Eyewitness Report —

NAIROBI CAMPAIGN

The Gospel was preached in Nairobi. I know — cause I was there and heard it! You could almost say felt it. It was that strong!

Sunday, June the 8th, was the final night of the campaign. My wife, Ev and I sat almost bolt upright as we heard Mr. Armstrong deliver the strongest sermon I think I have ever heard him give. The good news of man's ultimate destiny came through clearly and powerfully.

The first night Mr. Armstrong talked about the conditions in the world today. Later that evening he mentioned that he felt somewhat disappointed that he hadn't gotten into more meat from the Bible. This may have helped him get across his message more powerfully the following two nights.

The second night was much stronger than the first. Mr. Armstrong showed from the pages of the Bible that God's government was on earth before man was created and administered by Lucifer. Then he explained how Lucifer rebelled and the attitude he exhibited. He finished up the second night by showing that the Gospel is the return of the government of God to this earth which will solve the problems mankind faces and replace the present god of this world.

I thought that was pretty strong.

But the next morning I talked to a few of our members (we have 4) in Nairobi. They were very inspired, of course, but mentioned that they had a little difficulty with Mr. Armstrong's accent. They are used to English coming with a British flavor. Actually, most all the English teachers in Nairobi are Asians from *India!* For Nairobi Africans, American English takes some getting used to. I mentioned this problem to Mr. Armstrong — but I didn't see what he could possibly do about it. How do you change your accent in six hours? He must have prayed about it. Because to me he sounded exactly the same the third night. But our members and everybody else in the Auditorium felt there was no problem whatsoever. They sat transfixed. And nobody looked at their watch as God's servant on earth today delivered the message to Nairobi of the purpose for mankind's existence on earth and what is his ultimate destiny.

To give you an idea, towards the end of the sermon (you have to call it a sermon) Mr. Armstrong said "You know God's face is not black like yours!" He paused as those words sunk into the hearts and minds of the audience. He had our attention to say the least! Then he said "Nor is it pale and anaemic like mine! — His face shines like the sun in full strength! and so will yours and mine. We'll all be the same in the God Family. There will be no divisions — we'll all be ONE!"

I felt like cheering! I got all choked up and felt like I and that blackfaced audience already were ONE! I can't tell you how encouraging and exhilarating an experience it was that final night.

Later I reflected on the situation. Here Ev and I were, two Americans who live in Johannesburg, (Continued on page 351)

Church Administration

Mr. Wayne Cole is currently with Mr. Les McCullough and Mr. Steve Martin in Bricket Wood attending a ministerial conference with a number of ministers from the British Isles and other nearby areas of the continent. He asked us to put in the CAD column some of those administrative questions that sometimes have to be set aside because of a lack of space in a particular issue. So for this Bulletin we'll play catch up. What follows is an administrative potpourri.

Advertising in Yellow Pages

A number of you have recently asked questions regarding advertising in the Yellow Pages of the telephone book. You asked for guidelines and instructions, wanting to know costs, etc.

We do not yet have a budget for Yellow-Page advertising. Some telephone companies apparently allow Yellow-Page listings of churches and ministers without charge, though this is probably a rarity. For the most part, as far as we have been able to find out, most telephone companies consider churches in the category of businesses and charge accordingly.

Mr. Ted Armstrong has stated that he would like to see every church listed in the Yellow Pages to enable people to find us more easily, and that's what we hope to do in the future when we have adequate advertising funds. In the meantime, for those of you who have found that you may advertise without cost, here's a word of caution. Even though you may not be charged for the listing, the phone company may decide to increase your monthly rate, charging you now on the basis of a business telephone. Be sure to clarify that point if anyone does seem to offer you free advertising space.

The cost to advertise all churches across the United States in the Yellow Pages of the telephone book each year would run well in excess of \$250,000! In this time of tight budget restrictions, we simply do not have the money no matter how much we may wish we could see the Church advertised in the Yellow Pages across the entire nation.

Fair Booths

A number of remarks have reached us indicating that at least a few of you feel that fair booth participation is more or less mandatory. That is

not true. You are under no obligation to participate in the fair booth program. We feel it is a positive thing for the Church and for the membership, but by no means something that you are required to do in any way.

We have found additional growth in those areas which have had fair booths. But we realize that not all ministers and not all church areas have the time nor the facilities for handling every project that might be available to them. While we may encourage things where they are applicable, we by no means make such things mandatory.

Another point to add is that while we may find some things distasteful about the approach of various other churches or denominations, we need not view every change that we make in our approach to the public as something to question or to look for comparisons in how other churches might do it. Neither do we have to find everything they do distasteful.

There has been a word or two of criticism of fair booths by those who at one time or another have been sorely pressed by some religious zealot. At times we may have been embarrassed or even angered by their aggressive approach. However, we don't want to let our distaste for the wrong

To all ministers and fellow laborers in Christ's Work:

GREETINGS!

I'm now back in Pasadena, just this moment having come from the radio studio after finishing another broadcast (I am ahead only about three or four at this moment -- and must do more before I can ever get away from hot, smoggy Southern California again).

I just returned from the Big Sandy campus where I was able to conduct one of the sessions of the most current Pastor Training School, attended by about 35 ministers and a number of their wives from many parts of the United States and even several provinces of Canada.

I had intended to take only about one hour, since they have a very tight schedule during these thoroughly-prepared and professionally-done pastoral training sessions, but I found the enthusiasm running so high and the questions so many and so varied on so many topics that before I looked around I had spent the entire afternoon -- about 3 1/2 hours with only a brief coffee break about halfway through!

However, when it was all over I know all the fellows and their wives there felt it was time well spent, and I could tell there was a tremendous appreciation on their part of being brought up to date and hearing from me the most recent developments in the Work, including a full-scale discussion and explanation on the new Foundation about which they had heard a great deal recently, and even including further exposition on such doctrinal questions as birthdays and D&R.

Really, we ran the gamut of every conceivable topic you can imagine, from ongoing projects in the Work to doctrine, and it was a very rewarding and fulfilling meeting for all of us.

The schedule included some top professionals from other fields, including lecturers on the subject of drugs. I was very pleased to see the careful way in which these Pastor Training Schools are being conducted and that our pastors can have exposure to many professionals in other fields who can give them valuable experience and expertise in areas of life that we may not be personally acquainted with. Mr. Helge was to conduct at least one session to brief all the men on some of the intricacies of today's current legal climate, and there were many other lecturers from both within and without the church who would contribute substantially to the program.

I was also able to play at least one softball game with some of the fellows and one basketball game. Conducting these meetings in Texas during this time of the year gives a terrific opportunity for a lot of the recreational activities which would not be available elsewhere, including Lake Loma for swimming and sunning for the wives and children if they wish.

So, all in all, I was very grateful to be able to take part in this particular series of meetings, and I believe all the fellows and wives who were there felt the same way.

One of the things I hope we never slip up on again in the future of God's Work is constant, open, direct, lateral, and fearless communication with each other!

LOYALTY is a two-way street. It goes both up and down as well as laterally. Though we have had to be saddened recently by a few more who have left God's Church on the "right," INSISTING that they will not change on the subjects of Pentecost, D&R, or make-up and a whole host of other imaginary or peripheral "reasons," I hope that the strong and viable majority of the ministry of Jesus Christ will grow ever more solidly knit together in the bond of LOVE as Christ commands, and that we will grow in those qualities of the ministry which the Apostle Peter made so clear in his chapter to the "elders which are among you." We are all to be "clothed with humility" and to be "SUBJECT one to another"! I know there is no risk of "familiarity breeding contempt" in the case of one who is literally filled to the brim with the very love of God! Never would a person who is illustrating the Holy Spirit of God and the very love of God in his life and his mind grow familiar to the point of presumptuousness and overbearing ego with anyone else.

Personally, the kind of camaraderie I experienced even for those few hours being with some of the fellows in our latest pastoral training meeting in Texas and the flow of warm and supportive letters and memos I receive from you fellows in the field proves to me we are growing closer toward those bonds of true fellowship in the way Jesus Christ really intends! I don't ever want a climate to be created around me, even UNINTENTIONALLY, by those who are only striving to help, that I am "hard to get to," or that I am not "easy to be intreated" when it comes to problems any of you would like to bring to my personal attention! Again I reiterate, even though I AM busy (but then, who isn't? -- you fellows know how busy you are!), I DO nevertheless read the letters and memos you send, and, even though I might not answer every one of them (I DO answer some!), I read them all and will try to answer them "collectively," either in the pages of the Bulletin or in other ways -- in my sermons or through attendance at SOME (and I hope to attend more in the future) of these smaller conferences.

In the meantime, once again, I hope you are preaching the strong, powerful, doctrinal and Christian-living kind of sermons your brethren and members are really thirsting for. Keep right on the firing line — and especially those of you who are conducting open lectures and services for the general public, let me tell you how much we appreciate your support here at Headquarters. As never before, you are a dynamic part of the FIRST COMMISSION to the Church and a part of directly being used as a witness and a warning to call people to Jesus Christ and to His true Church. This is, truly, an exciting NEW DIMENSION in God's Church today and can ultimately result in tremendous growth.

So keep the lines of communication wide open -- write or call whenever you feel the need -- and THANK YOU for all the input from those who are contributing to the Bulletin.

Mr. Armstrong is currently back in Pasadena, and Mr. Stanley Rader is in New York and will be visiting Washington to talk to various of our Washington contacts. We just heard from Les McCullough who tells us of very constructive ministerial meetings in England (both Wayne Cole and Brian Knowles were also present), and Les was very enthusiastic and positive in all the comments he made concerning the recent series of meetings with the fellows there. Mr. McCullough will be gone to the continent for approximately a week or so and will be back in Pasadena shortly after you read this Bulletin.

That's about it for this time. I know you all read my very lengthy columns in the WN, and I don't wish to be redundant in the pages of the Bulletin, using this space to rehearse with you a lot of the things I tell the entirety of the brethren there, but I do want to encourage ALL of you to thoroughly digest the Bulletin, ESPECIALLY all of Mr. C. Wayne Cole's comments on CAD, and anything from the Business Office so you can give summary reports in your Bible studies or the announcement portion of your Sabbath day services to all the brethren, and really keep them INFORMED!

approach blind our eyes to the opportunity to use the right methods. Of course, we should never be ashamed of the gospel of Christ, and we should never be ashamed to tell anyone about the gospel. But we must remember to keep things in balance. Making ourselves available, in the sense of good advertising by annoucing our presence to tens of thousands of people at a public event such as a fair, does not make the practise intrinsically wrong.

Pastor Reports

When the pastor reports were first sent out, it was mentioned that once we began to receive accurate church attendance information on the monthly reports, we could do away with the weekly church attendance cards. After five months of tallying the attendances off the pastor reports and comparing them with the information on the church attendance cards, we have found that the pastor reports are not effective as a means of obtaining church attendance figures. For the five months we have already completed, the total U.S. church attendance from the pastor reports has been 18,000 to 20,000 less than the total derived from the church attendance cards.

Because the church attendance figures are used as a monitor of church growth and as a gauge for budget planning, we need to have as accurate church attendance information as possible. Therefore, we feel it is necessary to continue to use the weekly church attendance cards. These cards provide us with more accurate information since they give us the attendances for each church on a weekly basis. The responsibility for filling out the attendance cards can be delegated to a deacon. They should be sent in on a weekly basis either by the church pastor or the deacon who is in charge of taking the attendance.

Vacation Policy

A few of you have asked questions regarding the ministerial vacation policy, especially with regard to individual problems.

The vacation policy, as stated in the Ministerial Manual, is still in effect. We do recognize, however, that there will always be situations where any policy could cause undue hardship or difficulty. No policy is going to cover every situation. The vacation policy is no different in that regard.

If you feel you need to make a special request because of requirements placed on you by the Feast Office or Headquarters, or because of constraints placed on you by difficult situations for which you could not plan, then you should contact one of the area coordinators for a solution to your problem.

Health Benefit Plan

Our health benefit plan has now been in effect for a full six months. As claims begin to come in, questions regarding the plan naturally begin to arise. Most everyone we have talked to is very happy to have the fine coverage provided by the plan. However, some are asking what it would cost to have full coverage or a smaller deductible.

Before establishing our present health plan, a very thorough study was made of available insurance plans, and bids were taken from top insurance companies. These quotes projected a cost of from \$30-\$60 per month for an employee with a family. You can see that the \$16.50 per month you are now paying is a very reasonable rate.

The plan that we presently have costs the individual less than half what other companies had indicated they would charge. At this time we feel we have as good a health plan as it is possible to get within our means.

A \$250 deductible would almost double the present monthly cost to employees. Many of our employees who were contacted about the possibility of a lower deductible have indicated that they would not be able to participate in the plan if the premium were to be doubled. Those of you who feel that the deductible amount is too high might consider setting aside that extra \$15-\$20 per month yourself until you have saved the additional amount required to be used against possible future medical expenses.

That does it for this time. Be sure to read the material in the academic column by Dr. William Stenger, Director of Admissions for Ambassador College in Pasadena. His comments are regarding a new interview form for prospective students.

South Africa sitting in Nairobi, Kenya, with approximately a couple of thousand Africans and about ten other Whites listening to Mr. Herbert Armstrong deliver the clearest, most lucid and inspiring sermon on the Kingdom of God I have heard to date. It just seemed incredible!

Later that night we had dinner with Mr. Armstrong and his team back at the Hotel. I sat on one side of Mr. Armstrong and Ev on the other. Next to me was Mrs. Upton, Mr. Rader's secretary. Over a fruit cocktail, Mr. Rader was dictating an article for the Worldwide News and Mrs. Upton was taking it down discreetly in shorthand. Anyone sitting much farther away than I would never have known what was going on. Mr. Rader mentioned several announcements that he made that evening after Mr. Armstrong's sermon and general news for the Church as a whole. Later that night as Ev and I sat and talked - we were too excited to sleep - Mrs. Upton was sending the copy back to Pasadena for immediate publication. Somehow she also managed to get some typing done for me and another message regarding accommodations through to Tokyo before leaving early the next day for Japan.

Mr. Rader and Mr. Gotoh were busy the whole time I was in Kenya with communication with Headquarters, meeting various Officials and Ambassadors and setting up appointments for Mr. Armstrong. And other more mundane but equally vital functions, such as hiring film crews and airfreighting the films to Pasadena, hiring the halls, cars, microphones and who knows what all else. seeing to it that the Plain Truth was on every seat in the Auditorium, hiring ushers and usherettes. setting up ads in newspapers and billboards throughout the city and, of course, Hotel accommodations, protocol arrangements and becoming aware of the local conditions, economy, history, etc., etc. When you see how much they do it's amazing that Mr. Armstrong's "team" is only made up of three men, counting Captain Black!

Mr. Armstrong said that he couldn't do the Work without his team. I believe him! They all work together extremely well and each contributes his own part selflessly. I was struck by how much each one of the men respects the contribution of the other. It seems that is one of the fundamental reasons for the success they have achieved. They truly respect each other's strengths and seem determined to carry their own responsibility faithfully. I never saw an instruc-

tion given twice nor an excuse for a lack of success (in fact — there didn't seem to be any lack of success!) nor a suggestion of any kind that another hadn't done his job fully. I agreed with Solomon about the four things that are "beautiful in going."

So the "team" preached the Gospel in Nairobi with the approval of President Kenyatta in a powerful and clear way. And for Nairobi it's the beginning. Now the Worldwide Church of God moves in as a support function to the main arm of the Work. Mr. Rader hopes we can begin printing the Plain Truth there and he announced that we would have a minister there within two months of the campaign. The Plain Truth mailing list has already grown from 550 to 7,000 — in three days! A Bible study is planned soon and hopefully a full-fledged office after that. The door is not only opened — it looks like it's been pulled right off its hinges altogether! No wonder nobody can close it!

International Division

FRENCH WORK UPDATE

During the first half of 1975, the French-language phase of the Work has continued to grow at an encouraging rate.

According to the statistics available at this writing, the year-to-date income is up 27% over the same period last year. This increase is enabling us to gradually cover more of our own expenses and reduce subsidies required from U.S. funds. At present, all of our office and ministerial expenses (including salaries) in Europe and the Antilles are paid from local funds — and we will soon be paying for broadcast costs on Europe No. 1, which have heretofore been paid from the U.S.

The subscription list for La Pure Verite is now up to 116,000, which represents a 30% increase over June of 1974. A little over half of our monthly circulation (59,000 copies) goes into Canada, with 32,000 copies going to France, 8,000 to Belgium, 2,500 to Switzerland and the remaining 14,500 copies divided up between some 145 different countries and dependencies. We expect the steady growth of the PV to continue as we are currently adding around 2,500 new subscribers per month.

Beginning with the July-August issue, the PV will take on a different look. At that time, we will be changing from the tabloid newspaper format back to a magazine format. We feel this will be

more suitable for our needs since we normally publish only once a month and have done considerable distribution through newsstands. The improved appearance and quality of the magazine format should boost our success in the latter area.

Along with the PV, the French-language Correspondence Course has also shown good growth. There are now a total of 4,000 students enrolled, up nearly 18% from this time last year.

In the Spring of this year, two semi-monthly French-language churches were raised up — one in Lausanne, Switzerland and the other in Nîmes, France. In addition, Mr. Apartian will be going to Guadeloupe on July 9 to open a new monthly church there. It will be pastored by Gilbert Carbonnel who also pastors the congregation in Martinique. This will bring to 8 the number of French-speaking churches (not including those in Canada). These churches are served by 6 full-time ministers and 3 ministerial trainees.

In an effort to bring the "meat" of the Gospel to as many as possible, we have embarked on a program of small, public Bible studies in various towns similar to those being held in many parts of the U.S. and Canada. Mr. Bourdin has conducted several in France, and Mr. Carbonnel reports a total attendance of 76 at the five such studies he has conducted in Martinique.

Mr. Apartian recently returned from Montreal where he conducted open Bible studies, in the French language, in two different sections of the city. Each of the four studies attracted between 20 and 30 new people which was quite an encouraging turnout. Mr. Dean Wilson was also in Montreal at the same time to conduct a series of open Bible studies in the English language. If his schedule permits, Mr. Apartian will conduct another series of studies in Quebec City in November.

Data Processing

Greetings from headquarters! The hectic days of June are about passed. With year-end processing, budget planning for the next fiscal year, the rapid start-up of the Ambassador International Cultural Foundation, and planning the move of the entire Advertising Department from their present suite of offices in the Office Facilities Building to the Data Processing facilities, we have really been busy!

Here's a potpourri of what's been happening in the division since my last column:

Corporate Stationery Manual

We have put the finishing touches on the new Corporate Stationery Manual, and all international office heads should have received (or soon will) their copies. Some of the AICF stationery standards are at the press now and will be sent shortly. We'll be sending other materials on AC and WCG stationery for the manuals as time permits. Thanks for your patience and cooperation. We think this manual will be a good tool to help us unify our public image, as well as save money.

PLAIN TRUTH Circulation

As Mr. Ted Armstrong has mentioned, the *Plain Truth* circulation worldwide has passed the 3.4 million mark — 2.19 million in the U.S. — right on the planned target for the close of the 74/75 fiscal year.

Incidentally, we do not have a "trial subscription" any more as some might still believe. Individuals are given a full one-year subscription rather than the former three-month trial. Even though there are more Plain Truth's to print and mail, the overall simplicity of the straight one-year subscription actually saves us money in the long run because of the greatly simplified processing.

Circulation of the *Plain Truth* in the next fiscal year will continue to grow at some 50,000 new subscribers each month, but a key renewal program looks necessary to trim out non-active persons and to cut the budget somewhat. A plan for eleven of the major thrusts of the Work has been formulated for the U.S. which program directors and division heads have used to establish their fiscal 75/76 budgets. When all the budgets have been submitted to Financial Affairs, the entire package will be reviewed with Mr. Ted Armstrong for his final approval. More about this plan later.

GOOD NEWS Circulation

Although the Good News circulation has grown consistently (July issue — 266,706 U.S.; 314,316 worldwide), its growth has been lower than expected or projected. Norman Smith is preparing some commercials for the TV program to boost the Good News circulation. We want Mr. Armstrong to advertise it more on the radio too. We all want to have an active list of subscribers, with plenty of "new blood." So the plans for the next year include a one-shot renewal program (a series of three letters) of all Regular-status subscribers.

Direct Mail

Our recent letter to co-workers promoting the booklet, The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse, produced a 25 percent response, one of the best we've ever had. And sixty percent of the requests for the booklet included donations as well.

Likewise the response to our letter offering the revised edition of *U.S. and British Commonwealth* in *Prophecy* has brought a huge response. Of course, Mr. Armstrong has also been advertising it on radio and TV. At last report we had already sent out practically all of the first printing of 75,000 and still had some 26,500 requests on hold in the computer, 35,000 estimated yet to be processed, and 50,000 more expected requests all waiting a second printing of 150,000 copies.

Soon to come off the press will be the new tithing booklet. It's not totally clear yet whether we will automatically send a copy of this booklet to all members and co-workers, or whether Mr. Armstrong will write a promotion letter for it. Tithing is an important and much needed booklet for all our members and co-workers. But it might also be an important tool to encourage more Regulars and Donors to see the need for greater financial involvement in the Work.

Fiscal 75/76 Circulation Plans

One of the most exciting projects I have been working on lately with other division and program directors is a circulation plan covering eleven of the Work's major programs. As mentioned above, we now have a handle on the Plain Truth and Good News circulation for the next year. In addition, the Direct Mail program is all laid out for the coming year. Growth of the Correspondence Course, a most important involvement tool, has been planned. And how all these programs impact the Booklet program has also been worked out. All the major programs of the College and the Church interrelate and interact with each other. Really, no program can be considered by itself - isolated from others - since each impacts the other in some way.

For instance, the one program that seems to be impacted by practically all others is the Booklet Program. Brian Knowles and I have recently had several meetings to discuss this program and plan for the next fiscal year.

An analysis of MPC Terminal Department, Direct Mail and our Literature History computer files showed that we mailed over 3.9 million booklets in the U.S. in the 15 month period between January 1974 and April 1975. Approximately 3.1 million booklets were mailed in a twelve month period. The following table shows the number of booklets attributed to the various types of media producing the response:

For purposes of "guestimating" the fiscal 75/76 needs, this data was simplified to eliminate the relatively small areas by lumping responses in similar categories. The "Unidentifiable Radio/TV" was proportionally divided between Radio and TV. Mail and WATS responses were likewise lumped together.

The simplified data looks like this:

There was little *Plain Truth* response since advertising did not begin in a direct way until very recently.

The twelve-month data was used to project the 75/76 needs, based on what knowledge and planning we had of the other programs. Those estimates for 75/76 are:

Obviously, any changes in our major thrusts will result in certain changes in booklet needs. But at this time, with our present plan, we can expect the Work in the U.S. to send out over 2.8 million booklets — a little less than 10 percent under last year. Brian and I will be carefully tracking this program this coming year and make necessary modifications in advertising, direct mail, or making recommended changes to other programs to stay on target.

Similar studies of other programs with their directors have been made. Fiscal 75/76 plans have been established for each. A computer model of these eleven programs is being constructed too. I'll report on this more next time.

Academic

We would like to take this opportunity to thank all of you for your fine work in interviewing Ambassador College applicants, as well as to update you on the new interview form we are using.

One of the amendments to the General Education Provisions Act of 1974 passed by the U.S. Congress (generally known as the Buckley Amendment) requires student access to academic records in schools, colleges and universities throughout the U.S.A. We are now instituting procedures for compliance.

Under the statute there are several important exemptions, including confidential letters and statements of recommendation, provided the student has signed a waiver. Therefore, the new interview form (purple ink on white paper) has a place for the applicant to waive his or her right of access to the interview form. Please have the applicant sign the waiver BEFORE you write your comments on it. In this way we can maintain the confidentiality of your recommendations.

Should the applicant have any questions about signing the waiver, you can explain that it is necessary for the college to comply with U.S. Government regulations. It should be "no big deal," but if a problem arises, feel free to call the college on the WATS line, leave your name and phone number, and someone in the Admissions Office will call you back as soon as possible.

There are still a few old forms (green ink on white paper) in the pipeline. You may continue to use these or, if you prefer, give us a call and we'll send you some new ones.

One other small point, not necessarily related to the new form, which may be of some interest to you. As we have expanded our audience via PT we have begun to receive applications from a number of individuals not in the church. Many of these know very little about the church but are interested in the college. We would like to give such applicants an opportunity to attend Ambassador as long as they are academically acceptable and can go along with us philosophically, if not religiously. Any positive encouragement you can give to such applicants would be helpful.

We really appreciate your efforts im meeting with prospective Ambassador College students. In many cases the ministerial recommendation is the factor that tips the scales one way or the other on an admissions decision, and in every case members of the admissions committee hold your recommendation in high regard.

Mail Processing

Our mail for June is continuing to come in at a very good pace. In fact, the week ending June 20 is the second best week for mail in 1975 and is raising our letter count for the month to 183,148 letters — a 29.4% increase compared to last year at the same time! Our accumulated total mail for the year now stands at 1,101,468 letters.

Response to the direct mail letter offering The United States and British Commonwealth In Prophecy is also continuing to come in strong. Through June 23 we have received 97,308 requests for this booklet and estimate that requests from the direct mail letters alone will total over

110,000. And this figure does not include additional requests brought to us by our radio and television programs! The U.S. booklet may well be one of our more popular pieces of literature for the year.

Another area of good news is in the number of responses we are receiving to coupons in Plain Truth. Requests for booklets advertised with a mail-in coupon has substantially increased the number of letters received from Plain Truth readers. Through the 20th of June we have received 15,293 such requests for literature and anticipate that by the end of the month we will TRIPLE the PT letter count we had before booklet coupons were introduced!

When and where possible, it is undoubtedly wise to purchase at least one good encyclopedia for general use in carrying out our ministerial, editorial, teaching or other responsibilities and duties.

Personally, I still believe that the Encyclopaedia Britannica is the most valuable set for the average person in the Work. Another very valuable encyclopedia is the World Book Encyclopedia. It is not as complete or exhaustive as the Britannica, and consequently is less expensive.

If you can't afford these or other multi-volume encyclopedias, then I have a recommendation for you — one that will fit anyone's budget. There is a most informative and helpful one-volume encyclopedia called *Hutchinson's New 20th Century Encyclopedia*, edited by E. M. Horsley and published by Hutchinson of London. (The American version, which is exactly like Hutchinson's is titled: *McKay's One Volume International Encyclopedia*.) This handy, informative, reasonably up-to-date (1970) encyclopedia contains about 1250 pages and is available at some U.S. bookstores. The price is \$12.95.

Hutchinson's (or McKay's) one-volume encyclopedia is so handy, that I have purchased one for my home and a second one for my office. It is no larger than a regular desk-size Webster's diction-

If you are unable to procure a copy of this very handy one-volume encyclopedia, then I am sure the Paper Egret here on campus could get it for you (with postage prepaid, of course).

Mr. Richard Rice's contribution a few months ago was especially helpful to me. It applied

directly, just recently. He wrote about preparing a spiritual feast well ahead of time, in relation to sermons. Not dishing up leftovers, and cooking up last-minute smorgasbords.

I had read his contribution quite some time before being ordained, and never thought it would ever apply to me. For some reason, his advice stuck in my head. Good thing, too!

A few months later, Mr. Swagerty said it would be good experience for me to give a sermon. With my heart in my throat, I agreed. The date was set, and my mind went to work feverishly. The subject was picked, then research, study, and prayer followed rapidly on its heels. Recall, if you will, the time when you gave your first sermon. Then imagine the slight (!) turmoil in my head, when the morning of the big day arrived and I suddenly had the responsibility for not just one Sabbath Service and one sermon, but two! We were preparing to leave the house when a phone call came. A minister who had originally been scheduled to take one of the Services said he was ill. Could I do it for him? Fortunately, I was prepared. Mr. Rice's contribution on preparation had done its work. Our family sallied forth to grasp the challenge firmly, and to rise to the occasion. This was my very first occasion to take charge of services and to give a sermon. And I was called upon to do it twice in the same day! It was an experience that will not be soon forgotten! Other than being nervous, with butterflies in the stomach, and perspiring like an athlete, services went well. Both times.

Now I know it is no easy job to give a sermon, especially two on the same day! My prayers will be more fervent and effective now for those ministers who have double responsibility.

Again, thanks to the staff of the *Bulletin* and to all who contribute.
