


During the Oklahoma State Fair held in October, the Oklahoma City Church of God (7th Day) maintained the booth shown above in the "Made in Oklahoma Building."


We were very glad that many of the brothers and sisters from Freeland and Vasser were able to attend. A few of the Spring Vale students were also able to come.



FYC ACTIVITIES IN POLAND

An affiliation with the folks in Poland is anticipated as soon as we can send a representative there. Here is another fine report from Brother Bronislaw Ciesielski on the progress of the newly-established FYC in Poland.

"I pray that our collaboration will be daily more wealthy. The first event of importance during our summer holiday was the Polish Conference meeting held in Secrecin. In this town we have a little church. There were two delegations from the church in Czechoslavakia and Hungary. This was our first time for meeting the Hungarians. Four brothers and one sister came from there. In Hungary, on September 5, was their Conference, but I couldn't go because I didn't get my passport in time.

"After the Conference our small youth group went to a health resort at Potcayr Zdroj. In the first week of camp we had 17 members, in the second week 14 members, and in the third week only 10 members. The terrain was very pretty. And we really enjoyed our summer holiday from school by camping together and seeking God.

"The lectures were twice each day. Brother B. Hoffman spoke on the

"The war in Nigeria is ended and the FYC is now carrying her activities as usual. There are lots of inguiries to make about the work of the FYC, since we haven't had contact for so long. Please up-date us on what is happening. When we learn more, then we will send better reports of the FYC here. Please pray for the FYC work here. I take care of the Ekepeye and Ogba Districts. Your earliest reply would be much appreciated. Convey my heartiest greetings to all our brothers there, the young people particularly.

Try to contact the pastor of the church you like to attend. I am sure that he will consider it a delight to be of service to someone like you.

OUESTION:

I have a real good job, and up to now, working on Sabbath has not been a problem. I just found out that I have to work on Sabbath once in awhile after receiving a promotion. I can't afford to quit, because we wouldn't make it financially. I don't think I have a choice (whether or not I work on Sabbath when asked), do you?

ANSWER:

Whether or not you have to work on Sabbath depends on the kind of god you serve. If yours turns his back on you when you run out of a job, you have no choice.

Some good friends of mine worship a God that promises to take care of His own, whether they are in plenty or not. In fact, He has been known to test the faith of my friends only to present them with more after the test than before! It would be great if you got to know HIM!

THANKSGIVING - Scrolls of Hope



It is doubtful that one can celebrate Thanksgiving in the true sense of the word even one day out of the year if his remaining 364 days are marred by discontent.

Recently as I heard a group of young people singing the chorus, "I woke up this mornin' feelin' fine; I woke up with glory on my mind," it occurred to me that this pretty well depicts the sort of attitude that should be ours in order to be truly thankful Christians.

Never was it promised to us as Christians that our days would *always* be sunny, but rather God has promised us grace for the trials and strength for the day. This assurance is why the Christian has so much for which to be thankful, in spite of the burdens and difficulties he may be facing.

Every day can be a "... woke-up-this-mornin'-feelin'-fine" day. Our own choice—our own attitude—decides it all. God offers us peace and contentment. The degree to which we accept this is up to our own choosing.

I recall a pamphlet which I read years ago, "My Blessing, Not My Doom." The author had discovered, by taking a two-month vacation, that his work was something which he enjoyed—something which he needed in order to be happy and content. He was lamenting the fact that all too many people don't understand this until they no longer have their work to enjoy. After years of resentment and complaint, they realize that the only thing disagreeable about their work was their own attitude toward it.

Many of us in our younger years find our schedules very crowded. It may be our schoolwork schedule; it may be our class schedule *plus* a job. It may be our full-time job plus outside activities and responsibilities which seem to more than fill our 24-hour days. For a young mother, it may be lively days with lively little tots—days which may be considered hectic, or may be considered blessed. Much of it depends upon our own frame of mind.

Most young people in the situations just described will someday look back and realize with longing that these were some of the happiest days of their lives. It is up to each of us to make our days ones of thanksliving. It is up to us to keep up our "gratitude attitude." Our spirit can commune with God so consistently that we will sing through the days that used to seem hectic. A defeatist attitude has made many a mountain out of a molehill.

Teen Guidelines

God's Choice or Your Gamble???

Jewell Linville

"...til death do us part..."

Surely God is grieved with the way these serious words are considered so lightly in our present world of "loveins," "trial" marriages, and "unrestrained" passion! Such gross deviation from God's plan for man and woman!

Yes, God does have a plan—and He has a plan especially for you! You need only to submit to His guidance "casting all your care upon Him; for He careth for you" (1 Peter 5:7). Our God is not so busy controlling the universe that He cannot take time to direct you in the most important decision of your life (other than that of salvation itself). Our God is concerned that you choose the proper companion—one who will bring you the ultimate in personal happiness and joyous fulfillment in service to Him—together with your mate.

God has the answers. He is ready and willing to give them to you. But

first, you must be ready and willing to seek God's guidance and accept His way for your life. You must be willing to "commit thy way unto the Lord, trust also in him; and he shall bring it to pass" (Psalm 37:5).

God can guide you in your choice of a mate just as surely as He guided Abraham's servant to choose Rebekah for Isaac's wife (Genesis 24). This isn't to say you should expect such a "sign" as in Isaac's case, but you can be just as certain in your choice. In fact, you MUST be just as confident! Anything short of absolute certainty should be regarded as contrary to the will of God.

IS IT TRULY LOVE?

The point of absolute certainty must never be considered merely an emotional "assurance," either. God gave us an intellect with a special reasoning power for such matters. At the same time, you may follow some

basic guidelines in recognizing the "prince charming" or the "lovely queen" God has chosen especially for you...

To be able to recognize your "intended," you must first identify love itself. Love is God's signboard to lead you to *His* choice for you, and love cannot be measured by a presence of mere sensual desires and passions. True, these will accompany love—will appear "as a result of" but never as a basis for!

Most often, the misconception that these physical lusts mean love comes during years of immaturity. No young person, especially the immature, wants to be told that he is simply not mature enough to distinguish love from lust, or that he is too young to make such a significant decision. But, young people, it is imperative that you listen to the "voice of experience" of your parents, your pastor, and mature adults as they cry out for you to BE CARE-FUL and wait for maturity to help you reach a decision that will affect your entire life and perhaps even your eternal life! When that age of maturity comes (most often not until after the teenage years), let God guide you into a true and lasting love with the marriage partner of His choice.

Does Your Love STAND THE "Test"?

TRUE love will not deviate from God's own description of love as found in 1 Corinthians 13:4-7:

"Charity suffereth long,
and is kind;
Charity envieth not;
Charity vaunteth not itself,
is not puffed up,
Doth not behave itself unseemly.

Seeketh not her own,
is not easily provoked,
Thinketh no evil;
Rejoiceth not in iniquity,
but rejoiceth in the truth;
Beareth all things,
Believeth all things,
Hopeth all things,
Endureth all things,"

If you possess this type of completely selfless love, you will quite naturally be able to answer "yes" to the following questions:

- 1. Do thoughts of his (or her) approval spur you on to greater achievements?
- 2. In whatever you are doing, do you consider what his (or her) reaction will be?
- 3. Are your happiest times when you are together?
- 4. Are you proud to be identified with him (or her) in a crowd as well as privately with your best friend?
- 5. Do you think of him (or her) as deserving of the loving labor of your hands?
- 6. Do you quite naturally think of your future as shared with him (or her)?
- 7. Do you dream of a baby boy with traits "just like his" (or a baby girl with traits "just like hers")?
- 8. Do you admire him (or her) just "as he (or she) is"? If you have in mind to change him (or her) after marriage, you've made the wrong choice—What makes you think you can change traits that have been 20-25 years in developing?
- 9. Do you find in him (or her) the qualities you want in a mate?
- 10. Are you satisfied with attention

from him (or her) only? If you desire to be in company with another man (or woman), you had better give a second thought to your choice—you simply are NOT "in love"!

- 11. Are you compatible? This does not mean just part of the time either, although there will quite naturally be some instances of disagreement, but these should be very few and should be easily settled.
- 12. Do you admire the way he (or she) treats his (or her) parents? This treatment often indicates far better the "real you" than the charming companion you are on a date!
- 13. Are his (or her) habits pleasing to you? If his (or her) habits are distasteful to you, you should consider that other habits will come to the surface after marriage. Do you have what it takes to live the rest of your life with those "habits"?

If you cannot answer "yes" to the preceding questions, you are obliged to give yourself a chance by waiting on the Lord until that point of surety comes. Don't be afraid to remain single for a while longer. After all, God's foreknowledge allows Him to know what is best for you, and you can be assured that if you have doubts about your choice, that "still small voice" is God telling you to "wait."

Remember, God's thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are God's ways your ways (Isaiah 55:8), but the wisdom that is from above is pure (James 3:17). Even David, a man after God's own heart, exclaims that "such knowledge is too wonderful for

me; it is high, I cannot attain unto it" (Psalm 139:6). Is it not only fitting that you should rely on that infinite wisdom of God to guide you aright in the decision that will affect your entire life and your service to Him as well?

"... WAIT PATIENTLY..."

"Haste makes waste," and with an improper decision in such a serious matter, the "waste" may be your life! Many a home in today's confused world rings with the theme "If I could live over...." These "wasted years" simply do not have to be the case in your lives, young people, for God will guide those who want to be guided. "Be not as the horse, or as the mule, which have no understanding: whose mouth must be held in with bit and bridle ... " (Psalm 32:9), but rather know for a surety that "... the Lord shall guide thee continually" (Isaiah 58:11) if you will only "rest in the Lord and wait patiently for him..." (Psalm 37:7). "Trust in the Lord with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge him, and he shall direct thy paths" (Proverbs 3:5, 6).

Perhaps God has your path directed toward a few years of service to Him before limiting that service by obligating yourself to the natural responsibilities of a married life. Or, to the contrary, perhaps God's plan for your service to Him can best be accomplished as a partner to the marriage contract.

Regardless of what the plan might be for your life, the important consideration is to allow God to direct. "Delight thyself also in the Lord; and he shall give thee the desires of thine heart" (Psalm 37:4).

This verse in Psalm 37 brings to mind a beautiful fulfillment of the promise as it occurred in the life of a very dedicated young lady. She, being exceptionally diligent in seeking God's leading, had concluded (following some concentrated study of 1 Corinthians 7) that God's purpose for her life was that of complete celibacy. Soon after her acceptance of God's supposed plan for her life, God brought her together with a young man who was, in every sense of the word, "meant" for her. It is enlightening to note that it was only when she was willing to happily give ALL to God that He gave ALL to her!

Won't you join this happy young couple by "delighting yourself in the Lord" and thereby answer God's plea inspired through the lips of the prophet Jeremiah in Chapter 3, verse 4: "Wilt thou not from this time cry unto me, My father, thou art the guide of my youth?"

SCRIPTURAL GUIDELINES

When one seeks God's guidance, however, he must be careful that he does not ask God to guide him in a choice that is already condemned in the Scripture. All too many times young people (and older ones alike) try to "tempt" God by placing certain stipulations on their requests for direction. For example, when young Louise asked God whether she should marry John, a member of an opposite faith, she made the stipulation that if she didn't become ill before breakfast that morning, she would assume her good health to mean that it was God's will for her to marry John. Of course, she did not become

ill and today she is paying for her mistake through her own life of discontent and mental anguish. "Can two walk together except they be agreed" (Amos 3:3)?

God demonstrates His disapproval of such inter-denominational marriages by His punishment against the whole earth in Noah's day when the people of God took wives of those of the heathen (Genesis 6). He further demonstrated His disapproval by pouring His wrath upon the children of Israel when they married outside the realm of God's people (Numbers 25 and Nehemiah 13). In the new scriptures, He gives a direct command to "be ye not unequally yoked together with unbelievers: for what fellowship hath righteousness with unrighteousness? and what communion hath light with darkness" (2 Corinthians 6:14)?

God also sets forth a command that "Thou shalt not commit adultery" (Exodus 20:14), and "... whosoever shall marry her that is divorced committeth adultery" (Matthew 5:32).

Such deviations from God's plan only serve to hamper or eliminate your service to Him, not to mention the unrest that it will inevitably create in your own life plus the confusion and insecurity it will bring to the lives of your children; but the converse is true when one really follows God's divine plan. Recently, I received a letter from one of my former high school students, now a college graduate, who was married just last August. Her testimony is so exemplary of what God will do if we allow Him to guide: "I'm really thankful that I waited upon God to


The program committee will be happy to receive suggestions for the program from any FYCers of FYC groups around the country.

A Lynn cries, "Materialism is wrong. Selfish people stop hoarding!"

A young radical writes his girlfriend:

"We radicals have a high casualty rate. We are the ones who get shot and hung and tarred and feathered and jailed and slandered and ridiculed and fired from our jobs and in every other way made as uncomfortable as possible. A certain percentage of us get killed. We radicals don't have the time for movies or concerts. We've been described as fanatics. We are. Our lives are dominated by one great overshadowing factor—the struggle for revolution. We radicals have a philosophy of life which no amount of money can buy. We have a cause to fight for, a definite purpose in life, and we subordinate our petty, personal selves into a great movement of humanity. And if our personal lives seem hard or our egos appear to suffer through subordination to the cause. then we are adequately compensated by the thought that each of us in his small way is helping do something to make a better world. There is one thing about which I am dead earnest, and that is the radical cause. It is my life, my business, my religion, my hobby, my sweetheart, my wife, my mistress, my bread and my meat. I work at it in the daytime and I dream of it at night. Its hold on me grows, not lessens, as time goes on. Therefore, I cannot carry on a friendship, a love affair, or even a conversation without relating to this force which both drives and guides my life. I evaluate people, books, ideas, actions, according to how they affect radical causes and by their attitudes toward it. I have already been in jail because of my ideas, and if necessary, I am ready to go before a firing squad."

The fiery sun sinks, and sets, gross darkness falls. With bitter tears I tell you he found an answer. Yes another lad found . . .

A way to wreck his life . . .

a strong delusion—lies

LSD

"free love"

mad pleasure

A way to end his life . . .

carbon monoxide

a bridge

a bullet

BUT, where were you when the bridge was walked, the key was turned, the trigger fingered? Where were you? Or did you even hear? Have you not felt the agony of our restless generation? Young people, Church of God young people, I ask you why? Why hasn't the "cup of water" been given when craved? Why haven't answers been given when truth was searched, when happiness longed for, when love sought? Why, oh why, did you let the sun sink and the darkness blind? Have you seen and heard and yet just don't care enough? Has your own experience with Go1 been so shallow that you have nothing to give, no compassion for others?

Are you just an altar-Christian, one who at each revival, each youth camp, each retreat, year after year, weeps bitterly in remorse and returns to the same slothway ways? The king of wisdom once said, "The desire of the slothful killeth him for his hands refuse to labour." Christianity is more than just hanging on. In other words, no matter how much you may desire to:

make entrance to God's kingdom, walk close to God, be of service to others, attain perfection, communicate with God, master His Word, attain happiness,

just having those desires will NOT bring them to you on a "silver platter." You must long for them with all your being, be a "go-getter," ask, seek, strive, search, and pursue!

Listen closely, my young friend. Your 15 to 20 years of "accumulated wisdom" is no match against your 5900-year-old adversary; he, a two-faced mastermind of treacherous traps, has made YOU his business, if you're confidently resting, sweat and toil on his part will make you his property. Cling to God! Peter gives the specifics, "And beside this, giving all diligence add to your faith virtue, and to virtue knowledge, and to knowledge temperance; and to temperance patience; and to patience godliness; and to godliness brotherly kindness; and to brotherly kindness charity. For if these things be in you, and abound, they make you that ye shall neither be barren nor unfruitful...for IF ye do these things, ye shall never fall."

Re-read the radical's letter—then dare yourself to ask . . .

Do I BELIEVE in God?

Am I as dedicated to God's cause as this man is to his cause?

Paul, Daniel and David were radicals of their day; they conformed to the "out group." Yet their testimonies don't at all give the impression that they led miserable or drab lives. To the contrary, David, a man who called God his "Exceeding Joy" confidently counsels: "Delight thyself in the Lord and he shall give thee the desires of thine heart."

Paul, a radical in every sense of the word, beseeches us as brethren to delight ourselves in the Lord by presenting our bodies a "living sacrifice," holy and acceptable unto God which is our reasonable service.

Time is ticking, present pleasures shall pass, your life, your only life is diminishing, one chance you have to fail.

Are you preparing?

Tough trials are promised.

Are you preparing?

Few will stand.

A fading cry may call.

plan my marriage and to send the person He has been preparing for me. It was well worth waiting for although it was very hard at times to wait." (Happy is he that hath the God of Jacob for his help..." [Psalm 146:5].)

This important prerequisite of Christians marrying Christians cannot be stressed enough. However, we must consider, too, that it is not enough just to find a Christian. Even Christians can have personality differences that make them incompatible as lifetime mates. But rather, one must consider all guidelines as set forth previously, and must seek always to "... prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God" (Romans 12:2).

CONTENTMENT

God's perfect plan for your life will be made clear if you will "...

in every thing by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God" (Philippians 4:6), and "pray without ceasing" (1 Thess. 5:17). Then season your prayers with an extra helping of patience so that you may "... let patience have her perfect work, that ye may be perfect and entire, wanting nothing" (James 1:4).

"Perfect"—"entire"—"wanting nothing"—for what more could one ask? God has a plan for you that would grant you this state of bliss. It is up to you to follow His plan—to seek His guidance—and to realize that "except the Lord build the house, they labour in vain that build it..." (Psalm 127:1).


