Mr Herbert W. Armstrong first views the Hanstead Estate, Bricket Wood. 27 June (Sabbath)

Its purchase announced at London church.

16 September

Church office moves from Cranbourne Street, London to Hanstead House.

3 October: Feast of Trumpets First Church service in the Headquarters area in this era. Observed at Hanstead House, Bricket Wood.

17-24 October: Feast of Tabernacles Observed at Hanstead House (117 persons attend).

November

First advertisements in Reader's Digest (over 5000 responses).

1960

5-13 October: Feast of Tabernacles Observed in marquee at Bricket Wood (234 persons attend).

14 October

Ambassador College pioneer year formally begins with 32 students. 13 December Local church visiting programme begins.

1961

20-22 May: Pentecost weekend (3 days of services) held in Music Hall. 24 Sept.-2 Oct: Feast of Tabernacles Observed in large marquee at Bricket Wood (468 persons attend). 26 October First Spokesman Club in London

19 September: Feast of Trumpets First service in Dining Hall. 12 October

First formal Sabbath service of the newly-formed Bricket Wood Church.

5 January 1965-14 August 1967 Broadcasting of The World Tomorrow from ship stations brings in over 63,000 responses. Stations are Radio London, Radio Caroline, Radio City, Radio 390, Radio Scotland, Radio 270, and Radio Britain. 6 March Men's dormitory and International Lounge opens. 9 March Ground breaking for A.C.

gymnasium/swimming pool.

10 March

Dr Benjamin Rea dies and is buried on the College grounds. (Also buried on the College grounds are Mr Leo Bogdanchik, Mrs Barbara Silcox and Mrs Veryl Hunting.) 15 April: Passover First service in International Lounge.

1966

January

First English Plain Truth printed by. Ambassador College Press, Watford. 8 April (Friday evening)

First Church meeting in gymasium.

14 May

Dedication of the gymnasium at Sabbath services by Mr Armstrong. 21 June

Radio Luxembourg ceases broadcasting The World Tomorrow after generating approximately 232,000 respones (broadcasts begin January 1953). October (until December 1970) Radio Manx broadcasts

The World Tomorrow.

1968

31 August-3 September SEP begins at Violet Hill Farm, Yorkshire with 21 people incl. 7 staff (also held in Yorkshire: 1969-70, and then at Bassenthwaite: 1971-72, Bricket Wood: 1977-78 and Loch Lomond: 1973-76, 1979-89). July

A nationwide advertising campaign begins. Advertisements are placed in the Sunday Times, Sunday Times Colour Supplement, Drive Magazine, Sunday Express, Daily Telegraph, and Reader's Digest. By 1972 over 140,000 PT subscribers are added as a result.

1971

Newsstand programme begins. Stops in Dec. 1976, begins again in 1981. (To date [1989] over 11 million Plain Truths have been distributed via newsstands - current level is 160,000 per month in 326 outlets.)

1974

21 June

Ambassador College, Bricket Wood closes. (In 1961, three students graduate, in 1974 (final year), 62. In 14 years 438 men and women graduate from Bricket Wood.) June-August

Plain Truth Lectures in 11 towns and cities (over 1700 attend).

August

Adventure Camp begins (for children). (1974-82 with Mr & Mrs Wilson and 1983-89 with Mr & Mrs Shattock).

1975

Plain Truth lecture campaigns in over 90 towns and cities (over 4000 attend).

1976

January

Mr Frank Brown is transferred to Britain and becomes Regional Director and Evangelist (17 January).

1978

30 December

Last Sabbath service in Bricket Wood (in gymnasium). Church offices move to Ambassador College Press.

1979

7 January

First Church services of new congregations at: St. Albans, Borehamwood, Watford and Luton.

1980

29 June

Boys' Club begins.

1982

15 March

Church offices move to Elstree House.

1984

February

Scandinavian office and Norwegian edition of The Plain Truth begin.

1986

2 August

Mr Joseph W. Tkach addresses area churches at Wembly, London. 20 Sept. 1986-25 Sept. 1988 Sky Channel broadcasts The World Tomorrow (over 7000 responses).

28 February

Super Channel begins to broadcast The World Tomorrow (over 9000 responses to date, September 1989).

1989

17 September

First telephone responses (22) received from the British Isles and Scandinavia as a result of telephone numbers advertised on The World Tomorrow programme. (Calls from the Netherlands 3 weeks earlier, 27 August)

Edward Smith
