OUT OF THE PAST

Darkness had already fallen. It was Friday evening—thousands of Chicago families were eating supper, contemplating the coming weekend. A good night to be at home many thought—out of that chilly March wind. Besides, there was nothing much going on tonight . . .

At 64th and Green Streets, a few people entered the Masonic Temple for a meeting. No one paid any attention; only 12 adults and 3 children went in. But God Almighty was watching.

This was the birth of the Chicago Church of God under the guidance of Mr. Raymond McNair. It was March 11, 1955.

After 3 meetings, the group moved to a school hall on South Honore Street. A few months later another hall at 2345 South Kedzie was procured.

By July 1956, church attendance had climbed to 40. Then one day, a new minister was introduced to the small group—Mr. Dean Blackwell. Little did we imagine then that nine years later there would be about 400 people in each of 3 local churches.

Just how did the church become 30 times larger in just 9 years? Because one man was **dedicated to service**. He spent hundreds of hours behind the steering wheel so he could be in St. Louis or Chicago or Milwaukee—and many times **all** 3 between sunset Friday and sunset Saturday. He delivered the sermons, visited the sick, performed the weddings, preached the

Chicago Welcomes Mr. Bill McDowell

On September 11, 1965, Mr. Roderick C. Meredith, 2nd Vice President of the Philadelphia era of the Church of God and Superintendent of all ministers in the United States, opened the very special Sabbath Service in Chicago with an introduction of the new Chicago District Superintendent Mr. Bil! McDowell.

For the many Chicago church members, this was the first opportunity to see and hear Mr. McDowell who gave the first of two sermons for the day. Mr. Meredith followed with the second sermon titled "Do you really believe in the Kingdom of God?" The service began with a vibrant and lively song session led by Mr. McDowell. His wife Rose and two sons, Joel-Scott and Shawn were also present.

Mr. McDowell set his prior college years aside to attend Ambassador College and graduated in 1960 with Mr. A. J. Portune. Because of the zeal, drive and growth of both he and Mr. Portune, and there being only one office of President of the Student body, a special office was created and Mr. McDowell became the first student body Vice President in the history of Ambassador college.

After graduation, he served in the San Antonio and Corpus Christi, Texas area. From there he was sent to the big Pittsburgh church with an attendance then of about 300. After 3 years and much growth there, he was assigned to Seattle and Tacoma, Washington.

This man preached the word, was instant in season and out of season, reproved, rebuked and exhorted with all patience and doctrine. Why? Because he knew the flock in this area was committed to his trust. He was living proof of the statement, "And whosoever will be chief among you, let him be your servant" (Matt. 20:27).

During Mr. Blackwell's tenure here, the vitally important Spokesman Club was initiated. The first meeting was held on a Sunday night in August 1959. For awhile meetings were held every third week. Do you recall those first officers?

The club started with about 30 members. Now there are eight clubs-most with more than 20 members!

But still more was accomplished. A regular Wednesday Bible study came into being. In April 1961, the Chicago newspaper was born. Socials, picnics, and sports were regularly scheduled.

When the position of district superintendent was created Mr. Blackwell served in this capacity, in addition to his other duties. His "district" at one time stretched from Colorado to Toronto.







Answers - To Knowledge Knots

- 1. Here is a VITAL QUESTION!! On this date, Pope Paul VI comes to New York to address the United Nations General Assembly. This is the **first time** a reigning pope has visited this country. Not only that, but President Johnson will be in New York to meet with the Pope during his brief stay here!
- 2. The new district superintendent for the Chicago district is Mr. Bill McDowell. He has previously served in Pittsburgh and Seattle.
- Mr. David Antion has taken charge of the new Akron district, composed of the Akron, Pittsburgh, Wheeling, Lexington, Cincinnati, Dayton, Detroit and Toledo churches.
- 3. The axis of the earth is tilted 23½ degrees away from vertical. Even though the earth is closer to the sun in winter, the northern hemisphere is tilted away from the sun; likewise in summer, even

- though the earth is farther away from the sun, the northern hemisphere is tilted toward the sun. The effect is just the opposite in the southern hemisphere—explaining why there are greater extremes of temperature there. This "axis tilt phenomenon" also shows why God put much of the earth's land mass in the northern hemisphere, where tempertaures are not so extreme.
- 4. Wood has beauty, strength, durability and pliability qualities. Wood is porous, enabling a house to "breathe" and yet, because of locked cells of air, insulates the home.
- 5. God's people will be meeting in eight locations this year: Big Sandy, Squaw Valley and Jekyll Island in this country; Hayling Island, England; Johannesburg, South Africa; Blackheath, Australia; Kiara, Philippines; and the Isle of Martinique.
