up and we are glad we had no frost.



You have heard the slogan, "It pays to advertise," and I believe it's true, but no product could be better than the firm or individual behind it, so we must be careful to have the right firm and to believe in that firm before we can do truthful advertising. Some firms are noted for their honesty. If you send them a penny more than belongs to them they will return it though it might cost them a three cent stamp to do so. Other advertisements have a sign or slogan that tells you in advance what firm they are representing. For instance, when you see the sign, "When it rains, it pours" you know that is Morton's salt. HOLINESS A LIFE

While holiness is a Bible doctrine, a holy life is more convincing than the most elaborate argument of the reality of such a life. A man once said that he could defeat his mother in argument, but that she vanquished him by her holy living. Verily, what God puts on exhibition for us to see demolishes all human reasoning against its existence. Of course a holy life can only be lived by the help of God, but He has freely promised to give it.

The holy Scriptures declare that "we should live soberly, righteously, and godly in this present world." They also affirm that we are to be "holy in all manner of conversation." We are also divinely given to understand that we may serve God "in holiness and righteousness all the days of our life." And when God commands, "Be ye holy," He not only means that we may have a holy ex-

perience, but that our outward life is to prove the inward work. Bringforth "fruit unto holiness" certainly means that we are to live holy and useful lives. Real heart-holiness and life-holiness is always the Bible standard.

But let it be understood that Bible holiness is not something apart from or beyond true salvation. Every real convert to Christianity, through the regeneratiing power of the Holy Spirit, has holiness in its earlier stages ,and is expected to live a holy life. God has not two sets of rules for His people as to their manner of living-one set for the justified and regenerated soul, another set for the wholly sanctified person. All are expected and commanded to live without committing sin, and divine grace is freely offered to that end. and sin no more," is the injunction of Holy Writ. However, the new convert is exhorted to "go on unto perfection," in the sense of perfect love or heart purity, and to "follow holiness" in deeper and riches experiences in divine things.

Yes, holiness is indeed a life to live. With every Christian it ought to be as the apostle Paul expressed it, "Ye are witnesses, and God also how holily and justly and unblameably we behave ourselves." Brother and sister in the Lord, unless our life corresponds with our profession, the world has the right to say to us. "Physician, heal thyself."

Christ said, "Ye are the light of the world," implying that our life should be so exemplary or holy as to lead people to see the divine image in us and cause them to seek the Lord. Oh, to be "a burning and a shining light" for Jesus! An unsaved man once had occasion to remain a day or two in the home of a very saintly person, and was so greatly charmed with his holy demeanor that, on leaving, he said, "If I stay here any longer I shall become a Christian in spite of myself." Do we measure up to that standard in representing Jesus Christ?

THE CHRISTIAN CANNOT

The world - the state of things around - is not what God created it at all; it is sin's making. I get His beautiful workmanship in it, but spoiled by the Devil getting man's ear. The whole creation is under the bondage of corruption; that is not God's doing. It is a labor to make people happy; they seek in a thousand ways to forget God, for if they think of God they know they are lost. But there is the world of God's providence, where not a sparrow falls to the ground without Him; everything is under His hand. He has committed authority to magistrates and so on. and He owns it. If I were innocent as Adam in Eden I should not need magistrates; now this world would be a kind of pandemonium without such. The Christian is to be subject to such. ... It may not be righteousness. I do not look for righteousness but at the hand of God. I don't mean it ought not to be, but I don't expect it. My business is to walk as a Christian, and show the character of Christ, not to set the world right; when Christ comes He will do that, for He will take it into His hand. We are the living witnesses of what we are enjoying of the Christ they won't have. The world is under judgment, but in grace God has not executed it; He is sending out His gospel.

Now there is a great system of government going on, and God owns it. There were no servants in paradise; there was no stealing. . . "Servants" here (Col. 3:22) is slave, and nothing but sin brought in slaves. There never would have been such a thing if sin had not been there; but the apostle does not meddle with it. He does not say he approves of it, but he leaves the government of the world just where it is. If I can relieve bodily wants as a Christian am bound to do it, or prevent one beating another if I can do it by kindness; but I am to leave the world alone. It is hard to do it; in

our hearts we don't like it ...

Paul says to masters, "You have a master in heaven" (Col. 4:1) who will take notice of everything you do. Your part is to show what Christianity is and does, and that is good to an infidel, or whoever it is. Your confession of Christ is to be so positive that they should know what to attribute these things to. Let the world go on its own way, and you on yours—that is Christ's. If not, you compromise Christianity, instead of maintaining its testimony.

FARING WHOLLY WITH CHRIST

(Continued from last week)

3. Our Savior Himself set the fine example of this surrender. More affectionate or devoted child there never lived; but He began to draw aside from all home entanglements as He reached the conscious nearness of His public work. Mary was as thoughtful as any one human could be; she pondered every demonstration in her heart. Still she came up slowly to the understanding of that wonderful boy. Solemnly and seriously in its admonition comes even now to us the mysterious reply of Jesus at twelve years old to His sorrowing parents, who yet supposed they could chide Him for carelessness of their anxious feelings: "Wist ye not that I must be about my Father's business?" (See also Matt. 12: 46-504

III. The personal experiences of the new life are absolutely exclusive: "And another also said, Lord, I will follow thee; but let me first go bid them farewell, which are at home at my house. And Jesus said unto him, No man, having put his hand to the plough, and looking back, is fit for the kingdom of God."

We cannot help imagining there must have been some deft allusion here to Elijah's history in this reply of our Lord: "So he departed thence, and found Elisha the son of Shaphat, who was ploughing with twelve yoke of oxen before him, and he with the twelve: and Elijah passed by him, and cast his mantle upon him. And he left the oxen, and ran after Elijah. and said, Let me, I pray thee, kiss my father and my mother and then I will follow thee." Elisha desired the same privilege, not as an excuse for delay, but only as a tender duty of respect to those who loved him at home. He was actually at the plough when he was called by the casting of Elijah's mantle upon his shoulders.

1. Gospel experience is generous. It

supplies room for all; but those who reject the offer must be left behind. Recall the Old Testament picture of Naomi and Ruth; surely Orpah could have come along too. Remember the invitation of Moses to Hobab, his father-in-law: "And Moses said unto Hobab, the son of Raguel the Midianite, Moses' father-in-law, We are journeying unto the place of which the Lord said, I will give it you: come thou with us, and we will do thee good: for the Lord hath spoken good concerning Israel." This disciple could have said to one he loved: "It shall be, if thou go with us, yea, it shall be, that what goodness the Lord shall do unto us, the same will we do unto thee." For Jesus had grace for more disciples still.

2. Gospel experience is indivisible. Philosophically speaking, it is impossible for any man to love two things supremely: "No man can serve two masters; ye cannot serve God and mammon." That old familiar call, "My son, give me thy heart," means the whole heart. "A double-minded man is unstable in all his ways" (See 1 Chron. 12:23, and also Ps. 12:2). In both of these passages the margin has "A heart and a heart." A Christian man has only one heart, after God has given him a new heart.

3. Gospel experience is uncompromising. All attempts to combine religion with worldliness are injuri-Naaman asks the privilege of going into the house of Rimmon with a show of devotion so as to keep his place at court: "In this thing the Lord pardon thy servant, that when my master goeth into the house of Rimmon to worship there, and he leaneth on my hand, and I bow down myself in the house of Rimmon, the Lord pardon thy servant in this thing." The prophet is not to be understood as giving consent; he only keeps silence for a little, perhaps forseeing that the man will learn a lesson before long: "And he said unto him, Go in peace. So he departed from him a little way." Then Gehazi tries the same sort of doubleness upon Naaman; that seems to have cleared his mind about "a heart and a heart."

4. Gospel experience is immortal. "The world passeth away, and the lust thereof; but he that doeth the will of God abideth for ever." This part of our nature is what projects itself forward beyond the confines of time. It is the heart which decides character: "As a man thinketh in his heart, so is he." And it is character which decides destiny...

So much, then, for the disclosure of the principle contained in the narrative we are studying. How the counsel of Jesus was taken we are not informed. What these strangers to us replied we do not know. More important is it what we reply in our

dividual conscience? When was conscience ever a safe or true guide? Has sin not so warped and destroyed conscience that it is today but the mere mirage of the desert? "I verily thought within myself that I ought to do many things contrary to the name of Jesus of Nazareth"-so confessed Paul. Conscience led him to persecute the Church of God-a blasphemer and inpurious. "The time will come," said the Master to His disciples, "when he that killeth you will think that he doeth God service." This again is conscience. Man's best and most accurate judgment only leads him to oppose God and His saints, and at the same time to imturn; Jesus Christ has left the same challenge for ourselves to meet. Now we are ready for some comment up on the text itself.

- 1. Half service of Curist is where service of satan. What is "the kingdom of God?" There are only two kingdoms in this world. Each man is the subject of one or of the other. The earliest step in becoming a Christian is found in renouncing the devil.
- 2. Failure in religious life is in no wise chargeable to God. It only shows we have never been "fit" for His Kingdom. Commentators say this word means serviceable; but that means fit for service. When one, after a period of decorous devotion, falls away, it will not do for him to say that the Lord has broken His covenant of grace. The weakness is in himself; he has grown tired of the furrow. "Draw nigh to God, and he will draw nigh to you; cleanse your hands, ye sinners; and purify your hearts, ye double-minded."
- 3. The eye will sometimes show where the heart is better than even the hand. One can look back, perhaps, and still keep on with his plowing; but the look betrays him. So here is an illustrated text at once: "An high look, and a proud heart, and the plowing of the wick-ed, is sin." How much can be put into just one look of a divided heart. The men of Beth-shemesh only looked in the ark; but the Lord smote fifty thousand of them for their wicked curiosity. Eve looked at the forbidden fruit, and there her sin began, and all our woes. Only a look of wrong brought all the shame and sorrow that weeps in the penitence of the fifty-first Psalm. Lot's wife looked back on Sodom, because she was not fit for the Kingdom of God.
- 4. It is best to say our farewells before coming to Jesus. A thoughtful mind will ponder difficult questions before any committal; then there will be no need of hesitation afterwards. Observe the intense individualism of the choice here indi-cated. "No man" is excepted from the decisive enunciation. The expression we often use, "counting the cost," is directly Spiritual: "For which of you intending to build a tower, sitteth not down first and counteth the cost, whether he hath sufficient to finish it? Lest haply, after he hath laid the foundation, and is not able to finish it, all that behold it begin to mock him, saying, This man began to build, and was not able to finish."
- 5. They cannot fare well who do not fare wholly with Christ. Our word "Good-by" means God be with you; but God will not be with those who reject His Son. Abram left Terah, his father, only half way to Canaan, and went on to the land of promise without him. Better for us

to bring our friends along with us, when going to Jesus, if by any mean it is possible. "And Terah did in Haran," and Haran unfortunately was only half way to Canaan.

YOUR OWN BIBLE

When a boy or girl buys a Bible for his or her very own, here are some things to keep in mind.

Make sure that it is well bound, so it will not break apart and the leaves get loose from usage.

Make sure that the type is large and clear so it can be read easily without eye strain. It is better to get bigger Bible with large type, than a smaller book with type too small to be read easily.

Get a Bible with a column of cross references in the center of each page. These cross references wil prove very valuable as you trace names and ideas from one place to another.

If possible get a Bible with a concordance in the back. This concordance will help you find certain verses when you want them and do not know exactly where they are. This is one of the most important feature in a Bible for young people...

Whatever kind of Bible you get, use it regularly, and read it with the earnest desire to gain information and inspiration for your everyday life as a Christian.—Sel.

HOW TO STUDY

Study is work for young people, and just as men need to be trained for their work, so young people need training for their study. The ability to study well, and get the most out of it, does not come automatically, but is the result of thought, planning and persistence. The following suggestions may be helpful in getting the most out of study periods at home and in school.
