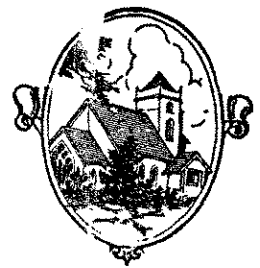


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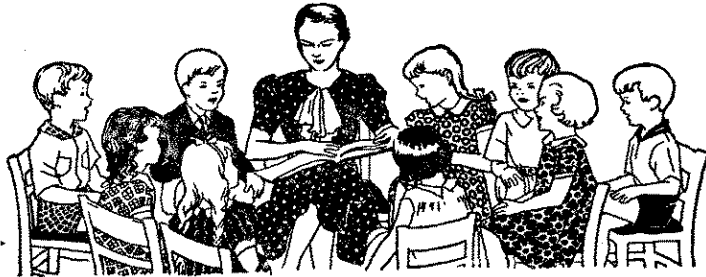

"I will be here for several weeks yet, and will read to you often, if you wish," was the answer.

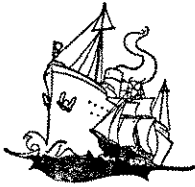

And keep the grass green.

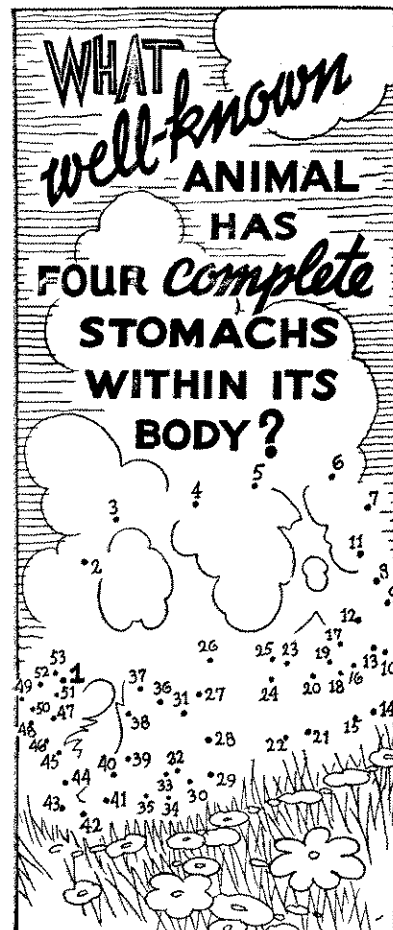
I help him polish
