
Mother answered, "No," and hoped that he would run and play and quit bothering her. But Lonnie was in no hurry and was patiently waiting to have his question answered.

When we know that God wants us to do certain things we should not figure that something else would do just as good. God is particular and wants things done the way He says, so let us live the way God wants us to.


WHO AM I?

After this Simon, Andrew, James, and John gave up their work to become disciples of Jesus.



Why They Burned the Books

Lesson Material: Acts 19.

Memory Verse: "Be strong in the Lord, and in the power of his might."

In our last lesson we learned that Paul weat on a missionary trip and was teaching both the Jews and Gentiles about Christ. In the chapter for our lesson material today we find him still on the trip.

At a place called Ephesus he found some people who were trying to do right. He asked them if they had been baptized and they told him that they had been baptized unto John's baptism. Then Paul explained to each that when John had baptized that christ had not yet come and died for them, but now that He had shed His blood for the world they should be baptized in His name. And when they heard this they were haptized.

Paul taught them in their synagogues for about three months. When some of the people hardened their hearts and would not believe Paul withdrew from them and taught elsewhere. He spent about two years teaching them and God did special miracles through Paul. Some of the Jews who did not believe Paul undertook to use the name of Jesus as Paul did. They were not doing God's will and were going to use the name of Jesus for the evil work they were doing. Many of the people believed Paul and came and confessed their sins and many of them also used books that taught them curious arts. These curious arts were not from God and were not what God wanted them to do. After they were converted they brought their books and burned them before all the people. In this way they showed that they were wrong and that they were not going to do as they had been doing. The books were worth fifty thousand pieces of silver and so had cost the owners a large amount of money.

When we want to follow Jesus and live for Him we are willing to give up anything that is not right, even though it has cost us a good deal. If we are not willing to give it up, we are putting it ahead of Christ and that is not right.




FROM MARYLAND


