
Johnny listened with his heart as well as with his mind. They were both wide open to receive such teachings; and Miss Jay spoke slowly and plainly that he might take it all in.

For March 8, 1952 PAUL COMPLETES HIS SECOND JOURNEY

The story of Paul's second journey that we want to study today is found in Acts 18:1-11.

After he left the city of Athens he went to Corinth. There he found some Jews who had come there from Italy. The ruler at Rome had commanded all Jews to leave Italy so these folks had fled to Corinth. You will remember that there was a time when Paul hunted for Jews in order to punish them but now he was their friend. Isn't it wonderful how folks change when God comes into their lives?

The Jews that he visited in Corinth were Aquila and his wife Priscilla. Paul stayed with them and worked with them for they were tentmakers and so was he. But they did not work on the Sabbath. They went to the synagogue where Paul preached to both Jews and Greeks.

Silas and Timothy met Paul in Corinth

when they came from Macedonia where Paul had left them to preach. They began to try to persuade the Jews to believe that Jesus is Christ. But they did not like that teaching and would not listen. Paul stopped trying to talk to them and went to preach to those who would reason with him. Many people were baptized and Paul knew God was with him. One night God spoke to Paul by a vision. He said, "Be not afraid but speak and hold thy peace: For I am with thee, and no man shall set on thee to hurt thee: for I have much people in this city."

So Paul preached at Corinth for a year and a half.

Paul grew to love the folks at the city of Corinth and after he left them he wrote letters (or epistles) to them. There are two of these letters in the Bible. We call them books. Can you find them? Do you learn a memory verse every week so that you can give one at Sabbath school? If you do, it is a very nice thing to do. Here is one that I think is good:


