Jesus Christ, the head of the true Church of God, has inspired His ministers at headquarters to ask that Mr. Clarence Bass and Mr. Elbert Atlas be sent to Ambassador College. They will begin further studying and training to help them to be better prepared to serve their people. This Act of God is evidence that He has more work ahead to be done among the Negro people.

These two men and their wives will make the third Negro couple to attend the College. Mr. Harold Jackson, now a Preaching Elder in God's Church, and the associate pastor of the Chicago Colored Church, and his wife, were the first Negroes to attend the College. The fruits of one semester spent there has shown greatly in Mr. Jackson's work as he ministers to his people.

The two men to follow him are serious and dedicated men with their lives yielded to the will of God.

Mr. Clarence Bass, a recently ordained Elder, is a graduate of Paul Quinn College of Maco, Texas, and a graduate student preparing for his Master's degree in English at Texas Southern University in Houston. He has worked very diligently and faithfully as Mr. Jackson's assistant since he and his wife were sent to this

What causes the "ache" in a muscle, or a group of muscles, or what incites the muscle to express itself in aches and pains? This is a good question, so let's see if it can be properly answered for those who enjoy the active sports, or just help the little lady with those laborious tasks around the house. These points should be of help to you.

Muscular contractions produce fatigue poisons, derived from muscle protein, the chief agent in causing fatigue, and consequently the ache and pain.

Because of the uric acid, one of several fatigue poisons, there is infusion of the tissues. This is simply poisoning-toxins in the muscular system.

Relief: Warm bathing and mild exercise does help to remove the "ache" from the muscle. Yes, it will be achy, but force yourself to exercise to speedily extirpate the muscle poisons.

Massage, too, is beneficial by supplying the aching muscle with fresh blood, consequently freeing the muscle of uric acid.

Exercise makes possible a swift and complete removal of waste from the body, and increases the oxygen which entails an accelerated combustion, the burning process. It stirs up the fatigue poisons and promotes their elimination.

Exercise affects the excretion of muscle waste products through the skin.

Remember, the skin is more than a covering of the body. It is the exit door for poisonous toxins.

Through perspiration the uric acid or fatigue poison, is eliminated. The perspiration—sweat—which the skin excretes is four times more poisonous than urine.
