

Can YOU love the "unlovely" and care for him unconditionally as a mother loves her child? CHRIST DID-AND DOES! Love is the active concern for life and the growth of that which we love LOVE IS DOING!

RESPONSIBILITY—"Bear ue one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ' (Gal. 6:2). Cain asked, "Am I my brother's keeper?" The loving person has compassion for the

life of his brother. He possesses a burden for his brother's soul. his happiness, and his needs.

RESPECT—Respect means the concern that the other person should grow and blossom within the realm of his own personality. Respect does NOT say. "I want that person to develop his life for the purpose of servina ME."

KNOWLEDGE — "To know you is to love you...." Those familiar words to an old song express a real key to loving anyone. We cannot always be pleased with what we know about an individual, yet the unadulterated love of God flowing through us enables us to love that person for what he IS—NOT what WE or society might expect him to be! Just A Meaningless Tradition?

In the realm of our worship to God, we as Christians recognize that indeed it is of utmost importance that we avoid traditions which have been handed down from generation to generation, but are virtually meaningless as far as enhancing our relationship to God.

There are, however, traditions which are given to us directly by Christ. These are to be kept. Even in the keeping of these, we must be very sure that

our observance is not "traditional" rather than heartfelt.

I am thinking specifically of the foot-washing ordinance which we observe in keeping with Christ's example at the time of the Lord's Supper (which time arrives this year on April 15).

Just what does the act of foot-washing mean to you? Is it just an ordinance which you observe once each year-or is it an act which truly portrays your daily attitude toward your brother? Can we stoop to splash some water on another's feet, then arise, pick up our high esteem and ego, ready to push our way on through another year until time again to observe the "act" of humility?

If we go on day after day, year after year, making very sure that no one takes advantage of us, that we are given every iota of credit due us, and that we are given every consideration we feel we deserve, then can we truly observe the act of humility on the night of the Lord's Supper with any real meaning or depth? Can we allow ourselves to become offended at any indication that we are being criticized or corrected-and then expect to receive a real blessing in observing the ordinance of humility? Can we allow ourselves, though human and subject to mistakes, to be readily critical of others-and still consider ourselves humble and in a condition to observe this ordinance? The answers are obvious; but, oh, how very often these very conditions can be seen in our lives.

As we come to the foot-washing portion of our service, is it such a great thing that we should stoop to wash the feet of a sister or brother whom we dearly love? This is not so great a thing; nor is this all there is to it. In our own self-examination, we must ask ourselves, "Is there a brother or sister whose feet I would not be willing to wash? If ours is true humility, we must be able to, from the heart, answer this question "No." The Bible says, "...let each esteem other better than themselves" (Phil 2:3).

May each of us learn to apply this "foot-washing" attitude in our daily living-willing to be on a lower level than another, willing to be overlooked perhaps, and very unwilling to be offended by another. May we realize that we cannot apply a "dose" of humility to our lives by simply observing an ordinance once a year. Rather, it must be an attitude that is evident in our daily living and truly applied in our dealing with others. May the ordinance of footwashing become more meaningful to us as we observe it from year to year.

Now, can you imagine yourself in such a situation? Face it, young person...one day that youthful body of yours is going to grow old! Job said, "Man that is born of a woman is of few days, and full of trouble. He cometh forth like a flower, and is cut down; he fleeth also as a shadow, and continueth not" (Job 14:1-2). Bearing this in mind, ask yourself the question, "What will happen to me in my older years of life?" Get a good mental pic-

ture of what life will be like for you when you are an elderly person, and then consider the fact that in our society today, the most neglected and unwanted people are the elderly! What a way to spend the closing days of your life...

lonely,

rejected,

unwanted.

forgotten.

You know that you never want to reach a stage in life when you will be lonely, rejected, unwanted and forgotten. Why do you allow hundreds of old people around you to feel that way today? Do you know that as a Christian you have a direct command to care for the elderly? "What? Where in the Bible does it say that I must take care of old folks?" The Fifth Commandment itself teaches you and me that we are obligated to care for our parents, James 1:27 instructs us to "visit the fatherless and widows in their affliction." Throughout time people have tried to excuse themselves from their responsibilities to their parents, but the law of God remains firm. Such was the case when Jesus rebuked the Pharisees in Matthew 15:4-6. The early church recognized the need to care for the elderly, and they appointed seven men of honest report to care for the widows who had been neglected (Acts 6:1-6). Turning your back on the plight of the aged and pretending they don't exist is like trying to deny that you need to breathe air to live. The privilege of life carries some responsibilities along with it, and you need to meet the responsibility of helping the elderly. "Okay, so old people need help... what can I do about it? Our FYC goes rest home singing now and then ... isn't that enough???" Rest home singing is good, but consider this fact—only 1 out of every 10 elderly people (70 years old and up) resides in a rest home. That means the other 90% never benefit from your efforts. There must be some way you can help more of these elderly people ... AND THERE IS.

How Much Land?

Exactly how much land should the Jews occupy to fulfill the prophecies regarding their return to Israel? This question is of special interest as we consider the present situation. Israel now holds much territory which before 1967 belonged to Arab countries, and the Arabs continue to demand that these lands be returned. But thus far, after five and a half years, none of the territory has been returned and there is very little evidence that the Jews have any intention of ever returning any of it.

From 1948 to 1967 we felt that prophecy was being wonderfully fulfilled by the return of the Jews and the rebuilding of Palestine. But all that time there was something lacking. Israel did not have the city of Jerusalem. Their return was called a "Zionist Movement" but they did not possess Mount Zion! How we rejoiced when Israel took the old city of Jerusalem and Mt. Zion!

The prophecy in Jeremiah 30:3 says "... I will cause them to return to the land that I gave to their fathers, and they shall possess it." What land was given to "their fathers"? Abraham is considered the original "father" of Israel, and in Genesis 15:18 we read: "In the same day the Lord made a covenant with Abram, saying, Unto thy seed have I given this land, from the river of Egypt unto the great river, the river Euphrates." This is much more

land than Israel possesses today, but they did rule over this much land in the days of kings David and Solomon. In I Kings 4:21 and II Chronicles 9:26 it is mentioned that Solomon ruled all the land from the border of Egypt to the river, and the marginal reference identifies this river as "the Euphrates."

There has been some question about the meaning of the phrase "river of Egypt" mentioned in Genesis 15:18. The great river of Egypt is the Nile, but it is located in the midst of the land, and for the Jews to possess the Nile would mean their possessing all of Egypt. So it is thought that this must refer to some other river, and the verses in Kings and Chronicles use the term "border of Egypt." But just what is that border of Egypt?


At the present time the border of Egypt is the Suez Canal,

and Israel occupies all of the Sinai peninsula to the Canal. Before 1967 the border of Egypt was the eastern boundary of the Suez situated only a short distance south of Beersheba. Farther southwest (in about the middle of the Sinai area) is a small river which some maps label "the river of Egypt." There has been some talk about Israel making a treaty with Egypt the terms being Israel's withdrawal from part of the Sinai, which perhaps includes that land extending to this small river. However, a recent news item indicates that they do, indeed, intend to retain this land. This news release reveals that Israel is now building a resort city in the Sinai desert similar to Palm Springs which is in the California desert. As I understand it, this is being built in the eastern part of the Sinai, probably northeast of the little river we have mentioned.

A news item in the December 12 issue of the "Jerusalem Post" tells of another reason Israel may want to keep part of the Sinai. The item reads in part: "What appear to be large deposits of high-quality tungsten, copper and other valuable non-ferrus minerals have been discovered in the Sinai desert. The discoveries were made in the course of a five-year scientific survey of the nature of the peninsula started after the Six-Day War...." Other Bible prophecies indicate that there will be things of great value in Israel, and these valuable resources will be one of the causes of an invasion from the north, and this invasion will lead to Armageddon. So, you see, this recent mineral discovery does connect with those prophecies.

Before the Six-Day War the northern boundary of Israel was the Hulah marshes just north of the sea of Galilee. But the Six - Day War extended the northern area of Israel to include the south slopes of Mount Hermon located fifty miles north of Galilee. The fact that Israel intends to remain there is shown by recent building activity. On television news recently I saw hundreds of Jewish people at a ski resort on the slopes of Mount Hermon. They have nice lodge buildings, a ski lift, and have plans for much more building there. This is in territory the Arab nation of Syria is demanding that the Jews return to them. But the building which the Jews are doing indicates that they have no intention of returning that land. In fact, serious warfare erupting from time to time is with Syria and Lebanon, and there is every possibility that eventually Israel will expand its boundary farther north. Before the second advent of Christ, we may fully expect Israel's boundary to extend all the way to the Euphrates, thus fulfilling the prophecy of Jeremiah 30:3 which says they would return to the land which God gave their fathers, and that they would possess it-ALL OF IT.

In a recent Newsweek article concerning the Mormon Church, they gave the statistics that in the past 12 years the Mormon Church increased its membership by 50%. This growth was solely attributed to their youth evangelism program.




Progress in the Philippines

In order to be motivated to seek out the elderly and make efforts to visit them, you need to rid your mind of the idea that elderly people are a bore and that you can't stand to visit them. Look at an older person as a storehouse of knowledge...a living history book...a natural resource for wise advice, and a person (a real, live person possessing the complete range of human feeling and emotion) who is as compassionate and loving as you are. Have you ever considered that maybe you are a bore to the elderly person you go to visit? Who wouldn't get bored with a young person who clams up, fidgets, and keeps his eyes glued to the clock during an entire 15 minute visit???

Get enthusiastic about visiting the elderly and doors of opportunity will open all around you! First visit elderly people you know personally such as relatives, church members, neighbors, and friends. Then welcome the chance to visit those who are mentioned by others as people who need visitation. If you show yourself wanting and willing to visit, you will have no trouble finding those who would like for you to visit them.
