ied toward his *doctor's degree* in Spanish. His language thesis is approved—but only *unofficially*.

This has been Mr. Dorothy's third summer in Mexico. He plans to complete the requirements for his degree next August.

A *full* schedule of approximately eight class hours daily included such courses as Mexican archeology, ancient history of Mexico, advanced composition, survey of Mexican literature, colonial history, and folklore.

During the course of the summer, some of those on the Correspondence Course list were visited and encouraged.

An interesting sidelight was a trip down the West Coast and through southern Mexico. Here they saw many famous places including Mexico City, Guadalajara, and Zamora.

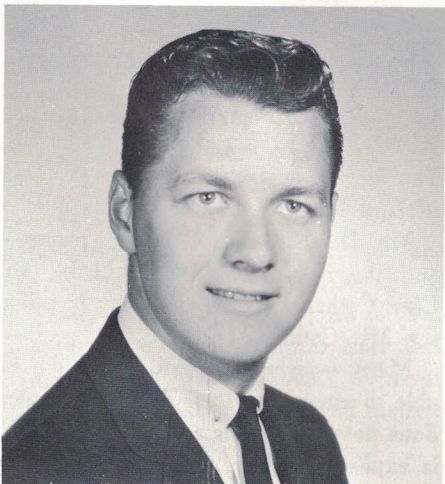
Mr. Dorothy said, "Mexico City is a sight in itself. It has much beauty, *contrasted by widespread filth*. Its extreme-

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and Mr. John Judy, both ordained on August 15, 1962, in the Pittsburgh and Akron Churches, respectively. Carol, one of our co-eds, was no doubt happy to hear of her father's ordination—Mr. John Judy.

Mr. Howard Silcox is the *only* deacon residing *outside* of the United States. He was ordained at the Feast of Tabernacles in London, England, in 1961.

But what about the deaconesses? Of the eighteen deaconesses, *twelve live in California* with the rest scattered across the country. Mrs. Roy Hammer had the honor of being ordained the first deaconess in God's Church in Gladewater, Texas, 1954. Seventeen have followed her. Mrs. Rufus Turner—ordained in New York, 1962—has been the latest addition to the ranks. Presently, there are no deaconesses outside of the United States.
