



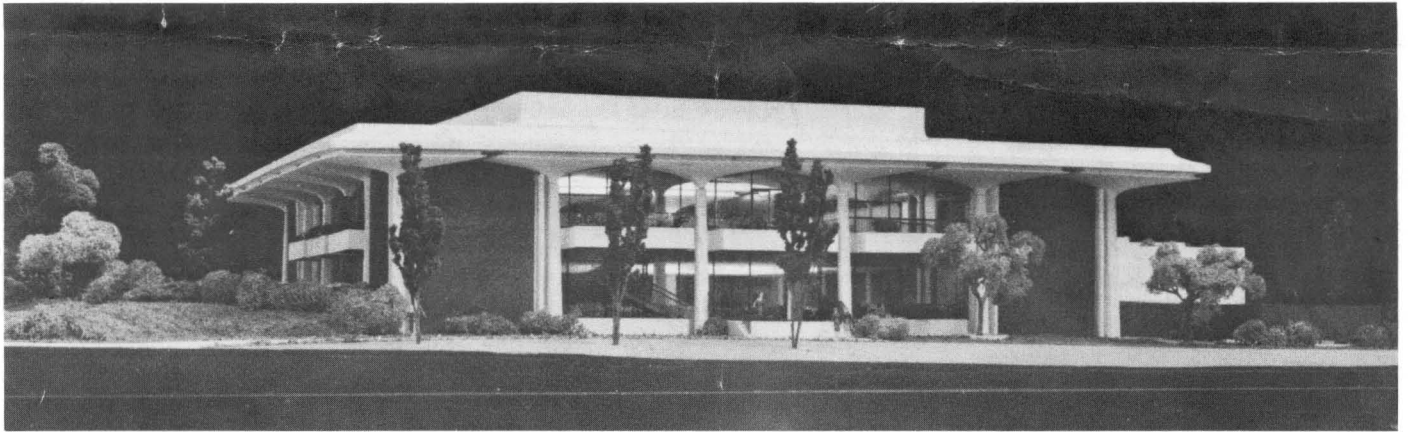

Construction Started on New Dining Hall

Ambassador Press Expands Again

Leaping forward with gigantic strides Ambassador College Press is once again expanding. The main scene of activity is centered around the big magazine press which prints *The PLAIN TRUTH*.

At one end of the press workmen are busily preparing two additional rotary printing units for installation. As soon as the last copy of the next number of *The PLAIN TRUTH* is finished these two units will quickly be put in place.

At the other end of the press a reinforced concrete slab is being poured to hold a new sheeter. A sheeter will make possible the delivery of flats of printed copy, not folded into sixteen-page sections. This is necessary to handle the full-color covers which are only

distinguished audience of City and County officials, including Pasadena's Mayor Gwinn and Los Angeles County Supervisor Warren M. Dorn, Mr. Herbert W. Armstrong began the physical "construction" by turning over the first shovelful of dirt of the new, multi-purpose Dining Hall.

With Mr. Armstrong's official "go ahead" the Moran Construction Company started to work in earnest. Big caterpillar tractors bulldozed their way through the few remaining frame houses, clearing the land for the new foundation. Mentoria Court, recently purchased from the City of Pasadena, was broken into pieces and hauled away never to exist again. Huge truckloads of fill dirt came pouring onto the

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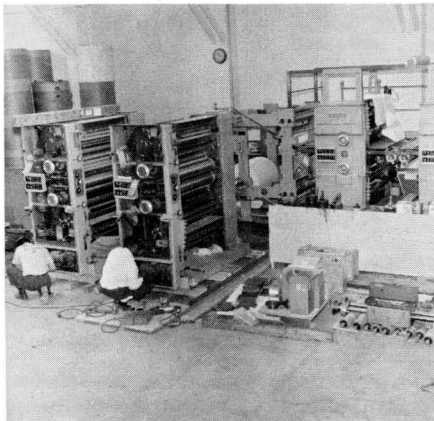

four pages and must be folded separately.

When completed the new additions will extend the length of the web press to 63' 11/2". Increased also will be its capacity. By running two rolls of paper through the press at the same time 32 pages of 2-color copy can be printed. If only one roll of paper is fed through the press then 16 pages of full-color can be printed.

This expansion is necessary to fulfill the projected biggest enlargement of *The PLAIN TRUTH* with the 32nd anniversary number, February, 1966.

Editorial

Are You Anemic?

Are you anemic—tired, worn out, enervated to the point you cannot think and work properly?

Do you desire to be healthy, alive, alert and vibrant in all of your activities?

Of course you do! Everyone desires a robust, abundant life!

Some, who have been anemic in the past no longer are a victim of this affliction.

Why? What did they do? How did they change?

First, they determined the cause of their anemia. Second, they took the necessary steps to correct the situation. Physically, this usually involved changing the diet to include foods extra rich in the elements their body needed. We are physical human beings and require physical food to sustain our physical lives. Consequently, we *are* what we eat. If we eat foods that are poor in the vital elements needed by our bodies then we cannot function as effectively as those having a better diet.

But—ARE YOU ANEMIC SPIRITUALLY?

Just as the physical food affects your physical growth and health, so does spiritual food affect your Christian life. A deficiency in iron causes you to be lethargic, lacking in zeal, little interest in the Church and will also eventually and inexorably lead to *your* eternal death.

Examine yourself as Paul says in II Cor. 13:5. Do *you* have an intense interest in the Work of God—His Headquarters?—His local Churches and their activities?—His colleges and students?—His Spokesman and Ambassador Clubs?—His witnessing, prophesying, teaching, correcting and healing through His ministers?

Is your heart in the Work of God?

Do you find it difficult to serve the brethren?—to pay your tithes?—to apply scriptures to your life?—to overcome?—to have an active interest in God's Work more than anything else?

Brethren, you *know* how you consider these things. If you *are* one who suffers from lethargy and lack of interest—which *is* spiritual anemia—then take steps to change!

In order to grow spiritually you must eat *spiritual* food just as your physical body must be sustained by *physical* food. Remember what Paul said in Romans 1:20, "the invisible things of him from the creation of the world are clearly seen, being understood by the things that are made . . ."

These two points are clearly evident: 1) eat good physical food and grow strong and healthy physically; 2) eat spiritual food and you *will* grow spiritually. *You must eat in order to grow.*

EAT SPIRITUAL FOOD AND YOUR SPIRITUAL ANEMIA WILL DISAPPEAR!

Christ said He was the bread of life in John 6:35. A few verses later He clarified the meaning by saying, "The words that I speak unto you, they are spirit and they are life." We consume spiritual food by *study, meditation, prayer and fasting*. But just as *you* must lift the fork to eat physically, *you* must also expend your effort seeking what God wants so anxiously to give you—then He freely gives you your needs.

God *cannot* lie! He states emphatically, "Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness for *they shall be filled*" (Mat. 5:6).

If you want to be a spiritually healthy servant—a producing, zealous, overcoming, happy, profitable son of God, *eat the food containing life!*

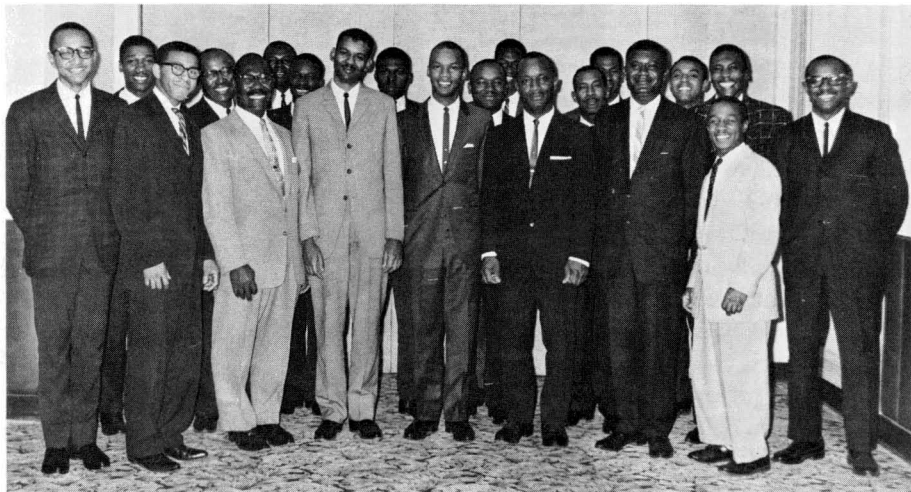

There were 21 men present at that first meeting: Mr. Alfred Carrozzo, Mr. Elbert Atlas—who will be the regular Club Director—and the 19 members of the Club.

Mr. Joseph Graham is the president; Mr. William Thompson, Vice-president; Mr. Felix Johnson, secretary; Mr. Melvin Featherstone, treasurer; and Mr. Benjamin Jackson, sergeant-at-arms.

building site raising the ground level to the required height.

Nine months from now (the scheduled completion date), a beautiful, yet very functional Dining Hall will stand 42' 9" above the Terrace Drive sidewalk. Students and visitors entering this impressive building from the north side will notice the terrozzo floor (small chips of marble moulded together in a special setting-bed, ground down and polished) of the main lobby.

Walking through the entry lounge into the massive main dining area your eyes immediately look up and notice the openness of the room with its ceiling more than 30' above you. Around the edge of this 58' 6" square opening in the ceiling runs a 9' wide corridor, where you can look down over the entire main dining room. As you look, your attention is focused on the beautiful expanse of parquet teak wood floor of the room—78' square.

Just to the west of the central area are four private dining rooms where Ambassador Clubs, foreign language clubs, and special meetings are held. Hardwood folding dividers can convert all four rooms into one long area to service larger groups. Huge walls of solid glass form the western boundary of these rooms and as you look through the glass you see a lovely outside dining terrace. Sitting at the tables of this terrace and looking west you have a grand view of the Ambassador campus, Mayfair, Terrace Villa and Ambassador Hall.

Turning back toward the east of the downstairs you pass by the south en-

trance with its large and spacious lounge similar to the one on the north side. Continuing east you come to the food preparing and serving area where hungry students get their meals. Behind

this is the kitchen with modern butcher shop, milling room and bake shop. (Be sure to read the accompanying article for more details of this custom-tailored kitchen.) Outside, entering from Vernon Street, is a 65-car parking lot and delivery ramp.

Upstairs, directly above the kitchen are two faculty dining rooms. From these rooms you can look past the shrub-filled planters by the windows, and over the entire City of Pasadena to the rising Sierra Madre Mountains in the distance. Located just to the south of this dining area is the carpeted faculty lounge.

Walking around the mezzanine to the west you pass by the two-chair barber shop and enter the 23'x60' student recreation and game room. And at the northwest corner of this area is the entrance to the student lounge, similar to that of the faculty.

Returning down the stairs, past the main dining room, and out through the entrance lounge, you are once again on the Terrace Drive sidewalk.

This one and one-third million dollar structure with its 33,860 sq. ft. of usable space adds an impressive segment to the expanding Ambassador College campus, and to the western section of the City of Pasadena. But most important of all, by its construction MORE students can be accepted to Ambassador, MORE workers and laborers receive training, and MORE churches and Bible studies started.

Read the editorial in this issue and be sure your heart is in the *growing* Work of God.

'Custom-made' Kitchen In New Dining Hall

One highlight of Ambassador's fabulous new Dining Hall is its "custom-tailored" kitchen.

Laschober, Pinckard and Sovich of San Marino, one of the nation's most outstanding firms of kitchen engineers, converted two years of thought, ideas, and planning into not only an up-to-date, modern kitchen but also one which expressly fits the needs of the Ambassador College student body. No other kitchen in the world is like it.

One of the unique features is a modern *butcher shop* designed especially to finish processing the pure Texas beef grown by our own farm program in Big Sandy.

Another feature is the special *milling room* in which wheat and grains bought from our own members are ground into the best, chemical-free flour possible. Bread and baked goods will then be prepared in a sparkling new *bake shop*, complete with the most modern of baking equipment.

The new Dining Hall kitchen has several other special features—1) a double serving line backed up by special holding units for hot or cold foods, 2) a conveyor belt system to take deposited dishes directly from the dining room to the dishwashing area, and 3) a self-service juice and water station.

The main cooking area includes the latest equipment—forced air ovens, steam cookers, broilers, heat controlled grills, and a revolutionary new machine called the "vertical food mixer." This one machine alone will perform a variety of jobs in an amazingly short time. Green salad or cole slaw for the entire college can be made in *twelve seconds!*

Ambassador Club dining will be served directly from the kitchen by food carts. Faculty dining facilities, located over the serving area on the second floor, will be served by means of an elevator from the kitchen below.

All these many features of the new Dining Hall are a wonderful blessing to Ambassador College and the Work of God.

Fontana Church Visits Huntington Library

Over sixty members of the Fontana Church spent an enjoyable Sunday afternoon, February 28, browsing through the Huntington Library, Art Gallery, and Botanical Gardens in Pasadena.

Located in the spacious exhibition halls of the Library building are over 250,000 rare books and two million or more manuscripts! The Library's Gutenberg Bible is one of 47 known copies, and one of only *twelve* printed on vellum instead of paper. Also on display are first editions of John Milton's *Paradise Lost* (1667) and John Bunyan's *Pilgrim's Progress* (1678).

In the main Art Gallery are many original works including the famous *Blue Boy* by Gainsborough and *Pinkie*, a portrait of Elizabeth Barrett Browning's aunt, by Lawrence.

Surrounding the Library and Gallery are the Western and Desert Gardens, the Camellia Collection and the Japanese Gardens. A setting of green lawns, semi-tropical and subtropical plants, palms, azaleas, and overhanging oaks give beauty and dignity to Huntington's estate.

The most novel part of the tour was the ten-acre Desert Garden—the largest collection in the world of mature desert plants growing out of doors!

For those of you who have never visited the 200-acre grounds of the late Mr. Huntington's masterpiece, it certainly would be an educational and enjoyable experience.

Pasadena A Falls to N. Hollywood 62-57 -- But Remains Top in Tourney

Pasadena's unbeaten record was shattered March 11, by a determined North Hollywood squad. Pressure for this BIG GAME was evidenced by the long, agonizing three and one-half minutes of hectic play before North Hollywood's Carl Tarver bucketed the FIRST two-pointer of the game.

The season—long and gruelling—had come to the "moment of truth"! Pasadena's strong A team, fresh from a dramatic win four days earlier over this same team, was knocking at the door to an undefeated season.

Back and forth across the boards pounded the players, as first one team and then the other sank baskets. Mr. Glover set the pace for his league leaders with 19 points, while Mr.

Graham led North Hollywood with 20.

The clock ticked on until, with minutes to play, it became apparent that the 2nd place North Hollywood five had risen to the occasion and, captained by Mr. Blackwell, were about to present Pasadena with its FIRST loss of the season.

At the final whistle, the scoreboard read 62-57.

With a real fighting spirit, Pasadena A played Mr. Carrozzo's Los Angeles B team in the second half of this double-header. Again led by Mr. Glover's 20 points, clobbered an under-manned team by the score of 91-43 and relegated the early league-leaders to a fourth place finish.
