
Phototypesetting Takes Over!



The Redactron editing typewriter and the Singer phototypesetter pictured above have brought considerable change to the Bible Advocate Press. The Redactron is used to record all manuscript on magnetic tape cassettes, and the phototypesetter reads the electronic recordings on the tapes and sets type by photo process.

This equipment has increased the selection of type styles and type sizes available to the B.A.P. printing operation. A font of type (a complete arrangement of 92 letters, figures and symbols in one style) for this system costs much less than for the Linotype, and the type can be set in 15 different sizes from a single font. The 29 fonts which have been purchased offer a very fine selection.

The investment for this equipment has already brought about pointed improvements in the typesetting operation. It holds promises for many more things in the future.

If the machines listed above, along with a headliner and photo paper processer had been purchased a few months earlier, the composite cost would have been over \$45,000. However, unusual events made the equipment available for \$28,500! The Lord has been good!

The Equipment Improvement Program depends on your help. The \$70,000 goal will finish paying for the equipment already purchased, and provide funds for automated bindery and packaging machines and other urgently needed items. By March 31, \$15,000 had been received. With God's blessing, and the generous help of concerned brethren, the goal will be reached during 1976.



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



BEARING ONE ANOTHER'S BURDENS

The apostle Paul, a man who was greatly burdened for the needs of others, made this remark, "... the members should have the same care one for another. And whether one member suffer, all the members suffer with it; or one member be honoured, all the members rejoice with it" (I Corinthians 12:25, 26).

It is not hard to understand the fact that when we get sick or suffer an accident the whole body is affected. It may be harder to understand how the problems one church member suffers can hurt others, but that is the message Paul intended for he said further; "Now ye are the body of Christ, and members in particular" (verse 27). He was comparing the human body to the body of the church.

The Church of God (7th Day) has demonstrated we have the "same care one for another" in a remarkable way. Although the brethren in Guatemala are many miles away, and almost totally unknown on a personal basis, the church has responded to their physical needs generously. Offerings have been contributed until a total of \$21,000 has been sent to alleviate their suffering as a result of the devastating earthquake they experienced. (Continued on page 23)

MINISTERIAL TRAINING CENTER

Ray Straub, Director

The Church of God (Seventh Day) will experience a meaningful milestone this coming summer! The Ministerial Training Program will be moved from Stanberry, Missouri, to Denver, Colorado.

The change in location will introduce a new approach. Courses will be offered on the postgraduate level. Faculty trainees will be sponsored by the church to prepare them to teach on the higher level. The school will be known as the Ministerial Training Center (MTC).

The questions and answers which follow provide an introduction to the new Ministerial Training Center of the Church of God (Seventh Day).

Question: Why are you seeking to train college graduates instead of high school graduates?

Answer: The higher level of education throughout the church demands a better educated leadership. The training center will enroll more mature, better educated students. This will elevate the standard and quality of our ministry. There are only a few professional fields for which one can adequately train with four years of college work.

Q: How many years of training will be added to college work?

A. Eventually, three years, including internship.

Q. What do you mean, "including internship"?

A. A trainee will be eligible to apply for an internship after six quarters (two years) of postgraduate studies. If he qualifies, he will be assigned an internship his second summer at MTC. He will serve approximately six months in the field before returning for two additional quarters of classroom work, after which he will be eligible for assignment. This change will extend the ministerial training by only two years.

Q: Why bring an intern back to the classroom?

A: Field experience will reveal needs for further studies in certain areas. Actual field work, integrated with classroom study is a valuable procedure followed by many professions. In some cases returning interns may teach a class. Having students coming in from the field will give the Center constant contact with the field.

Q: Do you think that ministerial trainees will stay with the program for that long?

A: Yes. They will enter knowing how extensive their training will be. The demands for more education are well known. College classes may be taken near home and in areas where costs can be minimized. In some cases the trainee who attends college near home will actually be gone a shorter term. The church has no alternative to requiring more training.

Q: Do we need a more educated minister, or a more dedicated one?

A: We need both. One is not the alternative to the other. Logically, those who concentrate longer in preparation will be more dedicated as well as better educated.

Q: At what point are you interested in identifying a prospective minister?

A: While he is in high school.

Q: Why so early?

A: Colleges and college courses are selected then. We would appreciate an opportunity to offer suggestions for majors and other courses which will offer the best foundation for further specialized ministerial training.

Q: Will there be any advantage in attending a Bible college?

A: Not particularly. We recommend a liberal arts course. Bible classes will be taught at MTC.

Q: Will a degree be a requirement to enter MTC?

A: Generally, yes. Consideration will be given to special cases. Applicants will receive attention on an individual basis.


Q: What will happen to Midwest Bible College in Stanberry?

A: It is scheduled to terminate classroom instruction at the end of the present school term.

Q: What about students now attending there? They hardly anticipated the extension of their ministerial training.

A: Their needs and concerns will be respected. The new training center will keep faith and make approriate adjustments.

Q: What will happen to the build-

ings now housing Midwest Bible College?

A: A committee, appointed by the Executive Board, will be visiting Stanberry to study this matter and offer recommendations. The local church will be consulted. Their feelings and suggestions will help to offer a sense of direction.


Q: Is it possible that the dormitories can be retained to be used by students attending nearby schools?

A: Such possibilities have not been ruled out.

Q: What will happen to the equipment now at Stanberry?

A: It will be transferred to Denver.

Q: What facilities are available in Denver?

Elder Jerry Griffin will transfer to Denver this summer to join the staff of the Ministerial Training Center. He will attend school as a faculty-trainee in addition to his teaching duties at the Center.

A graduate of Midwest Bible College, Pastor Griffin served his internship at Sacramento, California, where he remained as pastor for three additional years.

A: The General Conference office building was designed for two floors of office space. The lower floor has not been finished. It will now be completed to offer adequate space for offices and classrooms to house MTC in its inception. Possibilities for larger facilities as the Center grows are already being discussed.

Q: Won't the use of the lower floor of an office building be a step backward?

A: By no means. The facilities in a modern building will be attractively finished and decorated. They will be comfortable, well-equipped and conducive to study.

Q: How soon will you have a student body?

A: That's difficult to say. It depends upon success in recruiting. We do not anticipate a sizeable student body for

about two years. This will allow time to train a faculty.

Q: If several come, can you train them?

A: Let them come! We accept the challenge to offer adequate training!

Q: How will yo do it?

A: We will teach Bible-related subjects as well as those dealing with church polity and pastoral care. We will seek to work with other institutions of higher learning for special classes in non-doctrinal subjects such as Bible languages, history, philosophy, etc.

Q: How will you prepare to teach on a postgraduate level?

A: Elders Calvin Burrell and Jerry Griffin, both college graduates, will be entering post-graduate studies this fall. Both are talented student-educators and will be ready to offer excellent training on a postgraduate level soon. The sponsorship of the faculty-trainees will be an on-going program, offered to interested potential faculty members until the highest. most specialized, and dedicated training will be offered at MTC. It's designed to become a "behive" of scholarly, dedicated and effective work for the glory of God, His church, and eternal truth.

Q: Will you train only ministers?

A: We will train primarily ministers. Those aspiring to other areas of church work will also be accepted, such as writers, administrators, teachers. MTC will provide a "crash course" in specialized church-related training, such as Bible doctrines and church polity. These students will receive their professional training at other institutions before entering MTC.

Q: May lay members who do not aspire to professional church work attend the Center?

A: Classes will be open to nontrainees who wish to audit. This suggests they may attend class, but not for credit. They would not be tested nor graded but may otherwise participate in class as any other student does.

Q: What about those who wish to be pastors but who have neither time nor resources for the full ministerial training program?

A: The License and Credentials Committee is proposing that a provisional ministerial license be offered which will provide documentation to men whose training is limited but whose services are acceptable under restricted circumstances. Should this proposal be adopted, aspiring pastors with limited means may take a concentrated one-year course which will introduce them to ministerial techniques, and refine their knowledge of Bible doctrines and church polity.

Q: Have you plans to provide additional training for ministers already in the field?

A: Yes. Summer classes will be offered to those interested in taking refresher courses.

Q: How long will these summer classes run?


A: About four weeks. We may expand them later.

Q: Who will finance the cost of the summer courses for ministers?

A: Logically, the districts. It will be to their advantage. With good participation, costs can be held to a minimum.

Q: What kind of classes will you make available for summer studies?

A: A brief introduction to Bible languages so that correct use can be made of reference works like concordances, lexicons, etc.; courses in correct Biblical interpretation; parliamentary law; church polity; independent studies which will allow

Elder Calvin Burrell will pastor a church while attending postgraduate school, both on a part-time basis. He is scheduled to join the faculty of the Ministerial Training Center as soon as appropriate studies have been completed.

Following graduation at Oklahoma's Northwestern State Teacher's College, Elder Burrell began his professional work for the Lord at Spring Vale Academy. He remained there six years before accepting assignment to pastor the Church of God (Seventh Day) in Fort Smith, Arkansas. After three years he returned to Spring Vale Academy as Principal, then Director, where he is completing the third year of his present tenure — nine years in all at the Academy.

for personal research under supervision and guidance of a faculty member; seminars conducted by other leaders whose offices are in the head-quarters building, etc.

Q: How soon will you begin to offer the summer courses?

A: We hope to have some ready by Summer, 1977.

Q: What arrangements is MTC making to house and feed its students?

A: None. The more mature student will be expected to arrange his own living needs.


also encourages local groups to include pictures with their news items.

For the past several months this agency has been involved in conducting a number of pilot programs in YOUNG ADULT MINISTRIES. The purpose of this program is to coordinate activities of the young adults of the church and to organize a program that will place emphasis on outreach.

Since the last general conference business sessions in which the young people decided it would be in the best interests of the youth work to establish a new age standard it appeared that in some of our larger churches the young adult who was squeezed out of the youth program had no place to belong. It is in these churches that pastors became involved with the young adults of the church and put together viable programs to meet this need.

The Christian Education Agency provided materials from Gospel Light Publications entitled, "Peter's Principles." This material was used as a spring board for discussions on the book of Peter. It has not been nor should it be the function of the young adults in a local church to organize themselves into a group that would be

similar to that of the FYC, but rather to develop a common interest in getting together to discuss God's Word and to share God's goodness. It is in such informal settings that one is encouraged to bring visitors who will soon feel a part of the group.

The effects of an active young adult group cannot be over-emphasized. Since this is where the bulk of our population presently is it appears advantageous that we provide functions in our church to reach the age group.

Young adults through their restlessness carry with them a great deal of enthusiasm which must be channeled into church work. The church needs these new ideas and energy. If programs can be provided for its direction we will all be the better off for it.

If your church is interested in organizing a young adult program we would like to encourage you to get in contact with the Christian Education Agency as we will be happy to work with you and to share ideas with you that have proven productive in several of our churches in our pilot program.

Did you notice the new name of this agency? Foreign Missions has become Missions Abroad. The name Missions Abroad is not original with us. It has been used for some time by Elder Roy Marrs of the Church of God Sabbatarian of Hawthorne, California, as the designation of its missions program. Prior to that, the late Elder Charles Adams used the name.

After Elder Adams' death, Missions Abroad was transferred to Elder Marrs and the Hawthorne Church. In the past month, it has been transferred to the United Missions of the Church of God (Seventh Day) to become the official title of the Missions Agency.

The transfer of Missions Abroad to our United Missions program means a great deal more than the mere adoption of a new name. For the past 18 months discussions between Elder Marrs and the General Conference were leading to the unification of our missions program with Missions Abroad.

We were hopeful that Elder Marrs would be able to assume the directorship of this combined work. He was working in that direction in concert with us. However, in the past several weeks Elder Marrs felt the need to introduce a new approach to our plan.

He felt he was physically unable to continue to direct a missions program. Therefore, he suggested Missions Abroad be united with our missions program and that it be directed by someone working at the Conference offices. This location has proven ideal for servicing a viable missions program.

Elder Marrs made this proposal in

time for the United Missions and Executive Boards to review and act upon it. In their meeting each responded favorably to Brother Marrs' offer. The responsibility for the program of Missions Abroad was adopted along with its name. Foreign Missions has become Missions Abroad.

The adoption of the work carried by Missions Abroad adds new dimensions to our own missionary endeavor in Nigeria, India and the Philippines, These are the principal areas served by Missions Abroad. It is our hope to unite our efforts in each of these places.

Nicaragua, Central America

The Church of God in Nicaragua is alive and well amid much adversity. Just over two years ago, like Guatemala of recent times, Managua, capital city of Nicaragua, was hit with a devastating earthquake. It destroyed our only church building and the



AN UPDATED REPORT ON THE **GUATEMALAN EARTHQUAKE**

The devastating earthquakes which rocked Guatemala on February 4 and 6 caused great damage and loss of life. Nationally, more than one million people were left homeless, twenty five thousand were killed and eighty thousand were injured. Of these, 12 members of the Church of God were killed and four were injured. A total of 175 members lost their homes.

We thank God for His providential care over His people. There are nearly 1900 members of the church residing in Guatemala.


Thirteen of our church buildings were destroyed completely. Five buildings were damaged, including the large headquarters church in Guatemala City. Services had to be suspended in the headquarters church from the time of the earthquake until April 3. while repairs were being made.




Workmen are repairing the damage sustained to the wall of the headquarters church.

Guatemala Earthquake Relief

In February, Missions made an appeal for funds for the earthquake victims of the Church of God in Guatemala. We learned that ten members had been killed and more than 100 church families were left homeless by this disaster. One church building was reported to be destroyed.

To date, the generosity of all of you has been great. We have received and sent \$21,000 to the Church of God in Guatemala. In addition to this amount, the Church of God in Mexico sent over \$4,000 to help in the reconstruction of the homes and church damaged by the earthquake.

We have learned that these funds are being administered by a special committee appointed by the Central American Conference Board. The committee has promised to provide us with a report and some photos in the near future. For present, the brethren of Guatemala send their sincerest expression of thanks and gratitude to all who have been so generous in their giving. Thank you!

difficult because of the high costs of transportation and the fact that my membership is spread over a large area. I concentrate my attention on those who show the most interest. I do not have time to work with all the contacts made available to me.

I have many plans for the church here, but the church is very poor. None of our members have very good jobs. Their occupations vary from low paying labor work to selling goods in the market places. That is why the church's income is very low and it is difficult to do everything that needs to be done in our church program. As a country, Nicaragua has much poverty, sickness and unemployment.'

Elder Cho has two lav workers who assist him in Managua and the surrounding area. Between these three brothers, they hold services in five different locations where congregations have been established. One of these congregations is over 45 miles from Managua.



Actions of Interest to You

Every year in late winter or early spring, the work and programs of the Church of God (Seventh Day) receive a good scrutiny. It is at this time our two national boards meet to fulfill their respective assignment.

The United Missions Board usually meets first. Its assignment is to direct the work of our eight United Missions Agencies. Following that, the Executive Board meets to plan and adopt the total program of the Conference. The Executive Board has the broadest assignment. It functions on behalf of the Conference except when the General Conference is in session biennially.

In years past, these boards spent a great deal of their time in reviewing and evaluating the church's program. Any planning session still requires a degree of review. But happily, both of these boards have adapted to their assignments well enough to devote the greatest portion of their meetings to the development of plans and programs to assist every member and congregation of the church in their Gospel witness.

The United Missions Board, largely composed of lay businessmen has been performing an outstanding job in directing United Missions. In the three years this board has been functioning, the budget for United Missions has doubled. The output and effectiveness of the agency programs are reflected in this increased funding.

Perhaps the most significant decision resulting from the meetings of the United Missions and Executive Boards was the one relating to our ministerial training school. The United Missions Board developed the plan and recommended it to the Executive Board for


adoption. It was adopted unanimously by the Executive Board.

Basically the plan adopted by the boards calls for a Ministerial Training Center to be established in Denver. It will open this fall and will offer ministerial instruction on a postgraduate level. The Center will be housed in the office building of the General Conference until more space is needed. It will involve a two-faceted program. One, the Center will offer ministerial training.

Secondly, the staff of the Ministerial Training Center will be sponsored by the church for more advanced training. In this manner, we hope to provide an active training program which will constantly be improving its level of instruction. (For complete details on this program, be sure to read the special report contained in the front of this magazine.)

The United Missions and Executive Boards have been studying the church's ministerial and staff needs intensely for many months. To some degree this study has spanned more than five years. The personnel needs of the church have been easy to identify. The problem of recruiting and training our personnel was much more complex. It involved many questions regarding staff, curriculum, location of the school and the level of instruction.

All of these questions seemed to have multiple answers which were all examined. During the period of study and development of the adopted program, there was considerable speculation about the nature of the program which was to be implemented. In some cases, this may have caused misinformation or partial information to be offered about the train-

ing program. That is past. Now, an excellent program has been developed and adopted. It deserves every member's support.

From time to time the United Missions Board has been approached with the suggestion that the church should have a T.V. program. To date, no serious study has been made of this kind of a ministry. Of course, we have our radiobroadcast in *Faith For Our Time*. However, there are several who raise the perennial question, "Why not T.V.?"

The United Missions Board has taken steps to make a study of the use of this media in our outreach program. Once the study has been made, a realistic decision can be made of our potential for developing a television ministry.

The United Missions Board made one decision affecting this magazine. Beginning with this issue the Messenger will be printed quarterly. You will notice this issue is for April—June. The next issue of the Messenger will be the July—September issue. It will be a special issue of interest to every member.

The Executive Board adopted several proposals of general interest.

In addition to adopting the plan for establishing the Ministerial Training Center in Denver, it decided to close Midwest Bible College in Stanberry, Missouri. This school has operated under the auspices of the Church of God since the early 50's. It has generally conducted the training program for church personnel. It will close at the end of this spring term.

The board implimented the recommendation of the General Conference in relation to the voting record of its membership. A voting record was maintained throughout its recent meeting. It may be made available to any member of the Church of God who requests it in writing.

The Executive Board authorized the completion of the lower floor of the General Conference office building. This is a garden level basement. It will house the Ministerial Training Center and overflow from the ground floor offices of the Conference and Bible Advocate Press. It also ordered a sign to be erected along Interstate 25 identifying the building as the general offices of the Church of God (Seventh Day).

Several appointments were made by the Board. These include district overseers and representatives for two districts as follows:

The Executive Board has approved a plan which, once it is fully implemented, will assist local churches with their building programs. The object of this plan is to make some of the Conference reserve funds available on a short term basis to local churches. It will involve a program for receiving subscriptions from the local membership toward their own building projects. Thus, the Conference will help congregations to accelerate their fund-raising campaigns.

Both the United Missions and Exceptive Boards gratefully acknowledge the submission of Missions Abroad and its assignments to the General Conference. Elder Roy Marrs, director of Missions Abroad feels that his health will not permit him to continue to direct this missions program. He has, along with his associates, assigned Missions Abroad to the Conference. It is being fully integrated into our own missionary program which will be known from now on as Missions Abroad.

Due to the recent earthquake in Guatemala, Elder Antonio Vega was unable to make the necessary arrangements in time to attend the meeting of the Executive Board. Brother Vega was elected to the membership of the Board in July, 1975. He plans to attend the meeting of the International Ministerial Council in October.

The Executive and United Missions Boards each took action to express their appreciation to the Board and Staff of Midwest Bible College. The many contributions and sacrifices made by these outstanding brethren have greatly aided in the growth and development of the Church of God. These boards express their gratitude to all of those who have served Midwest and the Church so faithfully through the years. May God bless you.





this new approach to training ministers will be successful?

A: Committed young men will respond when the urgent leadership needs of the church are made known. They will be willing to receive whatever preparation is needed. Active efforts will be put forth to make needs known and to recruit prospective ministers. Also, when the membership realizes it is as important to train ministers as it is to maintain them, the financial support will come. God's people always respond in times of crisis, and we are definitely in a leadership crisis now!

Q: What can I do to help?

A: Send us names of prospective ministerial trainees. Encourage young

people to enter church work professionally — particularly young men who have potential ministerial skills and who appear suited to this kind of work. Secondly, support the Ministerial Training Center financially on a REGULAR basis. Determine how much you can contribute each month — raise it a little — then send it. "I Would Like to Know ... "

Question: I understand that the office building shared by the General Conference offices and Bible Advocate Press is full. What thought has been given to completing the unfinished lower floor of this building to provide more office space?

Conference office building is full. Presently, office space in this building is being used to house the officers of the General Conference, the staff of the Bible Advocate Press, the staff for Radio Agency's Searchlight Correspondence Bible Course and a secretary for the Youth Agency. A total of four United Missions Agencies are now being served from the Conference offices. One more will be added to this when the new Ministerial Training Center begins operation here in the fall.

Plans have been made and the work is presently under way to complete the lower floor of the Conference office building. The building was designed to permit us to double our office space when it was needed. Now that it is needed, we are finishing this space to provide classrooms and offices for the Ministerial Training Center. In addition, it will provide office space for the Conference and United Missions Agency staffs.

The cost of completing this space will be covered by funds made available to the Conference through its Bonding program.


This generosity is to be commended, and God knows the spirit of compassion and love that prompted every offering.

Physical needs should not be the limit of our concern, however. Neither should our concerns be only for the people in far away places. Again, we hear much about how we should love the sinner, and endeavor to bring the Gospel to that person. All of these responsibilites are worthy of our attention, but there is also something more.

We must be alert to the SPIRITUAL NEEDS OF THE BRETHREN who are in our midst. It is not unusual for someone to get discouraged — sometimes to the point of leaving the fellowship of the church. It is very sad when they also give up their Christian walk.

We must do all we can to help these people. Perhaps we cannot sympathize with their actions and responses to temptations, or we might even be inclined to be hurt by their actions when they show some feeling of bitterness; but we need to consider the loss that is being sustained when they depart, and do all we can to stop it from happening. We do not want to lose a part of the body of Christ any more than we relish losing a part of our own physical bodies.

"Brethren, if a man be overtaken in a fault, ye which are spiritual, restore such an one in the spirit of meekness; considering thyself, lest thou also be tempted. Bear ye one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ" (Galatians 6:1.2).
