"I'll make man of matter, so that Him I can correct, For if his house turns wicked, They shall die and resurrect; He will have to strive, becoming Someone that's far more Than those I fashion instantly Like those who've come before." So God made man and taught him Loyalty to what's correct; But man was challenged by the Adverse ones who still direct. God gave him dominion, Offering the tree of life; But Satan falsely advertised The fruit of will and strife. Defining good and evil was The task he offered man, To be the ruler of his will As God, like none else, can. With mankind's blood anew.

The earth was cleansed, and Noah rode

The rapids through it all;

God promised him, "A flood shall

No more bring about man's fall."

The Eternal rules His will

And makes contingent plans;

His promises predestine things,

In spite of Babel's stand.

Stanza 4: Nimrod and Abraham

So it is to be drained;

And boiling calves in their own milk,

In God's sight is profane.

The Eternal rules His will

His promises predestine things,

For those doing His commands.

Stanza 15: National Blessings and Cursings

The nation which obeys these laws

Shall have peace in its streets;

The rains shall bless its grower,

And with surplus shall it eat.

It shall not be victimized,

In its foreign trade;

And those who choose to be its foes

Shall challenge much afraid.

Its vineyard hand shall drink the wine

And it shall heed and be a joy

But idol gods and sabbath breaking

Send law in retreat;

Rains leave things in disarray:

In debt the people eat.

Merchants labor victimized,

In their foreign trade;

And those who choose to be their foes,

Less challenged can invade.

The people labor more and more

For things they can't enjoy;

They treat God's law as one of death,

And their roots are destroyed.

The Eternal rules His will

And makes contingent plans;

His promises predestined things,

For those who reached the land.

Stanza 16: The Conquest

God's law begot His nation's wisdom:

But sacrifices testified

Of permeating sin.

With spirit in him, Joshua

Knew God could take the land;

But God recruited judges who were

Loyal and could lead.

When a judgeship wained, the people

Lost their moral way;

Others then oppressed them, and they

Sought God in that day.

Another judge would then arise;

Four times this cycle went,

Til with Abimelech, their lives

In civil war were spent.

But The Eternal rules His will

And makes contingent plans;

His promises predestined things,

Should kings replace His hand.

Stanza 18: Jacob Seeks a King

Others ruled a divided

Israel in that day;

In the east were Amonites

Who Jephthah drove away.

Abimelech was killed to end

The northern tribes' unrest,

But Philistines, though plagued by

Samson, ruled in the west.

God's oracles went out from Chiloh;

Eli was high priest,

And his household ceased.

Through his successor, Samuel, God

Drove out the Philistines,

But his sons, as did Eli's,

Sought for wealth by evil means.

Thus people urged, "Let's have a king

Like nations round about,"

For these were rebels who would not

Let God work matters out.

So God through Samuel chose a king

But warned that by-and-by,

The king would draft their youth to serve,

And taxes would be high.

The Eternal rules His will

And makes contingent plans;

His promises predestined things,

For David's sovereign clan.

Stanza 19: David's Dynasty

To route the Philistines,

The Eternal rules His will

And makes contingent plans;

His promises predestined things,

But Israel spurned His hand.

Stanza 21: Israel's Wayward Kings Israel governed conquered slaves, But found its taxes high; And Rehoboam cruelly spoke Against the people's cry. But Jereboam stole their hearts By promising relief; So all but Judah, Benjamin, And Levi made him chief. He set back his Autumn feast A month for unity In borders separate from the Sovereign Lord's community. He favored people's lords or baals Joined with praising God; Then Baal, son of El, was joined With Ahab's ruling rod. Elijah, with his God, Eternal, Routed Baal's bands, Then Jehu wiped out Ahab's house And raised his kingly clan. Jehu praised the Lord Eternal But ignored His will; So once his seed was slain, Isra-El's Roots would soon be killed. For The Eternal rules His will And makes contingent plans;

His promises predestined things,

And prophets took His stand.

Stanza 22: Israel and the Prophets

Jehu wiped out Ahab's house

And raised his kingly clan;

His great grandson was Jereboam,

Mighty in the land.

Israel lost its alies when the

Baal cults were rent;

To aid the state, God had Elisha

And then Jonah sent.

Nineveh took heed because

A God sent Jonah by;

But Israel's priests ignored God's law

And spurned the prophets' cry.

Hosea's wives were harlots, just as

God's were Jacob's clans'

Their litergies and sacrifices

Spurned compassion's hand.

Amos spoke with empathy,

For Israel's foes were great;

But Israel spurned God and its poor,

Thus sealing its own fate.

The rich loved idle music and the

Currency exchange;

Thus God drove them north beyond

The civil world's range.

The Eternal rules His will

And makes contingent plans;

His promises predestined things,

But Judah spurned His hand.

Stanza 23: Judah's Irratic Kings Israel spurned God and its poor, Thus sealing its own fate; God's oracles subsisted with His Priests in Judah's state. Rehoboam's grandson, Asa, Ruled a righteous reign But looked to man in war and healing, Thus he died in pain. Asa's son, Jehoshaphat, Took a righteous lead, But his marriage link with Ahab Nearly killed his seed. His great grandson, Jehoash, had been Hid to spare the clan; Five irratic generations Reigned thus in the land. A proud but righteous Hezekiah Sought to mend their ways; God stalled an invasion and brought Peace to end his days. But his son's, Manasseh's, pagan Worship sealed their fate, Though his grandson, Josiah, did His best to cleanse the state. The Eternal rules His will And makes contingent plans:

His promises predestined things,

And prophets took His stand.

Stanza 24: Judah and the Prophets God stalled an invasion during Hezekiah's days, When Micah and Isaiah wrote Of God's intended ways. The rod of wrath from Nineveh Drove Israel's clans out lost; But for its cruel arrogance, It paid its roots as cost. Manasseh burned his son at Hinnom As a pagan rite; Some say he killed Isaiah as He filled God's land with blight. Ashurbanipal sent him To Babylon in chains, But Nineveh and Judah both Took on destruction's pains. Nahum told how Nineveh Would fall to Babylon; And Jeremiah saw that Judah's scepter traveled on. Josiah's grandson, Jeconiah, Lived a captive's life; His Uncle Zedekiah's roots Were killed in that day's strife. But The Eternal rules His will And makes contingent plans; His promises predestined things,

Though exiled were His clans.

Stanza 25: God's Lost Clans

"Judah keeps the scepter, til

The day that Shilo comes,"

Even though the thrown was kept

From Jeconiah's sons.

Thrice overturned and thought destroyed

While Solomon has heirs,

David's thrown and Israel's lost

Are hid in Gentile cares.

But God had called Abram that his seed

Should be blessing man,

So he gave endtime wealth to Joseph

And will join His clans.

For The Eternal rules His will

And makes contingent plans;

His promises predestine things,

Though beasts have swept the lands.

Stanza 26: The Great Gentile Powers

David's throne and Israel's lost

Are hid in gentile cares,

And God through Daniel summarized

The gentile world's affairs.

With eagle's wings, a lion,

Babylon, stood like a man,

For with a beast's inteligence,

Such states have ruled the land.

The handwriting was on the wall

Of how this beast would fare;

A two-horned ram, the Medo-Persians,

Lumbered like a bear.

But a he-goat, Macedonia,

Rode a leopard, Greece,

And it succeeded Persia in the

Fight for world peace.

But a gruesome ten-horned varmet

Roamed throughout the land;

Its first three horns were rooted up

By one which pierced God's clan.

For twelve hundred and sixty years,

His laws' own roots would spread;

They're now among the nations, an

I.D. upon their heads.

But The Eternal rules His will

And makes contingent plans;

His promises predestined things,

And Jews took up His stand.

From Zerubbabel to Nehemiah Stanza 27: Babel and its sovereign heirs To this day pierce God's clan; Though fifty years uprooted, some Jews Came back to His land. Zerubbabel and Joshua Began His house anew; Samaritans who claimed His name Opposed His upstart crew. But Zechariah worked with Haggai, And the work got done, And Zechariah wrote of days When God's first heir would come. God relieved the Jews when Esther Captured Xerxes' eye, And Haman hung on gallows he had Built for Mordacai. Ezra reached Jerusalem With God's law in his hand, When eighty years had passed since Jews first came back to the land. Nehemiah built the city's Wall thirteen years hence, And he and Ezra organized The thousandth feast of tents. Of beauty and of blight.

He urged his troops to marry women

Of the middle east,

And stirred a witch's caldron

For a gentile culture's feast.

The prophets disappeared; oppressive

Worship squelched God's name;

The Romans seized the caldron;

Caesars mastered Satan's game.

A voice cried in the wilderness:

"Repent, be set aright,"

And that is when God sent His heir

In whom He did delight.

The Eternal rules His will

And makes contingent plans;

His promises predestine things,

Through Logos, God made man.

Stanza 29: Satan Tempts Christ

Shall nourrish man," Christ said.

He took Christ to the temple's peak

And said to Him, "Jump clear;

You'll get aid from angels";

Christ said, "Don't tempt God with fear."

Satan urged, "Just worship me;

As world king you'll trod";

But Christ said, "Satan, leave; for

All are told to worship God."

The Eternal rules His will

And Makes contingent plans;

His promises predestine things,

For He will feed His clan.

Stanza 30: The Feeding of Hungry People Christ got aid from angels After Satan slunk away, For He had been conditioned for God's work those trying days. Once He'd been a wedding guest, And they'd run out of wine: He made for them some instant brew The steward found was fine. When He began to preach, the first He called were catching fish: That they should learn to fish for men He told them was His wish. Once He taught five thousand people Who He chose to feed; He took five loaves and two fishes And served the evening's needs. Wine and bread and fish depicted Blood and flesh and man: Thus the Christ did signs with meaning As God long had planned. But parables concealed the truth; The poor thus lacked Christ's bread; Dispite them, for His burial Was nard poured on His head. The Eternal rules His will And makes contingent plans; His promises predestined things,

But signs displeased His clan.

Stanza 31: The Sign of Messiahship Indeed, the Christ did signs with meaning As God long had planned; Impressed by flash appearances, A sign some did demand. The only sign they got was for Three days and for three nights; This long was Jonah in a fish And Christ's grave sealed Him tight. But few could recognize God's heir Who snuck from several crowds: Unlike trite preachers in the streets, He did not cry out loud. Although He was dispised, He bore Our griefs and healed the sick; And He became a sacrifice For others to afflict. By oppression and false judgment He was led away; For permeating sins of man, He died Passover Day. But God prolonged his days when he'd Spent three days in the grave, And Jesus is His name, for man's Salvation's road He paved.
