

GROWING AS GOD PLANNED

Lesson Material: Exodus 20:14; Matthew 5:8, 13-16; Luke 2:40.

Memory Verse: "Blessed are the pure in heart: for they shall see God." Matthew 5:8.

As a little boy, Jesus lived with his parents in the town of Nazareth. His father, Joseph, was a carpenter and Jesus liked to play where Joseph worked. He was probably like other boys of his age except that He grew wise in the things of God when a very young boy. He was a good student when He studied in the synagogue.

The books He studied were probably the Psalms, and the books that Moses and some of the prophets wrote. He learned much about God and when He was only twelve years old He could talk with the wise men and doctors in the temple at Jerusalem. (Review that story.) Jesus lived and grew as God had planned.

Our memory verse tells what kind of

hearts God wants us to have. If we are "pure in heart" God can come in and we will learn of Him and live like Jesus. There is harmony, love and prayer in a home where God is loved. He blesses us if we try to follow Him every day.

When Jesus was on earth He taught many things in parables, or stories. In Matthew 5:13-16, He told the good people that the life of a Christian means a great deal in the world. Christians "flavor" the world just as a little salt flavors a kettle of food.

He also compares us to lights. "Ye are the light of the world." A bright light reaches a long way on a dark night. Do you think your life as a Christian makes a difference to very many people? How can you let your light shine? Explain what Jesus said in Matthew 5:14. "A city that is set on a hill cannot be hid." How can you be "set on a hill"? Study verses 15 and 16 of Matthew 5 and see what they tell about the life of a Christian.

Learn the song, "This Little Light of Mine," if you do not know it, or, "Jesus Bids Us Shine."

Do you read the good stories and poems in the Missionary? Give your copy to a friend or mail it to a crippled or shut-in child.

LEARNING ABOUT HONESTY

- Lesson Material: Exodus 20:15; Luke 19:1-10, 45, 46.
- Memory Verse: "Thou shalt not steal." Exodus 20:15.

In the book of Luke there is a story about a man named Zacchaeus. He was a publican, or a man who collected taxes from the people. He was a very rich man. People said that he was a sinner.

Zacchaeus had never seen Jesus. Perhaps that is why he was a sinner. One day when Jesus came to Jericho, the town where Zacchaeus lived, he decided he wanted to see Jesus and so he followed the crowd to the place where Jesus was.

Zacchaeus had to climb up in a sycamore tree to see the wonderful Jesus, because he

was shorter than most people and could not see over their heads. When Jesus saw him, He said, "Zacchaeus, come down, for today I must stop at your house." How that surprised Zacchaeus! He not only got to see Jesus, but He actually called his name, and he was going to get to take the wonderful man home with him. He was very happy as he led the way home.

Some of the people who followed, could not understand. They said, "Why is Jesus going to the home of a sinner?" They would not think of going to the house of Zacchaeus. Being with Jesus and hearing Him talk made Zacchaeus different—his heart was changed. He told Jesus that if he had taken anything falsely from any man he would repay more than he had taken. By becoming a good man, Zacchaeus became a follower of Jesus and could do something to help others.

When Jesus was on earth the people who had sinned went to the temple and offered a sacrifice of a bird or an animal. Some men had decided to sell such things in the temple, where they would be needed for sacrificing, and so the church looked almost like a market place. It did, that is, until Jesus came and found them. This story is told in Luke 19, and verses 45 and 46 tell what happened then. It says, "And he went into the temple, and began to cast out them that sold therein, and them that bought; saying unto them, It is written, My house is the house of prayer: but ye have made it a den of thieves."
