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

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

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The Generation

Father (entering his son's room): Would you please turn down that noise so I can talk to you?

Son: That's a really groovy plate, Dad. You can really feel the music!

Father: That's another subject. Right now we need to discuss your hair. We had three or four people in church Sabbath make subtle remarks about "hippies" among our young people and part of that reference seemed pointed at you—because your hair is beginning to fall over your ears some, I suppose.

Son: Dad, I'm not a hippie—I don't look or act like one. What gives them the right to talk like that? Maybe I don't like how they talk or act either.

Father: Well, hair over the ears indicates rebellion. It also gives you association with those dirty, wierd-looking, no-work bums.

Son: This is unreal! Can't you understand that it's just a matter of style—like colored shirts, wide ties and flared pants? Nobody is rebelling around here—and all my friends who have hair over their ears are clean guys. Dad, I can understand about those long-haired freaks, but we're not extreme so we don't come across as one of them.

A similar discussion could just as easily have been about

music, clothes, food, books, entertainment, friends, war, women's lib, inflation, pot, etc. The "generation gap" is a very natural phenomenon experienced by each generation—the cause of which is age difference, lack of understanding and lack of communication.

Young people are characteristically active and idealistic. They seek commitment and the company of those likewise committed. Older people are more passive than what they were in their youth. Experience has dampened their idealism and many become committed more to themselves and less to other people or things. Because of their age, youth are flexible, willing to and even desirous of change—for variety's sake, if nothing else. The older people, for the same reason, are more stoical and less willing to make adjustment to change—variety is no longer appealing.

Age is also a partial reason for lack of understanding. The "older generation" has settled on a system of values that fits the social structure of the majority of their generation. The "younger generation" is still unsettled in their social structure and the finished product will not be the same as the previous generation's. This is not necessarily bad but it does take considerable understanding.

Young people are looking for new things to do—a new way of life. They can better afford to do this than any previous generation because the past couple of generations have materially "set them up." Today's youth have a far greater range of interests and opportunities, far wider experience than ever before. They still want a better life, but their "wants" fit into a new spectrum of thinking and living. This requires a lot of understanding.

Change is often misconstrued as rebellion. Actually, something new or different is very rarely rebellion. Studies have shown that the *average* young person retains about 80% of his parents' philosophies. Is the remaining 20% simply change or is it rebellion? It's probably a little of both, but it is amazing how inconsistent the older generation is in separating one from the other. This, too, requires much understanding.

One very important change in the "now" generation is connected with the value of money. Previous generations have built an affluency which allows for a decrease in the value of money by today's young people. There is a lessening of the materialistic view and an increase in the humanistic view today. Whereas materialistic accomplishment for one's self and family was the sustaining pride of life, now this "sustaining force" is becoming a sense of feeling—looking for the intangible, personal touch that relates people to each other. It is very possible this is something the parents of this generation lost in the quest for wealth.

This change in money value is followed by a freer attitude

toward life. There is greater, more open expression in all aspects of living. Many things that were preached against openly but practiced secretly are now openly practiced. The youth of this generation have challenged the "double-standard" more strongly than ever before but still too often the only reply they receive is a very subtle "do as I say, not as I do." As a result, there is a reexamination of life-styles and philosophies by the young people.

While one ponders the complexities of life in his young years, there is a need to discuss problems, concepts, opinions, with those older and wiser. The lack of confidence—quite often justified—in parents' and pastors' really understanding or giving satisfactory answers to questions causes young people to discuss these things only among themselves. The conclusions they reach are a conglomeration of what they like and accept in their parents plus a replacement by reaction of what they don't like. Thus, a lack of effective communication develops between generations and the less communication there is, the wider the generation gap becomes.

Young people, let us consider very carefully the words of our elders. We must try very hard to separate wisdom and prejudice in what they say. We must strive to understand their philosophies and how they were developed. Above all, we must give total commitment to living a life that follows the context of the Bible—having the mind of Christ.

as much as is practical.

To the older generation, you must remember that understanding is the key. The youth should not be expected to take the initiative in understanding. You must consider their ideas and not be too quick to condemn. The youth actually have an advantage here because they have observed failures of previous generations without being liable for them. Youthful idealism should be encouraged

OF TREMENDOUS IMPORTANCE: Today's youth should not be measured by yesterday's yardstick. What was good for times past is not necessarily what is good for today; What was wrong for one generation is not necessarily wrong for another. We are all answerable to God—not to our parents or grandparents or even to each other. He has given us a Book to aid us in building the perfect concept of life. Professor Davis smiled compassionately, "But Jewell, I wanted so much for you to realize that it mattered not what your church affiliation was, but what really did matter was that you were concerned enough even to attend church at all!"

You see, Professor Davis was a real example to me when I attended college, and, although she never "preached" her religion, her life echoed of a deep Christian experience. I still recall how I admired her, wanted to identify with her in a Christian way, and yet felt certain she would be less than unimpressed with my humble little "church on the corner." Thus I never made opportunity to witness to her, and when, at her home one afternoon, opportunity knocked me over, I ran! No, not literally, but as Professor Davis so aptly put it, I "evaded" her questions about "my" church to the point of obvious embarrassment. The burden of that conversation was still alive with her at our recent meeting. When I realized this, I knew for certain why God had allowed me to be haunted with that conversation for 11 years!

Oh. Satan had tried to convince me that Professor Davis had long forgotten my blunder, and that there was no need for me to worry with it. After all, as a professor in a college with approximately 6000 present enrollment, not to mention the hundreds of students who had filtered through her classroom during those 11 years, how could she possibly remember one short "insignificant" conversation with one female Caucasian herded through the halls of Northeastern State College? But thank the Lord that I listened to Him and finally righted my wrong!

BUT... what about all those classmates with whom I also "copped out" when witnessing opportunities presented themselves??? My failure causes me to tremble when I think of it in the light of Ezekiel 3:18 and 20!

Just take a look at Elijah! The Fascination of Fire

Let the fire siren blow and watch people hop into their cars and follow the screaming fire trucks to the scene of the blaze. Or build a camp fire in a clearing and the campers will form a circle around the fire to watch the blaze flicker as they sing or tell stories. Fire holds a strange fascination for most people.

When Jimmy was about seven years old he had an obsession for playing with fire. He'd light a piece of newspaper with a match, then carry it across the room to put out the fire under the kitchen faucet. Of course he did this only when his parents weren't around, which in-

creased the danger to himself and his little sister, who was his close companion.

When Jimmy's parents discovered his habit of playing with matches they launched an educational program to teach Jimmy about the dangers of fire. They explained what uncontrolled fire could do. They showed him pictures of burn victims and called his attention to stories on the news of children who had burned to death in their homes. But all their attempts to impress him with the danger of playing with fire failed.

The only change the instruction produced was that Jimmy now lit matches in his bedroom behind the closed door. His mother found burned matches under his dresser and bed, and her anxiety mounted. This habit HAD to be broken before a tragedy occurred. As a last desperate measure, she took the child firmly by the shoulder and said, "Jimmy, if we find one more burned match, we're going to burn you so you'll understand what we've been telling you."

For a short time there were no burned matches. But soon Jimmy's mother found another one. Jimmy's father took a match, lit it and let it burn a few seconds. Then he blew it out and put the hot match on the child's hand. Yes, it burned ... enough to cause a tiny blister.

Jimmy sobbed, and his accusing eyes told his parents that he had not believed they'd really burn him. Now the illusion was gone, and Jimmy had a new concept of what it meant to get burned. It wasn't at all glamorous nor desirable. He did not, definitely did not, want a repeat performance. The match-lighting episodes came to an end. The lesson, harsh as it may have been, probably saved his life and the life of his little sister.

The Bible has much to say about fire, and uses the term figuratively as well as literally. Proverbs 6:27, 28 says, "Can a man take fire in his bosom, and his clothes not be burned? Can one go upon hot coals, and his feet not be burned?" The fire, in this case, is symbolic of lust that leads to adultery. Verse 32

explains, "But whoso committeth adultery with a woman lacketh understanding: he that doeth it destroyeth his own soul." In today's language we say, "If you play with fire, you'll get burned." Human nature is reluctant to believe this. We prefer to believe, "It won't happen to me; somehow I'll get by. I won't really get burned."

Jesus told a parable about a rich man who died and went to hell where he was tormented in flames. The rich man begged Abraham to send Lazarus, a poor beggar who had died and was carried by the angels into Abraham's bosom, to his father's house to warn his five brothers so they wouldn't come to the same end that he had. "Abraham saith unto him. They have Moses and the prophets; let them hear them. And he said, Nay, father Abraham: but if one went unto them from the dead. they will repent. And he said unto him, If they hear not Moses and the prophets, neither will they be persuaded, though one rose from the dead" (Luke 16: 29-31).

Like Jimmy, who played with matches and could not be dissuaded by stories, pictures, and instruction, so our human nature is not to believe either until we are "burned." Yet the message must continue to go out. In these last days there is a greater urgency to warn people of the greatest fire of all fires yet to come. Jude admonished those who are Christians in these last days thusly: "But

QUESTION

Does the Bible speak against wearing "hot pants," eye makeup, little earrings? Going to clean educated movies like "Cross and the Switchblade"?

ANSWER.

In the June issue of AIM I answered the part of your question dealing with "hot pants" and little earrings. Now, what about the "eye make-up and clean educated movies like 'The Cross and The Switchblade'?"

Concerning eye make-up, as with many other questions on specifics which we may ask, one does not find a direct "shalt" or "shalt not" in the Bible. To some of us. however. it seems significant that makeup is mentioned in the Bible only in connection with one of low moral calibre, and that it is difficult to find basis to assume the wearing of make-up is a desirable practice today. At any rate, it seems appropriate to note that the excessive use of eye make-up which gives an artificial look is certainly not appealing and is repulsive to

"Clean, educated movies"??? Quite unlikely! If movies could

"be educated" to depict wholesome, clean, Godly living they would be beneficial, but extremely boring to most moviegoers.

Movies are generally geared to entertain, and to do this they must play up those things which appeal to and excite the natural, carnal nature. They are made to arouse the lusts of the flesh, thus the inclusion of much sex, violence, and entertaining plots and themes far removed from God's standard of right.

The Bible condemns this type of sinful action in our lives, and not only are the acts themselves condemned, but also those who "have pleasure in them that do them." Read Romans 1:29-32; Ephesians 5:1-12 and Philippians 4:8.

As for the "Cross and the Switchblade," I know nothing about the movie (though I have read the book) and so I can not even give you an opinion. If you found yourself enjoying that picture (if you have seen it) because of its scenes of violence and works of darkness, and if you were caught up in the excitement of those scenes, then you should know the answer to your question.



Cancer, the dread disease, is surpassed only by heart disease as the "Number One Killer Disease" in our nation. It is estimated that one in eight people living in our country today will lose his life to cancer. NEVER can cancer be disregarded!

Cancer is defined as "a disorderly wild growth of tissue cells. If the process continues unchecked, the normal structure and function of an organ are destroyed." There are appoximately 60 to 80 types of cancer that inflict the human body, and although cures for some types of cancer have been invented, there is no preventive medicine for this disease.

Are there dead cells in your church? Those who sit back and do nothing? Those who are weak or spiritually sick? Those who do not hear the distressed call of souls in darkness, or if they hear, lack strength or boldness to answer, or wait for a brother to respond to the call? These dead cells need complete cleansing and filling with the Holy Spirit.

Examine your church. Cancerous or dead cells must not be disregarded. Treat them immediately so that the church can remain healthy, spotless until Christ returns. And remember...THE CHURCH IS YOU!

The Call of the Classroom

This month millions of students throughout America will return to the classroom. After a summer of vacationing and working, they will again slip into the regimented schedule of class attendance and lesson preparation. Whether one attends elementary school, high school, or college, there is a regulatory atmosphere about school to which one must adjust himself. What with early rising each morning, moving from one class to another throughout the day, and studying at home for the next day's classes, the average student leads a methodical life, as well as a busy one. Being involved in school work for years is a way of life for American children and youth.

Samuel Francis Smith, writer of the now famous patriotic song *America*, penned a verse which was later omitted. It had to do with education and went as follows:

Our glorious land today, 'Neath Education's sway, Soars upward still. Its halls of learning fair, Whose bounties all may share, Behold them everywhere, On vale and hill.

America is a land of education—a country where a pupil can complete the twelfth grade without paying tuition. Often he is furnished textbooks without charge, and in some areas he can attend his first two years of college without tuitional cost.

What is the advantage of going to school? What does one profit in getting an education? To put it simply, one might reduce to two points the advantages of getting formal training. One, not only must a student learn facts: he must also learn where to find desired information. Two, he must know how to tell others what he knows -that is he must be able to express his ideas, thoughts and opinions clearly. Therefore, if one learns where to locate desired information and then learns how to effectively relate what he has found, he is well on his way to being an educated person.

Being a good student is not easy. A pupil has to be alert. punctual, and serious, if he is to do well in all of his subjects. Schoolwork is more difficult now than it was a few years ago; for though the students' experiences are more varied today, the subject matter being studied is much more advanced than it was just a short time ago. For example, ninth graders are now expected to comprehend in the classroom some areas of knowledge that fairly recently were studied in the third and fourth years of college. Nonetheless, being a student is both intriguing and challenging. To learn how one's food is digested, or how one's blood circulates, or how his government functions, is a gratifving experience that gives a student a sense of accomplishment.

The Apostle Paul, one of the best educated men of history, favored youth being trained. He wrote young Timothy that he should be studious. Because Timothy was a minister, the apostle emphasized the importance of his being well versed in God's Word. However, before he could study the Word. he had to know the language: he had to know how to read, and that involved education. A person can be a Christian without knowing how to read, but he can be much more effective in his work for Christ if he can read. To carry the point further, one can be a Christian if he does not advance in formal education much past the point of just learning to read: however, more than likely he will be used of God more widely if he will acquaint himself with numerous subjects, and then will dedicate what he learns to God's service. MAY THE LORD HELP US TO BE GOD-LY STUDENTS.

PRAISE GOD!!! Youth Tour-East, the National F.Y.C.'s major summer project, was born a dream, grew to reality, and matured in TOTAL SUCCESS! The mission of Youth Tour-East? Our '72 challenge?? The mission was a challenge...the challenge of taking FYC information and Christian inspiration to every person, and most especially to the FYCers, in the local congregations of "the new frontier"—the eastern one-third of the United States. The five-member Youth Missions Team (Janice Carlin, Pat Jones, Debi Scott, Elder Calvin Burrell, and David Robinson) was "on the road" a total of 32 days (July 18-August 18) and drove 8,000 miles. The tour, launched in District No. 5, first visited churches in Alabama, Florida, North Carolina and Tennessee. Working their way northward through District No. 6, they stopped for programs at churches in Washington, D.C. West Virginia, New York, Michigan and Ohio. Following a three-day stav at the District No. 6 Youth Camp and Camp Meeting in St. Marys, Ohio, the team made a Southern jaunt visiting churches in Kentucky, Arkansas, and Oklahoma. A jet flight to Oaxtepec, Mexico, where the team spent an exciting three days as delegates at the National Mexican Youth Congress, climaxed the month long tour. 
"Wishing you dreams to dream, a song to sing, and love to hold in your heart. Happy Birthday."

of the "lust of the eyes" (verses 16-17). "Wandering eyes" are related to wandering hands!

Sept. 3. Prov. 2. Thought: Refuse to listen to seducing, flattering words of men or women (verses 16-19).

EVIL THOUGHTS

Sept. 4. Matt. 5. Thought: To lust after a person of the opposite sex is the same as committing adultery with that person. The thought is the same as the action (verse 28).

Sept. 5. Mark 1. Thought: Evil thoughts, adultery, and fornication begin in the hearts, and the (Continued on page 29)

Some of the books I lost were: History of the True Church, Bible Dictionary, Egermeier's Bible Stories, Cruden's Concordance, and Bible Home Instructor."

"The sum of \$200 you sent to workers here through Bishop Tikili is well distributed. But that alone cannot solve our financial needs here. thoughts of these things defile the person (verses 14-23).

Sept. 6. James 1. Thought: "Every man is tempted, when he is drawn away of his own lust, and enticed." Then the lust bringeth forth sin (verses 14-15).

Sept. 7. Eph. 2. We are no longer to fulfill the lust of the mind (verse 3).

Sept. 8. I Tim. 2. Thought: Girls should dress and behave modestly so they won't cause men to lust after them. If it's wrong for a man to think evil thoughts of a woman—to lust after her—then it's no less wrong for a woman to entice a man to do so (verse 9).

Sept. 9. Prov. 6. Thought: Don't even lust after a woman's beauty (or a man's physique) (Verses 24-29).

Sept. 10. Phil. 4. Thought: THINK PURE THOUGHTS! (verse 8).

Sept. 11. I Peter 1. Thought: "Wherefore gird up the loins of your minds... not fashioning yourselves according to the former lusts" (verses 13-14).

Sept. 12. II Cor. 10. Thought: Bring into captivity every thought to the ohedience of Christ (verse 5).

Sept. 13. I Chron. 28. Thought: God searches all hearts and understands all imaginations of the thoughts (verse 9).

EVIL CONVERSATION

Sept. 14. Matt. 12. Thought: Verses 33-37 can be applied to the telling of "dirty" jokes and stories.

Sept. 15. Col. 3. Thought: Stop all filthy communications (dirty jokes,

stories, gossip, rumors) (verse 8).

EVIL ACTIONS

Sept. 16. Ex. 22. Thought: There is a way to make "amends" for fornication (verses 16-17).

Sept. 17. Gal. 5. Thought: The works of the flesh are adultery (extramarital sex), fornication (premarital sex), uncleanness (impure thoughts) (verse 19).

Sept. 18. Jude. Thought: The modern trend of "sensuality" is condemned (verses 18-19).

Sept. 19. Prov. 30. Thought: People find all kinds of excuses in an attempt to justify evil, saying it's all right when it has some kind of "redeeming social value" or "What is done between two consenting adults can't be wrong." What a mockery! (verses 5-14).

Sept. 20. Num. 25. Thought: When young men or women are placed in a society where the moral standards are not governed by God's laws—such as in Viet Nam—immorality is still not excusable.

Sept. 21. Ex. 20. Thought: "Thou shalt not commit adultery." "Thou shalt not covet (anyone or anything that is not yours). (verses 14 & 17). There are NO EXCEPTIONS to these laws!

Sept. 22. Heb. 12. Thought: Watch diligently, so that you don't fail and become a fornicator (verses 15-16). Note: An adulterer is unfaithful to his or her present mate ... a fornicator is unfaithful to his or her future mate. Both are equally serious offenses.

EXAMPLES

Sept. 23. Gen. 38. Thought: Evil desires always hurt someone, as with

Tamar (verse 24).

Sept. 24. II Sam. 11. Thought: David and Bathsheba—an example of the harm resulting from seeing that which we have no business seeing.

ADMONITIONS

Sept. 25. I Cor. 7. Thought: Consider Paul's admonition to unmarried and engaged couples concerning sexual desire (verses 8, 9, 36).

CONSEQUENCES OF EVIL

Sept. 26. Deut. 22. Thought: Even though we no longer have stiff penalties for adultery, fornication and related sins, they are just as abhorrent in God's sight now as they were then.

Sept. 27. Lev. 19. Thought: The "double-standard" is **not** God's standard! Men and women both

are responsible for their actions. (verses 20-22).

Sept. 28. I Cor. 6. Thought: Partakers in any type of sexual sin will not inherit the Kingdom of God—fornicators, adulterers, effeminate (men acting, looking, and dressing as women), and homosexuals (verses 9, 10, 13-18).

Sept. 29. I Cor. 5. Thought: Don't keep company with one who is a fornicator (yerses 1, 11).

Sept. 30. Gen. 6. Thought: God destroyed the earth by flood because man's heart and thoughts were evil (yerse 5).

Note: If we SEE no evil and HEAR no evil, we probably will THINK no evil. If we think no evil then we will not SPEAK evil or DO evil. Avoid seeing or hearing evil!

HOW MUCH WILL YOU PAY?

The Creator sells us good things at the price of labor, effort, drudgery, persistence, and renouncement. We pay for our high ideals, sometimes, with great loneliness. We pay for life itself in effort to sustain it, in greater effort to train it into worthy channels, in unremitting effort to keep it there. We pay for our inevitable sorrows and losses and errors sometimes with anger and denunciation, sometimes with endurance and stoic quiet, or best, with tender and hopeful resignation. But whatever coin we give we know at least that nothing may be had for nothing.

What do we most desire to buy? Are we able and willing to pay the price?

If we choose to buy pleasure and ease and self-indulgence, somehow we must scrape together the purchase price. We may not eat our cake and have it too.

Haven't you noticed what a high price those pay, in the end, who just drift through life, trusting to get the reward of labor and escape making the payments?

On one occasion a lady said to a famous violinist: "I would give half my life to be able to play like you do."

"That, madam," he replied, "is exactly what I have given to do it."

And it was Leonardo da Vinci, the great painter and philosopher, who exclaimed: "Thou, O God, dost sell us all good things at the price of labor."


