If not for self, then it must be that we find fulfillment and purpose in seeking to make this world—seeing that we are stuck with it—a better place for others. And if our business is serving others, what greater service can we do them than to introduce them to their Creator and help them harmonize their lives in Him? Apart from Him what hope have we of a better world? Only God can make calm out of chaos.

The wisest man who ever lived said, in Ecclesiastes 12:13, that the whole duty of man, the ultimate purpose in life, is to respect God, the Creator, and keep His commandments, which are summarized in love: love for God and love for others.

Christianity is love; it is a way of life. Christianity is communicating Christ: by actions, reactions and words.


ONE MORNING I STARTED PRAYING earnestly to God. I prayed that as surely as Jacob wrestled

Peace, Peace ... and there is no Peace ...

The whole world seems to be spouting peace these days—political leaders as an occupation and the "under thirty" group as a preoccupation. Every newspaper, every news broadcast, mentions overtures of peace—peace in the Middle East, peace in Vietnam, internal peace, world peace.

On a more individual level, young people are caught up in a cry of "Peace!" A dozen times a day we encounter the sign of the broken cross on bumpers, on windows, on jackets, or drawn in the dust; or we see the two-finger peace symbol used so freely as a casual salutation. And yet the world has never been farther from peace. No wonder we

are reminded of the words in Jeremiah 8:11, saying, "... Peace, peace; when there is no peace."

In fairness we must recognize that there are those who are sincere and organized in their pursuit of peace (or what they see as peace), but for every one who is sincere, there must be a dozen to whom it is a craze and a byword. As Christian young people let's not be numbered among them. Psalm 28:3 mentions "workers of iniquity, which speak peace to their neighbors, but mischief is in their hearts."

What sort of peace is sought by those who throw rocks and who riot in the streets? What peace is sought in drugs that kill

and cripple? What curious brand of peace will come through poor hygiene and free sex? Such "peace" is merely peace from restraint and brings with whatever shallow comfort it may afford the destruction which is its own natural consequence. "Peace" from parental discipline results in a disrupted home life and a miserable and insecure child. "Peace" from moral restraints brings the miseries of guilt and venereal disease. "Peace" through the world of hallucinatory or tranquilizing drugs brings destruction of mind, soul and body. Peace, indeed! "There is no peace, saith the Lord, unto the wicked" (Isa. 48:22).

As for world peace, the scriptures are plain that this will never happen until God's kingdom. Rather, turmoil will increase and "there shall be wars and rumors of wars." "For when they shall say, Peace and safety; then sudden destruction cometh upon them" (I Thess. 5: 3). Clearly then, whatever peace we find will be on an individual, not an international, level.

The fact is, every person alive spends a great portion of his existence in pursuit of peace, and few find it. Few find it because few know where or how to look—or even what they are looking for. God has made us for His own pleasure and therefore He built into us a desire to worship and a conscience toward His laws. When we speak of being true to ourselves or at peace with ourselves, we really

mean at peace with the conscience God built into us. Because of the way God created us, there is only one way to peace—His way. We may say "this" or "that" is not important, but our belief or unbelief does not change God's plan; it only affects our relationship to it. "If we believe not, yet he abideth faithful, he cannot deny himself" (II Tim. 2:12, 13).

Perhaps it has been true of every age, but certainly today's people seek for peace in the strangest places. It has long been realized that our peace is disturbed when we violate a moral or civil law. Violation of a moral law brings the disdain of society; and violation of civil law brings legal punishment. The traditional and obvious solution is to simply comply with the existing legal and moral codes. The new and strange approach is to instead remove the law, thus removing the violation, thus giving peace of mind. The only problem is: It doesn't work! Man cannot remove a law that God has made any more than he can repeal the law of gravity.

Some feel knowledge will bring peace and yet a survey has shown a greater-than-average measure of marital unhappiness among our space flight personnel. Many have the technical knowledge to land on the moon, but they can't go home to their wives. How great is their peace?

Some think they will find peace in financial security and

possessions, but instead find that their wealth breeds a lust for more wealth—and peace is far from them. The man in Luke 12 built greater barns for his goods and sat back, saying, "Soul, thou hast much goods laid up for many years; take thine ease." Read the account and see how great peace his goods brought him. "Their silver and gold shall not be able to deliver them ... " (Jer. 7:19).

Then there is the hippie philosophy which creeps throughout all "youthdom." Their lips speak of love, peace and brotherhood, but what are they doing toward these lofty goals? Their "love" means "love me," their "peace" means "Don't bug me," and their "brotherhood" means "tolerate me" and "extend to me the benefits of the establishment I despise." Many try to deny another of the needs God built into us-the need to work. The God who told us to rest on the Seventh Day said also, "Six days shalt thou labor." There is no way around it that affords peace.

We have examined some of the "no-nos." What then is the way to peace? It is stated so simply in Proverbs 3:2—"Keep my commandments: for length of days, and long life and peace shall they add to thee." God knows how we are made. Only He knows what things will bring us peace and He has written them in His commandments. There is no other way. He tells us this over and over again. "Great peace have they that love thy law" (Psa. 119:165). "Righteousness and peace have kissed each other" (Psa. 85:10).

But how can man, born with a carnal nature, keep a perfect law? God has provided for this through the influence of the Holy Spirit. And even when this is bypassed and sin does occur, He has provided reconciliation through His Son. When Christ was born in Bethlehem, the angels sang, "Peace on Earth, good will toward men," for through this child would man who had sinned become at peace with God once more.

Isaiah knew there was only one way of peace when he wrote these words of worship-"Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace whose mind is staved on thee" (Isa. 26:3).

Young person, you are beginning a lifelong quest for peace within yourself. A psychiatrist who headed a mental institution was asked what was the most common factor among his inmates. The majority, he said, were there for one of two reasons: they were not appreciated, or they were trying to live by two sets of standards at once. It cannot be done. The decision for God or the world must be made and only the right decision will bring peace. We are at God's mercy, for He has made us; He has the victory; He cannot deny Himself.

The next time someone casually flashes you the "peace sign," remind yourself that there is only one way. "Acquaint thyself with him and be at peace" (Job 22:21).

Tell Me, Please

QUESTION:

I am dating a girl who does not attend our church. We have the problem of not knowing what to do on a date or where to go. Our church is against so many things, and my girl friend doesn't particularly like to go to our church meetings.

ANSWER:

This question arouses my deep sympathies, because it does present a problem. Some might suggest that our young people should not date those outside the church circles, but I don't consider this to be a realistic attitude. Remember, I'm talking about dating, not marriage.

Many of our church groups are still quite small. In some cases there are not enough young people in the local church for dating purposes: In other groups, our young people grow up together (often closely related), and are so closely acquainted that there is little desirability to date each other. Because one finds himself belonging to a small church group, he

should not be denied the pleasure of dating.

The question suggests one serious difficulty. The girl friend does not appreciate church services, which I suppose would include youth meetings. What kind of girl is this? If she belonged to a religious persuasion which denied her the right to frequent meetings of other denominations, there would be less reason for concern.

If your girl friend just doesn't care about attending religious services, I would suggest that you thank her for her frank opinion and consider dating someone else. You feel you can get her interested in church? Perhaps so, but you had better find that out quickly. She is probably hoping that she can get you away from church.

You will need more activity for dates than going to church. Our church is against doing a lot of things, but for this you can be thankful! This factor has saved many young people from ruining their lives years before they have had a good chance to build them!

You have been taught right from wrong because people have been concerned about you. By this time you are old enough to recognize that this has been good for you, even though it restricts your dating plans. It is too late for you to throw this over. You cannot have a good time while your conscience is hurting you. If you want an enjoyable date, be sure to select activities that will not force you to hide—from yourself and God.

There are worth-while places to go that are of cultural value. When dating, keep your tastes high. It will give greater respectability to your relationship and will add to your own broadening. Good sense used here will cause you to become increasingly more thankful as the months and years pass.

There are undoubtedly school activities which are both allowable and enjoyable. Usually, when one takes his attention from the activities which his religion does not allow, he can find other events that are quite wholesome for young people.

Not too many youthful daters seem to realize that the places they attend largely gov-

ern their behavior after the date. This is why such activities as dancing and frequenting movies can be explosively dangerous to young people dating. Base appetites and desires are so intensely aroused that propriety is disregarded.

On the other hand, time spent in more cultural, wholesome recreation or religious activity will more likely lead to cleanness, maturity and respectability.

It is important that you counsel with your pastor about this matter. Activities which are allowable vary from place to place, and it would be impossible for me to say what might be offensive in another locality. Your pastor understands your problem, and he will help you solve it.

They are just as binding today as they were when He established them. It is only because the ministers of Satan brainwash people into believing they can flout God's laws and not pay for it, that they keep on disobeying Him. But in the words of our youth, "They will not get away with it." You can listen to, and believe, the teachings of liberals and theologians with their smooth, glib explanations of why we should not follow the old-fashioned way of obedience, but God "tells it like it is." He is the One Who made the rules; He says we MUST OBEY THEM—He has the power of life and of death.

Are you rebelling because your prayers have not been answered as you think they should be? God knows if the things we want are the best for us. Sometimes He wants us to learn we can do a little better than we are now doing. Are you failing in your effort to make friends? Just remember it is YOUR ACTIONS that draw others to you...or repel them...and they are not responsible for your actions. Take a good look at yourself. Do you have some of the traits you despise in others? Are you always thinking of yourself instead of them? You can improve, with God's help, you know.

Are you failing in school and blaming God because He doesn't help you? Just STOP AND BE HONEST! Are you REALLY giving all your spare time to study? God will not help you until YOU DO ALL YOU CAN to help yourself. Remember when Peter was in prison and the angel opened the doors and gates for him? He told Peter to "... Gird thyself, and bind on thy sandals..." (Acts 12:8). Peter had to do WHAT HE COULD.

If you are a teenager, you are responsible for your own thoughts and actions. Perhaps your parents failed to give you discipline and guidance when you needed it—or gave you too much discipline. You are OLD ENOUGH NOW to use the intelligence with which you are endowed to think things through for yourself. You are old enough to choose the GOOD THINGS in life—the

things God wants you to CHOOSE. He will not force you to choose Him. He loves you, and wants you to choose Him because you LOVE HIM. He could COMPEL you to love and obey Him-you belong to Him-but He wants only the obedience of a willing heart and mind, BECAUSE YOU LOVE HIM.

This is "telling it like it is": You CHOOSE; the good or the bad. There is no in-between. YOU will have have to live with your choice. Remember! If you choose the wrong way, you will have to live with it, and pay the cost. Your parents and friends cannot pay for you. Your parents cannot shield you from the consequences of your choice. And you will have no one to blame. If you are a teenager, you are old enough to assume responsibility for your own actions and choices.

Your parents, siblings and friends did not make the laws of God. When you rebel against parental control, you are not rebelling against parents alone. God has given parents special duties of love and discipline for their children. If they are slack in discipline they are disobeying God. You rebel against God's wishes when you rebel against your parents' efforts to teach you God's moral laws. Parents are not the rebels-You are. God LETS you rebel, but you, and you alone, will pay for that rebellion.

You want it "like it is"? The love of God has endured through the centuries—it will stand forever. It is your one hope—don't turn your back on it. You may not realize it, but it is what YOU ARE SEARCHING FOR so desperately. Why not become really acquainted with Him? It is easy, if you really wish it. You have everything to win, and nothing to lose, EXCEPT LONELI-NESS. Be sure what you are searching for is the BEST—not just something different.

I wish I had known that Dad wasn't such an old fogey after all.

I wish I had known that everything Mother wanted me to do was right.

I wish I had known what it meant to Mother and Father to raise a son.

I wish I had known the value of truthfulness in everything.





What is the next big event in your life—in the year of '71? It sometimes seems that life is a series of scurrying around and preparing for the next thing that's going to happen. When some outstanding event is imminent—a wedding, a banquet, a youth camp, or camp meeting, we are particularly engrossed in preparations. Often at such times, we push aside all else that can be ignored, and concentrate—and hurry—and prepare—for the big event.

The other day I was impressed as never before when I read the familiar verse found in 2 Peter 3:12—"looking for and hasting unto the coming of the day of God...."

Is that really what we're doing?? "...Looking for and hasting unto the coming of the day of God??" This describes so well the type of life we live—that is, the "looking for and hasting unto"—but I wonder if we're looking for and hasting unto the most important matters.

There is no room for a passive role, any more than we assume a passive role in these earthly events for which we prepare, and plan, and look forward to—that graduation day, that wedding day, that first day to begin a new business. Yet, how much of OUR looking for and hasting unto is directly concerned with preparing for the day of God? Too often we find, in a frank analysis of our activities, that we have so much earthly looking for and hasting unto that our Master's portion goes begging. Provision for it comes last.

A fresh look at our priorities—periodically—is needed, in order to keep our perspective where it needs to be. The cares of this life—and our daily duties—are always about us *demanding* our attention. God does not *demand*. He stands in the shadows and waits for us to turn to Him with our due portion of praise, of witness, of planning for such an effective life for Him that we can look forward to a place in His kingdom.

"But the day of the Lord will come as a thief in the night in the which the heavens shall pass away with a great noise, and the elements shall melt with fervent heat... Seeing then that all these things shall be dissolved, what manner of persons ought ye to be in all holy conversation and godliness, looking for and hasting unto the coming of the day of God...."

THE CROSS AND THE SWITCHBLADE

by David Wilkerson. A Spire book, paper, 160 pages \dots 75 ϕ Movie Edition, containing 16 pages of pictures from movie by same title, 95 ϕ

Dave was only a young, green, country preacher when God called him to a seemingly impossible mission. In his book, *The Cross and the Switchblade*, David Wilkerson relates the exciting story of how God is using him to bring the way of freedom—God's Holy Gospel—to the gang kids of New York's slums who are shackled by sin in its most hideous forms. From the beginning Dave was laughed at, sneered at, or simply ignored. But then one day a tough, sin-hardened gang leader knelt in front of his gang members and accepted Christ as his Redeemer. That was the needed break-through.

It was only a small beginning, though. "Preacher Davey" (as he was known among the gang kids) soon learned that after Salvation the boys and girls needed intensive follow-up work to keep them from falling back into the old life of drugs, fighting, prostitution, etc. Teen Challenge Center was opened in the heart of the slums, available for anyone honestly seeking help.

An awareness of the problems presented in this book is vital to each and every one of us today. There probably isn't one of us who won't be exposed, at least in some small way, to someone who is taking drugs or living immorally. We need to know the problems involved and have some knowledge of how to cope with such a situation. Anyone who is concerned should read The Cross and the Switchblade to see how God is working on these problems. Anyone who is not concerned definitely should read the book in order to become concerned. We can't afford to play ostrich. I feel safe in saying that no one can read this moving book without being affected to some extent.

Just an Afternoon Drive??

As Allen's Malibu swept around the curves of the beautiful mountain road, the noise of laughter from the lips of the five young people inside, along with the blaring of the radio, escaped through the open windows and blended with the sounds of the roaring stream that had just joined the road and was racing along beside them. It was a *lovely* Sabbath afternoon!

Pain from Al's "spinning conscience" finally drove him to action and he reached over and turned the radio off. "Ah! The fellows were so engrossed in their own fun-making that they didn't even notice."

The car rounded a bend and approached a straight stretch of road that rimmed a pleasant little meadow on the upper side of the road while the roaring stream bent away from the road and cascaded down the mountain to the bottom of the canyon.

A chorus of voices clamored for a game of "500" and the meadow did seem quite inviting. So who was Al to stem the tide? A ball, bat and gloves were taken from their place under the front seat (where they were always kept except when in use). The fellows headed for the flattest area of the meadow.

"I want to listen to the baseball game," one fellow remarked. "Hand me the transistor and I'll find it."

"No! I'm going to listen to the top ten tunes of 1970," was the ready reply.

"Okay, I'm going back to the car and listen to the ballgame there. Al, may I have the car keys?"

Al dropped his head as his already-present feelings of mis-

ery, though hidden up to this point, seemed to burst to the surface. Slowly he reached into his pocket and withdrew the keys, giving them up with obvious reluctance. "Fellows, I think I want to walk over to the stream on the other side of the road and watch its descent down the mountain."

"If thou turn away thy foot from the sabbath, from doing thy pleasure on my holy day . . . and shalt honour him, not doing thine own ways, nor finding thine own pleasure...." These words filled Al's mind as he turned toward the place where the stream disappeared over a rocky ledge. Al seated himself on a large rock overlooking the cascading brook. Somehow the beauty of it all, the stream, the trees, the mountains and the clear sky seemed to draw him into the presence of God. "Teach me to do thy will; for thou art my God: thy spirit is good; lead me into the land of uprightness" (Psalm 143:10)

Al and his friends had decided to go for a drive on this Sabbath afternoon. Nothing wrong with that! But somehow things just hadn't gone as planned and Al realized their activities had become obvious violation of principles found in God's Word.

Have you been confronted with a problem like Al's? Just what does God expect of young people on His Holy Sabbath? What does the Bible say concerning the keeping of the Sabbath? These questions ARE IMPORTANT TO YOUNG PEOPLE.

Proper Sabbath keeping can only be determined by using the Bible as our guide. Personal opinion is not really important but Biblical principle is ALL IM-PORTANT. One important rule to remember concerning Bible guidance is that when God gives a principle for our observance, we have no right to discredit or reverse that principle. Of course we understand that any Lawof-Moses attachments to the fourth commandment were nullified in Christ and any Jewish tradition is not binding anyway; but principles of Sabbathkeeping given by God are ours to obev.

Purposes of the Sabbath

In His Word, God gives some purposes for His sanctifying or setting apart of the Sabbath day. Those purposes for the establishment of the Sabbath are just as beneficial for Christian young people as they are for Christian adults.

A primary purpose is to give man a day of rest. God understood the needs of man whom He created, and God rested on the first Sabbath as an example for man and then God commanded that man should rest on that day (Gen. 2:2, 3; Exod. 20:8-11; Heb. 4:4, 5 and 9, 10).

Another purpose for the giving of the Sabbath is "worship of God." Isaiah 58:13 says that on the Sabbath we should "honor him." This command does not restrict itself to a congregational gathering and worship, but in fact it seems to indicate

a personal honor, devotion, or worship of God.

A third purpose of having the Sabbath is for the church's meeting together in worship of God. Leviticus 23:3 says the Sabbath is "an holy convocation"; a convocation is an assembly or a group of people meeting together.

Finally, the Sabbath is given as a memorial to creation. God made a beautiful creation in six days and then rested on the seventh day, establishing that day as a remembrance to creation. In fact, the fourth commandment carries a command of God that we are to abstain from work on the basis that the commandment is a memorial to creation.

Biblical Principles of Sabbathkeeping

With these purposes for the establishment of the Sabbath well in mind, we have a good basis for consideration of several God-given principles that must guide us as we seek to know how to conduct ourselves on His holy day.

"Bake That Ye Will Bake" (Exodus 16:23-30)

The first principle of the Bible giving instructions on what God expects in Sabbath keeping is found in Exodus 16:23. He says "Tomorrow is the rest of the sabbath unto the LORD: bake that which ye will bake today and seethe that ye will seethe..." "Yes, but today it is so much easier to cook with our modern kitchen facilities," one

might say. Does that change God's principle? His Word instructs us to prepare foodstuffs before the Sabbath arrives and never has He changed that law. To truly keep the Sabbath as God desires, one must let this verse be one of his guiding principles.

"Buying and Selling" (Neh. 13:15-21)

In Nehemiah's time Israel became lax in its Sabbathkeeping by harvesting, and by buying and selling. When the merchants came and did business with the Israelites, Nehemiah made it clear that God was not pleased with such goings on. Nehemiah 13:18 says, "Did not your fathers thus, and did not our God bring all this evil upon us, and upon this city? Yet ve bring more wrath upon Israel by profaning the sabbath." Nehemiah stood up for God's law and stopped the abuses of the Sabbath.

If we are not careful we will find ourselves going against this principle of God and we will be breaking His commandment. IT IS WRONG TO BUY OR SELL ON THE SABBATH. Some buy little things such as bread, pop, candies, etc., if the "need" arises, or they may go to a restaurant and buy a meal, or fill the car with gas; but God has spoken against these things and in no case should one excuse himself from God's principle. To do so is a violation of His law. He has not changed or revoked this principle of Sabbathkeeping. Can you afford to? His principle is that one may do good deeds on the Sabbath. But we must not employ laxity by calling everything a "thirsty cow" or an "ox in the ditch."

"Work (Bearing Burdens)" (Jeremiah 17:21-27)

God makes an obvious proclamation against working on the Sabbath in the commandment itself (Exodus 20:8-11). In many places throughout the Scriptures He gives emphasis to the non-work principle of Sabbathkeeping. Jeremiah 17 is especially positive about this matter but the most striking verse showing the importance of the principle is found in Exod. 34: 21, where God says, "Six days thou shalt work, but on the seventh day thou shalt rest: in earing time and in harvest thou shalt rest." God has commanded us not to work on His Sabbath, even in planting time and harvest time, and we cannot alter that law for our own convenience. "O ve of little faith:" God will take care of the crops over the Sabbath.

"Corn Pickers" (Matt. 12:1-8)

Jesus and His disciples walked through a field and they picked some wheat and ate it, causing the Pharisees to quickly condemn. However, the disciples had not broken a command of God. They were not gathering (harvesting) the wheat. They were only eating at a time when they were hungry. They were

simply having a meager, uncooked meal. Never read more into this text than what is there. It does not allow for work or harvest on God's Sabbath.

"A Thirsty Cow, A Sheep In the Ditch, And a Withered Hand" (Luke 13:1-16; Matt. 12:10-13)

Jesus taught that "it is lawful to do well on the sabbath." However, He did not in any case give permission to carry on one's regular employment in complete violation of His holy law. He pointed out that thirsty cattle are loosed for watering (Luke 13:11-16), a sheep in a ditch is lifted out (Matt. 12:10-13), and since "man is better than a sheep" (Matt. 12:12) it is lawful to heal those who are ill. His principle is that one may do good deeds on the Sabbath. But, we must not employ laxity by calling everything a "thirsty cow" or an "ox in the ditch." If we "buy or sell," or work, and say the ox was in the ditch when in reality we have just satisfied our own desires, then we have broken God's law.

"In A Crisis" (Matt. 24:20)

God is so earnest about the keeping of His Sabbath that through His Son, He asked the people of Jerusalem to be careful not to flee on the Sabbath from the Roman soldiers who were coming against Jerusalem in A.D. 70 (after Moses' Law was abolished). If any laxity would be permissible it would seem that a time of crisis such as one's fleeing for his very life would be the time, but Jesus said no. Isn't it sad that we make allowances because we want to see a football game on TV, are afraid the crops will get away from us, or maybe just have a craving for a 7-up?

"And That Baseball Game" (Isa 58:13)

Why did God inspire the prophet to pen the words of Isaiah 58:13? You know! It is because that is one of His guiding principles for our Sabbath-keeping. "But He didn't mean a measly little ballgame or a Friday night party or activity?" Yes, but He did! His Word is clear; do you want to change it to "suit your fancy"?

Your own sincere conscience and the Bible will have to be your guide in this principle. Your own pleasure-seeking is not pleasing to God for the Sabbath is for His honor and glory. The Bible says so and violation of this principle is "breaking God's law." How about the Sabbath afternoon drive up to the meadow? That could have been a tremendous time of meditation, prayer and joy in memorial to God's creation, but Satan used it to cause sin in the lives of young people.

Principles Not Grievous


The principles discussed above are not grievous, but to the contrary, they make the Sabbath a blessing. They are what make it different from six busy, ordinary, work- and perhaps worry-filled days. Let the Sabbath be the kind of blessing God wants it to be for you.

Al felt like a great weight had lifted from his shoulders. He slipped off his perch and walked back to the car. The fellows were soon on their way back around the curves, past the streams and heading toward home. "Fellows, I'm afraid we weren't very pleasing to God this afternoon. I don't want to sound preachy but I can't get Isaiah 58:13 off my mind, 'If thou turn away thy foot from the sabbath, from doing thy pleasure on my holy day . . . and shalt honour him, not doing thine own ways, nor finding thine own ways, nor finding thine own pleasure...' I just didn't feel right!"

"Well, I guess I wouldn't have said anything but I feel pretty awful too."

"And me too!"

"Don't leave me out!" Silence settled over the fellows until one of them starting singing, "Only to be what He wants me to be, every moment of every day..." The rich harmony drifted through the open windows and winged its way through the tall trees—united prayer of submission and dedication to God and His principles.

II Cor. 4 In these short letters from Paul, we find a lot II Cor. 5 of advice crammed into short verses. One chapter II Cor. 6 alone can give you very much to think about and II Cor. 7 ponder. One verse in particular struck me not too II Cor. 8 long ago. It was Ephesians 5:12. "For it is a shame II Cor. 9 even to speak of those things which are done of them II Cor. 10 in secret." II Cor. 11 The word, "them," here refers back to verse 11— II Cor. 12 the unfruitful works of darkness. In other words II Cor. 13 it is speaking of the evil done secretly by sinners.

> I have heard Christians express the opinion that they see nothing wrong in reading a book or watching a TV program that is either evil or based on evil things. "After all," they say, "we are Christians, and as long as we know that what we are seeing is wrong, it isn't going to hurt us." But, according to this verse, it's wrong to even speak of these things, so surely it must be wrong to read about, think about, or watch evil.

> Further, it is wrong to enjoy books, movies (or whatever), and to make jokes about them; for Romans 1:32 condemns not only the doers, but also those who "... have pleasure in them that do them." My marginal reference uses "consents with" as alternative for "have pleasure in." So this is quite a serious matter-to enjoy (or consent to) something that is totally wrong.

> From now on, let's watch our conduct as Christians, and keep our minds and actions out of the reach of temptations as much as possible.


An Hour a Day

A wise man named Franklin Field once wrote, "The great dividing line between success and failure can be expressed in five words: 'I did not have time.' "

In this frenetic age it often seems that there are not enough hours in the day to accomplish the things to which we aspire. So we abandon ideas. New Mark of Merit Booklet


