Just a few brief items in line with your limited available time.

Sorry for those evesdroppers on our phone call. They were not East Texans by accent. Probably some bored long distance operators. If so they have heard far more interesting conversations. Yet I do not like the fact that we mentioned that names. Will have to go back to the old practice of Mr. A., Mr. D. and Dr. T.

The fact that they did not know the part of the country I called from was a relief as it meant that any reference to problems and people here was pretty well Greek to them. Would imagine any 50 minute call might get attention. Or instead of operators, were these a legithate couple of women that somehow or other were interrupped by a failure in our electronic switchboards? In that case I hope they were ignorance of the names were mentioned.

I received the Dinosaur manuscript from Mr. Knowles yesterday, read it very carefully and see that Mr. Ginskey has done an excellent job of helping to hold the line on unproveable and sometimes rather wild ideas. He is a top man for that kind of problem edit#ing.
