the relativity of current events to Bible prophecy, you can help counteract the widely publicized "God is Dead" theory. (What an abomination!)

When war is referred to, we are reminded of the passage, "And he shall hear of wars and rumours of wars: but the end is not yet... For nation shall rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom... But he that shall endure unto the end, the same shall be saved."

With the frequent reference to peace conferences, and with many a dignitary's speech "peppered" with the word "peace," we are reminded of the words, "For yourselves know perfectly that the day of the Lord so cometh as a thief in the night, For when they shall say. Peace and safety; then sudden destruction cometh upon them...."

In the miraculous return of the Jews, and the blossoming of Palestine we see an encouraging fulfillment of prophecy—one of which many people

THE EARLY BROTHERHOOD 2:42.

The brotherhood was constantly concerned with fellowship and the teachings of the apostles; both in eating and in worship. A sense of keen reverence came to everyone. Many signs and wonders were performed by the apostles. All the believers were united and owned their things in common. They sold their goods and possessions and divided them between them all, to each according to his need.

Daily they continued with one heart at the temple. They ate their meals in their homes with joyfulness and a oneness of heart; praising God and enioving the good will of the entire population. Every day the Lord added those who were being saved to the number of believers.

CHAPTER 3

THE HEALING OF THE LAME MAN 3:1

John and Peter went together to the Temple for the hour of prayer, which was at three o'clock in the afternoon. There was a certain man, lame from the day of his birth, who was carried daily to a gate (called, Beautiful) of the temple to beg alms from those entering the temple. When he saw Peter and John about to enter the Temple, he asked them for a gift.

Peter and John looked at him with great intensity and said, "Look on us." He looked at them expecting to receive something from them.

Peter continued, "I have neither silver nor gold, but I will give you what I do have. In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, stand up and walk."

Peter took him by the right hand and lifted him, and his feet and ankles received strength immediately. He leaped up and stood and walked. He entered the temple with them, walking and jumping and praising God.

When he was walking and praising God, all the people saw him and recognized him as the man who sat begging at the gate (called Beautiful) of the temple. They were speechless and at a loss to understand what had happened to him.

The man (who had been healed from lameness) embraced Peter and John; and the people, wanting some explanation, began gathering quickly there in Solomon's porch.

PETER CALLED FOR REPENTANCE 3:12

When Peter saw that, he spoke to the people, "You men of Israel, why are you so amazed at this? Why are you looking at us so keenly as though we made this man walk through our own power or holiness?

"The God of Abraham, of Isaac, of Jacob, the God of our fathers has here glorified Jesus. His Son, whom you delivered up and rejected in the presence of Pilate, just when he had decided to release Him, You refused the Just and Holy One and chose instead a murderer. Then you killed the Prince of life. God, then, resurrected Him from death. We are witnesses of that.

"The man whom you now see and know, was made strong by His name through faith in His name. This same faith, which made him perfectly sound, is now in your presence.

"Now I know that you and your rulers did the crucifixion through ignorance. Notice, however, that all the things that the Christ was to do and suffer, as foretold by God through the prophets, He has fulfilled.

"The next step for you is to repent and be converted so your sins can be blotted out, and you will receive a renewal from the face of the Lord.

"He will send Jesus, who was preached to you before, and whom heaven must receive until the times when all things must be restored in accordance with the Word of God, which was spoken by all His holy prophets since the beginning.

"It is truth that Moses said to the fathers, 'The Lord God shall raise up, from your own people, a Prophet like me. You will listen to everything He says to you. Everyone who refuses to listen to that Prophet will be destroyed from among the people.'

"In fact, all the prophets, beginning with Samuel to each succeeding prophet, for as many as spoke, spoke of these days. You are children of the prophets and of the covenant that God made with our fathers saving to Abraham. 'In your seed all peoples of the earth will be blessed.' God raised His Son, Jesus, and sent Him to you first, to turn each one from his unrighteousness."



HAPPINESS SEARCHING



Our everyday activities are usually in search of a higher level of happiness. You buy something and the purpose of buying it is to inject into your life a little more happiness. You might feel it is only

for your comfort, or even your necessity—and yet you must still admit that comfort and the necessary things of life make for happiness. Even when you do something for others, in that you find happiness.

Some examples of grasping for happiness are not applicable to your life, but they do point out a search for happiness: The robber breaks into the bank because he feels happiness will be found in being debt-free, or in living lavishly. A murder is committed because some person seems to be standing in the way of another's happiness. A person may tell a lie to protect his happy state of well being.

Most people are quite particular in choosing their friends. They are careful to choose friends with whom they can be happy. And, of course, people try to choose their life-time companions with an outlook for life-time happiness. A young fellow may say to a young lady, "If we could just have a home together, just be together the rest of our lives, that is all it would take to make me happy." It is never really the case, though. After the knot is tied, it is: "If we could have that kind of home, that car, those clothes, we could really be happy,"—and it goes on and on. This is why we are bringing you this series, pointing out principles which, if integrated into your home building, will not fail to help produce a happy home.

The Divine Guidance Way

Perhaps we could call our thoughts for this month, "Happy Home Building, The Divine-Guidance Way." Never has a book lived through the ages like God's Holy, inspired Word. When I pick up my Bible, I feel awed at the miracle of that Word. Its life, its content, its inspiration, its principle and its revelation can be a thrill for you as a family if you will but pick it up and start the day with it—or close the day with it, or both.

One familiar verse that is a source of real inspiration is found in John 1:1:

"In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God, and the Word was God."

Notice a companion verse in John 1:14:

"And the Word was made flesh and dwelt among us, (and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the Father,) full of grace and truth."

Right now you may be wondering what all this has to do with a HAPPY HOME. Let me assure you that it has real significance. When you look into God's Word, remember that you have the Word (the testimony of Jesus) in your hands. In it you will find His life, His teaching, His counseling, His admonition, and His commands. The whole Bible is centered around the Son of God. Remember that He is the greatest teacher, the greatest counselor, the greatest preacher, and the great SAVIOUR.

Read the Bible together often, finding beautiful passages, comforting passages, instructing passages—

and do it with the thought of building your home the "Divine Guidance Way." With this, my friend, a Happy Home can be yours.

Remember that all our actions are made in pursuit of happiness. To find the greatest happiness, thankfully use the material blessings that God gives, including with this the Word of God—often read, even each day. Build your home strong and build it well. In Holy Scripture, you will find excellent instruction for father, mother, son and daughter.

Who's Sorry Now?

Genuine faith or belief will lead us to the second step in the plan of salvation—repentance.

Very early in Christ's ministry, He said, "... The time is fulfilled and the kingdom of God is at hand, REPENT ye, and believe the gospel" (Mark 1:15).

Repentance means to feel sincerely sorry for sins committed. "Godly sorrow" will cause us to take definite action to change our way of life. Instead of serving Satan, we will desire to be children of God. A very real change, or conversion will be evident in the way we think, speak, and act.

An essential part of repentance is confession. It is not enough to just feel remorse or regret for disobeying God's commands. A further requirement is to verbally confess our sins. Someone has said, "There is a difference between confession and profession, for whereas confession comes from the heart, profession rises only from the lips."

The foregoing instructions are especially appropriate at this time of the year when we need to be giving our lives a thorough self-examination in preparation for the Lord's Supper (1 Cor. 11:28, 29). We need not only confess and ask of the Heavenly Father forgiveness of our sins, but we need to make amends for anything that is amiss between us and our fellowman. It takes courage and humility to ask forgiveness of another. But these are attributes that need to be cultivated in a Christian.

As we meditate upon and memorize these verses, let us sincerely search our hearts, then follow the admonition found in them.

Successful Scripture Memorization

As Charles H. Spurgeon, the noted preacher of London, said, "There is no limit to what you can do with your memory, if you are only DE-TERMINED to make it your obedient servant."

After determining to be a Minuteman, do not permit yourself to become discouraged. "No man, having put his hand to the plow, and looking back, is fit for the kingdom of God" (Luke 9:62).

If at all possible, choose the mornings (a definite time each morning; perhaps during the same period in which you have daily 2T4G meditations) to learn new verses. Review can be done any time or place where a few spare minutes are available. That's why it's wise to always have a few cards with you.

One secret of successful memorization, is to learn one verse thoroughly before attempting a second. With only 8 verses a month, you only have to learn an average of 2 verses a week. Many who have successfully learned verses, memorize 2, 3 or more every morning.

It is very important that you work on these verses every day (Acts 17:11). Don't try to cram all 8 verses into your cranium the last Thursday night of the month before a local quiz some week-end. You'll not retain them, and you will not benefit spiritually. The Word needs to be meditated and feasted upon.

After learning one verse thoroughly, begin to memorize a second, remembering to review the first one and so forth.

Another key to successful verse memorization is to find joy in doing the work. At first it will probably seem like a chore; since it is natural for most of us to choose the way of least resistance. But as our knowledge of the Bible increases and becomes a part of our very being, available to use at a moment's notice, this memory exercise will become a real joy.

As suggested earlier, write the verse on one side of a file card and the reference on the reverse side.

After having learned several verses, the cards should be arranged so as to help you review systematically and effectively. For example, those verses that have been learned thoroughly, should be placed together in a section of your file box (or whatever container you use) to be reviewed just once a week. Later as that stack grows, you'll have to take from the weekly review your very best-mastered verses and put in a monthly review section. Eventually a quarterly, then semi-annual, and finally an annual review section can be formed.

All this time you will be learning new verses that will be reviewed daily and then added to the weekly review, and so on down the line.

If during any review you fail to recall a reference or are unable to quote a verse correctly, put it back
