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Insect war

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI) — More than a quarter-million ladybugs, predator insects, have been released in California in an effort to control common pests which infest residential gardens and shrubs. The aim of the program, the California Farm Bureau reports, is to get the ladybugs to feast on mealybugs. Green lacewings, also known as "aphid lions," are being used to reinforce the ladybugs. But the battle isn't one-sided. Mealybugs produce a form of honey which ants love. The ants will defend the mealybugs from all attackers.

Tabernacles' in prior years gave impressive evidence that the thousands of Worldwide Church of God members who gathered in the Pocono Mountains not only were law abiding and ideal visitors but that millions of dollars pour into the area for meals and lodging and other expenditures.

The Worldwide Church of God organization even polices its own members during the nine-days devoted to prayer and recreation, with Benjamin Chapman and Raymond Cole acting as coordinator for the festival.

Members gathering Friday at Mount Pocono come from the Northeastern part of the United States and from Canada, reaching down into the Washington-Baltimore area and into eastern Ohio.

One highlight of the conclave will be participation for

one day and one night by Herbert W. Armstrong, president of the Worldwide Church of God and chancellor of the Ambassador Colleges.

The "Feast of the Tabernacles" is considered a "time for rejoicing," picturing the millennial reign of Christ — "the Happy World Tomorrow."

Hotels and restaurants in the Pocono Mountains are aware of the food requirements of the members since the Worldwide Church of God bans eating of any pork products and certain seafoods belong to the crustacean family, such as lobsters, oysters, clams and scallops. Swordfish and catfish also are taboo.

While members are permitted to drink alcoholic beverages — always with discretion — it was light red wine to consume with meals.

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
