CAN WE FELLOWSHIP THE DISFELLOWSHIPPED?

Are some of us trying to be more kind, merciful, and considerate even than GOD? Are we actually disobeying God in our soft, fence-straddling approach toward certain others?

To those disfellowshipped from the Church, Christ will say, "Depart from me..." (Matt. 7:23). There have been those disfellwoshipped for cause who have tended to want to "hang around" the Ambassador College campus and God's Church--attend basketball games, fraternize with members, enjoy what is here to be enjoyed. They seem never to cease wanting to "<u>GET</u>" all they can from the Church. Yet they usually will spread false rumors against the Church, or in other ways speak against it.

One thing characteristic, it has been noticed, concerning many disfellowshipped, they continue to have MORE INTEREST IN THE CHURCH than even many members. They seek diligently every bit of news or information about Church activities. They seek every method to obtain our literature--to know "what's going on." WHY? They seek every bit of information to twist and turn against God's Church, God's people, and God's Work. They seek it because in their hearts they know they are wrong, and they seek selfjustification by finding grounds by misrepresenting facts to falsely ACCUSE and CONDEMN the Church of GOD! Instead of seeking justification of their sinning past by the blood of Christ, they seek <u>SELF</u>-justification by persecution against, and false ACCUSATION of the Body of CHRIST!

Some time ago, without my knowledge and without any authority, someone started a category called "inactive members." It now appears this was done to benefit some who had been DISfellowshipped for cause. There never has been any official or recognized category called "inactive members." An announcement was made in this Report on that recently [April 3, 1981]. Such nonexistent category is officially declared nonexistent. Those who prior to that were DISfellowshipped are STILL DISFELLOWSHIPPED.

Now what does the Word of God teach God's Church in this regard? Those who had become baptized and received as members, but who, for offenses, had been disfellowshipped, we are to "AVOID THEM" (Rom. 16:17).

Again, "Now we COMMAND YOU, brethren, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye withdraw yourselves from every <u>brother</u> that walketh disorderly," and, "if any man obey not our word by this epistle, note that man, and have no <u>company</u> with him..." (II Thes. 3:6, 14).

We may have reason to have conversation or to eat with those of the world, but NOT with Church members or disfellowshipped ones who "walk disorderly." We read, "I wrote unto you in an epistle not to company with fornicators: yet not altogether with the fornicators of this world, or with the covetous, or extortioners, or with idolaters; for then must ye needs go out of the world. But now I have written unto you not to keep company, if any man that is [or has been?] called a brother [Moffatt: "any socalled brother"] be a fornicator, or covetous, or an idolater, or a railer, or a drunkard, or an extortioner; with such an one no not to eat" (I Cor. 5:9-11).

There have even been some, who have called themselves members and have been called such, who have been apparently preparing and recording "evidence" (improperly as brothers) to take before the courts of this world against Church members. The very next chapter, three verses later, begins, "DARE any of you, having a matter against another, go to law before the unjust, and not before the saints?"

God is far more strict in all such matters within the Church than we have sometimes been inclined to be.

Since we are to AVOID THEM entirely, that means not only that we must not go to them, but they must not be allowed to come into God's Church, or on the Ambassador College campus.

We may, personally, very much dislike to appear to be harsh. But expelled members have always in the past sought to come on our property and enjoy its privileges when they had abused the right to such privileges.

We MUST NOT appear to try to be more kind than God. Christ will say, "Depart from me!" WE MUST NOT COMPROMISE! GOD DOES NOT! Rather than compromise with His Law a trillionth of an inch, "God GAVE His only begotten Son."

But we should PRAY for such former members. Jesus said to pray even for our enemies. I do pray for all such. I pray God will BLESS THEM-with whatever He in His supreme wisdom knows is BEST FOR THEM--even though that may be severe PUNISHMENT! God punishes every son whom He loves. God's punishment is NEVER REVENGE or desire to hurt and enjoy their suffering. It is always CORRECTIVE! It is for the purpose of HELPING them--of BLESSING them! God still does it in LOVE for the one punished!

But what about those former members who just of their own accord "dropped out?" I think we have to go to Jesus' parable of the sower and the seed. Jesus showed that a few--or it may be many--endure only for a little while. It is those that "ENDURE UNTO THE END" that shall be saved, and born into God's Kingdom. Perhaps those who lost interest and dropped out were never converted in the first place. God shows us no reason to avoid them, but we should not closely fellowship with any unless or until they are being led by God's Holy Spirit, and show the fruits of God's Spirit within them.

What about disfellowshipped relatives--or even close, such as father, mother, son, daughter, brother, sister, etc.? I covered that in an article in the April, 1980 GOOD NEWS, "Which Family Comes First?"

I showed you that we are to withdraw ourselves from every BROTHER-or sister--son or daughter, etc. If it is a father or mother, we must still HONOR them, even in withdrawn fellowship.

Let us realize the JUSTICE of God's way, and that it is, truly, more just than the way that may seem right to a man.

FROM MINISTERIAL SERVICES

International News

From New Zealand Mail income for the month of March was easily the highest monthly income figure we have ever achieved! The total was a whopping 47.4% increase over the same month last year, bringing the yearto-date increase to 31.5%. The major reason for this excellent result was a very fine response to Mr. Herbert Armstrong's latest co-worker letter. God is certainly abundantly blessing His Work at this time, and we are very grateful to Him for that.

Excitement is mounting and preparations are well underway for Mr. Herbert Armstrong's proposed visit in May. Mr. Armstrong plans to conduct a Bible study in Auckland on the afternoon of May 17th, followed by a meeting with the New Zealand ministry and wives. We're making arrangements to establish a possible video link with Christchurch and audio links with other church areas so that brethren throughout the entirety of the area will have the opportunity to hear from God's Apostle.

In April we're launching a new series of promotions aimed at stepping up the size of our PLAIN TRUTH mailing list. This will consist of a fullcolor flier advertising the magazine, to be placed in leading newspapers nationwide. Late last year this promotion was tried in The Christchurch Star and The Otago Daily Times resulting in the addition of 11,400 new subscribers. In April it will appear in Wellington's morning paper, The Dominion, and after that it will be placed at two-week intervans in various newspapers in other centers.

German Office News Although the month of March showed a slight decrease compared to last year, our total mail for the year is still 75% more than in 1980. In March of last year we renewed our entire list and therefore our solicited mail was very high, accounting for the slight decrease in March 1981. However, the booklet requests in 1981 are continually increasing each month as our more than 35,000 new subscribers (resulting from 1980's advertising campaign) order more and more booklets with the convenient "booklet order card" placed in each KLAR & WAHR issue. We also sent out 5,000 US & BC IN PROPHECY booklets this month, as a result of advertising in the magazine. The mail income for the month of March was 9.7% more than in March 1980. Our year-to-date mail income is +16%.

<u>Spanish Language Activities</u> Recently, a small ad placed in a Sunday edition of the independent Madrid daily, El Pais (circulation 400,000), has yielded over 500 responses at a cost of less than \$2.00 each! The ad was positioned next to an article covering the nomination of King Juan Carlos for the Nobel Peace Prize. Any article about the King attracts extra attention, especially since his bold, much-applauded action during the attempted army takeover of the Spanish government. La PURA VERDAD circulation in Spain is nearing 6,000, with over 4,000 being added during the last three months.

Due to advertising in European magazines, the circulation of the Spanish PV has increased in numerous countries with large immigrant worker populations, such as Germany, Switzerland and England. This advertiging has yielded responses from many far-flung countries as well. The Spanish PV now circulates in 97 countries including Yugoslavia, Bulgaria, Poland, Sudan, Saudi Arabia, Iceland, Tanzania, Turkey and Sri Lanka.

Since the return of the South American ministers to their respective areas following the January Ministerial Refresher Program, a strong boost has been given to the "take one" wall card distribution program. In a few short weeks many cards have arrived from Peru (800), Venezuela (100), Chile (1,000), Argentina (700) and Uruguay (50).

Wilfredo Saenz, based in Lima, Peru, has established card distribution points in the Lima Convention Center and the busy central post office. Luis Chavez, the minister in Argentina, headed a seven-man "platoon" which placed over 200 cardholders in many parts of Buenos Aires. In three days, more than <u>twenty thousand</u> cards were taken by residents of the capital city!

The entire College, both students and faculty, as well as some of the employees, were pleasantly surprised and were highly honored to hear Mr. Herbert W. Armstrong address the forum on Tuesday, April 7th, and then again on Tuesday, April 14th. Mr. Armstrong sketched a brief review of some of the highlights of his life, and also gave a brief history of the founding of Ambassador College. It was all very inspiring. Mr. Armstrong had not spoken to the students for nearly three years.

Since you ministers don't receive the "Ambassador Portfolio," I thought it would be good to reproduce one article concerning the 1980 Feast Film which featured the Young Ambassadors. This Portfolio article tells how many peoples in Ghana, including the President and Vice President, and other leaders and diplomats came to see the film. Also, the students of the University of Legon saw and enjoyed the Ambassador Feast Film. The article follows:

Feast Film Success with Ghana Leaders

The 1980 Feast Film, featuring the Young Ambassadors, is making a big hit in Ghana, Africa. As Mr. Melvin Rhodes, pastor in Ghana remarked, "One might say the Young Ambassadors are becoming a more familiar sight in Ghana than many celebrities."

Following is the story of how this film came before the president of that country as told by Mr. Rhodes, March 26:

"It all started with the arrival of the Feast Film in Accra, Ghana [the capital] for its showing to the Church, sometime in December. The only available projector was owned by the British Council. The

British Council is an organization which aims to promote British culture to the best educated people, in countries they operate within, namely Third World countries.

"Before allowing the use of the projector, the film must be test run to ensure everything is working properly. While it was running, the film director entered the room and saw the film. At the time, he was working on a lecture about Western pop music to be presented at the University of Legon, so he asked for use of the film.

"The students enjoyed it so much, this film director decided to show it to other educational organizations in town.

"It is presently in the British Council library and is the most requested film they have. It has been shown at nurses' colleges, trade union schools and several universities.

"Then, the overall director of the British Council became interested and began showing it in his home to diplomats [ambassadors and high commissioners]. Then, early in March it was shown to the President and Vice President [of Ghana] in their homes with their families present and with remarkable success!"

This is only a beginning. As Mr. Rhodes commented after telling this story, "Who knows where it'll go from here?"

Progress on the new 1981 ENVOY is coming along very well. We plan to have it shipped to the feast sites before the Feast of Tabernacles begins so that it will be available to all of the brethren who attend the Feast. I am sure you will agree that this ENVOY is even better than the 1980 ENVOY.

Thanks for your continued prayers and other types of support for Ambassador College and, of course, for Mr. Herbert W. Armstrong. So far as I have heard, all of the ministers on the Refresher Program have expressed their joy at seeing Ambassador back on the track. Mr. Armstrong stated at forum this week that it is good to see the College coming along very well, and that he is pleased with the progress of the College. And, with the continued prayers and backing of God's people--and most of all, with God's support--I know Ambassador will continue to be blessed by Almighty God.

ON THE WORLD SCENE

THE ATLANTIC RIFT GROWS--WASHINGTON AND ALLIES DIFFER ON SOVIET THREAT The American people are on cloud nine after the successful performance of the space shuttle Columbia. National pride in America by Americans is surging once again.

In its foreign policy too, the United States--specifically the new Reagan team in office--is attempting to recover its lost prestige around the world, to finally "stand up to the Russians." But on this count Washington's determination is running into resistance, especially in Western Europe.

U.S. Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger's first appearance at NATO's Nuclear Planning Group last week accentuated the rift on defense matters that's steadily widening beween America and its European allies. This is something that the Soviets have long wanted, of course.

The United States, propelled by the urgings of President Reagan, is planning to spend heavily on defense to offset the startling Soviet/Warsaw Pact growth in weapons. It wants the West Europeans to get more excited about the issue as well. But the allies are dragging their feet, partly because of a different perception of the Soviet threat, partly because of the difficulty of keeping up with soaring military costs in a time of economic recession, inflation, unemployment and rising imported oil bills.

European leaders complain that the Americans just don't appreciate them, their problems, their already solid commitment to NATO as it is. Mr. Reagan, Mr. Weinberger, Secretary of State Alexander Haig and others are coming on too strong, too "hawkish," they complain. Particularly galling was the charge by President Reagan's National Security Advisor, Richard Allen, that "outright pacifist sentiments" were on the rise in Western Europe, causing the "contemptible 'better Red than dead' slogan of a generation ago" to once again be heard.

At the NATO talks in Bonn, Mr. Weinberger added more fuel to the fire by dismissing 17 years of detente--which many Europeans thoroughly believe in--as a mere Kremlin fraud to mask an ongoing Soviet arms buildup. He sidestepped European demands for an early resumption of strategic arms control talks with the USSR. Many European leaders warn Washington that they cannot supply their home soils for the new cruise missiles and longer-range nuclear missiles the U.S. wants to place there, unless the U.S. agrees to the resumption of arms talks.

How serious is the Atlantic rift? It's obvious that it is past the superficial stage and now into substance. The West German newspaper, Bonner Rundschau, for example, reported that the conflict which arose in Bonn forebode "perhaps the beginning of a <u>fatal split</u>." The influential national newspaper, Die Welt, contended that "the Atlantic Alliance is in danger of falling out over basic questions of material interest."

That the issues involved are deep was confirmed by West German Chancellor Helmut Schmidt when he referred to "the dispute over <u>fundamental issues</u> of defense policies." The Chancellor was especially <u>critical of Wein-</u> berger's dismissal of the supposed benefits of detente, in which the Germans have a very sizeable stake (i.e. keeping open tenuous ties to East Germany). The opposition to the tougher U.S. stance is strong in the Netherlands and growing in West Germany. The powerful Dutch Reformed Church--joined by an assortment of leftists and environmentalists--is mounting a crusade to bar the cruise missiles slated for the Netherlands in 1983 as well as the removal of short-range nuclear weapons already there. Washington's speculation about reviving the neutron bomb issue has resulted in an emotional outburst in the Netherlands.

In West Germany, there is a definite schism developing in the country's reaction to the new American posture. If a poll in the liberal news weekly der Spiegel can be believed, sixty per cent of Germans interviewed felt that "Bonn should keep its distance" from the "harder line" of the United States against the Soviet Union. Thirty-eight per cent supported the hard line.

The "soft" approach is favored by the younger generation, unfamiliar personally with the harsh realities of war. Radical elements among the young have led a recent upsurge in anti-American activities including bombings of U.S. military installations.

The strengthened left wing of the Social Democratic Party is giving Chancellor Schmidt a rough time. Some feel Schmidt is but an "American lackey." The left-wingers speak of the "two superpowers" in the same frame of reference, as if Germany's fate were not attached to one of them. Many left-wing politicians cut their teeth on the anti-U.S. rioting in Germany during the Vietnam era. They ascribe sinister motives to the U.S., but give Moscow the benefit of every doubt. Even a Soviet invasion of Poland would not likely phase them.

The left in Germany and elsewhere, however, composes by no means a united front. And this, says a Dutch defense official, typifies Europe's division as a whole. "Many politicians say Europe must speak with one voice," says W. F. van Eckelen. "But if you ask what the voice should say, there is no answer."

Europe still is waiting for the voice, or voices, to tell it where it should go. Either the leaders step forth--or Western Europe slides into a neutralized bear hug.
