THE BIBLE GROCERY STORE

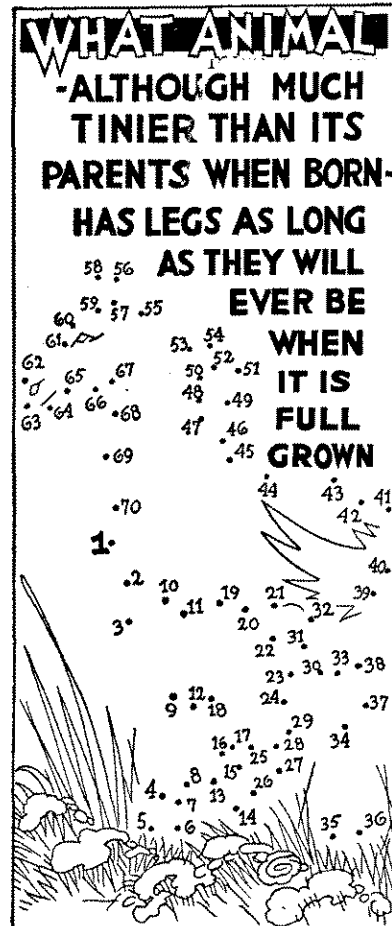
In the following find some things that can be bought at a grocery store. The answers will be printed next week.

Doing Right When It Is Hard

In our lesson Jeremiah was doing right and telling the people what God had said. Some of the people didn't like what Jeremiah had told them and they went before the king and asked that he be put to death. The king told them to do as they wished. They took Jeremiah and put him in a dungeon where there was mud. It appeared that they were going to let him die there.

It must have been hard to serve God when he was treated that way. One man heard what had been done to Jeremiah and went to the king and told him that Jeremiah was apt to starve there. The king told him to get thirty men and get Jeremiah up out of the dungeon. So Jeremiah was rescued.

Another example of serving God when it was hard was Daniel. He refused to worship the king instead of God and was put in the lion's den. He knew that he would be punished for doing right but he obeyed God just the same. If he had prayed to the king he would have broken the first commandments, which says, "Thou shalt have no other gods before me." God saved Daniel from the lions.

Sometimes it is hard for us to do right when those around us make fun of us and tease us because we are serving God, but we must obey God just the same. These are the times we need to pray more to God to be able to keep doing right. We are not treated like Jeremiah and Daniel were, and they chose to do right even though they were punished.

Jesus was not discouraged when He was abused while He was on this earth, living an example for us. It must have been hard for Him to give up His life for us that we might be saved from our sins.
