# GUEST EDITORIAL GUMITIS

Gumitis is an affliction that has become quite prevalent in the twentieth century. It attacks both young and old, although it is seldom seen in children under one year. Symptoms are a steady rotating motion of the lower jaw, occasional opening of the mouth, and frequent snapping and smacking sounds emanating from the lips.

Certain animals of the ruminant varieties are also given to similar chewing, but it is done quietly and less fervently than the chewing that is a symptom of gumitis in humans. In ruminants it is a natural process necessary to the proper digestion of food, but in humans it is artificially produced by the introduction of a small wad of rubber-like material, artificially flavored with mint, wintergreen, cinnamon or cloves.

It is supposed that the chew-

ing of gum produces sweeter breath and aids in the digestion of foods. Actually it produces tiredness of the jaw, excessive mouth sugar which induces tooth decay, and aggravation of spirit for those in proximity to the addict.

Gumitis is an obnoxious disease, but addicts become a special burden when they attend church. Many children are started on the road to gum addiction (gumitis) by parents who give them small pieces of chicle to keep them quiet in church. Frequently the results are embarrassing to the parents when mastication produces unusually weird sound effects, or when the gummy substance is parked on the seats and becomes attached to the clothing of others in attendance.

Gumitis sufferers in church frequently interfere with the enjoyment of the sermon, for those who sit near to them find it difficult to understand the minister. They will get similar results when they turn on a radio speaker during a thunderstorm, and try to filter his voice from the static. The wagging jaws of the gumitis sufferers make it appear that there are dozens of people taking part in the presentation of the message, but the sounds are quite distressing to non-sufferers.

Gumitis, like alcoholism, is curable, but the treatment is sometimes severe. It requires an abundance of patience on the part of the addict, along with unshakable determination to be rid of the dread disease which addiction produces. It is highly recommended that sufferers begin their treatment by frequent periods of abstinence, such as during the

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# Whose Side Are You On?

Did you read the short fourparagraph item in a recent issue of the *Herald and Call* entitled "Only 'Religion' permits it"?

We refer to this because several articles have come to your editor's desk in the last few weeks vainly attempting to abolish the law of God—the Ten Commandments.

It is not the spirit of Christianity that would eradicate God's law. "Imagine our school teachers telling the students that the Ten Commandments had been abolished and urging them to live in accordance with such an idea! Imagine our police force declaring that the Ten Commandments had been wiped out of existence. and practicing such an idea! Imagine a Judge in a court of law [and why have judges if there is no law?] declaring that the Ten Commandments had been erased as Mosaic, out of date and no good for this age!"

What about the preachers who claim the Ten Commandments were abolished? Do they practice what they preach? They dare not! And who are they pals with in this respect?

Young folks, the devil is working hard to get people to disregard and violate the law of God—which law is holy, just, good, and spiritual (Rom. 7). There is no doubt that the devil hates God's moral law, and he has many helpers, too. They are no better than Communists in this respect.

One of the articles referred to, in speaking of Jesus, says, "As the Lord of the Sabbath He kept it perfectly, as He kept all the Law, and by His death and resurrection put an end to it as He did to all the Law, in that He thus brought in the age and dispensation of Grace and Christianity."

This writer has apparently failed to study and rightly divide the Word of truth, as Paul instructed Timothy to do. The Law of God on tables of stone was not a law of shadows like many of the laws which God gave Moses to write in a book. Many fail to rightly divide the Word at this point.

In the February 14 issue of the Herald & Call we quoted an article from Christian Fellowship Class News by A. A. Sorensen, Chaplin of the prison at Joliet, Illinois. Could you imagine him holding such a position if he contended that the Moral Law, the Ten Commandments, had been abolished! He wrote: "Any statement or question which infers that, because we are under Grace. we are no longer responsible to the moral law, is based on an erroneous concept and indicates, not only a misunderstanding of the moral law, but also a misunderstanding of the great doctrine of Grace itself. . . . Contrary to the teaching of some, the Old Testament is full of the Doctrine of Grace, and men were saved by looking forward in faith to Calvary just as we are now saved by looking back to Calvary and accepting by Faith the finished work of Christ upon the cross. . . In His teachings, Jesus repeated

the outstanding precepts of the moral law and intensified these obligations by demanding internal as well as external conformity. (See for example Matt. 5:27, 28)."

There is no reason on earth why the Ten commandments should be abolished. It is almost impossible to imagine what this world would be like if all people made every possible effort in deed and in spirit to show that they considered the Decalog as being no good for man today.

The noted Evangelist Billy Graham says that the moral law is summed up in the Ten Commandments. Would he say that about an abolished law? Should he be denounced as a false prophet because he upholds this sacred law? (We do not suppose he understands the fourth precept as we do, but he isn't so foolish as to trample under foot all ten precepts just to get rid of one.)

We were pleased to read in a late newspaper that "30,000 Youths Take Pledge in Battle on Delinquency" in Chicago. One girl who had gotten into trouble said, "You have to learn to be a good citizen and live by the Ten Commandments. It is a pity that these simple rules cannot be taught effectively by parents in their own homes."—St. Joseph News Press.

Some preachers need to take this girl's advice instead of tearing down the moral law, unless they are on the side of lawlessness and sin!

Possibly some who "make void the law" and are out of harmony with Paul who said, "Yea, we establish the law" (Rom. 3:31), may contradict their own teaching by saying that they do not mean it is wrong to steal and covet, and so forth. How inconsistent will

human beings get? If Jesus' death "put an end to it...all the law," what Bible authority would anyone have to reinstate it as it was? Didn't Paul say, "For if I build again the things which I destroyed, I make myself a transgressor"? (Gal. 2:18). Does it show wisdom and intelligence to say out of one side of the mouth that all the law was abolished, and then from the other side say that most of it should be dug up, slyly brought in under some name or manner, and kept?

One of these articles referred to in our second paragraph says, "These Ten Commandments were afterwards written on two tables of stone, by the hand of Moses, [italics ours] at the command of Jehovah (Exod. 34:1, 5, 27)." Let us now see the fact of the matter.

Verse one says, "And the Lord said unto Moses, Hew thee two tables of stone like unto the first: and I will write upon these tables the words that were in the first tables, which thou breakest." How could this be made clearer that God, not Moses, wrote on the second tables of stone, as He said. (See also Deut. 10:1-2). Then in the following verses of Exodus 34 God gave other rules and regulations which Moses wrote.

When we read in verse 27, "And the Lord said unto Moses, Write thou these words," He could not have referred to the Ten Commandments without contradicting verse one. When it says, "And he wrote upon the tables . . ." in order to avoid a contradiction we must conclude that the "he" refers to God. The center column reference for "he" gives Ex. 31: 18, ". . . written with the finger

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# Juvenile Delinquency?

HAT must we do to lessen juvenile delinquency in our world today? This is

a question that confronts many parents. Where must we begin in order to stop this awful epidemic that has spread into many homes across the nation?

This is not a new story! I believe if it were, we would do more about it. We have read of occasions where a sudden catastrophe struck and immediately something was done to try and help the situation.

I think juvenile delinquency has crept upon our nation as cancer has crept upon some of our people. The beginning of juvenile delinquency is sometimes hard to determine, just as is the beginning of cancer. We must act soon, or delinquency will become more prevalent as the days pass.

If anyone should be doing something about it, it should be us who profess to be Christians! " . . . Am I my brother's keeper?" (Gen. 4:9). If we are, why not do as we believe the Scriptures teach! Just consider-how would you have received the gospel if someone had not been considerate and thoughtful enough to bring the gospel to you, or to invite you to church so that you could hear the gospel and receive the Lord as your personal Savior?

I know that "every word of God is pure" (Prov. 30:5). And since "train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old he will not depart from it" is true, then doesn't the fault lie

mostly with the parents? Parents who do not recognize their responsibility in rearing their children, should wake up to the truth of the fact and teach the children what way to go and what way not to go!

It has been proved by some men, that whatever a child has been taught before school age will greatly affect his later life. We find this among the Catholic people. They impress heavily upon the little minds their doctrine and belief, and seldom do you find a child of strong Catholic parents departing from their faith. What do they do? They teach their children from infancy. What do we do? We use an excuse oftentimes for not teaching children when they are small. Each one of us has a great responsibility to carry, whether we are young or old.

In the "back of your minds," I am sure, that most of you young people expect to be married someday and later be parents. This is not unreasonable thinking either, because God created mankind to have that desire in life. However, besides all the happiness you may enjoy in having a home and rearing children, you also have a responsibility before God.

Young men are admonished to be sober minded, which I consider to have a twofold meaning: (1) to be sober from the drink of alcohol, (2) to be sober in mind; to be sincere. They are exhorted to show themselves to be a pattern of good works.

Especially among the worldly group of teen-age boys there is the attitude that the use of vulgar language is an accepted way of showing that they are grownup; but the Word admonishes the young men to have "sound speech, that cannot be condemned . . ." (Titus 2:8). We know that vulgar language is to be condemned and, therefore, it is wrong to use.

Fathers are exhorted in the Word thus: "And, ye fathers, provoke not your children to wrath: but bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord" (Eph. 6:4). In the cases of some fathers, if the Word were written according to their works, it would read, "And, ye fathers provoke not your children to wrath; but let them indulge in the pleasures of this world." If boys and girls were reared in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, these juvenile cases would not exist in such a large measure as they do.

Most of the trouble lies with parents concerning this juvenile delinquency. If the motto, "Spare the rod and spoil the child" were put into effect in all homes, then we would find different results! The Word of God says, "He that spareth his rod hateth his son: but he that loveth him chasteneth him betimes" (Prov .13:24); "Correct thy son, and he shall give thee rest; yea, he shall give delight unto thy soul" (Prov. 29: 17). If fathers and mothers would correct their children, it would save countless heartaches years later.

The women must not be forgotten even though they are the weaker sex. The Lord does not let this be an excuse for not taking responsibility in the home, and in the church. The Bible says,

"The aged women likewise, that they be in behavior as becometh holiness, not false accusers, not given to much wine, teachers of good things; that they may teach the young women to be sober, to love their husbands, to love their children, to be discreet, chaste, keepers at home, good, obedient to their own husbands, that the word of God be not blasphemed" (Titus 2:3-5). If we actually take this to heart, this covers a lot of territory.

The aged women were admonished to teach the young women how to do things and how to handle the things of the home. Yet, we find so many young wives who do not know how to approach problems and this causes friction within the home. There are many divorces among young married people because their fathers and mothers did not teach them the responsibilities of home life when

they were children.

The children are admonished in the Word, "Honour thy father and mother; which is the first commandment with promise" (Eph. 6:2). What is that promise? It is, ". . . that thy days may be long upon the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee" (Ex. 20:12). They are also admonished in the Word, "Children, obey your parents in the Lord: for this is right" (Eph. 6:1). Many times the children would rather have it written this way: "Children, obey your parents in the Lord: as long as you think it is right."

There are other things that could be mentioned concerning the duties and responsibilities which each individual must share in order to lessen juvenile delinquency and build up our na-

# The Grace of God

HE nature of grace is almost unbelievable to the believer. Its depths are

hard to fathom, but the grace of God is exceedingly precious to

God's people.

God says, "I am gracious" (Ex. 22:17). I "will be gracious to whom I will be gracious, and will show mercy on whom I will shew mercy" (Ex. 33:19). The grace of God is the "unmerited favor" that God shows toward sinful man. It is God's grace, mercy, love and tender compassion that gives sinful man the chance to come back from sin and destruction. Grace has extended to man salvation and eternal life. The law reveals iniquity, condemns man to death; grace provides a righteousness beyond the power of man to attain otherwise. The works of the law cannot save man; the grace of God in Christ alone provides man's redemption. "That in the ages to come he might shew the exceeding riches of his grace in his kindness toward us through Christ Jesus. For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: not of works, lest any man should boast" (Eph. 2:7-9).

"But after that the kindness and love of God our Saviour toward man appeared, not by works of righteousness which we have done. but according to his mercy he saved us, by the washing of regeneration, and renewing of the Holy Ghost" (Titus 3:4, 5).

The recipients of God's grace

are those who believe in God and strive to please Him by doing His will. God's grace is extended to all. He says, "And the Spirit and the bride say Come. And let him that heareth say, Come. And let him that is athirst come. And whosoever will, let him take the water of life freely" (Rev. 22: 17). "Whosoever will" may be a recipient of God's grace. They must come to God and be "accepted in the beloved. In whom we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of sins, according to the riches of grace" (Eph. 1:6, 7).

"The grace of God . . . bringeth

salvation" (Titus 2:11).

"But we believe that through the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ we shall be saved . . ." (Acts 15: 11).

We are "justified freely by his grace" (Rom. 3:24).

Our daily strength to meet the hours of need, and to comfort us, come to us through the grace of God. Paul was troubled by a thorn in the flesh and besought the Lord that it might depart from him. "And he said unto me, My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness." After Paul heard this he said, "Most gladly therefore will I rather glory in my infirmities, that the power of Christ may rest upon me" (See 2 Cor.

Paul never ceased to thank God for His mercy. He said he was the least of the apostles because he

had persecuted the church of God, but he said, "by the grace of God I am what I am: and his grace which was bestowed upon me was not in vain; but I laboured more abundantly than they all: yet not I, but the grace of God which was with me" (1 Cor. 15:10).

Paul doesn't take any credit for his successful ministry, but gave the credit and thanks to God.

We could do well to strive as diligently for our Lord as did Paul. We should never cease giving thanks to God for His mercy that saves, keeps, and empowers us to live for Him. We should not remain static in the virtues of the Christian life, but should "grow in grace, and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ" (2 Peter 3:18).
