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EDITORIAL

pass against us.

We may feel that we have forgiven those who have wronged us and then ever so often meditate upon these wrongs that others have done to us. We may even go so far as to bring these things up in our conversation with others. I wonder if we would rejoice over the mercy of God if He would bring up our past sins at times and think of us in the light of them or even reveal these sins to those who do not know about them.

An Educated Ministry

FTEN WE hear people ridicule the idea of an educated ministry, and to support their scoffing at education for ministers they like to refer to the twelve apostles whom Jesus sent out to convert the people and bring the gospel of

the kingdom to the world.

years.

It may be true that when Jesus called these men to follow Him they were unlearned in the ways of the world and collegiate education; but they were far from being unlearned men when He sent them forth with the message. Let us examine the Biblical records and see if these things be true. If, as people generally claim. we find these men were ignorant and unlearned, then we shall say no more, for where the Bible speaks we will speak, and what cannot be proved by the Bible we should lay aside.

In Matthew, chapter 4, we read of the preparation of the Master for His work among the people. His fasting and praying to the Father immediately after His being baptized of John in Jordan. After this fast and His overcoming the temptations of the devil.

Nazareth and dwelt in Capernaum, where He began to preach. Here He came upon Peter and Andrew and He persuaded them to follow Him: then James and John followed immediately afterwards. This was in A. D. 26, according to the record. These four are definitely identified as having been called to follow Jesus in the beginning of His ministry. No doubt there were others who left all and followed Him at about the same time, but the record does not verify this nor identify others at this time according to the gospel as written by Matthew. Matthew was called in A. D. 31. as we find in chapter nine of this book, which, of course was some years after the calling of Peter, but Matthew was already an educated man so far as worldly learning is concerned.

In chapter ten we find that Jesus sent out the twelve, whose names were Peter; Andrew, his brother; James, the son of Zebedee, and John his brother; Philip; Bartholomew; Thomas; Matthew, the publican; James, the son of Alphæus; Lebbæus, whose surname was Thaddæus: Simon. the Canaanite; and Judas Iscariot.

Please notice that these men were not called into their apostleship until the year 31 A. D. Some of these men had been with our Lord since A. D. 26, and had been trained for their work under the He learned of the imprisonment tutorship of the world's greatest of John and He went down to teacher, Jesus. Would you call a

man ignorant who had been in school under a special tutor like Jesus for some four to five years? If these were ignorant men, unlearned and raw, then I would like to ask what it would take to educate them. If we had men in the ministry now who had been with Jesus personally for that long a time, being instructed in the gospel by so great a teacher and schooled in the methods of evangelism through practical observation and experience, then we would not dare to call them ignorant and unlearned. Peter was no longer the ignorant fisherman that he was when Jesus called him from his nets. Andrew, also, had been through many experiences with his Master Teacher and had become acquainted with the methods of preaching which his Lord had used. He had learned something of his Master which most people of today have not the privilege of learning.

Perhaps you may say that one's experience in the Lord as of to-day would be comparable with that which these men had with Him personally, but on second thought anyone would admit that those who were with Him in person had many advantages over one today who has walked only by faith and learned of Him through the printed page.

But with all the experiences these men had with Jesus prior to their going out on their own, they needed further instructions after they returned to Him, for they had met with problems they were unable to solve. They had met with difficulties which they were unable to surmount, and when they came back to the Mas-

ter they received further instructions, even until Jesus went away and left them.

In A. D. 33, we find the Master Teacher going away and leaving behind Him those men whom He had commissioned to preach the gospel. Several of them at least had been through seven years of schooling with Him that were much superior to any college training we can give to men nowadays. Contrary to the general belief. Jesus was with these men for seven years, teaching them in the ways of evangelism and preparing them for the ministry. We know that Peter, Andrew, James, and John had this seven years of training, others may have had, while Matthew had much less of it. If you doubt this statement relative to the time period of Jesus with His disciples, please check the chronology as given at the top of the page in your Bibles. He was baptized in A. D. 25 and crucified in A. D. 33, if the chronology given is dependable. Jesus was about thirty years of age when He was baptized, but the year A. D. 1 was four years in error due to calculations of them who first began to count time from the birth of Christ, but this same error is carried through when dates were given, and it is still carried on our present calendars.

Now, when Matthias was chosen for the apostleship, the Scriptures make it plain that he must come from this same school with all this training, for they would not have an ignorant man for this place. Please read Acts 1:21, 22.

As war hysteria engulfs our nation, people are being warned to be on guard against an atomic bomb raid. Even schools are giving drills to prepare the children against such terror.

As I hear and read about these warnings, I think of the warning question that Isaiah put before his people, "Watchman, what of the night? Watchman, what of

the night?" Isa. 21:11.

Surely, we are entering a night of terror for those who are unprepared for Christ's coming—a night so black that we cannot find our way without the light of the Holy Spirit's guidance. Many Christians are letting the spiritual light die out of their lives and are already groping in darkness.

Paul feared that his soul would be lost unless he kept in constant communion with Christ In 1 Cor. 9:27 he wrote, "But I keep under my body, and bring it into subjection: lest that by any means, when I have preached to others, I myself should be a castaway."

If a great Christian like Paul, who had suffered near death many times, knew his need for daily communion with Christ, how much more should we be

guard against evil?

One day a foot-weary traveler was nearing the end of his journey when he paused at the top of a hill to gaze at the golden sunset in the west. "Over there on yonder mountain is my home," he said in meditation. "I'll take the trail across the canyon, below me and be there much sooner."

However, before he reached the winding creek, the heavy darkness made the trail invisible. On one side of the trail was a high bluff, and he knew that an uncertain step would be fatal. Picking up a long stick, he carefully tested the way ahead of him before taking steps. It was a slow, discouraging way to travel, but the stick guarded him from probable death.

As we journey through life;. we, too, will tread near high-Unless we stay inprecipices. communion with Christ through prayer, spiritual darkness will overtake us there just as darkness of night overtook the traveler, but we also have a guide to guard us from the dangers of eternal death-the Word of God. There are times when we will have to go slowly, carefully searching for the trail through the thorns and rubbish, but we can always be sure of Christ, our

guide. Keep remembering His promise, ". . . I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee." Hebrews 13:5.

As the weary traveler climbed the last hill to his old home, he sometimes wandered out of the trail. Thorns and briars tore at his flesh, but through the darkness he could see the faint glow of a light through a small window. That ray of light gave him courage to finish his journey, for he knew that safe within the humble walls a "welcome home" awaited him.

In our spiritual journey as we climb the rugged hill, thorns of jealousy, envy, and strife tear at our every act for Christ; yet those wounds alone cannot kill if we keep faith in Christ and continue to love those who do evil. To live above the worrying demons that surround us, we must keep our spiritual eyes open toward the light of Christ before us and always be on guard against Satan's enticements.

The Call and Return of the Jews

M

ANY BIBLE prophecies are now being fulfilled in the world today.

We can see around us that people and nations are all struggling one fighting against the other. Of all the people and nations there is one people and nation that is now very outstanding in history for its great progress. These people are the Jews. They have gathered together at Jerusalem and throughout Palestine to set themselves up as a separate nation. The prophet Ezekiel was one who said this would come to pass.

This movement of the regathering of Israel to Palestine was started by Theodor Herzl and some other Jews in the 1880's. Herzl organized a world Zionist Organization, and the first Zionist Congress met in 1897. From the time of the first Zionist Congress to 1917 there were only about 65,000 Jews who had managed to move to Palestine.

Then on November 2, 1917, during the first world war there was an agreement that the British would help the Jews get the land of Palestine if they helped England with the war against Germany. Part of this agreement was the Balfour Declaration. This greatly inspired the Jews to return to Palestine.

In 1919 Britain was given a mandate by the League of Nations. This gave Britain the right to provide government and police the land of Palestine, which she had promised to the Jews. Many of the wealthy Jews bought the land from the Arabs for \$200.00 an acre and began to move to Palestine. These were men that started to make Palestine a self-supporting country.

In the year 1936 the world saw that war was coming. Britain was in need of the oil resources of the East which were under the control of the Arab states. The British now favored the Arabs and forgot about the Jews. In 1939 Britain issued a White Paper which restricted Jewish immigration into Palestine to 75,000 more.

Thousands of Jews in other countries were being tortured and killed. This oppression caused the Jews to flee to their homeland,

Dear Granddaughter,

There is reason to be very courageous in living for our heavenly Father's kingdom.

Our first meeting with the Ahiaba Church of God made us glad we had come. Our welcome, though not boisterous, was sincere and in spite of the fact every word had to be translated into the Iboe language, we were made to feel we were among friends and brethren.

Naturally the customs are very different. We were probably as wide-eyed at the colorful native costumes and quaint manners as they were at our strange appearance. We were especially thrilled at the singing which was good four-part harmony. These people love music and enter into it wholeheartedly. I predict busy times for the organ and accordion. We couldn't understand the words but some of the tunes were familiar and our hearts joined in praise and worship. The only accompaniment was a bell struck in time to the music.

After the introductions my husband spoke briefly as to our mission here. Their acquaintance with white missionaries has not always been pleasant and they are prone to be a bit suspicious toward strangers. There are 130 members of this local church. Bro. Tikili's work speaks highly of his zeal and our acquaintance strengthens our faith in his loyalty to the Church of God. The work is well organized and he is

highly respected by the workers. All during the ten years since he established this mission, a school has been in operation. Despite the fact that insufficient means has meant inadequate equipment, the school is attracting students because of its program of instruction. A lawyer in Aba who was educated in Cambridge, England, sends his children out here in preference to the other government and mission schools in Aba. A small tuition fee from students pays the nine teachers. In addition to regular studies, Bible classes are conducted as a part of the course of study. Elder Tikili and his staff have done remarkably well, although laboring under such difficulties as inadequate seating, few desks, no cupboards, etc. With help in getting such basic requirements this school can qualify for a government grant of finance which will mean a great deal. There are no free schools in Africa, nor compulsory school laws, so illiteracy predominates and with it the lowest standards of living. Knowledge of the sort taught in this school is a death blow to heathenism and the need for support cannot be overestimated. This is the most direct way of teaching the people. Teaching the gospel to those who cannot read a Bible in any lan-

guage is a long and slow process for the subject must be told, told. and retold. . . in native vernacular. English is taught in this school and through Christian education comes a higher standard of life. Bro. Tikili, a capable teacher with past experience in both government and mission schools, realizes the need for the schooling of his people and is trying desperately to get this work on a level for government recognition and regular aid. So far our organization has not contributed to this work, but now is the hour! The monthly allowance sent heretofore has been meager pay for the overseer and evangelists and native contributions have built the school, although it is a recognized Church of God school.

The demands for contributions have been many, but we feel that we may call for help without hesitation. Few, if any, have ever made a REAL sacrifice for mission work. You don't know poverty and the kind of existence experienced here. If we are to do the job you have sent us to do we must have help. Can you do without the new refrigerator? (We have none and a cool drink of this boiled water would seem heavenly.) Could a new stove wait? (Ours is an open fire between rocks.) This is not an appeal to bring out the martyr, but an attempt to share with you the joy of sacrificing that others may have a chance at what we consider everyone's heritage. Let's put first things first and check up once in awhile to see that our sense of values is still functioning properly. Remember, only what's done for Christ will last.

We will be glad to answer any questions you may have relative to the work here and certainly letters from "home" are most welcome. Our address is Box 84, Aba. Nigeria, W. Africa.

But where there are few Y.P. or even no Y.P., we suggest that you organize a Y.P. group anyway and carry on the regular programs as found in the Herald and Call, all the time praying for the Lord to send you some young people, and He will.

SUGGESTED ORDER FOR MEETINGS— Meetings will be of two types, devotional and business. Devotional (or regular Y.P. meetings) should be conducted on either Friday night or Sabbath afternoon. All business meetings for the purpose of making plans for things other

Provide entertainment. social gatherings and group outings or picnics to stimulate fellowship. have accompanied with us all the time that the Lord Jesus went in and out among us, beginning from the baptism of John, unto that same day that he was taken up from us, must one be ordained to be a witness with us of his resurrection."

This shows definitely that no neophite was to be entrusted with so important a work as that which lay before them. No one ignorant or unlearned was to be commissioned with the rest of the apostles to preach this wonderful gospel.

When later on Jesus saw fit to call a nother to be an apostle unto the gentiles He called Paul, who was one of the best educated of all the apostles, for he had studied at the feet of Gamaliel, one of the best teachers of that age. Paul was well versed in the law, as his letters reveal, and all he lacked was that touch

of the Master's hand. He needed to be converted to Christ and prepared by the revelation of the Holy Spirit before he was a fit vessel for the Master's use.

Paul's case is a testimony to the fact that an education is not all that is needed to make an evangelist for the Master. He had to know the Lord through an experience of grace that would open his eyes to the realities of Christ and His gospel. He had to have that personal touch of the Master and also instruction from one who had been with the Lord Jesus. That was why, after Jesus knocked him down on the way to Damascus, Paul was told to go to a certain evangelist, and there it would be told him what he must do. There were instructions that were necessary from one who had been with the Lord which were absolutely essential for Paul's preparation for his calling. Had the Lord prepared him wholly for the ministry, there would have been no reason why he should have sought out this man of God for instructions.

In all these things we find out something of the divine plan of our Master who calls men into His service. There are many things which are necessary for one to consider in his preparation for the ministry of the Lord.

Again, let us call to your attention the fact that even though those eleven men whom Jesus left with this wonderful commission to preach the gospel, men whom he had trained for all those years in the knowledge of the Lord and with all their personal experiences and their observations of the ways and means which their Master had used in

persuading men to be reconciled unto the Father, Jesus commanded them to wait at Jerusalem until they be endowed with power. This power came through their experience on the day of pentecost when the Holy Spirit descended upon them and gave them power to witness, both at Jerusalem and unto the uttermost parts of the earth.

May we submit to you that there are many men today whom we suspect of having launched out on a mission to preach the gospel who have not waited for this power. They have not called upon the Lord and received as yet this Holy Spirit which is so very necessary for witnessing for Jesus. That is why their sermons are so dry and uninspiring. They are struggling under their own power and have not the power of the Holy Spirit. Perhaps they have not yet been born from above.

We are opening a college at Stanberry, Mo., to train young men and women for the gospel service. We hope to give the educational training which is so badly needed, for there is nothing much more pitiful than to see some dear brother trying to preach the gospel when he cannot pronounce the simplest words of the Bible when trying to read his Scriptures. We would not pretend to say that his work will be a failure, but there are places where such a man could not go and do effective work. There may be one who might be able to preach a good sermon and then spoil his influence when he tries to write a letter and cannot do his work justice in his writing, or another who cannot write an

article for our religious papers because of a lack of education. If you will consult any of the men who are trying to carry on in the work of the Lord under such handicaps they will tell you in terms that you will be able to understand that one should not neglect the advantages of an education when such may be obtained.

The work of the early Church in our times may have been carried on successfully by men who were pioneers and without much education, but the times have changed, and the Church of God must keep abreast of the times in the sending of men out to represent them, and if we do not prepare our evangelists with something of a better education than our fathers had, we will find ourselves very much handicapped in this present world. We must prepare our ministers so they can meet other men sent out from other organizations and not be embarrassed because of a lack of education.

In conclusion, let us heed the admonition which Paul gave to Timothy in 2 Tim. 2:15: "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

Once more, let us remind you that the book learning which you may receive at Midwest Theological Seminary is not going to be sufficient to prepare you for the ministry, but we hope to be able to provide a situation where the earnest seeker for higher learning will also find this power with God that is so necessary for the preparation of a well equipped

minister. The spiritual training will not be neglected.

but when they arrived in their homeland, Palestine, they found Arabs occupying the land. As more Jews came, the Arabs began fighting to drive them out. Even though the Jews were outnumbered ten to one, God was for their side and they were victorious over the Arabs.

On May 14, 1948, the Jews declared their independence as a nation. The Arabs again went against the Jews to drive them out of Palestine, but again God was with the Jews and the Arabs failed.
