In enclosing handbill of my next meeting, starting Sunday night 12 miles north of Salem. The work in this state is in excellent shape. Those we lost at Jefferson are not in barmony with our points of doctrine --- stand for pork, tobacco, plague in the past, etc. Some take Passover litth, others of them agree with us on that. I do not feel that we should grieve over losing the few we did, since they were not with us, and it would have left us divided, and with a constant source of trouble in our midst. We are now in perfect harmony.

Will send report for B.A. in a few days. Am basy day and night. In addition to evengelistic work, holding meetings six nights a week, I preach, as I said, twice on Sabbath 55 niles apart, then ever the Radio Sunday mornings, besides conducting Young People's meetings which I personally teach at both Jofferson and Rugene, and mid-week meeting I askey nights at Bugene church when I am not away holding meetings. When holding meetings I prepare leasons for young people and they conduct their own meetings. But all this takes much preparation and time. Besides we receive from one to five or six letters every day at the radio studie, most of which need a personal reply. I wish you could see some of these letters, and sense the real genuine interest we have over the cit. Have received letters from hundreds of people for miles around. You can see I am kept busy, by the time I try to write, cut stenoils, print, and mail out 500 copies of a nine-paged miniographed magazine besides.
