


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How many of you read what was on this page in the last paper? If you read it I hope that you are working on the three things that I mentioned.

Ships of the Desert

Everything about a camel is odd and mysterious. His appetite is queer, and his body is a large living puzzle. But, even so, he is one of the world's most useful animals.

The camel is often called the "ship of the desert," because no animal living today can carry as heavy a burden across the great hot, waterless desert.

Surprising, indeed, is the fact that the camel can travel across wide seas of shifting sand for as many as seven or eight days without so much as a drop of water to quench his thirst.

When a camel is three years old, it can start carrying burdens weighing a few hundred pounds. In another year the load may be increased to a quarter of a ton, which is about the limit for an adult camel. Most of these strange "ships of the desert" are able to carry heavy burdens for fifteen to twenty years, and to do light work until they are thirty years old. Some camels live to be fifty years old.

After a day's travel under the glaring Sahara sun, a camel may be given only a handful of hard dates or dry beans, and he will do very well on the small ration, too. During the night, instead of resting, the animal usually crops twigs, thistles, and thorny shrubs that grow here and there in the desert. Sometimes he will even eat leather, tentcloth, straw mats, or baskets. One writed has said that the camel can make a breakfast from a newspaper and an old umbrella.

BEING UNSELFISH

- Lesson Material: Exodus 20:17; Luke 12: 13, 34.
- Memory Verse: "Thou shalt not covet." Exodus 20:17.

Jesus told such wonderful stories when He was here on earth. Many of them are written in the Bible for us to read, just as He told them to the multitudes of people who thronged about Him. Sometimes so many came to hear Him that they walked upon one another. One day a man spoke to Jesus about his selfish brother who would not divide his money with him. Jesus told him that there are more important things in this life than wanting money and that he should not covet (want) something that was not his. Then He told this story:

"The ground of a certain rich man brought forth plentifully: and he thought within himself, saying, What shall I do, because I have no room where to bestow my fruits? And he said, This will I do: I will pull down my barns, and build greater; and there will I bestow all my fruits and my goods. And I will say to my soul, Soul, thou hast much goods laid up for many years; take thine ease, eat, drink, and be merry. But God said unto him, Thou fool, this night thy soul shall be required of thee (you may die before tomorrow): then whose shall those things be, which thou hast provided? So is he that layeth up treasure for himself, and is not rich toward God."

A man could be happy with much money or goods if he were not selfish but would share with others what he did not need.

In another verse Jesus pointed to the birds. He said they "neither have storehouse nor barn; and God feedeth them." If we help others and share with them instead of storing too much for ourselves God will help us to get more.
