The sum of \$150 has been allotted the Philippine District for the purchase of radio broadcast equipment.



You care ... because the pet is lovable, living proof that creatures—unhampered mere by mankind's prejudices, cruelties and complexities—measure up to their purposes on earth. You care because it is your pet and you love it ... enough not to let it suffer and die for lack of attention.

THE AUTOMOBILE is neither inconsistent nor junk. It just requires proper servicing. But it's only a car. So who cares?

You care . . . because the car is a marvelous, useful model of that deceptive ingenuity which enables man to build genuine democracy into a machine easier than within himself. You care because it is your car and it represents an investment of too much hard-earned money not to rate all the time, expense and trouble of having it regularly serviced with, and by, the best.

THE JOB isn't the world's greatest. Neither is the pay. And advancements seem to travel by mule train. But it's only a job. So who cares?

You care...because you know that job—any job—is a junction for opportunity and nobody gets far without one. You care because it is your job and you like it...enough to give it all you've got, and then some!

THE COUNTRY is in terrible shape. Various reports claim that its waters are hopelessly polluted; that its air is unfit to breathe; that it wallows in past glories, thrives on war, exploits the underprivileged, mistreats minorities, ignores God and worships the dollar; that its government taxes some citizens to death, kills others with luxury and murders still others via starvation. Even some of its own educational and political leaders decry the country as doomed! But it's only a country. So who cares?

You care... because you believe that, with all its difficulties at home and abroad, it still is the greatest country and that one of its most aggravating ailments is caused by acid heads and myriad odd balls marching with well-meaning, soap opera alarmists whose "thing" obviously is to make catastrophes

of all difficulties and thereby contribute to, instead of correcting, the country's ills. You care because it is your country and you love it...enough not to merely look on apathetically and give it up as God-forsaken and lost.

THE FAMILY has its problems, internal and otherwise. But it's only a family. So who cares?

You care... because you realize that the world can't be a better place until all families are better families—and that the most important missionary field is right at home. You care because it is your family and you love it... enough not to let it disintegrate for want of dedicated effort.


The church is in trouble. It was broken into one night; its study vandalized, ransacked and robbed. Worse yet, its main purpose is impeded by absentees and other members who seem stricken by an evil malady that masquerades somewhat innocently as "so-what-ism"! But it's only a church. So who cares?

You care...because you know that the church is an eternal fountain of faith where the goof-off list never includes God. You care because it is your church and you love it.

But do you really care? Do you really love your church... sufficiently to give it its just share of such energies as you expend on your pet, car, job, country and family?

There's an old riddle about two chimney sweeps who have just gotten through sweeping a chimney. One comes out with a clean face, and the other with a dirty face. Which one will wash his face?

No, you're wrong. The one with the dirty face will look at the one with the clean face and assume that his own face is also clean. The one with the clean face will look at the one with the dirty face and think that his face is also dirty. As a result, the one with the clean face will wash.

Or maybe you were smart and remembered that most often we are influenced by what we see, or think we see, in others. Styles are set, trends are put in motion by what some people wear or don't wear. Reputations are made or broken by what is seen or not seen. And sometimes we are as badly fooled as the chimney sweeps who looked at each others' faces.

Paul warned the Corinthians about the foolishness of finding

standards of comparison in each other. He said that some, "measuring themselves by themselves, and camparing themselves among themselves, are not wise." Besides lacking a worthy standard for judgment, such a practice can either falsely inflate or cruelly deflate our estimate of ourselves.

Like the Pharisee in the temple in Jesus' story, we may choose to compare ourselves with some unfortunate moral cripple and compliment ourselves that we are "not as other men are." Such a comparison may be as phony as it is flattering. What is more tragic, feeding our self-esteem may prevent us from acknowledging our true condition before God, thereby making true penitence impossible. The "horrible example" to which we have pointed may be closer to God's grace than we are.

Some try to excuse their irreligion by referring to hypocrites in the Church. Some Christians seek to excuse their low

standards by comparing themselves favorably with others no better than they are. But the true standard is not those who follow Christ, but Christ Himself. When we compare ourselves with Him, none of us can be smug or satisfied. He provides a standard of judgment which continually condemns and yet constantly challenges us.

Then there is the other aspect of this comparison business. Seeing persons who are better, or cleverer, or handsomer than we are, we feel uncomfortable and inferior. Not that we are in open or secret competition with these folks, but we often feel as though we are. My worth does not go up or down in relationship to the one I am compared with.

All of us are familiar with a child's seesaw. Riding it, one child goes down as the other goes up. We use a "seesaw system" of evaluation for ourselves and others. On this "seesaw," we go up when someone else goes down, and we go down when someone else goes up. Our emotional position shifts in relationship to others. Having no true inner stability of our own, our estimation of our worth fluctuates according to the person we compare ourselves with. If they are inferior, we feel superior; if they are higher, we feel lower.

Meeting a man who is cleverer than I am does not make me stupid. I am as able to think and act as I was before I met him.

His talents do not diminish mine. It is only as I compare my ability with his greater ability that I arrive at an unfavorable estimation of my powers. Must I then find a man poorer than myself to feel rich, someone less proficient so that I can feel competent? Must they go down so that I can go up?

The truth is that each of us has his own essential value, his own rightful place, his own particular talents. Comparing myself with someone more gifted or less able neither increases nor decreases my actual worth to myself and others.

To measure ourselves by ourselves is, as Paul observed nearly two thousand years ago, "not wise." The true standard of goodness, by which all men are measured, is Christ. Compared with Him, I am not as good as I ought to be. Enabled by Him, I can be better than I am.

Tell Me, Please

Youth Questions answered by Ray L. Straub



QUESTION:

I'm a teenager attending high school. Even at my age my parents don't let me watch some TV programs. I think I'm old enough to select my own programs. Why can't my parents trust me?

ANSWER:

Your question tends to indicate that you have lost your perspective of the situation with regard to your TV viewing privileges. Your question suggests that with the exception of certain programs you are quite free to select what you wish to watch.

Further, it is not a matter of trust, but of proper guidance. You are old enough to know that a person must be selective in what he chooes to eat. Further, what he eats has an effect on his physical, as well as mental and emotional, welfare.

What you do not seem to grasp is that what you see works the same way. You become emotionally and mentally affected by what you see. This does not mean that a single exposure is going to bring about a big change, but constant exposure will. Young minds are extremely impressionable, and they need careful and conscientious guidance.

I suggest that you control your resentment and stop exaggerating your restrictions. This will not only help you to reconcile yourself to the situation, but it may also help you to see how blessed you are to live in the home that you do.

QUESTION:

The members of our family all attend church regularly, and all except for my little brother, we have been baptized and are members. But, you should hear the hollering that goes on at our place! Is it right for Christians to always be mad?

ANSWER:

Thanks, anyway, but I'd rather not hear the hollering. It may help for you to realize that not everyone who hollers is angry. Some people are louder than others, but they are not necessarily angrier. Usually when people correct others they are just loud,

when they correct me they are hollering!

I agree that yelling can become a habit that is quite unnecessary. It is too easy to fall into and too difficult to correct. You can help by asking whether or not your behavior is making it necessary for your family to speak in loud tones. It is amazing how difficult it is for some young people to hear requests that are spoken in softer tones. You might make an interesting offer to the other members of your family. Tell them that if they agree to speak to you with less volume, you will promise to listen with better attention. It may be the beginning of a new kindness to your entire family's vocal chords.

Anger is not necessarily unChristian. It is the object and endurance of the anger that makes the difference.

QUESTION:

This girl and I have been dating for several weeks, and I'm getting to like her. She is good company, lots of fun, and conducts herself well. When I get home after a date I feel good. She has one problem, though, that bothers me. She is always late. She is never ready when I go to pick her up. She is late when we plan to meet somewhere. She never even gets to church on time. What can be done to get her to look at the clock? I know this isn't a serious problem, but it sure bugs me.

ANSWER:

Tardiness is a miserably bad habit disliked by all including those who are always late. The habit is seldom cured because it is so difficult. Some could do better. Others simply cannot get themselves organized well enough to keep up with schedules.

Depending on how much this "bugs" you, you have some interesting decisions to make. If you like her well enough to put up with her discourtesy in keeping you waiting, you may get ulcers, but you also have the girl. If you think she's curable, you might buy her a clock for her birthday. If you consider that she will not change, and that you cannot avoid clashes over the matter, let me assure you that there are plenty of nice young ladies around who know how to tell time.

Can You? How Much Ja??

During a Bible study with a person who is well-grounded in his beliefs, even though they are not the truth, would you be able to disprove his beliefs and present the truth? As you know, many of these people read and study the Bible zealously, at least the scriptures that seem to uphold their doctrines. Would you be able to show the truth of the Bible to them? Have you taken the time to study the wonderful truths of God's Word so that you can "...be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason of the hope that is in you with meekness and fear? (1 Peter 3:15)?

While in the stockade at Fort Hood, Texas, for refusing to participate in the carnal warfare machine, I made friends with seven fellow prisoners who Jehovah's Witnesses. Through our Bible discussions, I came to realize that my knowledge of Bible truth was too limited to enable me to explain these marvelous truths adequately. I knew I had the truth; I was convinced of it myself; yet, I simply lacked the deep understanding one needs to enable him to break through the barrier of a skeptic.

Shortly after this experience in Texas, I was again placed along side a Jehovah's Witness while working in a manufacturing plant in Kansas. We talked about God and the Bible quite a number of times, and we both agreed on many points that we knew were truth. But one night while having a Bible study with him and his friend, I came to realize even more fully that my effective witness was lost through my own limited knowledge of the scripture.

Do either of these experiences resemble your witnessing? Ask yourself this question—"Would I be able to relate the truths of the Bible to others?" If your answer is "Yes!" then I say "Amen!", but if your answer is "No!" then something is lacking in your life. This can be supplied, though, if you are willing to take the time. Your

own church has provided the facility of learning, but it is not worth anything to you unless you are there to learn. Midwest Bible College has a wonderfully-enlightening Biblical Foundations Course which would prove very beneficial to you in helping you prove the truth to others. If your answer was "No!" then plan to be a student next semester. If your answer was "Yes!" there are still many things you could learn to become a more effective witness.

The Bible teaches that we should learn and never fail to give an answer to anyone that asks. In 2 Timothy 2:15 Paul admonishes Timothy to "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed...." And today this may apply to you. Study—Where? At Midwest Bible College—to show yourself approved to God—a lay worker that need never be ashamed!

Gasoline and the Teenager

"Watch out for teenage drivers!" "He drives like some foolish kid." Sound familiar?

Reputation deserving? In many cases—No! The antics of a few often bring labels to many. It seems that many young drivers cannot control the urge to "turn loose the horses" every opportunity they get. However, teenage drivers have a reputation that may sometimes be deserving. Screeching, squealing tires and fast driving are the principal factors in causing young people to be typed as "reckless" drivers. The long strips of rubber on our streets and highways are nearly always accredited to "teenagers."

Sadly, we are made to notice

that innocent "horseplay" with cars has been the cause of many, many deaths and a multitude of serious injuries, not to mention the innumerable minor injuries. Are teenagers the only guilty ones? Of course not! However, in all honesty, we know that many teenagers have contributed much to the earning of the reputation given to them.

Most of us in the Church of God are quick to criticize people for a lack of obedience to God, and yet, there are some of us who have no qualms at all about driving in such a way that we endanger the lives of many innocent people. Is it possible that in the eyes of God we accidentally commit murder

with our cars? At the same time we make great profession of keeping the commandments of God, we are obligated to obey the laws of our land. Chapter 13 in the book of Romans makes that point clear when it tells us to be subject to the powers of government. Often one hears boasts of "capers in cars" that in reality are not heroics; but rather, they are attention-getting devices, and ride at the very top of the list of foolishness.

God wants you to be obedient. God wants you to meet your Christian obligation of driving according to the laws of your land.

There are certain principles of driving to which Christian young people should always adhere. Let these be your 10 Commandments for driving:

- I. Thou shalt not show off while driving.
- II. Thou shalt not drive to release thine anger.
- III. Thou shalt not tongue lash other drivers.
- IV. Thou shalt not drive when too tired or sleepy.
- V. Obey the driving laws of your land that thou may have long life.
- VI. Thou shalt not kill with careless driving.
- VII. Thou shalt not blame others for thy mistakes.
- VIII. Thou shalt not be impatient while driving.
- IX. Thou shalt always show courtesy to other drivers.

X. Thou shalt drive with care, watching both thine own actions and those of thy neighbor drivers.

Apply these principles to your driving, and you will be less likely to have to be sorry that by your carelessness you caused deep, irrevocable grief to come to innocent people.

We hear much about our "Christian Witness"—Have you thought about your Christian Witness with your driving? You can let your driving habits portray a real witness for Jesus Christ. Drive as He would want you to drive. Courtesy with your car and your words while driving could give you beautiful opportunity to help some fellow driver become interested in the God you serve.

It has been disappointing at times to see Church of God young people drive in ways that no Christian would possibly drive. I have seen discourtesy that gives no credit to a profession of Christianity. I have heard words that lashed drivers for doing something that the tongue-lasher constantly does himself.

If a person passes you when you don't want him to or cuts into your lane in front of you, are you inclined to become venomous? Do you make an effort to "get back" to show him that even at the risk of many lives around you, he can't do that to you!?



"THE GOLD-DUST OF TIME"

"Youth is not rich in time, it may be poor; part with it as with money, sparing; pay no moment, but in purchase of its worth; and what its worth, ask death-beds; they can tell.—Young.

Perhaps one of our most perplexing problems is that limited and unyielding amount of minutes and hours which we are allotted each day. Regardless of the duties which fall upon our shoulders, regardless how pressing and formidably circumstances seem to close in on us, we know that our portion of time will not fluctuate—it stays the same.

It is interesting to note that while the love God gives us is immeasurable and while the grace which He offers is boundless and free, yet the time He gives us is carefully measured. Therefore, we are entrusted with the responsibility of planning and using our time with the same care and precision with which it is meted out.

Could it be that we need to discipline ourselves to leaving some free moments in our days to *think*—to leave some opportunity for God to inspire us with a new plan, a new program—or with an article for "AIM, the magazine for young people"?

Progressive young people (which I dare say describes you who are reading AIM) find themselves occupied in worthwhile activities which, for many of you, *cram* your hours full of studies or employment—or both. The devil would have it so that Christian young people would find their time so filled with *planned* activities—usually group activities—that they never have time to use some of their own individual initiative to do something worthwhile for God.

What about those "in-between" moments? "Spare minutes are the gold-lust of time; the portions of life most fruitful in good or evil; the gaps through which temptations enter." The devil has cunning little tricks for snatching away those "could-have-been-worthwhile" moments—tricks such as making sure there are enough programs on T.V. that even Christians will find it easier, time after time, to spend those free moments in front of the T.V. The greatest evil in T.V. is not the violence and evil (which can be screened out), but the time-wasting habit which it breeds


