

Several days ago as I was walking past the nurse's office at the school where I work, I was summoned by the vice-principal, "Mr. Fischer, come here. We may need you."

As I walked into one of the resting rooms in the nurse's complex, I noticed one of our senior students stretched out, seemingly lifeless, on a cot. Minutes before he had been discovered on the floor in a rest room nearby. The ambulance was on its way.

Before us was the quiet, seemingly cold, body of a young man whom we had seen full of energy just a couple of days ago when he romped up and down the football field as an important member of the undefeated high school football team—the first in the short history of Kennedy High School. It seemed like just hours before that he had run back an interception for a touch-down in a blaze of glory. He was so much a part of life.


While I sat there, I wondered if and when this young man comes back to school what we will say to him. Will he live? "Lord, You must let him live," I kept saying to myself. This young man had so much to give and had come to the conclusion that life wasn't worth having.

What would we say to his parents? His father enjoys a successful medical practice and donated his services to the school as the football team's attending doctor for he was interested in the success of his son who was so much a part of that team.

What approach does one take? We needed to talk to the parents, but what should be said? During those few moments, it seemed simple to talk to the parents of two young students who had been killed in a car accident just several nights before. They had given so much, wanted to give so much more, but their lives were terminated. It seems easy now to say, "They gave so much in so little time." But, what would we say to parents whose son chose not to give anymore? That would be difficult. Most certainly, they would want to know, "What could we have done?" "Where do we go from here?"

As I sit and think of those few moments that left such a lasting impression on me, I can't help but ask myself, "How can I as one individual influence the lives of others so they may see value, seek opportunities to give, to contribute, to share?" How can I assist others to identify lasting values, to see things in proper perspective? Those tangible things that seem to mean so much amount to so little when placed in proper perspective.

While these are days which suggest depression, days when one's values are challenged, with God speaking to those who know Him in very certain terms, we must seek opportunities to share with those around us values that are lasting, values that are beyond tangibles. We have been provided with the opportunity to share God's goodness so that others would see life as an opportunity to give, to share, and to love. Countless opportunities are presented to us daily to display such attitudes. Let us dedicate ourselves anew to assist those with whom we come in contact to say "yes" to life!



You don't believe me? Try it next time and see! Some will arrive with such an eagerness and an enthusiasm about them that you just can tell right off that they are ready for an encounter with Christ. Others? Well, they look like they are living down on "Barely Get Along Street," next to "Grumble Alley!" Which one is going to really enjoy that youth service and get something from the Lord? You guessed it!

Your attitude is important! If your attitude is positive, you will find yourself living in victory—spiritually and otherwise. Learn to live positively in Christ Jesus, and you will find yourself living victoriously! In writing to the Christians at Rome, Paul said: "Don't let the world around you squeeze you into its own mold, but let God remold your minds from within" (Romans 12:2, Phillips). A Look at the Church in Latin America

Latin America in 1946

In the year 1946 a Russian named Nicolas Mazur planned to travel from Uruguay to the United States, but his travels took him only as far as Mexico, for there he discovered the doctrine of the Church of God (Seventh Day). After devoting himself to studying God's Word, Nicolas Mazur became well-grounded in the Scriptural truths and returned to Uruguay where he began preaching and teaching these new-found truths.

During 1948 and 1949 Brother Mazur traveled through Central America preaching and teaching the doctrines of the Church. A group was formed in Guatemala and another in Honduras.

In 1955 a young bachelor, Antonio Vega Serafin, went to Guatemala from Mexico and continued the work Brother Mazur had begun there. Elder Vega is now the General Overseer of the Churches of God of the Central American Republics.

The Church of God in Central America has been involved in missionary work for some time. Elder Andres Leiva, missionary in Ecuador, is from Guatemala. Elder Vega has visited Uruguay and Argentina establishing good contacts in those countries.

Brother Nicolas Mazur returned to Uruguay in 1950, and he has remained active in the Gospel work there ever since. Through the years he has requested missionaries to help him in the work there. Maybe some day one of you reading this report will go to help!

- URUGUAY—The man instrumental in the spreading of the doctrine of the Church of God throughout Latin America, Nicolas Mazur, resides in Uruguay.




Baptism service in Misiones, Argentina

Dear FYCer,



Quarter-per-Quarter, based on average attendance of the local church, is a financial assistance method for local FYCs to support the National FYC. Some have asked, "Who decided that this was the proper approach?" "What do we (the local FYC) receive in return for our support?" "Is it worth the investment, or could the funds be better used locally?"

WHO DECIDED ON QUARTER-PER-QUARTER?

The young people who were present at General Conference, 1971, made the decision. In business session, the FYC'ers amended the National Constitution to promote this method of support, determining that the National FYC could better help the local FYC's if it had more finances to work with. This was an FYC Conference decision—not a committee decision.

"Okay, I understand that we made the decision, but what I want to know is what we receive in return for our local support?"

The first major project following the adoption of Quarter-per-Quarter was the establishing of a National FYC Office in the new General Conference Office Building. At this time, we hired a National FYC Secretary at part-time salary to represent the National FYC, and to serve the local FYCs.

The National FYC provides these services:

CORRESPONDENCE

The National FYC office strives to keep you INFORMED of all FYC projects and programs so you are always up-to-date and in-the-know.

When questions arise, someone is there to respond to your inquiry with a personal touch. [NOTE: Quarter-per-Quarter receipts cover less than half the National FYC Secretary's salary.]

PROGRAMS

The National FYC prepares programs to encourage and to inspire spiritual growth and involvement. DESIGN III and SHAPE are two such programs designed to help you and your group to share in the total church program.

MATERIALS

Programs are of little value unless they can filter down to local level. Materials and explanations of programs as well as helpful hints are passed on from the National FYC to you.

"Is it worth our investment, or could the funds be used better locally?"

Take away the programs of the FYC-DESIGN III and SHAPE. Take away the correspondence of the secretary, take away ALL the programs and materials of the FYC and what do you have?

Some local churches could plan a youth program to meet the needs of their youth... but there is always the majority who benefits from the services we provide in giving direction and purpose. We believe that the total picture is enlarged BECAUSE of the services you receive through the FYC Agency. Because YOU receive services and you can help be of service to other groups in instituting better youth outreach, it IS WORTH THE INVESTMENT!

The United Missions Board is concerned about all of its agencies and their programs. Because the UMB believes in the FYC, it is willing to assist us in funding our programs. In turn, the FYC is expected to share in supporting these programs through Quarter-per-Quarter. This is cooperation at its best.

FOCAL POINT: In your yearly plan, include a week or week-end to be designated as "Youth Week." Although the National FYC is no longer planning a National Youth Week Program, if your local group wishes to have one, we do encourage you to plan a local version of youth week as it relates to your local needs.

And remember-Quarter-per-Quarter is serving YOUth!



The Business Meeting

One of the most dreaded of all FYC activities is the business meeting. Usually, they are boring, frustrating, agonizing, long—and frequently anarchy reigns. It causes one to wonder how any business is ever transacted. Too often only very little is accomplished and what is accomplished often gets cancelled because of insufficient planning.

No longer does the business meeting need to be a fearful, failing activity. The SHAPE program offers a very efficient, practical approach to the business meeting. This approach includes an officers' meeting where the pre-planning for the business meeting is done and an agenda is drawn up. Also, there needs to be only one business meeting a quarter (the middle month of each quarter) because of the use of a yearly theme and a quarterly sub-theme. Committees are appointed to plan activities for one full quarter.

Every business meeting should be preceded by a short devotional —one that relates to the quarterly sub-theme and one that can be applied to the group's purpose for meeting. The quarter's devotional committee can take care of this part of the program.

Following the devotional, the Individual Business Meeting forms are distributed and the president calls the meeting to order. First comes the reading and approval of the minutes of the group. After the treasurer's report, the president calls for the reading of any correspondence. This may be referred to committee, taken up under new business or it may require no action at all.

Just prior to the main part of the meeting, the president should, if he feels it necessary, announce that disruptive activity by the membership will not be tolerated. If a person doesn't seem to abstain from disrupting the proceedings, he will be disqualified from discussion and voting on the motion under discussion and if that person still causes a problem, he will be dismissed from the meeting. Hopefully, everyone who has a tendency to create a problem will catch on.

Following the agenda, any business that is still pending from previous meetings (tabled business, committee reports, etc.) should be discussed and decided upon. The new business should begin with the discussion and approval, month by month, of the up-coming quarter's program calendar. Following

that, any other proposals can be considered and then committees need to be appointed to plan the various activities. At this point, the Vice-president should complete the Committee Form for all the newly formed committees.

The President is now ready to close the meeting. It is good to encourage participation in Design III and Sabbath School. A closing prayer is always appropriate.

That's it! The business has been discussed in an orderly, efficient

way, and everyone knows what has been decided, when events are scheduled to occur, and how they fit into the program. It should have been a good, inspiring and encouraging experience for all who attended.

SHAPE is the organizational guide for local FYC groups. Questions and suggestions concerning this program are dealt with in this feature. Please send all questions and suggestions to the editor.


QUESTION: "I'm not sure I understand the planning set-up of the SHAPE program. Your help in my understanding of this would be appreciated."

ANSWER: You must be referring to the quarterly planning system and use of themes, quarterly officers' meetings and quarterly business meetings and committees.

First, a theme should be selected by your group at the beginning of the year. Then a four-point outline of that theme can be used to serve as quarterly sub-themes, and these sub-themes should be developed each quarter, by your activities.

At the beginning of the middle month of each quarter (February, May, August and November) the officers, sponsors and pastor should meet as a planning committee to develop the next quarter's program calendar. Shortly following the quarterly officers' meeting, the quarterly business meeting should take place to make a final decision of the next quarter's program. For each type of activity a committee should be appointed for the duration of the quarter.

The use of forms in their respective places is necessary for the wellbeing of this program. Be sure to use them. If you do not have them they may be ordered from the National FYC Office.



JAMES

Date:

Two views are commonly held as to when the epistle of James was written: 1) in the early 60's A.D. shortly before James' death and 2) in the middle 40's A.D. before the Jerusalem Council. Evidence within the epistle favors the early date. The intended Jewish readership and overall Jewish tone, the congregating of believers in the synagogues, the simple approach to church organization and discipline, and the lack of reference to Gentile believers all seem to indicate that James was written around 45 A.D. prior to the Jerusalem council and subsequent rise of Gentile prominence in the Church. If the 45 A.D. date is accurate, James has the distinction of being the first book written of the entire New Testament.

The author of this epistle simply refers to himself as "James, a servant of God and the Lord Jesus Christ." Since there are four different men in the New Testament with the name of James, the author's true identification has long been disputed. The four are: (1) James, the father of Judas Thaddaeus (2) James, the son of Alphaeus (3) James, the son of Zebedee (4) James, the Lord's brother. (For a detailed investigation of the identity of the author see Clark's Commentary, "Preface to the General Epistle of St. James.") In spite of the controversy, modern scholars generally agree with early Christian

tradition and attribute the epistle's authorship to James, the younger half brother of Jesus and natural son of Mary and Joseph (Matt. 13:55; Gal. 1:19).

James, along with his other brothers, did not believe that Jesus was the Messiah during His ministry (John 7:5). However, after His resurrection, Jesus made a special appearance to James which evidently changed his mind (I Cor. 15:7). James was among the initial 120 believers who were present with the apostles at the election of Matthais and at the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the day of Pentecost (Acts 1:14-15).

As an earthly brother of the risen Saviour, James became a prominent figure in the New Testament Church. Certain facts even suggest that James was the leading elder and head of the "mother church" at Jerusalem. Peter requested that the news of his miraculous release from prison be reported to James (Acts 12:17). Even the great apostle Paul recognized James' position of authority by reporting to him on several occasions (Gal. 1:19, 2:9; Acts 21:18). The Jerusalem Council of 50 A.D. concerning the Gentiles and the Law of Moses was evidently presided over by James. After all others had spoken, including Peter, Barnabas and Paul, James summarized the discussion and proposed his judgment which the council adopted (Acts 15:13-21).

According to the Jewish historian Josephus (see Antiquities of the Jews XX 8, 1), James was stoned to death in 62 A.D. by the order of Ananias, the High Priest, for refusing to publicly denounce Jesus as the Messiah. It is ironic that James was martyred for refusing to deny the faith he, himself, once had doubted.

Purpose:

Addressed to "the twelve tribes scattered abroad," this general letter was written primarily to Jewish Christians. James is the most Jewish book of the New Testament because of its threefold purpose. (1) to help Jewish believers make the transition from Judaism to Christianity (2) to correct certain faults which were characteristic of the Jews (3) to deal with practical aspects of everyday conduct. James accomplishes his purpose by using a series of exhortations, instructions and maxims which resemble the Sermon on the Mount and the wisdom literature of the Old Testament.

The epistle's most noted theme concerns "faith and works." James 2: 14-26 compliments, instead of contradicts as some have falsely claimed, Paul's teaching on justification by faith. James points out that the Christian should put into action what he claims to believe. As you read this fundamental and practical letter of the Christian faith, heed the words of James, "Be a doer of the word and not a hearer only."
