Living With a Stranger

Greg hadn't been so nervous since he had to play a piano recital when he was ten years old. He paced around the sparcely furnished room, darting glances at himself in the mirror. He wanted to look his best. Making a good first impression was plenty important.

In a few minutes, the door would open. In would walk a fellow near Greg's own age. A stranger. For the next nine months they would live in close proximity. This stranger would be Greg's roommate.

Perhaps you, like Greg, will soon share a small college dormitory room with a stranger. Like Greg, you too are eager to make a good first impression. Here are some tips for making that relationship a satisfactory, rewarding one.

If you arrive in the room ahead of your roommate, you have "squatter's rights" to the bed with the best matdesk nearest the win

and the handiest closet. You'll do well not to exercise these rights, however. Some unsuccessful roommate friendships have been ruined right at this point. It's a good rule to remember in any relationship that we rarely win people to ourselves by being selfish.

When you meet for the first time it's a big moment for both of you. Be your warmest, most out-going self. Give your roommate a hand with the baggage, greeting your roommate's family cordially.

Part of the fun of getting acquainted with anyone is finding out about his background and comparing it with your own. A feeling of unity is established to discover that your roommate has two kid brothers at home, too, that both your fathers are in business for themselves and that both of you like math and dislike English.

One word of caution about this interchange of information, though. Save something for tomorrow—or next week—or next month. In your eagerness to become well acquainted don't simply "spill" over with everything you've ever felt or thought or done. A mark of maturity is learning NOT to divulge family skeletons or private information which belongs inside the family circle. Later you may discover that this new-found friend confides in everyone both his own secrets—and yours.

During those first days you'll want to arrange a workable share-the-workschedule. Dusting, sweeping, wastebasket emptying, and window washing

will pile up in the busy schedule of college unless you have a definite plan. Be sure you do your share—and a little more. Live up to your part of the agreement. If your roommate is not a Christian and you wish to be a testimony to him, you'll want to be extra careful at this point.

Nancy came from a disciplined, orderly household. She hung up her clothes promptly. She dusted and drymopped her room at home every morning with the same regularity she employed in brushing her teeth. At college she roomed with Marybeth.

Marybeth's family had been very active in an evangelical church. They considered all other activities more important than housecleaning. Casual, relaxed living gave them more time for doing Christian work, Unfortunately, Marybeth's testimony was spoiled for Nancy. Even the sight of her roommate on her knees having her morning devotions infuriated Nancy. For the dust curls under the bed, and yesterday's wearing apparel on the chair were a sign of shocking untidiness to Nancy.

If at home you left your bed unmade some mornings, and if your mother had to hang up your clothes. mend your ways quickly. You're in college now. Neatness and good housekeeping habits count.

Families differ in other ways, too. In some homes, doors are slammed. voices are raised, and no one ever says "Excuse me," "Please," or "Thank you." Certainly they love each other. They just don't practice politeness within the family circle. Unfortunately, when a young person from this type of home goes to college, he may jar his roommate without even being aware of it.

Learn to be considerate of the person with whom you live. Don't type. play the radio, or eat an apple if your roommate is napping. Do you prefer to study late at night and sleep late next morning? College isn't scheduled that way. Better adhere to conventional hours.

Allow your roommate some privacy, too. Do some of your studying in the library. Don't read her mail, use her hand lotion or borrow her clothes. Maybe you and your sister sort of owned everything together. Well, your roommate isn't your sister.

Also remember that you're only rooming with this person—you aren't marrying him. Married couples frequently spend all their spare time in each other's company. They plan how to spend money together. They plan leisure time activities, rarely including others.

College offers an open door to all kinds of friendships. Don't limit yourself to nurturing one friendship to the exclusion of all others. Certainly you and your roommate should share some "fun times" together. But include others, too. Invite the kids who room across the hall to come over for a "feed." When the allowance permits. take the kids next door to the drug store for a malt.

Spend some leisure hours in the company of others without your roommate. Be as loyal to him (or her) though, as you would if you were related. Maybe your roommate has faults. Serious faults. Others have noticed. "How can you STAND Betsy's baby-talk!" a group of girls demanded of Betsy's roommate. "It's nauseating!"

Since a dog is man's best friend, can you kill your neighbor's friend if he should happen to be human? This is the kind of reasoning you are using. If you say I can't compare the killing of a fly to the murder of a human. I contend that you cannot compare playing pool in a home to playing poker in a gambling establishment.

I say all this to let you know that unless you can approach this matter more reasonably, I'll have no comment to offer.

OUESTION:

I would like to know what is wrong with exchanging gifts, cards, or having children participate in Christmas plays at Christmas time, even though we do not believe in celebrating Christmas.

ANSWER:

It appears to me that you answered your own question. If you don't believe in celebrating Christmas, then you ought to live up to that belief by not celebrating! I suspect that you find yourself in a position of wanting someone who shares your theological viewpoint to give you endorsement to make the compromises mentioned in your question, freeing you from having to stand by your decision by yourself. I cannot give this endorsement.

The Choice of a Profession

In the past months you have read articles in this section of AIM magazine on such important subjects as Dating, Military Service, How to Pray, How to Pay Tithe, How to Dress, and other subjects vital to our everyday life. It is impossible to pull out one segment of our daily life and say this is most important. Every decision we make is correlated with our every other action to create the life we lead. It is fair to say, however, that the choice of a profession is the most important in one respect: that is, that the greatest amount of our entire lives is devoted to this occupational pursuit. Many other important decisions may only have to be made and carried out once in a lifetime, but our occupation demands daily consideration.

Opportunities abound in this rapid age in which we live. Ev-

ery newspaper has a long list of job opportunities, guaranteeing high salary, position, and financial success. It is not an easy decision to make. In fact, it may not be possible to make this decision in one step. Perhaps we will work up to our life's profession by trial and error.

I would like to think that many of you have chosen to work toward full-time employment in the spreading of Christ's gospel. If so, certainly there can be no profession any more rewarding than this. This subject will be expanded in a later article in this magazine.

In choosing a profession, as in every other decision you make, do not leave God out. Remember these words from Psalms "... a thousand years in thy sight are but as yesterday.... So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom...and establish

thou the work of our hands" (Psalm 90:4, 12, 17).

You will soon find that in the business world honesty is not always considered a virtue. Men covet, lie, cheat and steal, to become successful and accepted in a society which measures a man's worth by his possessions. The only answer to the corruption in the business world today is to turn back to the Bible and again put our trust and belief in a God of judgment. There is no higher office or position in this world than the office of President of the United States. No law requires them to take oath of office on a Bible. Yet they choose to do so. President Lincoln used a Bible opened to Proverbs 21 where it says, "Every way of a man is right in his own eyes...but the Lord pondereth the heart. A high look . . . a proud heart . . . is sin." President Eisenhower pledged himself on a Bible opened to 2 Chronicles which says. "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways, then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sins, and will heal their land."

Regardless of your choice of profession, preparation is important. Preparation today means education. This does not always mean formal education such as a college degree, although this is very desirable. Education means devoting your time and energy to developing personal skills so that you can

be a productive employee and capable of operating your business. This can be a long, tedious process requiring much patience and hard work. It is during this preparation period that so many fail. They settle for a profession far below their mental or physical capabilities just because they are too lazy to give of themselves enough to do their very best.

The decision to settle for something less than we are capable of attaining will reflect also in other areas of our lives. Remember—it is impossible to neglect one segment of our lives without this affecting our general attitude. For example: How can you be a leader in your community or in laymen's activities at your church if you choose to give less than your best to your profession? Do not be content only to be a good employee where you work, determine to be the best. The influence of a key employee, or successful business man, can be widespread. You must be willing to go the extra mile, to put forth the extra effort—and then shall you find favor and good understanding in the sight of God and man.

I have spoken only in general about the choice of a profession. The requirements of all vocations are the same. Success demands the best of everything we have to offer. All of us have our personal preference regarding how we want to spend our working day. Some like to work inside an office, others outside,

Pacific Pines Youth Camp 1969

God was there!—all over the green hillside—among the majestic pines. He was in the gentle whisper of the breeze that moved the graceful ferns beneath. God was there!—within each rustic, wooden structure—one mile above the valley below. His presence surrounded each heart bidding an entrance. God was there—at our third Youth Camp at Pacific Pines!

As camp opened, some were apprehensive as to what this year's camp would be like. We had had good experiences in the other years we had been here. Would God continue His blessing this year, too?

Then—as heavily-laden autos, grinding in low gears, began to appear and young people with eager, smiling faces began piling out—I thought of the song, "They come from the east and west—to worship the King—to dine as His guest—how blessed these pilgrims are!" And how blessed these young people looked to me!—some just approaching their teens—others who would soon become adults.

Our two new counselors (from the Stockton-Sacramento area) arrived with a carload of campers. The National Youth Team arrived, as did the cooks. They came from near and far, counselors and campers, until by 5:00 that evening the girls' dorm was full and the boys' dorm was about half full. There were 52 young people registered.

After unpacking and supper was over, the evening service got under

way and the rules of the camp were read. Elder Nathan Lawson took charge of the service and the Youth Team presented their program. The hills rang with the beautiful singing of the "Challengers" Team. All enjoyed the wonderful program and God's presence was felt.

The next afternoon the Youth Team and the rest of the campers engaged in a game of baseball to vie for a trophy, and the Challengers, living up to their name, won it.

That evening God seemed to come down in the camp and His glory filled our hearts. There was weeping as youth and staff members alike were being blessed. Several gave their hearts to the Lord that night, and there was much rejoicing.

That same evening the Youth Team left. The empty feeling which their absence left in our hearts seemed to cause us to again wonder if the blessings would continue—and we prayed. God's presence continued. His presence was felt in every service. The youth this year seemed to be more

devoted, more serious—and a hunger for God prevailed.

Campers were divided into groups of six or seven for each teacher for the 10:00 a.m. Bible Classes which were conducted in various places over the hillside. The youth responded well to these lessons; teachers and students were enriched together.

On Thursday evening a banquet was prepared, the mode of dress being costumes of different countries of the world. The menu was: La sagne, with tossed green salad, and strawberry shortcake with whipped cream. The staff put on a satire show, "Life in the Girls' Dorm," which caused much laughter.

Besides the early morning general assembly and Bible classes up in the woods, an evangelistic class was conducted at 11:15—a different speaker in charge each day—in which were given many pointers on how to reach people for God. At the same time a Crafts Class was held for the Junior campers. Sisters Pauline Kiger and Ann Meador were in charge. Many beautiful things were made and put on display on the last day.

Another new counselor which we were privileged to have this year was John Lemley, a Midwest Bible College student. I think all the camp enjoyed having John with us. Brother Harvey Fischer contributed much to the camp and we were very grateful to him for coming to make our camp more complete. Each evening God seemed to bestow Elder Nathan Lawson with inspiring messages so that we were all blessed. He was truly a great inspiration to our camp.

Sabbath day seemed to be the climax of the whole week. In the morning, in addition to the junior and

senior classes, a baptismal class was conducted. In the early afternoon there was a talent program in which many youth participated with beautiful renditions in song. The trophy was awarded to a trio from the Los Angeles Church—Larry Marrs, Elaine Smith, and Loren Stacey, who sang, "It's In Your Hands."

As a result, Biafra's remaining population is now suffering more from starvation then ever before. Therefore, it is of increasing importance that we pray earnestly and without ceasing for all our brethren there. Brother Lael Tikili received a letter from his father a few weeks ago. It stated that everyone in the family was getting along fine. Only Sister Tikili has become quite ill from working too hard caring for the family. He requested that we all pray for her as well as for all our brethren in Biafra.

While members of the Church of God were gathering together at Huron, South Dakota, this past summer, our brethren in other countries were also having annual meetings:

Quezon, Philippines: The FYC in Quezon, Philippines, sent in a report of their Young People's meetings at which 22 were present. Much of the business consisted of planning projects for beginning

the construction of their first church building. Following is an excerpt from the report sent by Sister Phoebe Sausa:

Church building begun

After this meeting we came to action. Now we have accomplished the skeleton of the chapel as the result of our first meeting. We have also acquired a church site with an area of 4400 square meters. When our dream shall become a reality it will give us more power and enable us to more actively spread the Gospel throughout the Philippines. We need more members, but first of all, the church.

FYC holds debates

As it is now, we have not sponsored any social gatherings yet, but it is my pleasure to report that today we have encountered the Church of Christ, through debate, in the public. The topic of debate is entitled "The Laws during Abraham's Time, including the Ten Commandments, are still binding during the Christian Era."

London, England: The Church of God in England held their Third Annual Convocation and were richly blessed, both in numbers (over 400) and in experiences received from God. Seven souls were baptized as a result of the meetings.

Report on FYC Rally

The FYC sponsored a fund-raising rally to raise money for liquidating our debt owed on the church building here in London. We did not reach our goal, but thank God for all that was raised. Many of the people who loaned money to the church are in need of their cash and are requesting an early payment. Please pray that God will provide us with the finances which we so sorely need. All the help which you brethren in America provide, whether in the form of money or prayer, will be highly appreciated and I am sure God will bless you for it.

Hanover, West Germany: The Church of God in Hanover, West Germany, held their first Mission Meeting in Hanover. Over 60 brothers and sisters from different directions of Germany came for the special services. It is truly a blessing for them to have enough of their Mission-Center completed to hold services in.

Report from Elder Strauss

About our first church building, including young people's centre, plans are made and we hope and pray that we can start

this year. Our Mission-Centre will serve both the church and young people. Since we have no place of our own, it is hindering the progress of the work here in Germany. That's why we need this centre so much. We have to pay a lot of rent money for this present meeting place. So we will then be able to put this money into our work. If you help us build this Mission-Centre you also will help the work in Germany. We want a living church and that's why we are building the Centre. Our church and Mission-Centre will be connected with an Old Folks Home. We have purchased the ground for this project and paid for it already.

I hope you and many other brethren can see the vision God has given us here in Europe. Every possible help, financially and in your prayers, will help the Church of God move forward. It is not my burden alone, it is the burden of everyone in the Church of God who has heard the command of Jesus Christ to go into all the world and preach the Gospel. I am too little to carry out an order like this alone. So please help us, not for my sake, but for the sake of the Church of God.

The burden of our brethren in the Philippines, England, and Germany to have an adequate place of worship for facilitating the dissemination of the Gospel should become the burden of each member of the Church of God. Let's support them in their time of need, as those in Paul's time came to the aid of the poor saints in Jerusalem. Let's unite together in helping them accomplish their goal and the churches will be built, because we had a mind to work.





Several students received encouragement that caused them to go to our church schools.


The tour covered churches from



A SILVER ANTENNA?

Among the more recent status symbols is the silver mobile antenna on top of an automobile which indicates there is a telephone inside. The waiting list for car telephones is so long that people are now pleading with the phone company to just sell them the silver mobile telephone antenna for the top of their car, even though a telephone for the inside will not be available for some time.

Certainly a candid example of a status symbol!

Probably not one person reading this has once considered purchasing a silver mobile antenna, but it serves to point out a facet of human behavior which we must guard against—that of putting too much emphasis on what others see. There is the danger even of judging our own worth and character by what we know others can see. This is not a true test.

Any thinking person recognizes that if an impressive status symbol is falsely representing one, it will sooner or later be evident. Regardless how large and flashy is the silver antenna, it is of absolutely no value unless the telephone is present. Similarly, regardless how pious our outward show may be, "God looketh upon the heart."

The important consideration is that we not be controlled by status seeking. Conformity is perhaps one of the hardest forces for people to resist. To be swept along with the crowd, regardless of the wisdom and practicality in a certain thing, is so easy. It is pertinent for us to ask ourselves which concerns us most—to be out of step with the practices of the worldly people around us—or to be out of step with God's standards upheld by our Christian friends. Consider carefully. Examine your own feelings and attitudes well. Make very sure that you are "not conformed to this world; but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect will of God" (Romans 12:2).

Even in church activities we may do well to be cautious lest we

give more consideration to our status with people than to our status with God. Our church going itself can become a status symbol—with our church-going friends. That you are there each week, dressed your best, on time, dependable—that's fine.
—All very commendable. Your "symbol" is in tip-top shape. Make very sure that it is your real status—not just a "tinkling 'symbol.'"

We will do well to pray and

meditate and stay close to God, lest someone peep below that silver antenna and find that there is really nothing there after all!

What we think most about is constantly weaving itself into the fabric of our career, becoming a part of ourselves, increasing the power of our mental magnet to attract those things which we most ardently desire.

Open Letter to Teenagers

ATTENTION ALL YOUNG REBELS!! You do your thing and I'll do mine. And what is my thing? I like to preach the Word. There is a wild, fantastic something in me that wants to come out. I've got a message all pent up inside and I'm going to let it out—line by line so that it can go down easy.

Here goes!

You say, "Destroy the American system because it has not abolished unemployment and war." Then you must blow up the hospitals because they have not abolished cancer.

You want to make revolution. Then find out what for.

The establishment is supposed to be against the poor. Yet poverty in America is on the decline.

In 1900, about 90 per cent of our population was poor. In 1920, 50 per cent. In 1930, 34 per cent. In 1968, only 15 per cent. The job is far from finished, but don't say someone is not trying.

Now who has failed? You have.

You fail because you no longer want to think. You fail by using violence to shut down schools. You fail by denying freedom while you cry freedom for all.

You slander and abuse anyone who disagrees with you.

You steal, loot administration buildings, and defy all authority.

You try to whitewash your ignorance with idealism. You call your hysteria insight.

You say, "The American people demand...." Then you add only what you want. This is intellectual sloppiness.

You want to "wreck the system."

It took centuries of pain and suffering to devise democracy. A system that protects squares like me against rebels like you! That protects innocents against fascists. A system that still protects every minority from tyranny.

A system that at least tries to solve human problems. A system that still seeks to make change without violence. A system that abhors

bloodshed. A system that refuses to suppress free speech.

A system that allows reckless attacks against itself. That allows mass demonstration to be nationally televised. And you want to smash it.

And what would you give us in its place? Heroes such as Marx, Mao and Che. Leaders who demand power, while jailing students, writers, scientists, and teachers, banishing them to labor or death—only because of of their opinions.

Tanks and armies rolling over borders—to "liberate."

You plan to give us "nonviolent coordinating committees," who engage in gunfire and violence.

You would dig out of the grave a nineteenth-century ideology, Marxism.

You would give us assertions and deny us facts. Passion as a substitute for knowledge. Slogans for solutions. Idealism with not an ounce of brains behind it.

No, thank you, my rioting student friends. Whatever its imperfections—give me democracy.

I despise poverty more than you—but I am free to give.

I despise pompous politicians—but not one has my back against the wall.

The smug affluent bug me, too. But God help us if we didn't have their taxes to feed the poor.

Sure, I know there is a credibility gap. But it beats having to swallow a dogma enforced by terror.

Under democracy I am a free man. Free to worship God—even to the point of fanaticism. Free to stand on any street corner in America and preach any gospel, under the protection of a flag and a constitution.

Free to travel—to any point on the globe. Free to vote against inferior products through dollar power, and against dishonest politicians with a ballot.

Rebels so far have done little more than soften the system.

They have blown kids' minds, frightened the conforming classes, questioned the legitimacy of everything, and carved up capitalism without the foggiest idea of where to go.

It is more a revolution of jargon, slogans, and polysyllables than of substantial ideas.

Radicals and militants are now addicted to the capitalist telephone. They accept invitations to speak and the money pours in. They become capitalists. They are "defanged" by the dollar. For one thousand dollars they will curse "capitalism."

Why is everything happening now—and together? A surplus of causes seems to exist. People are desiring to maintain a sense of their own importance. Trying to find values in a superorganized world of bigness. A vacuum of impersonality. A sense of powerlessness.

There's fear that man no longer has influence over decisions affecting his life. Loving, honesty, caring have become "corny."

"Make love, not war" is no longer lofty idealism. It is merely a sex slogan.

Self-justifying intellectualism has been exposed as hypocrisy. It has become popular to excoriate America in four-letter words.

People are sensing something new happening in their lives.

They can't touch it or see it. It has to do with sexual freedom, the kids, riots and assassinations. These things seem to be related somehow, but no one can find the links. They are underground connections.

Even space is shrinking in size. Good taste is now bad style. Adjustment is now called conformity. Self-indulgence has become freedom. Welfare has become slavery. Leisure has turned into loneliness.

Religion has become "neuroticism." Goodness is equated with weakness. Honesty with stupidity.

Revolution may never work in America. To be a revolutionary is to love your life enough to change it. There are not enough of you left, in love with God and life and fellowman.

I don't mind your doing your thing. But you cannot do it at my expense. The only dignity you can give to doubt is to wrap it in silence. There is no bravery in preaching revolution without purpose and overthrow without follow-up.

Could it be that you're really not doing your thing at all—but that your thing is doing you?

Before you start "doing your thing," better get fenced in with love. God's love!





The story of Solomon's dream at Gibeon is well-known. God promised him whatever he would request. Most of us, I'm afraid, would jump at a chance like this to ask for power, fame, riches, a new car, a new wardrobe, or other selfish things. But, though Solomon showed already unusual wisdom, even in making his choice, his request was for more wisdom—not material things. He asked for an understanding heart to rule his people. God heard him, and gave him not only his wisdom, but also the riches.

Because of this we now have the books of Proverbs, Song of Solomon, and Ecclesiastes—three books from which we can learn much about our daily Christian life.

As we read these books, let's try to apply this God-given wisdom to our lives.

During the month of September approximately 7.2 million young people enrolled in the nation's colleges and universities. We praise God for the 22 dedicated Christian young people who enrolled at Midwest for the 1969-1970 school year. Of these 22 students, 14 are young men training for God's ministry while five students are pursuing the Biblical Foundations Course and three young women are part-time Bible students.

This year's college faculty includes Elders Stanley J. Kauer, Max Morrow, and Dale Lawson and Sister Jewell Linville. For the last seven years Elder Kauer has been director of Midwest; however, this year he has assumed the role of full-time teacher and Elder Morrow has taken over the directorship of the college. Elder Morrow has been a part of Midwest twice before, the first time as a student and then later as an instructor. It is good to have Elder Morrow back again in the capacity of instructor and director.

Larry Hadden from Colorado, John Lemley from California, and Mark Ling from Wisconsin are the three senior ministerial students who will graduate in May, the Lord willing. These three directed ministry students are employed by the Stanberry Church in the absence of a full-time pastor. They assume pastoral duties such as delivering the sermons at the Friday evening services, making pastoral calls each day, and assisting Elder Dale Lawson, who is the pastoral director, with the many duties of a local church pastor.

The one-year Biblical Foundations course offered this year for the first time brings the following five stu-



dents to Midwest: Judy Haffner from Oregon, Lucy Marrs, Tom O'Haver, Iva Pruitt, and Cheryl Youngs all from California. The Biblical Foundations Course is a special one-year course of study designed for both men and women. The high school graduate who plans to continue his education in a secular college or anyone who wants a better understanding of the Bible and desires to be of greater service in the Church is encouraged to come to Midwest for the Biblical Foundations Course.

Besides their regular studies, the college students are busy participating in the local church and college activities. The Stanberry Church choir is composed almost entirely of college students. The students actively participate in the local church program, and their time and talent adds much to the furtherance of the Lord's work here.

We thank God for Midwest Bible College where there is no campus unrest, no student rebellion, no striking teachers, and no racial discrimination. We thank God for Midwest where there are young people with high moral standards and a desire for an education which includes the things of the Lord. We thank God for Midwest where young men are dedicating themselves to a lifetime of service in the ministry and where young women are preparing themselves for

a greater service in the Church and in spreading the Gospel truth. We thank God for Midwest Bible College and pray for His richest blessings throughout the coming school year.



He asks four questions:

- 4. Does it contribute to a healthy, moral atmosphere?

If our vocational choice does not stand up to this formula I think a change in jobs is in order.
