Is Life Just For Fun?

What is it that everyone wants out of life? Young people want it just as much as any, for youth is full of ambition, hope and wants.

Is there one word that can describe or reveal what all people want out of life? How many have it? If it is scarce, how can it be obtained? Is it costly? Is it worth the price? One other question: Should we let our desires or wants run rampant, grow into a mountain and push us around like an elephant might push a calf around?

That one word might be either satisfaction or happiness. This is a broad way to put it, but we want to cover a lot of ground in short order.

There are innumerable ways in which people try to find happiness-or at least what they think is happiness. Many have the idea that life is just for fun—that is as far as they are concerned. They seem to thing their wants come first, often regardless of other people, or what is fair and square. They never analyze their wants (which are often hankerings) to see if they are justified in the sight of righteousness. They want what they want and they want it. Their wants run wild and any restraint is gone with the wind. Some go so far as to commit crimes in vain attempts to gain what they think will satisfy their wants (or hankerings). Some are caught; some live in secret sin.

Christian young people confine their wants to things compatible with the Christian life. It takes prayer to do this—"bringing into captivity every thought [including our wishes] to the obedience of Christ" (2 Cor. 10:5). Does this mean restriction short of happiness? Indeed not, for the things restricted are those which are not good for anyone.

God wants His people to be happy. "Happy is he that hath the God of Jacob for his help, whose hope is in the Lord his help" (Ps. 146:5). "Happy is the man that findeth wisdom, and the man that getteth understanding" (Prov. 3:13). The man of understanding knows that sin can bring a momentary and superficial kind of happiness. A life pleasing to God is the only life in which true happiness can be found. Just look about you and see if those in sin are really as happy and satisfied as those you know who are followers of the Master. Which meet the problems of life with the most calmness and assurance? Which know where to turn for help in times of sorrow or deep trouble?

Life has a meaning. It is not just for fun. Life didn't just happen without cause or purpose. Life is for the purpose of testing us, fitting us for the eternal beyond where there will be joy evermore. This does not mean there is to be no happiness along the way. Israel would have found much satisfaction out of life on their way to Canaan had they trusted God rather than continually murmured.

As we read the Bible we understand that life has a purpose. We are caretakers for God in His vineyard. To one is given one talent, to another five, and another ten. As we put these to work for God we gain experience, and as Paul said, that which follows experience is hope, "And hope maketh not ashamed [for it gives us joy]; because of the love of God shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost which is given unto us" (Rom. 5:4, 5).

The greatest happiness we can find in life is out of the satisfaction of living for Christ, and committing all our ways into the hands of the loving heavenly Father. He knows what is best even if we may be prone to differ with Him on this point. Pray over all the desires of your heart, young folk. Ask God to direct your ambitions in His way. Then read Deut. 32:29 and 5:29, ". . . that it might be well with thee . . ." Remember this: "For the Lord God is a sun and shield: the Lord will give grace and glory: no good thing will he withhold from them that walk uprightly" Ps. 84:11.

Please Explain ...

Question: Does 2 Corinthians 3: 14 mean that there is a veil over the eyes of all who read the Old Testament?

Reply: First it should be explained that the term "old testament" used here, and other places in the Bible does not mean the books from Genesis to Malachi. It means the old covenant God made with Israel. It was agreed to by Israel in Exodus 19, and ratified by blood as noted in Exodus 24.

All of the terms, laws and regulations were not fully given at that very time, but Israel agreed to do all God said.

Beyond Moses, the prophets, strictly speaking, are not part of the old covenant; neither is the

Psalms, Proverbs, etc.

Notice in 2 Corinthians 3:15 it reads, "But even unto this day, when Moses is read, the veil is upon their hearts." When what is read? Moses wrote only a small

part of the old Scriptures.

The veil upon 'their hearts," as the context shows, refers to blinded Israel. They became so sinful they could not see that their system of worship pointed to Christ. When Jesus came unto His own, had they accepted Him they would have seen the meaning of their typical services—that it was a shadowy system, foreshadowing Christ.

We, who know Christ as the true lamb of God, see through the system of shadows. There is no veil upon our hearts in reading Moses' writings. Much of it helps us understand the plan of salva-

tion better.

We might add that although the old covenant, the old agreement with Israel, and along with it the shadows of things to come, expired and was done away, does not mean that every standard of righteousness before Christ was abolished. Not at all - for why, as an example, would there be any need whatsoever of abolishing the Ten Commandments? Why would they even need any changing whatsoever? In Romans 7:12 Paul, writing in this dispensation of grace, says the law is holy, just and good. We conclude then that holy, good and just people would naturally love just such a law.-L. C.

He placed in man the natural instinct to want companionship as he does along life's pathway, and that desire becomes remarkably vivid in any individual's life, beginning early in childhood and continuing throughout life.

The water was made in such a way that it reflects one's face when one looks into it; likewise, man is made so that one man's heart will answer another man's; that is, one man may supply the comfort or sympathy that another one wants (Proverbs 27:19).

Even infants possess a desire for friendship. Babes only a few weeks old learn that life is much more enjoyable if they have someone giving notice to them as they lie in their cribs. We say they are spoiled, but God has made them that way.

David and Jonathan enjoyed the experience of a perfect friend-ship, an affection growing out of mutual good will. Each one was seeking the good of the other and not himself. Their souls were "knit" together as the Scriptures say (1 Sam. 18:1) because Jonathan loved David as his own soul, and both were comforted in the companionship of the other.

The trials of this life are made much easier for those who have a friend, for "Two are better than one . . . for if they fall, the one will lift his fellow . . ." (Eccl. 4: 9, 10). Yet, if one is a good firm piece and the other is a softer piece, then the one of poorer quality will receive all the wearing off because it cannot withstand the friction from the one made of better material.
