"My, He must have been busy. Just think how

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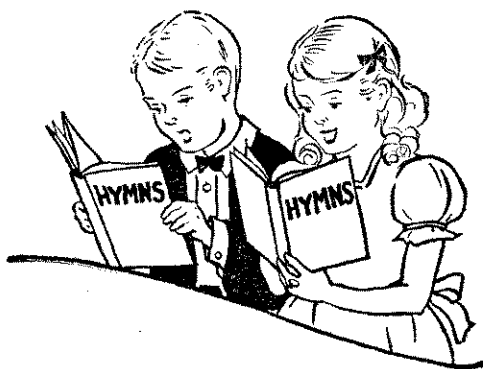
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LET US SING
