A TIME OF THANKSGIVING

Memory Verse: "Enter into his gates with thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise" (Psalm 100:4a).

Lesson from Leviticus 23.

Every year, in November when all the harvest is in, we have a holiday we call Thanksgiving. This is a special day in which we should give special thanks to God for the many blessings He has given us during the past year.

The children of Israel had a special time of thanksgiving, also. They celebrated their time of thanksgiving a little differently than we do. God told them how they should celebrate this and He told them why they were to do these things.

This special time was to start on the fifteenth day of the seventh month. God had told them to start counting the months of a year in the spring time so the seventh month would be in the fall of the year. (Many years after Jesus went back to Heaven, men decided they did not want to start the year in the spring as God had done. They decided to start the year in the winter and soon everyone was keeping time that way.)

The first day of the feast and the last day were to be sabbaths. They were not to do any work on those days. Burnt offerings were to be offered unto the Lord. They were to bring gifts and freewill offerings to give unto the Lord.

The people were to have finished gathering their crops by this time. They were to keep a feast unto the Lord for these seven days.

The people were not to live in their own houses during this time. Instead, they made themselves huts from palm trees, willow trees and other leafy trees. They would live in these huts during this feast.

The Lord wanted them to do all this so that they would always remember He was the One Who had brought them out of the land of Egypt. They were also supposed to teach their children what God had done for them. They were to keep this feast every year.
