A Famous Supper

"Mother, today Miss Young told us that we would soon have to be studying about the Lord's supper. She said it wouldn't be too long before it would be time for the Lord's supper."

"What is the Lord's supper and why do we have to know about it? I couldn't see why Miss Young should be thinking about it," added Bob.

Miss Young was the Junior Class teacher and she wanted the children in her class to know all the Bible truths that they should know.

"It would take lots of study and quite a bit of time to explain about the Lord's supper," the children's mother told them.

"I'll tell you what to do," their Daddy said. He had been listening to what the children had been telling their mother. "Why don't you children do some studying on this subject? Every night after supper try and take a little time for this study, and then at the end of a week tell us what you have learned and we will be interested to know what you have learned."

Their father wanted the children to learn how to study the Bible for themselves and



not have to depend on what other people would tell them, altogether. And he knew they were not too young to begin such a study.

At the end of the week Daddy asked the children what they had found out and they were happy to tell him.

"I found that the Children of Israel kept a feast that they called the Passover. It was to be kept once a year to show that they had been delivered from Egypt where they had been in bondage," Rachel said.

"Yes, and Jesus kept the Passover, too, added Bob. "Just before Jesus was taken prisoner to be crucified He sent some of His disciples into a city to a certain man's house to prepare for the Passover.

"It was at this supper that Judas left the rest and went out to get the men to whom he was going to sell Jesus for thirty pieces of silver," Rachel added. Both children were so eager to tell what they had learned that it was hard for one to keep still while the other talked.

"Did you find out when the Lord's Supper was given instead of the Passover?" asked Mother.

"Yes, I found the place that told about Jesus giving that after the other supper," Bob hurried to answer.

"Let me read what Matthew has to say about it," Rachel said as she went to get her Bible. "I will read in Matthew 26, verses 26 to 28. 'And as they were eating Jesus took bread, and blessed it, and brake it, and gave it to the disciples, and said,

Take, eat; this is my body. And he took the cup, and gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, Drink ye all of it; for this is my blood of the new testament, which is shed for many for the remission of sins."

"Do you understand what that means?" Daddy asked as Rachel finished reading.

"I believe that it means that Jesus was going to shed His blood for us to take away our sins," Bob said.

"Did you find out why we still have to keep the Lord's Supper?" Mother asked.

"The nearest I could find was in 1 Corinthians 11:23 to 26, and I would like to read it," answered Bob. And opening his Bible he said, "I will begin with the last part of verse 23. It says, 'That the Lord Jesus the same night in which he was betrayed took bread: and when he had given thanks, he brake it, and said, Take, eat: this is my body, which is broken for you: this do in remembrance of me. After the same manner also he took the cup, when he had supped, saying, This cup is the new testament in my blood: this do ye, as oft as ye drink it, in remembrance of me. For as often as ye eat this bread, and drink this cup, ye do shew the Lord's death till he come.' "

"Yes, children, we are to keep or observe the Lord's Supper until He comes, for in that way we are showing that He died for us and that we want His blood to wash away our sins," Daddy explained.

"And then there is the washing of feet that is to be done as well as eating the Lord's Supper," their mother told them. "Jesus washed the disciples feet to show them that He was a servant unto them and

was meek and humble."

"Peter didn't want Jesus to wash his feet, did he?" asked Bob. "No, but Jesus told him that if He didn't wash Peter's feet that Peter would have no part with Him. Then Peter was anxious to have his feet washed," Daddy told them.

"Jesus told them, 'If I then, your Lord and Master, have washed your feet; then ye also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have given you an example, that ye should do as I have done to you.' You will find that in John 13:14 and 15. And verse 17 reads, 'If you know these things happy are ye if ye do them.\"

For February 9, 1952 "THE LAME MAN IS HEALED"

One day Peter and John, two of Jesus' apostles, went to the temple to pray. When they got to the temple gate, they saw a poor, lame man who was begging there. He asked them for some money but Peter told him, "Silver and gold have I none; but such as I have give I thee. . ."

He could see that such a miserable cripple was far more in need of good legs than money. So he went on talking to him and said, "In the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk." Immediately the man's feet and ankle bones grew strong and he stood up for the first time in his life.

If you run and play every day you have never known what it means to be crippled and you cannot understand how happy the man must have been. Thank God that you are well and strong and have a healthy body.

The happy man called to his friends as he jumped and ran about to show them that he was healed. They came to see Peter since he had helped the man, but Peter did not want any praise and told them that only God had such power.

That was what we call a miracle. A miracle cannot happen without God's power. The Bible tells many miracle stories. The one we have just read is found in A. ts 3: 1-12. If you can read your Bible, find the story and read the verse or verses which tell:
