Even Christian parents are sometimes guilty of this error in perspective. Proud parents, in extolling the accomplishments of their offspring, are all

too often heard to emphasize the position of employment, salary, the fine home, etc., giving little regard to what place the Heavenly Father may hold in the life of their loved one.

Yes, the world definitely measures success with a faulty measuring stick. Fine homes, fine cars, habatchis and barbecue grills are well and good—but only as these possessions come in the order outlined in Matthew 6:33—"But seek ye first the kingdom of God and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you."

Like happiness, success is not to be sought as an end in itself. Rather, it comes about in the pursuit of doing and being an honest, helpful, kind and resourceful individual. It comes in recognizing one's weaknesses as well as in strengthening and utilizing one's strong points. It comes in being humble about those human tendencies which we recognize to be a part of ourselves, but in being bold in standing up for those principles which God requires of us.

Success comes to those who are seeking to do good, to help others, and to serve God—not in order to gain success, but in order to benefit someone. And herein lies success, though it so quietly approaches that one is not aware of his own real success, as such.

world. Don't be deceived. Right now it is MOST important that you resolve to be a steady, determined individual for the cause of Christ. When you face a conflict, weigh it correctly. No price is too high in avoiding compromise where your Saviour is concerned.

Within the next few years, you will likely select a mate, select a vocation, and establish the circle of friends which will influence your type of life. Your "measure of success" right now IS important. If you are found compromising your beliefs and principles at this time, the same and more will be expected of you later. Anyone can drift with the tide (the crowd). It takes an uncommon individual to determine to stand for truth, regardless what those around may do.

Go ahead and be a success not just in the church pew—but in the business world. God needs successful people in His field to support His work, to pay tithes into His storehouse, to provide comfortably for their own.

What a waste of years, then, I thought to myself. God has just allotted us 70 years ("three score years and ten"—Psalm 90:10). This leaves only five years for really living. And I thought the Lord wanted our *lives*, not just scraps of our lives.

The purpose of the caption was to show that life after 65 can be productive and rewarding, a time for fulfilling the dreams of earlier years. Several examples were related and photographed to prove it.

But for you who are just reaching the milestone of graduation

from high school, college, or university it would be foolish to accept such a false premise. Life has already begun for you; it is only that you have now reached a new stage, a higher launching pad, you might say.

WHICH WAY?

Many graduates flounder in uncertainty and bewilderment for a period of time, not knowing what to make of their lives—rather, not knowing what God wants to make of their lives. They experiment with this and that, wander here and there, hoping to strike on something that "rings a bell," something that seems to be "the thing." Graduation for them is a crossroads experience when they must

make the choice of direction.

This is regrettable, for a clearcut decision for Christ ought to have been made long before graduation. And this decision is the cross-roads experience when we have a right to choose. After this choice is made, it is only for us to follow in the way the Lord leads.

Graduation, then, ought not to be a time of deciding, but a time of attaining—a time of achievement along the way we have already chosen.

Naturally, if the decision for Christ has not been made before, it surely ought to be made now—at graduation—before any more of life is wasted.

A saying that I can remember hearing my father mention many times goes something like this: "An educated fool is the worst fool of all." What youth with an education wants to "fool away" his life?

GUIDELINES FOR LIFE

Graduation for the Christian is actually a time of promotion in the field of service. Once as a student, his life was lived for Christ; now his life is lived for Him as a skilled workman, a trained specialist, a certified professional.

Your Health Clinic

Dear Doctor Reeh,

I am very concerned about a friend of mine. His temperature seems to be abnormally high a great percentage of the time. The slightest annoyance or inconvenience leaves him burning up.

I understand there is possibility of permanent damage if the condition persists. Is there some medication or therapy which will normalize his temperature?

Dear Ann,

You do indeed have cause for concern. Your friend is suffering from megalego or in laymen's terms, enlarged ego. Other symptoms of the disorder are slight swelling of the head and frequent flushing of the face and neck. Often it is accomppanied by reddening of the ears.

It is highly unlikely that any permanent damage has been done if proper treatment is begun immediately. However, as long as the condition is allowed to persist it creates an unhealthy atmosphere for those who come in contact with your

friend. It is especially contagious to small children.

This disorder is known to have a definite effect upon the behavior pattern of the victim as it weakens the functioning of the brain and heart. According to Scripture, "Everyone that is proud in heart is an abomination unto the Lord" (Proverbs 16:5), and the effect on the brain is emphasized in I Timothy 6:4, "He is proud, knowing nothing, but doting about questions and strifes of words, whereof cometh envy, strife, railings, evil surmising..."

You may do a great deal to help this person on his road to recovery by prayerfully and tactfully making him aware of his condition and of the danger of neglecting it, for until he is cured, a person suffering from this disease has little chance of living a full and satisfying life. The headswelling will be relieved by repeated exposure to Scriptures stressing the mortal and sinful nature of man and the goodness and mercy of God. The temperature will be normalized by continued application of patience poultices and by love capsules, taken while on the knees.

The Situation Ethics Dilemma

For many people there seems to be no problem with the conflict concerning the profound theory of situation ethics—they just ignore it until a time comes which calls for them to decide. Quite frankly, I had a very uncertain concept of what the term "situation ethics" meant until delving into some very heavy material.

The idea of situation ethics has been around for several hundred years, but in the late 1960's a Dr. Joseph Fletcher wrote a book on it that sent reverberations throughout the theological world. In quick summary, he claims that there are three approaches to arriving at moral decisions—legalistic, antinomian and situational and, of course, the only right method is situational.

The legalistic approach means that the letter of the law is absolute regardless of consequences. The antinomian approach is nothing short of religious anarchy—there is no law, one just knows what is right when one needs to know. The situationalist says there is only one law—to love (agape) God and neighbors. All rules—laws, principles, and ideals—are valid only when they serve love in any given situation.

The decision on how to act in a given situation is determined by pragmatism, relativism and personalism. Time and space precludes going into detail, but it would be well for you to look up these terms for clearer understanding.

The over-all theory is summed up in six propositions: (1) Only love is intrinsically good (2) love is the only ruling norm in Christian ethics (3) love and justice are one and the same (4) love wills the neighbor good even if one does not like his neighbor (5) only the end justifies the means, and (6) love's decisions can only be made situationally.

To give these propositions more meaning, I quote Dr. Fletcher, "The first one pins down the nature of value. The second reduces all values to love. The third equates love and justice. The fourth frees love from sentimentality. The fifth states the relationship between means and ends. The sixth authenticates every decision within its own context."

This skeletal summary doesn't do justice to the subject. It would be of interest for you to check out some books or magazine articles on situation ethics.

When considering the situation ethics theory the immediate impact a traditional moralist will experience is one of shock. The question comes to mind, "Can just anything be permissible if agape love is the result? Anything??" The situationalist would answer affirmatively. This sets the mind to thinking of a variety of bizarre incidents.

Several examples of pointedly perplexing situations were given for consideration. One such example is the story of a woman who was held as prisoner in Russia during World War II and could return to her family in Germany only if she became pregnant—which would make her a liability to the Russians. She asked a prison guard to impregnate her and, having become a liability, she was returned to her family. The child born

as a result was deeply loved because of the reunion he caused. *Is this* right or wrong? Did more love exist because of this experience than it otherwise would have?

Then there is the case of a father and husband with a terminal illness. He has been given three years to live if properly cared for—otherwise only about six months. His only insurance policy would probably be cancelled when it came up for renewal. Would he refuse the medical care and leave his family \$100,000 in insurance payment or continue the expensive medical care and leave nothing?

A very realistic situation is that of the Uruguayan rugby team whose plane crashed high in the Andes without hope of rescue or survival. After 20 days the 16 survivors ran out of the little amount of food and finally decided to consume the raw, frozen flesh of the comrades they had buried in the snow. After 73 days they were rescued. What would you have done in the same situation?

Love in its highest form—Godly love (agape)—is the situationalist's basis for deciding what to do in these cases. The situationalist maintains that laws no longer have absolute, unbreakable control in every situation. No longer does tradition—no matter how firmly entrenched—hold back when love can best be

Is it valid to choose the lesser of two evils or does one unconditionally cling to all precepts of the law? Consider: During World War II in a German concentration camp, those women that were pregnant were killed. A doctor in the camp performed 3000 abortions to save what would otherwise have been 6000 deaths-both mother and unborn child.

You can probably add some less dramatic but just as poignant examples of your own to these described. At this point it would be well to recognize that the type of dilemmas which we have cited here are not the real issue in the conflict over situation ethics. Obviously, it would be useless to attempt to analyze all possible circumstances of an extreme nature. One can only trust

that when such perplexities are faced. if the one concerned is a child of God. He will be given the needed wisdom to judge correctly. The real issue concerns those who apply situation ethics to justify their satisfying their every whim.

How does one know right from wrong? The situationalist has what seems to be a simple decision-do what results in the most love. There are some problems with this theory, though.

Can man always know what is good or what the way of love is in every circumstance? Here we take into account the human being-man. We have a tremendous capacity to believe what we want. Thus, love becomes whatever we want or think it to be. Try as we may to be objective, there will be times when several people will not agree on how love can best be served or on what the love to be served really is.

Just what is love? Apostle Paul states that love is the fulfilling of the law. With this he refers to the Decalogue. Regardless of our biases, it should be realized that God has a firm set of rules which was magnified with the coming of Jesus. There have never been any Biblically recorded valid exceptions to the Ten Commandments. In fact, obedience is one of the strongest themes in the Bible.

I am unaware of any Biblical precedent for exceptions in any of God's absolute laws (The Ten Commandments, clean and unclean, and tithes and offerings) that have been considered justifiable by God. Some may point to David's taking of the holy shewbread when he was in need. It must be remembered that this was

"THERE IS NO PEACE"




Now more than ever we are reminded of the words of the prophet Jeremiah in Jeremiah 6:14. "They have healed also the hurt of the daughter of my people slightly, saying, Peace, peace, when there is no peace."

Ieremiah was referring to Iudah which was being attacked and would soon be carried away into captivity. But we see the thought of the verse also carried out in the results of the peace conferences of man. The Treaty of Versailles did not make a lasting peace. It was a "slight" healing of the hurt, and it resulted in World War II. Just recently we have seen the development of a peace agreement with North Viet Nam. American prisoners of war have been returned and the American forces have been withdrawn ... but the war goes on. Apparently North Viet Nam has no intention of giving up until they have won control of the entire Indo-China peninsula. Some fear

that the United States will be drawn back into the war, but this is doubtful. It would seem, rather, that the far eastern nations will be further consolidated in preparation for their part in Armageddon.

ARABS AND OIL



In a recent issue Time magazine told of the great wealth of the Arab nations in connection with oil. These are the nations on the Arabian penninsula to the south and east of Israel. The Arab nations around Israel—Egypt, Jordan, Syria, and Lebanon-are not rich in oil. It is noteworthy that Saudi Arabia. Kuwait and other oil-rich Arab nations have not been willing to put their money into financing war against Israel. And they are not using ther wealth to build up ther own armaments. They are more interested in improving their educational facilities, their agriculture, and in obtaining the luxuries of life. And so their oil wealth is not at present a threat to Israel. If they should join in a war against Israel, it is conceivable that Israel might occupy their territory and gain control of their oil production. This is what has happened in the Sinai. Israel is exporting some of the oil produced there and thus profiting from their occupation of that land.

WATER, THE KEY TO PROSPERITY IN ISRAEL

Some of the most desolate desert land of the world is found in the southern part of Israel, called the Negev. One of the miracles connected with the return of the Tews to Israel has been their ability to inhabit such desolate land and to cause it to produce profitable crops. The prophecy of Jeremiah says, "And fields shall be bought in this land, whereof ye say, It is desolate without man or beast; ... Men shall buy fields for money and subscribe evidences, and seal them, and take witnesses in the land of Benjamin, and in the places about Jerusalem, and in the cities of Judah, and in the cities of the mountains, and in the cities of the valley, and in the cities of the south: for I will cause their captivity to return, saith the Lord" (Jeremiah 32:43, 44). Note the phrases "desolate without man or beast" and "in the cities of the south." A new college called "The University of the Negev" is now being built in a "city of the south" -Beersheba. And the desert is being watered and made to produce. But where do they get the water? The answer is, FROM THE SEA!

Sea water is salty and unfit for irrigation, but the Jews have built the world's most efficient plants for de-salting sea water. One such plant is at Eliat at the north end of the Gulf of Aqaba which is part of the Red Sea. The cost of converting the water is so low that it is being used in large scale irrigation in the desert of the Negev.

PROSPERITY TO CONTINUE

This effort to make the land produce orchards and fields is not something which will be only a vain attempt. The Bible indicates that it is to continue and become wonderful in the future. "And the desolate land shall be tilled, whereas it lay desolate in the sight of all that passed by. And they shall say, This land that was desolate is become like the garden of Eden ..." (Ezekiel 36:34, 35). And Amos declares, "And I will plant them upon their land, and they shall no more be pulled up out of their land which I have given them, saith the Lord thy God."

And so we find new things constantly taking place in the world which continue to fulfill the prophecies showing that the second ad-

an ecclesiastical law and not a moral one. Otherwise it might have been more practical for him to have stolen from an unsuspecting Gentile in the area.

A tremendously important concern to this subject is the aspect of faith. Many people artificialize faith by adamantly adhering to law and tradition—their own as well as God's. All of this legalism provides a feeling of security from sin when actually much of this is a superficial cloak of self-righteousness. We aren't to be mechanical robots. On the other hand, faith *alone* cannot be expected to please God. To live our life with "faith" that God will direct our every move with no assistance from us is quite naive and certainly unbiblical.

God has given all Christians varied intelligence, talents, and personalities to use in fulfilling a particular work or office. God expects us to put to use all the resources He has endowed us with to solve problems as they arise and to be creative in service to Him. In relation to situation ethics,

if our spiritual life is strong, we can depend upon the Holy Spirit's guidance as we use our God-given abilities to determine right and wrong. When we have done all that God has given us the ability to do, it is necessary to exercise total reliance upon God. When we have complete faith in Him, God will fulfill the promises given to us. Too often our own faith isn't sufficient to allow God to work for us.

It is imperative that we continually strengthen our spiritual faith. Only then will the words of Romans 8:26-28, 31 be meaningful to us: "Likewise the Spirit also helpeth our infirmities: for we know not what we should pray for as we ought: but the Spirit itself maketh intercession for us with groanings which cannot be uttered. And he that searcheth the hearts knoweth what is the mind of the Spirit, because he maketh intercession for the saints according to the will of God. And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose. What shall we then say to these things? If God be for us, who can be against




Elder Andres Leiva, missionary in Ecuador, reports that the work there is very promising. The church in Ecuador has been growing slowly, but surely.


BOGOTO, COLUMBIA

of these little ones a cup of cold water only in the name of a disciple, verily I say unto you, he shall in no wise lose his reward" (Matthew 10:42). "For God is not unrighteous to forget your work and labour of love..." (Hebrews 6: 10).

STIMULUS FOR SERVICE

The natural inclination is to want to be served. This is the selfish way. But the self-LESS way is to do the serving. And this self-less way is naturally based on love.

This is graphically illustrated in the story of Luke 7:36-50. Here a Pharisee is pictured as hosting Jesus at mealtime, when an unchaste woman entered and wept at Jesus' feet, even anointing His feet with ointment. This she did to the embarrassment of the host. The lesson of the story is that love evokes service—service in return for blessings received.

It is love in the graduate's heart that speeds him on his way of service to God through service to his fellowmen. Without this love, this compassion, the graduate is merely a refrigerator in which is stored a wealth of facts and skills that are too cold to glorify God. Knowledge without compassion is as unproductive as a light bulb without electricity.

Graduation has come. You are caught up in the pomp and excitement of your achievement. Let the surety of your commitment to Christ keep your bearings. There is a trail chartered for you, Follow



it faithfully as the Lord leads and you will find satisfaction in every step, with ecstatic joy awaiting at the finish line.

Almost Persuaded

It had been a rather busy day of preaching with services both in Jerusalem and in Samaria, when Philip decided to rest for a while. But this rest was short-lived for an angel of the Lord appeared unto him and told him to go down to Ethiopia. Without pausing to question, but merely obeying, Philip made the journey south. There he found a eunuch sitting in his chariot reading from the book of Isaiah. "Do you understand what you're reading?" Philip asked.

"How can I unless someone teaches me?" was the reply. As Philip read the 53rd chapter of Isaiah, he took advantage of this golden opportunity to tell the eunuch of Jesus. Immediately grasping the truth of the gospel of Jesus, the eunuch requested baptism. Philip told him that if he believed on Jesus, he could be baptized. After the eunuch's statement of belief, Philip proceeded to take him down into the water (Acts 8).

Mere belief was the key. Is it still the only requirement? Are works necessary? Should we keep the ten commandments? The ninth article of belief of the doctrinal handbook of our church deals with this very subject. Numerous passages in the Bible say only "believe and thou shalt be saved." Is this all that is necessary? What does "belief" include?

Acts 26 tells about an interesting event in the life of Paul when he appeared before King Agrippa. In the 27th verse, Paul asked, "King Agrippa, do you believe the prophets?" and then answers his own question, "I know that thou believest." And yet, the king replied in verse 28, "almost thou persuadest me to be a Christian." Belief was not enough. James 2:19 says that the devils also believe and tremble.

Many are going to appear before Christ saying, "Lord, Lord" and will declare their many good works before Him on the day of judgment only to hear Him say, "Depart from me, I never knew you." (See Luke 6:46 and Matt. 7:21-23).

But if belief isn't enough and if works aren't enough, then what do we do to be saved? James 2 shines a light for us. "Yes, a man may say, Thou hast faith, and I have works: shew me thy faith without thy works, and I will show thee my faith BY my works." If we truly believe that Christ is the Son of God, that He was sent to set an example for us, that He died a cruel death on the cross and was resurrected that we might have eternal life, won't we want to tell the world? If Christ gave His all out of love for us, what are we to do? What are we DOING for Him?

Accepting Christ initially involves belief, but it does not stop there. 1 John 4 and 5 describe Christ's sacrifice and also the danger involved in our denying His sacrifice (4:2,3; 5:10). After this initial belief, works will automatically follow. We will want to keep His commandments (1 John 2:3-5) and to spread His message of life to the entire world (Matt. 28:18-20).


