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**Blacks
are not
'beaten
down'**

DURBAN. — Mr Herbert Armstrong, 84, America's "ambassador for world peace", said here he expected to find the Blacks in South Africa a beaten down and whipped people.

Instead, he found them to be a people who held their heads high, higher, in fact, than the Black people in the United States.

Press campaign

Mr Armstrong is chairman and founder of the Ambassador International Cultural Foundation, an organisation which concerns itself with cultural and charitable projects throughout the world.

He said at a Press conference that South Africa needed to establish a world-wide Press campaign.

"I say this because in the rest of the world you do not have a very good Press," he said.

"After reading about South Africa I did not realise it was as big as it is, that its cities were as large and modern as they are, and I expected to find the Blacks beaten down and whipped, and every kind of discrimination practised against them.

"In truth I found the opposite," he said.

Mr Armstrong and his party will arrive in Port Elizabeth on Tuesday and he will speak at 5.45pm that day in the Hotel Elizabeth on world peace and current affairs.

Mr Solly Rubin, District Governor of Lions International, has invited leaders from all sections of the community to hear him.
