Then he will "hop" on over to Jerusalem in time for the arrival of our 70 students who will be spending a "summer session" at the "big dig." The Ministry of Tourism for the Government of Israel will host a special reception for Mr. Herbert Armstrong and Minister Moshe Kol and all the Ambassador students immediately after their arrival. This means that a top minister of the Israeli Government will welcome our students.

As for me, I will soon be off to Big Sandy to be rehearsing with the "AMERICA LISTEN" group. The participating students from Pasadena will be flying commercially on student rates. That will save two full days — time is crucial — and prevent possible sickness, sore voices, sore backsides, bad food, loss of sleep, fatigue, etc. due to a long, gruelling bus trip.

Then it's on to Nashville for our opening on Saturday night, the 20th of June. I'll be taking the Queen Air up from Big Sandy. We'll be staying in a private condominium — which has been rented in someone else's name in order to circumvent any problems from unwanted telephone calls or unsolicited visits.

r. Armstrong's Co-Worker Letter explained many of the details concerning the July fourth "Stars and Stripes" show. I have been asked to give the invocation at the morning dedication of the Dwight Eisenhower memorial in the Stars and Stripes Park in St. Louis. Following that, I have also been asked to give the invocation at the opening of a two-hour telethon featuring Red Skelton, Art Linkletter, Anita Bryant, and perhaps other well-known names. I plan to "slip out" (not long after my part in this event is concluded) for a quick trip to Cincinnati for the opening of "AMERICA LISTEN" that same night (July 4). I might mention that the trip from St. Louis to Cincinnati — which enables me to participate in both events — would have been completely out of the question were it not for our own jet.

Now that I've told you what is going to happen, let me bring all of you up to date on what has already happened.

Dear Fellow Ministers:

I'm writing this personal section in order to save the time of my father, who is so burdened with his many heavy responsibilities (with the closing days of college upon us, and the imminency of his trip to Jerusalem) that he simply cannot find the time right now.

Still, I wanted to give you somewhat of an insight into what is "going on" at Headquarters, and, hopefully, Mr. Herbert Armstrong will be able to write to you all personally from time to time -- perhaps in these pages.



Only yesterday, we (Mr. Armstrong, Mr. Portune, Mr. Rader, Mr. Bob Haworth and I) were hosted at JPL by Dr. William Pickering, head of the Caltech Jet Propulsion Lab. The meeting actually interrupted a very busy schedule for all of us in these closing moments of the academic year -- but had come about through an earlier visit of Dr. Pickering and his staff to the campus here, and his reciprocating with an offer of a high-level, VIP tour through their facilities. We arrived at 10:00 a.m., and were taken directly into Dr. Pickering's office for a brief discussion of the plant -- then into a viewing room for about a 20 minute film of the history of JPL -- then on a whirlwind tour through the many buildings (we only saw a tiny part of the vast layout -- I believe around 8,000 employees work there). As you may know; this is where the "Mariner" spacecraft are made -- and we saw actual spares of the identical spaceships which originally soft-landed on the moon, and several of which are even now in solar orbit. We were briefed on the planned Mars, Jupiter and Venus "fly by" for the future.

I had to leave at about 12:00 noon because of the pressures of radio and television; and the others remained for lunch, and were back on campus before 2:00 p.m.

Then, I did a TV program on "Sex Revolution." Originally, we had planned one on family finance -- but I couldn't seem to get stirred up enough on it (they're waiting on me right now to do that one yet today), and so quickly made some notes, and simply



did a "WORLD TOMORROW" radio-type delivery on video tape. Don't know whether we'll air it; I was pretty strong -- but maybe.

You wouldn't believe the steady stream of people in and out of the executive offices here. Mr. Armstrong's day consists of only partially beginning a very important letter to the Co-Workers when interrupted by a student disciplinary problem; which is interrupted by Art Ferdig, requesting approvals on ad layouts, or presenting requests for ad copy; which is interrupted by a call from Stan Rader, who is interrupted by an urgent answer for Mr. Portune, who is only part way through explaining the problem when Mr. Hill needs approval for the brown lines of "TOMORROW'S WORLD" -- and he is then interrupted by Mr. Meredith requesting approval for ordinations, who is interrupted by a couple of long-distance telephone calls, which are in progress when two or three telex messages from Jerusalem, London, or elsewhere are brought in -- probably these are interrupted by news from Frank Schnee of the visit of some "Hor Zu" officials who are coming to "check us out" for Axel Springer, who is the "William Randolph Hearst" of Germany -- and then I most likely end up interrupting all the other people -- (many of whom have been just as busily interrupting me -- not to mention Dave Antion, who walks in with some Imperial Schools problems, local in-house personality problems, manpower problems, or other questions, or Ron Dart, who has free access at any hour of the day to talk over the foreign work).

While I have not protrayed the actual happenings of any one day -- this unbelievable (yet true) chain of events makes up many of the days (spelled "daze") here at Headquarters, believe it or not.

I know all of you realize there is a pace here that is not found in the "field" -- and I know most of you do appreciate the heavy burden on Mr. Herbert Armstrong's shoulders, and on mine, and all the vice presidents and EVERYONE ELSE in this whole work -- but I thought a quick little "look" into some typical activities might be enlightening.

It's very frustrating sometimes -- you'd like to slow down, take about 4 or 5 hours in long, interesting discussion over some problems you try to solve in 15 or 20 minutes -- but which one of us would want to change jobs??

So, while I know you DO pray for Mr. Armstrong, and for me, and for ALL of us in the work -- and you're conscious of what's happening here -- please KEEP IT UP. We know most of YOU are laboring -- really LABORING in God's work -- and we know ONLY if you are really working, driving yourselves, until your tired mind and body knows its been put through a TOUGH DAY -- only then are you really filled with that feeling of satisfaction and


Dear Fellow Ministers:

Be sure to look for most of the strictly news items regarding new ministerial assignments, Churches, Bible Studies, babies, etc., in special little news blurbs in "personal NOTES" on page 2 and/or here in our Church Administration section. I will be including some of these items here in my personal letter if I wish to explain or magnify them in any way, but normally they will be simply as a quick news item.

We are all fine here, and everyone is in good health, to my knowledge. I do want to especially thank you for your prayers for my eye condition. It retrogressed somewhat after the Passover season but is *much better* now and certainly on the way toward complete normalcy again. Thank you for remembering me!

With graduation coming up, things are certainly getting busy. But you will be happy to know that a number of our men are obtaining Master's degrees this spring including Mr. Bill McDowell who will be out here in a few days to receive his. Lester Grabbe and Bill Dankenbring, here on campus, will also be receiving their Master's degrees. Then Mr. Arthur A. Ferdig will be awarded a Master of Arts in Education. And finally, Mr. Sherwin McMichael has sent us his thesis and will be granted his degree over in Bricket Wood. Congratulations to you all!

As you can see in the item giving our Pentecost plans, many of us will be out to see you again soon. We will be looking forward to this and hope that close communications can be constantly improved between the Field and Headquarters. I will be coming out on a Field visit nearly every month from now on — as Mr. Luker will continue to do. However, most of my visits will be to the District Superintendents — although I will try to stop by other areas also from time to time.



So get organized and prepared to use your own time — and that of your assistants — to the maximum efficiency this summer!

News comes from Indiana and Michigan that the "Sacred Names" people are trying to make inroads into our membership and perhaps weaker Co-Workers. The "new" approach these people have is that they claim to keep the seventh-day Sabbath and the Holy Days. Some, of course, have always done this-though I know of no group which ever kept the Sabbath and all of the Holy Days as they should. But they are beginning to prey on our weak members and Mr. Kenneth Martin mentioned one man in the Church who had to be dropped because of this. However, this man reported that these people were holding regular meetings in that area and also said that he met some of our people from the Milwaukee Church who made a special trip clear over to Indiana to attend one of these meetings!

Additionally, one of our members returning from the Feast at Mount Pocono last fall met a man with a fine camper. He assumed he was one of our people. Upon engaging in conversation, it was determined that he was a member of the "Sacred Names" group and claimed he was returning home after having kept the Feast of Tabernacles — apparently with us. So we need to be cware of this and step these inroads.

If there is any problem in any of your congregations — and be sure to ferret it out — give a sermon or have a Bible Study exposing this



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heresy. Also, be sure to refer the brethren and any interested people to Dr. Hoeh's very fine reprint on the subject, "The Unknown God."

Instructions: Many of you ministers request transportation regarding the moving of widows from time to time. From now on, be sure to request these moves through C.A.D. and we will best be able to determine whether college equipment or Third Tithe expense should be used in these cases.

Since the whole Work has had to become "budget conscious," all departments have had to make procedural changes to conform to basic accounting principles. Our department has had to change all of our cards and forms involving money transactions to give the Business Office the information they need to properly determine whether a purchase or expenditure is an asset or a liability, and to clearly define which area of the budget to charge. The cards affected are the Monthly Ministerial Expense Card, Hall Rental Card, Minister's 2nd Tithe Card, Member's 2nd Tithe Card, 3rd Tithe Authorization Card, and 3rd Tithe One-Time Assistance Card. We will be sending the new forms and instructions to those of you in the U.S. soon.

One of our leading ministers recently wrote in regarding a problem which occurs from time to time in nearly all Church areas. Because of its universal and explosive nature, I want to paraphrase — in order to disguise names, places, etc. — his points and suggestions and add some of my own on this important topic. It involves the principle of a woman in the Church sometimes "using" the Church to get her way with her unconverted husband. Mr. Ted Armstrong has been concerned with a similar case in the South in recent months, and now this other one appears which shows this to be, perhaps, a common problem.

To see the "pattern" of events and approaches that may come up in similar cases, notice the basic points in the case to which I am referring which resulted in the man divorcing the woman in the Church, violently HATING the Church and blaming our ministers for "taking sides with his wife" against him:

1) Indications now show that Mrs. Woman always wanted to be "center stage" — always in the middle of things, and first whenever she could be. She was not ready for baptism, but some of her friends were ready and were baptized. She evidently disliked this very much and

rushed to get baptized also so that she would not be left out. She "got" one of our ministers to baptize her.


- 2) Before coming into the Church, there was a chronic background of trouble between her and her husband adultery, wife-swapping and perversion. Her hands have been far from clean.
- 3) It is clear now that she simply "used" the Church to inflict her will and her way on her husband to bring him into line!
- 4) While she was in Podunk (after having left Mr. Woman), Mr. Minister reports that she gave at least one deacon the distinct impression that she had a strong "crush" on another minister. We feel this is probably one if not the reason Mr. Woman hates this other minister so much. She "used" this minister to circumvent her husband "Mr. So and So says this and Mr. So and So says that, or does things that way" literally infuriating her husband as it would nearly any carnal man.
- 5) She always painted her husband as a real "beast." But no one ever found out what she was like! She was the "angel" who did no wrong, supposedly. But in reality, it was apparently she who needled her husband, pushed him, upset him and "inspired" him to the drastic actions he took. She now admits to this after much prodding and soul-searching! She admits she was never a real wife and helper to him.

One mistake in this whole situation was that our ministers unwittingly allowed themselves to be arbiters in disputes between a wife and her unconverted husband. Remember, Jesus said: "Who made me a ruler and a judge over you?"

This is, of course, a delicate area and sometimes a minister can help and prevent such a couple from going to the divorce court through proper counsel and encouragement. But the minister should be there primarily to help patch and build up the marriage - NEVER as a "judge" whom the husband sees as prejudiced against him and as one trying to break up his marriage. So our ministers must learn to STAY OUT of this role of "judging"! IF, however, they win the respect of the unconverted mate and are asked by both parties to the marriage to give general counsel and guidelines for both, then they should do so — being especially careful to give the unconverted mate every consideration so that he can have no real grounds for feelings or accusations of prejudice on the minister's part.

We perceive that many women give such woe-



fully wrong impressions of the Church and the ministry that this, in itself, causes harm. Our women must be cautioned against this in sermons and Bible Studies. So, if we find that the Church, and our churches, are being dragged into a family argument anyway (as they usually are), it may actually be preventative medicine for the minister to explain the principles of our churches and attitudes regarding husband-wife relations to the couple so the husband gets the sincere, positive explanation and not some wrong ideas his wife uses as a "club" over him. Many of these women give their unconverted husbands the impression that they are taught to obey the minister rather than the husband, that their Bible studies and/or prayer life has to be put at a certain time to directly inconvenience their wifely duties and fellowship with their husband, or even that their eternal life hangs on whether or not they should have sex on the Sabbath. One lady thought she should withhold sex for one week before and one week after the menstruction period! Pity him if she had a long period! But she used the Church for her cloak of "righteousness." It seems a big test of a woman's true conversion is whether she will truly submit and work to make her marriage a success, sexually and otherwise. We must teach our women this and to quit using the Church as an excuse for their own weaknesses, inadequacies and carnal human selfishnesses.

Well, there is much more that could be said on this point and perhaps one of us will write an article on it in *The* Good News or even in Tomorrow's World in the near future. But in this *personal*-type instruction for our ministers in this letter, I thought it best to apprise you of these basic points and exhort you to handle these problems with *wisdom*.

That's it for now. Please let us know how you like the format of this bulletin and any suggestions you may have for our Church Administration news, or anything else you would like to suggest. Keep *praying* for the Work and for the big events coming up, and prepare for a busy summer.

FULL BRITISH ISLES REPORT SEPARATE

The following Passover-Unleavened Bread report was received from Mr. C. Wayne Cole, Vice-President: Financial Affairs for Australasia and Asia.

We have just completed a very inspiring Feast of Unleavened Bread in all Church areas throughout Australia. Coming at the time of one of the most severe crises God's Work has ever experienced, and following soon after a time of special fasting and prayer for the Work, this festival was one of the most purposeful and uplifting we have ever observed in Australia.

Many brethren have expressed to me that this was unlike any other Passover-Unleavened Bread Feast ever observed. I personally feel this Holy Day season has meant more to me than any other Spring Festival I have observed in my 20 years in God's Church.

I was in Sydney for the Passover, Night to be Much Observed, First Holy Day and one evening meeting during the Festival. My wife and I were then privileged to spend the weekly Sabbath plus the Last Holy Day with our brethren in Perth, West Australia. Adding to the inspiration of the Last Holy Day's service in Perth, was the ordination of Mr. William Dixon as a Local Elder. Mr. Dixon was employed in November 1968 as a ministerial assistant. Now, as a Local Elder, he will be a more effective help to Mr. William Winner (pastor of the Perth Church) and the brethren in W.A. Mr. Dixon and his wife were baptized in May 1962 during the



first baptismal tour taken to W.A. — conducted by Mr. Frank Simkins and myself.

In eight church areas in Australia — Sydney, Blackheath, Newcastle, Melbourne-Ballarat, Adelaide, Launceston, Brisbane-Toowoomba, Perth – 1649 partook of the Passover. The attendance for all areas on the first Holy Day was 2772 and for the last Holy Day it was 2365.

The offerings were unusually good being 35 percent more than taken up last year, amounting to over \$5.00 (nearly \$6.00 in U.S. currency) per man, woman and child attending. This is a very good offering considering the low local wage and salary structure plus the fact that no tithes or offerings can be deducted on income tax returns.

This Passover and Festival season has certainly been a spiritual boost for God's Church in Australia. As well as being a time of rejoicing, it was sobering in the realization that this is 1970. The question is, "Do we have only one more such Passover-Unleavened Bread season to observe in similar surroundings and circumstances in this age?"

CANADA

Two items of special interest in the Canadian Work are a recent review of *The* World Tomor-Row television program written in the *Calgary Albertan* and Glen White's report of a police chief's glowing comments regarding the Crime Booklet.

We reproduce Shirlee Gordon's May 11 newspaper column in toto.

I am writing this column at approximately 4:40 p.m. on Mother's Day, immediately after watching a program that has renewed my faith in this medium. A show that's got the guts and back-up proof to 'call it as it sees it.' A show called *The WORLD* TOMORROW. CFCN's every Sunday at 4 p.m.

"80 percent of the PARENTS are at fault if their children take drugs...not 6-point-something, 80 percent!" This from the host, in my opinion one of the most magnetic in the business, Garner Ted Armstrong.

The WORLD TOMORROW is an Ambassador College production, with address in Pasadena, California and Vancouver, B.C. It utilizes film, location interviews and a lot of straight talk, and of course the subject lent itself to straight talk (and about time) . . . Children Taking Drugs.

TWT visited a special rehabilitation school in Arizona for young men of all ages, plagued by serious emotional problems brought about by "kicking the habit." It interviewed young men who had successfully rid themselves of drugs, and asked what advice they could give other teens about the problem. Armstrong pointed out the simple statement made by one-such, statement you hoped a parent would make: "Find out WHAT you are doing, before you do it. If you don't know what effect a drug is going to have on you... you won't know how to handle it."

Another said: "Marijuana can get to be a psychological hangup, and addictive that way. But it's the person himself that leads to stronger drugs."

"If only they could have talked to me more, tried to see my side, be interested in ME, I wouldn't have had to search elsewhere for answers."

Armstrong was vehement in his attack on the 80 percent...those who in essence declare: "My child wouldn't do a thing like THAT" and even with overwhelming evidence, ignore the problem rather than "lose face" in their community. Best they stand to lose the child! Films, interviews and frank discussion made this one of the best shows I've seen on this problem.

If you are interested in plain facts about raising your child, and I mean PLAIN FACTS in how to handle sticky situations and more, and if you are in a bind about the 'hippie thing' you can send away for two FREE books that tell it the way it is: The Plain Truth About Child Rearing (which host Armstrong helped to write) . . and . . . every way. Standing applause, a fine auditorium, an enthusiastic, responsive, attentive audience, etc. (I would greatly appreciate copies or photostats of all newspaper articles which covered that event.)

Many people told me how often they listen to, and enjoy, The World Tomorrow broadcast. One man specifically, high up in IBM in the Tulsa area, actually had tears in his eyes as he mentioned how much the program had changed the lives of his wife and himself.

The speech in Tallahassee—to the Florida Junior Chamber of Commerce—was utterly different. It was quite an experience—to say the least: a huge gym. sweltering weather, no air-conditioning — what was apparently supposed to be butter was actually a warm, oily pool dripping over the edge of its dish. About 2,500 to 3,000 were present — and many were completely sloshed. Whistles, horns, sirens, plenty of placards, signs, buttons, badges, etc. — the complete paraphernalia of a political convention. To top things off, the sound system broke down. When a make-shift replacement was finally set up, we were already one hour late. And then followed the formal introduction of everyone at the whole head table — which was about as long as the Ambassador College gym.

I did enjoy, however, meeting and talking with Fred Haise, Jr., Command Module pilot on Apollo 13. (While attending this convention, I wonder if he wished that he were back out there?)

"Inspired" by the setting, I revised my speech. I left my notes in my pocket and merely ad-libbed a little on "capsule societies," referring to rioters and ultra-extremists — then applying the principle directly to the JC's themselves, showing that only if they lived their creed (Faith in God, etc., etc.,) could they really say, "Follow me..., I have the solutions."

The two circumstances surely delineated the opposite extremes for a public speaker: Tallahassee, the world's worst speaking environment, and Tulsa, a very fine one. Well, chalk this trip off to experience. Seriously, I was very thankful for the opportunity — even for the traumatic one — since it will unquestionably help prepare me for the eventualities of the "AMERICA LISTEN" personal appearance tours.

y Tallahassee encounter somehow reminds me of another unpleasant subject. The current issue of "The Atlantic" magazine (formerly the "Atlantic Monthly") has an article on radio preachers. It's called "The God-Hucksters of Radio" and discusses the techniques — financial and otherwise — of many radio evangelists. I was amused — only partly — to find myself lumped with "A.A. Allen" as the "two giants of radio religion." The comments about me personally and God's Truth were expectedly sarcastic and obviously slanted, yet not as distorted as one might have predicted. The bad part is, of course, the association.
