

"I didn't suppose that just keeping the sled for me to ride on by myself would mean all of that," Sadie said. "I didn't think about God caring what I did when I was playing."


"God does care what we do when we are at work or at play. He wants us to be happy. He wants us to be kind to others and to help them to be happy. There is never a time when God doesn't see and know what we are doing," her mother explained to her.

They even put all their money together so that whenever anyone needed money it was there to be used. So let us try to not be selfish because it will lead us into sin and trouble."

"I will try not to be mean again. Come on, Jack, let's go coast some more, and I'll let you have the sled first and you can go down four times by yourself and then we will ride it together, and I won't push you off anymore," Sadie offered.

He also preached to the Gentiles and they were happy to hear the Word of God. However, there were many Jews who were enemies of Paul's and who were trying to find some reason to kill him. One day when they saw him in the temple they laid hands on him. They excited the people by crying, "Men of Israel, help: This is the man that teacheth all men everywhere against the people, and the law, and this place." They accused him of many things and said that the temple was made unholy by him being there.

It was not long until all the city was in an uproar. The people ran to see what was happening at the temple. They took Paul out of the church and shut the doors. They were about to kill him when someone ran and told the Chief Captain of the army. He immediately took soldiers and ran to the place. When the people saw the Chief Captain they stopped beating Paul. The captain asked for an explanation and since he did not get a good one he commanded that Paul be taken to the castle.

* * * * March 29, 1952 PAUL AT ROME

After Paul was arrested at Jerusalem, the Jews were angry because he had not been killed. A group of them banded together and said that they would neither eat nor drink till they had killed Paul. When the Chief Captain heard that, he secretly sent Paul to Caesarea to the Governor, Felix.

The Lord was with Paul through all these trials and one night at Jerusalem He stood by Paul and said, "Be of good cheer, Paul, for as thou hast testified of me in Jerusalem, so must thou bear witness also at Rome." (Acts 23:11).

Paul's journey to Rome was made in a ship. The sailors had to depend upon the wind for power to sail the ship. The trip was long and tiresome, and because of storms, was very dangerous.

On the way, the ship was wrecked close to the island of Melita. The men swam to shore where the people of the island were kind to them. Paul stayed there three months and many sick folks were healed through his prayers.

Then he went on to Rome in a larger ship, whose sailors had spent the winter on the island. When he got there he called the Jews together and spoke to them. Some believed what he preached and some did not.

Paul spent much time in Rome preaching and writing. Some of the books of the Bible were written by Paul at Rome. Among them: Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians, and Philemon. (Locate them in your Bible.) Verse 30 of Acts 28, says, "And Paul dwelt two whole years in his own hired house, and received all that came in unto him."

I go to Sabbath school. My teacher is my Grandma. I like having a class of my own.


