
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Thankfulness

Your Lessons

For January 26, 1952

JESUS AND HIS ENEMIES

The Bible reading for today's lesson is found in the 22nd chapter of Matthew. Begin with verse 15 and read to verse 23. The Pharisees were a group of Jews who did not like Jesus and tried to do Him harm. They were His enemies. There were other groups who were, too, but we shall not discuss them in this lesson.

The Pharisees wanted to do something to destroy the faith that people had in Jesus and they discussed how they might "entangle him in his talk" (verse 15), or confuse Him so that He would answer them with the wrong words.

Verse 18 says that Jesus knew they were wicked. He called them By that He meant that they pretended to be good when their actions proved that they were wicked. There are a great many hypocrites in the world today. Perhaps they

can fool you and me, and almost everyone, and make us think that they are really good Christians. We see only their actions but there is someone who knows just what is in every heart. Read Proverbs 15:3 and Proverbs 20:11. The Pharisees could not hide their wicked hearts from Jesus and neither can we.

The Pharisees asked Jesus if it were wrong to pay money (taxes) to Caesar, their ruler. When He asked about a penny in verse 19, they showed it to Him and He reminded them that Caesar's picture was on the coin. They were surprised at His wisdom when He answered. Read His answer in verse 21.

Discuss how people today "render unto Caesar the things that are his" (taxes to the government).

Some Things To Think About

- 1. Tell about another group that was astonished at the wisdom of Jesus.
- 2. Did the enemies succeed in hurting Jesus in this lesson?
- 3. Read again the last part of Jesus' answer to the Pharisees. If we give God the things that are His, how will we regard the Sabbath; offerings at church; tithes; the care of our bodies; our best service?

THE CHURCH BEGINS ITS WORK

After Jesus was resurrected from the grave where He had been for three days for forty days before He ascended to be and three nights, He was with His apostles with God.

A few days after Jesus had ascended, the apostles were having a meeting. It was on the day of Pentecost which was fifty days after the Passover. There were a great many people there. They did not all speak the same language. There were people of a great many different languages. The apostles were Galileans and they spoke the Jewish language but when they began to preach all the people heard in their own languages. The Spirit of God had come just as Jesus had said it would, and had given them the power to speak to a great many people.

Some of the people could not understand how this could happen. They knew the apostles were only Galileans and some of them decided that the apostles must be drunk on new wine. But Peter stood up and explained that they were workers for God and that the prophet Joel had written that all this would come to pass.

After he had talked to them about Jesus and how to live a good life, they began to wonder and to worry about their lives. Some said to Peter and the rest of the apostles, "Men and brethren, what shall we do?" Then Peter told them to "Repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins." They gladly received his word and they were baptized.

The Bible says in Acts 2:41, where this story ends, "the same day were added unto them about three thousand souls." That many were baptized in one day and thus did the apostles begin the wonderful work of the church.
