Lesson for October 4, 1952 "JESUS OBEYS GOD"

Lesson Material: Matthew 3:13-4:11.

Memory Verse: "Teach me to do thy will"
Psalm 143:10a.

LESSON STORY

Jesus is the Son of God. God sent Him to this earth to teach all of us the way of truth and the way to follow God. Jesus is our example. He knew what God would have Him to do and He obeyed.

John the Baptist was a cousin of Jesus. He, too, was one of God's preachers. He came to preach the gospel and to baptize those who obeyed God and repented of their sins.

One day when John was baptizing in the river Jordan, Jesus came to him and asked him to baptize Him. Read Matthew 3:14 and find John's answer.

But Jesus wanted to obey God's command to be baptized so He asked John again. "And Jesus, when he was baptized went up straightway out of the water: and, lo, the heavens were opened unto him, and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove, and lighting upon him: and lo a voice from heaven, saying, This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased." Mathew 3: 16 and 17. God said He was pleased. Jesus had obeyed Him.

In the Bible reading for today's lesson there is also the story of Jesus being in the wilderness where the devil came to tempt Him. He was trying to get him to serve him instead of God. But Jesus was always ready to answer him with a text of Scripture.

After Jesus had been in the wilderness

for forty days and nights without food, this is the way the devil tempted Him. He said: "If thou be the Son of God, command that these stones be made bread." Use your Bible and find the answer Jesus gave in Matthew 4:4. What does He mean by "it is written"?

Then the devil took Him to the holy city and set Him up on a pinnacle of a high temple. He said, "If thou be the Son of God, cast thyself down." But Jesus answered again with a text from the Bible. Find His answer in Matthew 4:7.

Finally, the devil took Him to a high mountain and showed Him all the kingdoms of the world. He said if Jesus would serve him, He could have all of them. Matthew 4:10 tells Jesus' answer that time. Read it and verse 11 to finish this story.

Lesson for October 11, 1952 "HAPPY WAYS OF LIVING"

Lesson Material: Matthew 5:1-16.

Memory Verse: "Blessed are they that hear the word of God, and keep it."
Luke 11:28.

LESSON STORY

After Jesus was baptized by John in the river Jordan, He went about all Galilee "teaching and preaching the gospel of the kingdom, and healing all manner of sickness and all manner of disease among the people." People thronged to hear Him. He was always followed by a great crowd to be healed and taught.

The first sermon of His that we read in the Bible is found in Matthew 5. Keep your Bible open to this chapter while we study this lesson. There was a great crowd present the day Jesus gave this sermon to the people and to us. Verse one says "multitudes" were there. Notice verses 3 to 11. How are they alike? They are called the beatitudes. Spend a part of your class period learning three of them in order. They all tell how we may be blessed. Discuss: poor in spirit. Those of us who want to possess the kingdom of heaven are trying to be poor in spirit. By that we mean we are not proud or haughty. The poor in spirit will some day be very rich. Folks who are "poor in spirit" are usually meek. What will the meek have as their reward? Where will the kingdom of heaven be?

The happy way of living is found in the Bible. If we really want to do God's will we "hunger after righteousness' (the right way of living). How shall we be filled?

Discuss: "pure in heart." Is their reward worth working hard for? What are some things that you could see a person who is "pure in heart" doing? Could he or she lie? or steal? or be unfair in any way?

Sometimes it is hard for Christians in this wicked world. We are "made fun of" or persecuted in other ways. Read verses 11 and 12. Is there a reward promised?

We cannot expect the world to love us but if we love the world, we cannot expect to be called Christians. It is better to be "Christ like" and be loved by God. But we are expected to be God's lights in the we must shine brightly so that all may world and try to lead others to Him. So see and God will be glorified. What lesson do you get from verses 14 to 16 of Matthew 5?


